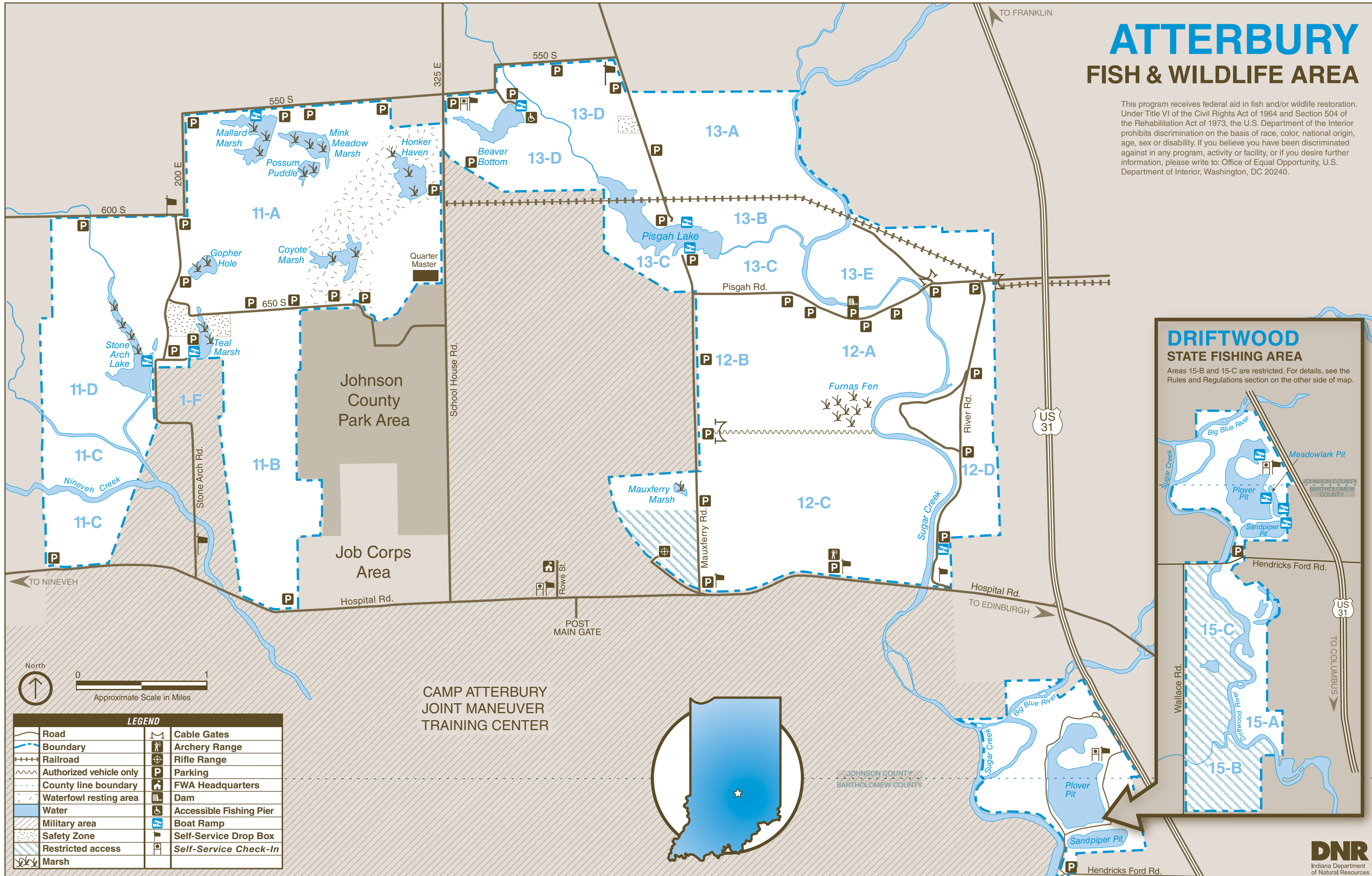


ATTERBURY FISH & WILDLIFE AREA

RULES AND REGULATIONS
In addition to state fish and wildlife laws, this property is governed by posted regulations affecting the public use of lands and facilities owned, leased or licensed by the Department of Natural Resources.

