WELLNESS

The Wellness Committee has established the following Wellness Policy for the Pendleton Juvenile Correctional Facility.

The Committee recognizes that good nutrition and regular physical activity affect the health and well-being of students. Furthermore, research suggests that there is a positive correlation between a student's health and well-being and his/her ability to learn. Moreover, this facility can play an important role in the developmental process by which students establish their health and nutrition habits by providing nutritious meals and snacks through the facilities meal programs, by supporting the development of good eating habits, and by promoting increased physical activity during students stay here.

The Committee sets the following goals in an effort to enable students to establish good health and nutrition habits:

- A. With regard to nutrition education and promotion, the Facility shall:
 - Student shall be provided meals consistent with the parameters set by the National School Lunch Program and Snack Program and meet the nutritional requirements established by the USDA for the federally funded program.
 - 2. Nutrition education shall be included in the health curriculum so that instruction is sequential and standards-based and provides students with the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to lead healthy lives.
 - 3. Nutrition education shall be integrated into other subject areas of the curriculum, when appropriate, to complement, but not replace, the standards and benchmarks for health education.
 - 4. Nutrition education shall extend beyond the classroom by engaging and involving the facilities food service staff.
 - 5. Nutrition education posters, such as the Food Pyramid Guide, shall be displayed in the cafeteria.
 - 6. Nutrition education will reinforce lifelong balance, emphasizing the link between caloric intake (eating) and exercise in ways that are age appropriate.
 - 7. Nutrition education shall be designed and implemented to help students learn how to assess one's personal eating habits, and how to set and achieve goals for improvement.
 - 8. Instruction related to the standards and benchmarks for nutrition education shall be provided by highly qualified teachers.
 - 9. The Facility may provide to parents information which is designed to encourage them to reinforce at home the standards and benchmarks being taught at this facility.
 - 10. School environment will reinforce the development of healthy eating habits, including offering healthy foods, health-conscience fundraising, and staff wellness support.
 - 11. Nutrition promotion will include lessons that cover topics such as how to read and use food labels, choosing healthy options and portion control.

12. Students shall be provided surveys bi-annually and encouraged to record recommendations.

B. With regard to physical activity, the Facility shall:

- 1. A sequential, comprehensive physical education program shall be provided for students in accordance with the standards and benchmarks established by the State.
- 2. Physical education class shall provide students with opportunities to learn, practice, and be assessed on developmentally appropriate motor skills and social skills, as well as knowledge.
- 3. The program shall include instruction in physical education as well as opportunities to participate in competitive and non-competitive team sports to encourage lifelong physical activity.
- 4. Planned instruction in physical education shall promote participation in physical activity outside the regular school day.
- 5. Physical activity and movement shall be integrated, when appropriate, across the curricula and throughout the day.
- 6. Students will spend at least 50% of physical education class time participating in moderate to vigorous physical activity.

C. With regard to other Activities:

- 1. The facility shall schedule mealtimes so there is a minimum disruption by groups, classes, recreation, and other special programs or events.
- 2. The Facility shall provide attractive, clean environments in which the students eat.
- Students are discouraged from sharing their foods or beverages with one another during mealtimes, given concerns about allergies and other restrictions on some students' diets.
- 4. A wide variety of healthy, alternative rewards are used to provide positive reinforcement for children's behavior and academic performance.
- 5. Faculty and staff wellness programs are incorporated to build effective school health initiatives.
- 6. Students have access to water during the school day.

Furthermore, with the objectives of enhancing student health and well-being, and reducing childhood obesity, the following guidelines are established:

- A. Food service program shall comply with Federal and State regulations pertaining to the selection, preparation, consumption, and disposal of food and beverages as well as to the fiscal management of the program.
- B. The food service program shall provide all students affordable access to the varied and nutritious foods they need to be healthy and to learn well.
- C. The food service program shall be administered by a qualified nutrition professional.
- D. All food service personnel shall receive pre-service training in food service operations.
- E. Continuing professional development shall be provided for all staff of the food service program.

- F. Foods or beverages, especially those that do not meet the nutrition standards for foods and beverages, are not used as rewards for academic performance or good behavior.
- G. Rewarding children in the classroom will not involve candy and other foods that can undermine children's diets and health and reinforce unhealthy eating habits.
- H. School-based marketing will be consistent with nutrition education and health promotion. As such, schools will limit food and beverage marketing to the promotion of foods and beverages that meet the nutrition standards for meals or for foods and beverages sold individually.
- I. The facility may provide information to parents which is designed to encourage them to reinforce at home the standards and benchmarks being taught at this facility. The facility Wellness Policy will be posted on the DYS website and provide directions on how individuals may provide feedback to the facility on this policy.

Special considerations addressing familial visitations and the purchase of snacks by visiting families.

- 1. Pendleton Juvenile Correctional Facility shall comply with Smart Snacks requirements for all food sold **directly** to students during the school day.
- 2. During family visitations, to include those during regular school days if approved, a visitor may purchase snack items only for the student they are visiting.
- 3. Pendleton Juvenile shall not impose restrictions on the nutritional value of items purchased for the student during such visitations.
- 4. Each student must consume all items purchased during the visitation period, prior to being released back to their housing complex.
- 5. No purchased items shall be allowed to be returned to the students housing complex, and items not consumed must be disposed of properly or removed from the facility by the visiting family member.

The following staff members shall sit on the Wellness Committee: Administrative Assistant 1, Food Service Director, and Physical Education Teacher.

The Committee designates the Warden as the individual charged with operational responsibility for measuring and evaluating the facility's implementation and progress under this policy.

An annual review shall be made of this policy by the committee. The committee shall evaluate the Wellness Policy using the Department of Education's Checklist. The committee will provide the Warden with any recommended changes to policy.

Progress reports shall be shared with the public using the following channels of communication: School newsletter, website, and other forms of communication.
