

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Substance use disorder / addiction is a major public health concern in the United States.

20 million are <u>symptomatic</u>, or in active addiction.

Another 23 million are living in recovery. They are non-symptomatic.

Combined, 43 million Americans are affected.



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


There are differences between **those** who use substances and those with Substance Use Disorder.


Addiction suggests a more severe turning point where changes in the brain occur.

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




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Community-Wide Effort Required




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
Research has illustrated the need for cross-sector collaboration to tackle multidimensional problems such as substance use disorder.











Clinicians SUD Education GAP

Research demonstrates that most primary care physicians feel unprepared to diagnose and treat substance use disorder (SUD).

Only 20% percent felt very prepared to screen for SUD, only 9% to provide a brief intervention, only 7% to discuss behavioral treatments, and only 9% to discuss medication treatments.

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Clinicians SUD Education GAP

While nurses and physicians have stepped up to help in the pandemic, many have discovered they were not formally prepared with the skills needed to address patients' comorbid SUDs.

In fact, an estimated 8% of the population over age 12 has a diagnosable substance use disorder, yet <u>a majority of providers</u> feel they're <u>unprepared to treat SUDs.</u>

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Stigma and discrimination

An Associated Press-NORC study recently found that 44% of Americans surveyed said opioid addiction indicated a <u>lack of willpower or discipline</u>.

A third regard it as a character defect or the result of bad parenting.

4 in 5 said they were <u>unwilling to associate closely with</u> someone with an opioid addiction.

Those with experience with opioid addiction, either themselves or through a loved one, are more likely to say a substance use disorder is a medical problem to be treated than those without such experience (62 percent vs. 50 percent).



Cross-Sector Community Collaboration

The Overdose Lifeline training and certificate programs assist clinicians, law enforcement, and laypersons in **building knowledge and competency** in the underserved area - substance use disorder / opioid health crisis.

Allowing individuals across community sectors to work together more efficiently and effectively in prevention efforts and to better serve those affected.

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In partnership with Purdue University College of Pharmacy, Office of Continuing Education, and funding through the Employer's Forum of Indiana, Overdose Lifeline has developed healthcare clinician and layperson continuing education on Addiction / Substance Use Disorder with an Opioid Specialization.

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Take online courses from anywhere. Completing the coursework when it is convenient for one's schedule.

- Designed for people with demanding schedules
- Courses may be taken in any order
- Courses run 1.5 to 3 hours
- Each course includes "Check Your Knowledge" activities to assist in preparing for the course final exam
- CE credit and certificate delivered upon successful course completion
- Affordable, \$15 per credit hour

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

To earn trainer designation, individuals complete one or more prerequisite courses and program training via the web.


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
Program Materials

Trainer Resource Centers include: Presentation, Full Script, Resources, Attendee Surveys, Hand-outs, Attendee Certificates, and more.




































