2015: A Look Back

Time seems to fly by so quickly, that it is often difficult to believe it when another year concludes. Fortunately, when you have a year as wonderful as 2015 was for IHCDA and our partners, it is not easy to forget. I am so proud of everything that we accomplished working together and how many Hoosier individuals and families we were able to serve, that I thought I would provide a brief recap of the year:

To begin with, quite a transformation took place in 2015, when a new two-story, single-family residence was completed on the site of the first abandoned property in Indiana to be demolished from funds received through the Indiana **Blight Elimination Program**. The new home, located in the St. Clair neighborhood on the near the eastside of Indianapolis replaced a vacant eyesore, improved the safety and appearance of the surrounding homes, and provided the opportunity for a tax paying family to contribute to the positive growth of the neighborhood. Many other Indiana communities, both small and large, experienced a similar renaissance in 2015 as unsafe and dilapidated structures were torn down.

2015 was an exciting year for the **Indiana Stellar Communities Program**, as it welcomed six new state agencies into its partnership. The program was happy to include

the Indiana Department of Natural Resources, Indiana Office of Small Business & Entrepreneurship, Indiana State Department of Health, Serve Indiana, Indiana Finance Authority, and Indiana Office of Tourism and Development. While the original three agencies in the Stellar Program, OCRA, INDOT, and IHCDA, have committed financial capital to implement the Strategic Investment Plan, the new agencies will provide technical skills to support and enhance the existing assets within the community.

Another change to the Stellar Program in 2015 was the creation of two divisions; Division I for communities with a population of 6,000 or more, and Division II for communities with a population of less than 6,000. This year the program had thirteen communities that submitted proposals, and from those submissions, five finalists were selected. After site visits and presentations were concluded, the Stellar Designation for Division I was awarded to the City of Crawfordsville in Montgomery County, and the Stellar Designation for Division II was awarded to the Town of North Liberty in St. Joseph County.

The 2015 **Permanent Supportive Housing Institute** was a huge success, with five teams representing the communities of Bloomington, South Bend, Lafayette, New Albany,

and Valparaiso completing the six month program. This was the first group of attendees who were able to benefit from the results of the study conducted by the University of Southern Indiana Center for Applied Research and Economic Development to evaluate the effectiveness of the Indiana Permanent Supportive Housing Initiative. Specifically, the study assessed the impact on tenants and the community of five supportive housing developments created through the initiative. The results demonstrated significant reductions in costs to community resources such as hospital and criminal justice services, while showing marked increases in housing stability, resulting in better school attendance, improved family relationships, and opportunities to increase income. The findings of the studyshowing that supportive housing is an effective way to end homelessness, and not just manage its symptoms, were inspirational for the participants in the Institute.

Another highlight of 2015 was the introduction of the **Moving Forward initiative**. This innovative partnership between IHCDA and Energy Systems Network is aimed at providing energy efficient affordable housing and transportation to improve quality of life while decreasing the cost of living for low to moderate income individuals and families in Indiana. The Indiana Bicentennial Commission endorsed Moving Forward as a Bicentennial Legacy Project.

In September, IHCDA received 11 responses from its RFQ seeking two developers to participate in Moving Forward. In October, after careful review, Pedcor Investments and BWI, LLC were selected as the two development teams. In November, a workshop was held where the development teams worked with numerous subject matter experts from industry, academia and government agencies to create housing concepts focused on transportation and sustainability. We look forward to seeing what the teams will come up with in 2016.

2015 was a huge year for Hoosier home ownership as demonstrated by the demand for our **single family loan products**. We were thrilled at the end of 2014 to report a record breaking lending year where we provided \$265 million to more than 2,500 Hoosiers. But now, thanks to the hard work by our single family team to streamline and

improve the lending process, we are proud to have broken the 2014 record! In 2015 we helped more than 3,200 Indiana citizens obtain the dream of home ownership by providing \$330 million in loans.

2015 was a very special year for Indiana's Community Action Agencies as thirteen agencies celebrated turning fifty. On October 2, 2014, Indiana's first Community Action Agency, the Western Indiana Community Action Agency (WIICAA) turned 50 years old. Fifty years before, on October 2, 1964, WIICAA was established to serve Clay, Putnam, and Vigo counties pursuant to the 1964 Economic Opportunity Act under the Community Action Program initiative. In 2015, twelve more Indiana CAAs turned fifty as well. To honor WIICAA and all of the thirteen Indiana Community Action Agencies that turned the golden age of 50, Lt. Governor Ellspermann, IHCDA, and the Indiana Community Action Association joined together to celebrate with the entire network of CAP agencies. Congratulations to all of the Community Action Agencies who turned 50, and thank you for the many years of service you have provided to individuals and families in Indiana.

