Project Success

- 325+ field days/workshops reaching over 16,000 people
- 275+ producers provided assistance through phone calls, emails and site visits;
- 100+ producers provided with high level technical one-on-one assistance;
- 350+ agency staff receiving high level technical training;


Practices Requested in FY 2015 by Status





Practices Requested in FY(s) 2014 and before by Status



Program Updates

On Farm Network/INfield Advantage

- The OFN Winter meetings will be completed on March 12. They are going well with plenty of grower engagement
- I was part of a panel discussion during the Iowa Soybean Association's Annual Research
 Conference on February 19, 2015. The panel highlighted the Multi-state On Farm Partnership.
 Corn and Soy paid for some or the OFN group leaders to attend and two district staff people, as
 well as some ISDA staff, attended.
- The Indiana Corn Marketing Council/Indiana Soybean Alliance is sponsoring the program's group leaders to attend the Indiana Ag Forum on March 16. There may be a breakout session during the afternoon.

Red Gold Environmental Stewardship Program

 The 2015 award program will be accepting preliminary applications from March 27 through April 27. The top five finalists will be visited the first week of July and the winning farm will be announced in early August.

Program Updates

2014 Conservation Accomplishments

Region 5 Model analyses are Nutrient load reductions are completed for the Northwest and Southwest Regions. Northeast and Southeast will have their analyses completed by March 16.

IDEM reported that the GRTS database is once again operational. They pulled the Section 319 practices for 2014 and are currently waiting on the point data from EPA. The point data will be married to the practice data once received.

All 2014 practice data has been aggregated by county and program into a spreadsheet. Once IDEM's data is submitted, the 2014 Conservation Accomplishments map will be created featuring the total amount of practices installed in each county.

The nutrient load reduction maps will be created the latter part of March or first of April, along with the 2014 ICP Conservation Accomplishments Report and 2014 ICP Nutrient Load Reductions poster.

NRCS State Conservationist's Report March 2015

NRCS Budget

We have received our 2015 budget and it is one of the first years ever we are not starting out in a deficit. We are trying to digest everything but feel good about proceeding with staffing and training plans.

Staffing

NRCS went through a major operations improvement effort last year looking at staffing, training, quality assurance, etc. As a result of holding vacant positions and the operations improvement effort, we will proceed with filling 14 vacancies at the field and state office level.

Soil Health

Indiana continues to lead the country in soil health efforts thanks to many of you. Nationally, a new soil health division has been established at headquarters and we have a hired new director and assistant director. Other positions for regional soil health leadership are expected to be filled soon.

We recently partnered with IASWCD and Marion County SWCD to hire an urban soil health conservationist in Marion County (Kevin Allison). Kevin will be working with community gardeners and urban residents on their special soil health needs.

We are excited that Purdue Extension has announced three positions that will support the Conservation Cropping Systems Initiative (CCSI) and our soil health work here in Indiana

- Extension worked with IASWCD to hire the CCSI agronomist (to take Hans Kok's place). The position is for one year and will be housed at Purdue.
- Ronald Turco, Agronomy professor has been named the assistant dean of agricultural and environmental
 research for the College of Agriculture. This position is new and will focus on soil health and water quality.
 Ron has also been appointed as the new director of the Purdue Global Sustainability Institute at Purdue for
 the next two years.
- Another key soil health position recently announced is that Walt Sell will become the ANR Assistant Program Leader for Soil Health, a newly created position within Purdue Extension. Along with soil health, he will focus on water quality and nutrient management. Walt will help coordinate efforts among the ICP members in the field, making connections and providing resources and support. Walt will begin on April 15th.

The Midwest Cover Crop Council is moving from Michigan State to Purdue. It will be a great opportunity for the ICP to have them in the state.

There are lots of upcoming soil health events – watch for field days and workshops near you.

Contribution Agreements

Indiana is evaluating the need for new contribution agreements for the following work:

• NRCS is in need of assistance with slide scanning, program support, administrative support, and certain CRP activities. Some of this work will involve field reviews, as well as data entry into our business software systems. We are considering pursuing contribution agreements with partners to accomplish this work. This will allow our District Conservationist's as much time as possible to do Conservation Planning and meet with customers on their farms.

2014 Farm Bill Program Updates

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP): Application approval will begin after March 6th.

Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP): NRCS has opened a public comment period for the ACEP interim final rule. If you are interested in seeing the rules or commenting, please let your District Conservationist know. The deadline is April 27th.

<u>Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)</u> – The deadline for farmers and forest landowners with expiring CSP contracts to re-enroll is March 31, 2015. The deadline for general sign-up CSP applications is Friday, March 13, 2015.

Conservation Compliance Requirements for Crop Insurance Participants: To be eligible for premium subsidy on <u>any</u> federally reinsured crop insurance policy, including specialty crops, livestock, and pasture, farmers must file form AD-1026 certifying compliance with FSA by <u>June 1, 2015</u>. The Risk Management Agency has notified farmers who might be first time program participants and requesting premium reduction for crop insurance or those who have insurance, but records indicate an AD-1026 is not on file with FSA.

Special Initiatives Updates

Mississippi River Basin Initiative (MRBI): Phase II of MRBI is coming. We worked with ICP Leaders and the State Technical Committee to select five 12-digit watersheds in the Mississippi River Basin to focus additional targeted EQIP dollars this year. The five recommended watersheds will be finalized and submitted to national headquarters this week and should be approved by early April.

<u>National Water Quality Incentive (NWQI)</u>: A second NWQI EQIP sign up has been announced, with an application deadline of March 20. Beargrass Creek in Wabash County has been added as a targeted watershed in 2015. NWQI focuses EQIP funds to address nutrient reductions. The other three watersheds are:

- Eagle Creek in Hendricks and Marion Counties
- Silver Creek in Kosciusko and Wabash Counties
- Ell Creek in Dubois County

<u>Resource Conservation Partnership Project (RCPP)</u>: The FY16 solicitation for new RCPP pre-proposals is expected soon. Agreements for the three projects that include Indiana are being written, including:

- Indiana Watershed Initiative led by the University of Notre Dame
 - o Kosciusko, Newton/Jasper/Benton, Howard Counties
- Tri-State Western Lake Erie Basin Phosphorus Reduction Initiative led by Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development MDAR
 - o Steuben, Noble, DeKalb, Allen, Wells and Adams Counties
- Michigan/Indiana St. Joseph River Conservation Partnership led by MDAR
 - o St. Joseph, Elkhart, Lagrange, Steuben, Kosciusko, Noble and DeKalb Counties
