### What is an Active Shooter?




One or more subjects who participate in a random or systematic act(s) of violence demonstrating the intent to continuously inflict death or serious bodily injury on another person(s) and does so while having access to additional potential victims.


# School Active Shooter Incidents

1970-2022 (https://k12ssdb.org/active-shooter)






#### Active Shooter Situations at K-12 Schools: School Level (1970-2022)

# **Pre-Event Behavioral Clues**

- Share their intent with others / recruit.
- Begins bullying or gets bullied.
- Makes threats.
- Failure to fit in (become isolated / sudden withdrawal).
- Obsessed with desensitizing activities (cruelty to animals).
- Extreme fascination with previous active shooter events.
- Extreme fascination with weapons / bragging about access to weapons.

# Preparation / Awareness: Cooper's Color Code

**Unaware Relaxed Awareness Threat Identified Action Mode Freeze in Place** 



### Prevention

Our level of awareness can assist in recognizing a potential problem, conflict, or active shooter.

**Cooper's Color Code Yellow** 

#### **IMPORTANT**

We must recognize that not all individuals that present our "Pre-Event Behavior Clues / Potential Stressors or Triggers" will become active shooters. These are simply some indicators that have been developed through research of active shooter events.



# **Understanding Active Shooter Events**



#### The Attacker:

- Opportunistic
- Looks for Easy Targets
- Attacks Victims as they are Encountered
- Attacks Randomly / Or May Have Specific Target
- Takes Path of Least Resistance

#### The Attack:

- 44% last less than 1 minute
- 24% last less than 2 minutes

# How Should Management Respond?

#### **Identify / Create an Intervention Team**

- We are all pieces of the puzzle -



**Mission:** Identify individuals in need of assistance and **provide support**.

**Team Composition:** students, parents, School Resource Officers (SRO's), law enforcement, school counselors, mental health professionals, bus drivers, clergy, etc..

**Goal:** Identify pre-event behavioral clues and assist with providing necessary support to the individual demonstrating the clues to **prevent an active shooter event**.



#### Department of Justice Awards More Thak \$125 Million in Grants Under The Stop School Violence Act

FORT SMITH – The Department of Justice today announced nearly \$126 million in funding to advance school safety under the STOP School Violence Act. The grants, awarded by the Office of Justice Programs' Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) and the department's Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS Office), will help institute safety measures in and around primary and secondary schools, support school violence prevention efforts, provide training to school personnel and students, and implement evidence-based threat assessments.

"The Justice Department has no greater responsibility than protecting Americans from harm," said Attorney General Merrick B. Garland. "Schools must be safe places to learn, and today's investment of more than \$125 million under the STOP School Violence Act will help ensure that they are."

The Students, Teachers and Officers Preventing School Violence Act of 2018 (the "STOP School Violence Act") gives the Justice Department the authority to provide awards directly to states, units of local government, Indian tribes, and public agencies (such as school districts and law enforcement agencies) to improve security at schools and on school grounds through evidence-based school safety programs. It also provides grants to ensure a positive school climate by helping students and teachers recognize, respond quickly to, and help prevent acts of violence.

The 78 BJA annual awards, totaling almost \$74 million, are intended to support training and education for school personnel and students on preventing violence against others and themselves, including anti-hullying training and specialized training for school officials to respond to mental health crises. Funds of help develop and implementabilities inlinear threat assessment or internation teams and design technology solutions such as anonymous reporting systems, hotlines and websites.

The COPS School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP) provides up to 75% of the funding for school safety measures in and around primary and secondary schools. The 153 SVPP awards, totaling almost \$52 million, are statutorily obligated to be used for coordination with law enforcement; training for local law enforcement officers to prevent student violence; locks, lighting and other deterrent measures; technology for expedited notification of local law enforcement during an emergency; and other measures that provide a significant improvement in security.





# How Should You Respond?

#### **Be Aware of your Environment**

- Observe people around you
- Know where each exit is and how to open it
  - Position yourself to observe the area
- Plan your response options based on the area

#### **Be Mentally Prepared**

- Cooper's Color Code Relaxed Awareness
  - Be alert, not paranoid
- Plan your response based on your observations
- HAVE A PLAN.....Not <u>IF</u> it happens, but <u>WHEN</u> it happens



# Environment + Mental Preparation = Options

# Lockdown / Bypass — Escape — Fight

"In the moment of decision, the **BEST** thing you can do is the right thing, the **NEXT BEST** thing is the wrong thing, and the **WORST** thing you can do is nothing."

- Theodore Roosevelt



# Lockdown / Bypass Considerations

Can you simply **drive away** prior to attacker boarding the bus?

Can you **secure your door(s)** so the attacker cannot board the bus?

If the attacker boards the bus, cover (i.e. a medium bullets cannot pass through) within the bus is limited.

Concealment (i.e. a medium bullets can pass through, however can conceal your position) **should only be a temporary option**.

Examples of concealment are: behind / under seats, backpacks, class projects, etc...

\*If stuck in a position of concealment and an attack is imminent, consider rapidly transitioning to escaping or fighting.



# **Escape Considerations**

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What is the position of the attacker? (e.g. front, rear, or middle of bus)
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What type of <u>weapon</u> does the attacker possess? (e.g. firearm, knife, explosives, etc...)

Can the students be **evacuated away** from the attacker? (e.g. will they have to go by the shooter to escape)

Is the bus moving, does it create an advantage to suddenly start, stop, or violently steer the bus to **throw off the shooter's balance**?

Once you make the decision to escape, you must be clear to the passengers and yell, "GET OFF THE BUS."



# Fight Considerations

What can you use as a <u>weapon</u>? (e.g. Tire Iron, Fire Extinguisher, Backpack, etc...)


If fighting is your best option, **DO NOT HESITATE** and **FIGHT AS HARD AS YOU CAN**.

Can the students be **evacuated away** from the attacker while you're fighting? (e.g. yell for them to get off the bus while you are fighting.)

Once you make the decision to fight, you must be clear to the passengers and yell, <u>"GET OFF THE BUS."</u>