The inaugural class of the My Community, My Vision program finalized the plans for their communities in 2015. Student leaders from Hanover, Rushville, Vevay (Switzerland County), Washington County, and Lawrence County worked diligently with help from Ball State University's School of Urban Planning to develop formal plans to improve their communities and shape the future of their hometowns. Some highlights of the plans include developing apartments out of vacant downtown structures, constructing sidewalks and trails, expanding local farmers markets and providing access to local produce for healthier eating. Other ideas include opening a student run coffee house, and raising livestock to donate to food pantries.

The 2015 Indiana Housing Conference afforded IHCDA the opportunity of partnering with the Indiana Affordable Housing Council to host the event this year. Attendees enjoyed the introductory discussion about Indiana's Permanent Supportive Housing Institute, as well as the informative plenary sessions. Workshops focusing on U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development updates and Indiana's Qualified Allocation Plan were also very popular. In addition, housing professionals discussed the latest



Darin was a trusted coworker, a lifelong advocate for affordable housing and community development, and most importantly a friend.



This program celebrates the dedication and commitment of those that truly promote recovery of individuals in their ongoing treatment of serious and persistent mental illness. Stockment joined IHCDA in 2006 to serve as the Community Services Director. Fortunately, IHCDA offers a wide variety of training options for anyone ranging from "these programs are brand new to me" to "I'm very knowledgeable but a refresher course is always nice." These trainings can be found on our website and are offered for the **Tax Credit**, **HOME**, and **CDBG** programs. The offerings are available free of charge or at a reasonable cost. Many are offered as downloadable

Power Point presentations or PDFs and many others are available as online trainings that still allow the users to train at a time and pace that works best for them. Additionally, IHCDA partners with Zeffert and Associates to provide at least four trainings at different locations throughout the state. IHCDA finalizes the training schedule and posts it early every year with training topics including **Compliance for Tax Credit Managers** and **Managing Multiple Programs**. You might want to sign up early, because these trainings are popular and can fill up very quickly. Regardless of the method used, when a compliance auditor schedules a visit, the files will clearly show you have done more than just show up.

Randall Lofts Honored For Innovative Financing


Indiana's RealAmerica Development Company is received the 2016 Development of Distinction award for their work on Randall Lofts, which is located on Harrison Street near The Landing in Fort Wayne.

This accolade is given to development companies that use the low-in-

come housing tax credit in unique and innovative ways.

RealAmerica runs 20 different housing and commercial properties across the state, nine of which are located in Fort Wayne.

Vice President of Development Jeff Ryan says Randall Lofts was different than its other development projects because of its age.



"It needed a lot of work," said Ryan. "And so we combined historic tax credits with the rental housing tax credits in a way that gave us more equity to be able to rehab the building and be able to put more money into it."

Ryan says the property serves mixed income-earners by pro-

viding affordable housing to individuals making between \$12,000 and \$30,000 annually.

Randall Lofts is the only Midwest property to be honored with the award, which was presented to RealAmerica on January 7 at the Novogradac 2016 Tax Credit Housing Developers Conference in Miami Beach, Fla.

Moving Forward Program Endorsed as a Bicentennial Legacy Project

he Moving Forward Program recently received endorsement from the Indiana Bicentennial Commission (IBC) as a Bicentennial Legacy Project. IBC Executive Director Perry Hammock delivered the news at a workshop recently hosted by the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHCDA) and Energy Systems Network (ESN) for the two development teams selected to participate in the program.

"Projects like this one are important to Indiana's continued growth and prosperity," said Hammock. "While much of the Bicentennial celebration is focused on the past, projects like this one are important as we look towards Indiana's future."

The two-day workshop took place at the **Indiana Nature Conservancy** in Downtown Indianapolis and featured subject matter experts from across the country collaborating around the integration of energy efficient affordable housing and transportation. The workshop was opened up by Indiana Lt. Governor Sue Ellspermann.

"I'm extremely proud of the teams at IHCDA and ESN for their innovative approach to affordable housing," said Lt. Governor Ellspermann. "What Moving Forward does is recognize that affordability in housing goes beyond paying monthly rent. It includes transportation costs, utilities and other ancillary expenses."