HISTORY
Atterbury Fish & Wildlife Area, a portion of the former Camp Atterbury, was acquired by purchase in March 1969 from the Government Services Administration and through the Federal Lands to Parks Program. Wildlife management efforts began immediately on the initial 5,400 acre tract. The remaining military area became a training facility for National Guard and Army Reserve units. In 2010, DNR deeded 1,250 acres to the National Guard to meet its military mission needs and acquired in exchange more than 1,900 acres to create Deer Creek FWA in Putnam County.



Atterbury State Fish & Wildlife Area is dedicated to providing quality hunting and fishing opportunities while maintaining 4,950 acres of upland game habitat, marsh, running creeks and shallow impoundments.

FISHING
Atterbury Fish & Wildlife Area provides 270 acres of available water: 10 impoundments, including 75-acre Pisgah Lake.
• Channel catfish, bluegill, redear and largemouth bass are the major species present.
• Stone Arch Lake, Beaver Bottom and Pisgah Lake have concrete boat ramps, and Teal Marsh and Mallard Marsh have gravel boat ramps.
• All lakes are limited to a maximum 24-volt electric motor.

TARGET RANGES
The shooting range facility features a 66-position rifle/pistol range and four combination trap and skeet fields. A fee is charged. Eye and ear protection is required. Range may be closed during severe weather. Contact the range for details, (812) 526-6552.

PERMITS
In addition to a hunting and/or fishing license, the following permits are required:
• Written permission from the Fish & Wildlife Area areas are open to the public.
• Check-in or written permission is required for fishing. There is a minimum size limit of 14 inches for largemouth bass in effect on all state-owned, operated or leased waters except for free flowing streams. Partial closures exist on five fishing areas during waterfowl hunting season.
• A DNR Lake Permit is NOT required on Atterbury Fish & Wildlife Area.

TRAFFIC
Traffic on public roads through the area is governed by state and county laws. Traffic over service roads and trails, except by authorized vehicles, is restricted to walking.

WILDLIFE WATCHING
4,950 acres of upland game habitat, marsh and shallow impoundments attract over 200 species. Atterbury is an excellent songbird viewing area all year round.

ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITIES
Wetland trapping is available through a drawing held the first Saturday in October.
• Dog training areas are provided in sections 13-A, 13-B and 13-D. (See map.)
• Put-Take Pheasant Hunt is available.
• Visit wildlife.IN.gov for more information.
• Accessible hunting areas for hunters with disabilities are available. Ask for details at the headquarters.
• Nuts, berries and mushrooms may be gathered from Atterbury Fish & Wildlife Area.

WILDLIFE WATCHING

HUNTING
Deer, rabbit, squirrel, dove, woodcock, ducks and geese are common at Atterbury Fish and Wildlife Area.
• Check-in is required. All hunting seasons and bag limits apply. Special hunts include a three-day Military Deer Hunt and Put-Take Pheasant Hunt.
• Dog training areas are available. Quail and pheasant, raised in captivity, may not be released for training purposes.

PERMITS
In addition to a hunting and/or fishing license, the following permits are required:
• Written permission from the Fish & Wildlife Area areas are open to the public.
• Check-in or written permission is required for fishing. There is a minimum size limit of 14 inches for largemouth bass in effect on all state-owned, operated or leased waters except for free flowing streams. Partial closures exist on five fishing areas during waterfowl hunting season.
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TRAFFIC
Traffic on public roads through the area is governed by state and county laws. Traffic over service roads and trails, except by authorized vehicles, is restricted to walking.

FUNDING FOR FISH AND WILDLIFE

The DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife sells hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses. All revenue is used for managing fish and wildlife resources in Indiana. No license money goes into the state general fund.

The Division also receives money from the federal Sport Fish and Wildlife Restoration programs (sometimes referred to as Dingell-Johnson and Pittman-Robertson funds). The funds are derived from excise taxes levied on sporting arms and ammunition, bows and arrows, fishing equipment and motor boat fuel. The funds are then returned to state fish and wildlife agencies using a formula that in part is based on the number of fishing and hunting license buyers.
