### Help the Hellbender and Promote Water Quality



This April, IDEM staff will be giving Earth Day school presentations virtually. To keep the presentations engaging they have been reworked to fit into a virtual format. One of the new additions includes teaching about one of Indiana's endangered amphibians – the Hellbender.

Amphibians are small vertebrates that need water, or a damp environment, to

survive. They can breathe and absorb water through their skin. Other species of amphibians include frogs, toads, and newts. Hellbenders are the largest salamanders in North America. On average, they grow to be 12-15 inches but have been found to grow over two feet in length and weigh up to four pounds.

Hellbenders are fully-aquatic salamanders that require clean rivers with cool, well-oxygenated water to breathe. Today in Indiana they are now only found in Southeast corner of the state. Populations have dropped drastically due to modification of stream habitats. The accumulation of silt, agricultural and industrial pollution, warming waters and habitat degradation have landed Hellbenders on Indiana's state endangered list.

Hellbenders unique look is a striking visual for audiences when discussing what can be done to help keep Indiana's water clean. To learn more about Hellbenders and water quality in Indiana schedule an Earth Day presentation for your class!

### Supplies:

Colorful pages from old magazines, brochures and newspapers • Scissors • Glue Stick • Round pencil or crayon

### Directions:

STEP

Pick a colorful page out of a magazine or other paper product no longer being used.

**B**2

Cut across page at a slight angle to make long triangular strips.

**43** 

Place a triangle strip of paper flat and put pencil along wider edge of the paper strip. Roll the paper around the pencil.

Apply glue on the unrolled part of the strip of paper.

Tightly roll the rest of the paper strip around the pencil.

Slide the rolled paper off the pencil.