The subject matter experts specialized in the built environment, energy efficiency and supply, systems integration, transportation and policy and finance. Experts from a number of organizations participated, including Art Center College, Building Green, Duke Energy, Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Purdue University and Vectren Corporation.

"We were fortunate to bring together national experts in affordable housing, energy efficiency and transportation," said Paul Mitchell, president and CEO of ESN. "As a result of this program and our partnership with IHCDA, we may see as many as 100 families who could benefit from the innovative solutions in affordable housing and transportation that will be developed out of the Moving Forward program."

"In my five decades of experience in attending urban planning and design workshops, this was one of the best workshops I've attended," said Carl Worthington, director of urban design for OZ Architecture and founder of Carl A. Worthington & Associates, a subject matter expert in the workshop. "From the incredible talent in the room, to the level of organization by ESN, to the sheer volume of innovative work that was accomplished, the Moving Forward workshop created the potential for some groundbreaking

work for the future of affordable housing." Worthington has an extensive portfolio in urban design projects, including Boulder Downtown Pearl Street Mall in Colorado.

At the conclusion of the workshop, the development teams shared their preliminary design concepts with the subject matter experts and Lt. Governor Ellspermann. Following the creation of their full development concepts, both teams will be able to submit Rental Housing Tax Credit (RHTC) applications of up to \$750,000 each under the General Set-aside* in July 2016.

First announced at the 2015 Indiana Housing Conference, Moving Forward was designed to create housing that increases quality of life while decreasing the cost of living for low to moderate income individuals and families.

*Per the Qualified Allocation Plan (QAP), IHCDA will reserve 10% of its RHTC for the IHCDA General Set-aside. Under this set-aside, IHCDA reserves credits for developments that further the Authority's mission, goals, initiatives, and priorities irrespective of the ranking by evaluation factors. The QAP states that the Authority will exercise its sole discretion in the allocation of the IHCDA General Set-aside.


The John Niederman Rural Development Leadership Award recognizes individuals who have demonstrated leadership in improving the quality of life, influencing policies, and fostering opportunities for growth and development for the betterment of rural Indiana. These individuals operate in a collaboration-first approach, building relationships to leverage impact in the rural communities that they serve. Bill Konyha, Executive Director of the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs said, "Abby embodies the collaboration-first, always acting, and relationship-building style of leadership which is the anchor of revitalization."

Hoy played a vital role in Wabash County's bid for the 2014 Stellar Community designation, which resulted in \$29 million in grants, tax credits, and private equity being invested in nine projects. One of these projects helped the community save the largest building in Wabash, bringing desperately needed affordable housing to the city and redeveloping ground floor store fronts. Just in the past year, Hoy's efforts have grown the Wabash Farmers Market, fostered cooperation between multiple organizations in

Wabash and North Manchester through a Public Arts program, and enabled the Wabash County Special Olympics to triple their donations.


Energy Efficiency Awareness Month in Indiana

Six groups of high school students from around the state are considering these questions as they participate in the second year of the **My Community, My Vision** program sponsored by IHCDA and Ball State University.

Student groups from Anderson, DeKalb, Gary, Hamilton Heights, Martinsville and Muncie recently gathered at the Ball State University Center in downtown Indianapolis to hear presentations about community planning strategies, funding options, and learn how to collaborate with community stakeholders. Graduate students from the Ball State University School of Urban & Regional Planning will mentor each student group as they learn and implement community planning practices.

In addition to exposing students to the basic tenets of community planning, My Community, My Vision provides high schoolers with a civic engagement platform. Teams work proactively with elected officials and community organizations as they develop their community plans, giving students a real-life view of policymaking at the local level.

My Community, My Vision teams will continue to meet through the winter and spring months to draft and perfect their plans before presenting them at the Indiana Statehouse for Lt. Governor Sue Ellspermann. Current ideas for community development include partnerships with local nonprofits, working with local mental health advocates and spurring entrepreneurial activities.

IHCDA's Innovation Grant Programs

ince 2013 IHCDA has set aside funds as a part of the Community Service Block Grant to support innovative community collaborative projects that will impact local low income communities that are at or below one hundred twenty-five percent of the federal poverty level and directly address one or more of the Six National Goals. Grant applications have focused on a particular community need that was documented through a local needs assessment or other community survey. The project or initiative must also demonstrate an active partnership between a local community-based organization and a community action agency.

