

Conservation Education

The Indiana Demonstration Forest Program identifies private forest landowners who are doing an exemplary job of forest management and assists in networking those landowners with others interested in improving and/or diversifying their forest management practices. There are currently 25 private woods designated as Indiana Demonstration Forests. In 2008 there were 14 field events hosting 383 people.

Project Learning Tree is a curricular supplement used nationwide to introduce pre-K through 12 students to complex environmental issues, using the forest as a "window to the world". In 2008, there were nearly 700 educators trained in the program. Thirty new workshop facilitators were added to the team of statewide facilitators. The first pre-service faculty workshop was conducted with 14 faculty members from 10 Indiana colleges and universities who will integrate PLT into their science methods courses. A forestry bus tour was conducted and Advanced PLT workshops on tree identification and Map, Compass and GPS. Indiana's Project Learning Tree State Coordinator served as a mentor to assist Wisconsin's program as part of the national PLT Model Program Initiative. Time donated to the state by facilitators and other volunteers totaled more than \$10,000.

The first **Environmental Education Symposium** was held in Indianapolis to examine both state and national issues and trends in the field. National Project Learning Tree Director Kathy McGlauflin was a keynote speaker, and author Richard Louv addressed the Symposium via webinar. The event was attended by 130 formal and non-formal educators and served to initiate efforts to revise Indiana's 1996 Environmental Education Implementation Plan.