Last year IHCDA highlighted the 2013 Agencies who

received Innovative Grant funding. The **South Central Community Action Program** received funding for "**Growing Opportunities**" which is a social business project that continues to be a self-sustaining com-



mercial greenhouse which provides job training for people with barriers to employment. **Northwest Indiana Community Action** also received funding to foster the civic engagement of seniors through events that gave them the opportunity to attend a Resource Fair, Educa-



tional Workshop and Open Space Technology Meeting.

We are now highlighting two programs that were awarded funds during our 2014 Innovative Grant Cycle and came to a close at the end of September 30, 2015.

Boys & Beyond

Pace Community Action Agency

This program focused on life-skill training and leadership building for low-income males ages 9-11 in Knox County, IN which includes three school corporations (Vincennes, South Knox and North Knox). The program was designed locally to provide life-skills





for boys as they transition through puberty and into manhood. Sessions were provided twice a month with healthy meals included. The program provided eight interactive,

innovative and fun learning sessions and one field trip for 4th and 5th grade boys. In addition, participants were able to earn rewards (personal hygiene kits, alarm clocks, coin sorter banks, shirts/ties and family movie passes) as incentives that comple-



mented the learning modules. Below are three exciting highlights of the program:

- 8 learning sessions and an educational field trip to a Children's Museum
- 12 Boys completed the program and 16 Boys participated in at least 2 sessions during the program
- 8 Boys opened a savings account with \$25 because of the program

Brightpoint Career Academy

Brightpoint

This program focused on providing participants with basic job skills. First the participants were introduced to such topics as accountability, appearance, respectful behavior, communication and punctuality. Then they moved into



direct issues that aid participants in seeking employment, including resume writing, interviewing skills and conducting a job search. The final two weeks included many key experiences as participants explored their career prospects.

This included class projects where they work in teams, analyzing themselves and their career aspirations, and talking with employers and community leaders.

Following graduation from the academy, participants are enrolled in Blue Jacket's Opportunity Staffing Agency. Opportunity staffers work to develop job opportunities and then match them with graduates of the program. Graduates of the academy also have access to Blue Jacket's clothing store which provides gently used professional clothing at a low price.





2015 Innovative Grant Cycle

The 2015 Innovative Grant cycle funded three new programs, and we look forward to seeing their progress. They include South Central Community Action Program's Energybus Weatherization Training Program, Community & Family Service's Crimson Coffeehouse that will provide job and skills training for unemployed clients and TRI-Cap's NFL Fatherhood Program.

- The Treasurer of the State or the Treasurer of the State's designee
- The Public Finance Director of the Indiana Finance Authority or the Public Finance Director's designee
- Four (4) members appointed by the Governor
- Not more than three (3) of the members of the authority appointed shall be members of the same political party.
- All members are appointed for a term of four (4) years.

Created in 1978 by P.L.28, Sec.1, and later amended by Acts 1982, P.L. 35, Sec. 2, IHCDA was created due to a need which exists to provide safe and sanitary residential housing within the financial means of low and moderate income persons and families. For more information, visit

About IACT

That was the moment that started the path to the creation of IACT. It was established to provide Indiana municipal officials a means to congregate, educate and advocate their interests before the state and federal governments. Indiana is one of the first states to form a municipal association, and IACT (pronounced "i-act") has a rich tradition of serving municipal government and elected officials. A not-for-profit organization, IACT represents municipalities before state lawmakers, and provides educa-

tion and information to members. With more than 460 municipalities as members, IACT is the official voice of municipal government in Indiana.

The reasons IACT was formed more than 125 years ago are still relevant today. Municipal officials unifying for the benefit of all Hoosier cities and towns. The specific issues are different, but the foundation is still the same.




on multiple issues including Indiana's housing priorities,

A Letter from Governor Mike Pence



On Wednesday, September 16, 2015, the Governor's Task Force on Drug Enforcement, Treatment, and Prevention held its first meeting, and at my direction, provided several recommendations for immediate action to combat the drug abuse crisis in Indiana. I have decided to take action on their recommendation involving **Aaron's Law** (SEA 406-2015), which I signed into law earlier this year to allow individuals to obtain and administer lifesaving overdose intervention drugs.



Therefore, I am directing all agencies to raise awareness of the existence of this law. Consider how your agency may be directly or indirectly involved in the carrying out of this law, and any constituencies you may be able to notify and educate about it so that more individuals will know about the availability of these lifesaving drugs.
