







#### **Heroin Seizures**



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


Opioid & Other Controlled Substances Prescription Rates for Representative States Rate of Rx per 1,000 Population - 2010-2016




#### **Cocaine Seizures**





The above graph reflects the change in cocaine/crack seizures, in terms of amount seized (in kilograms) within all HIDTA counties from 2011 to 2018.




The above map reflects HIDTA cocaine/crack seizure percentages of change over the past seven years, by comparing 2018

to 2011




#### **Methamphetamine Seizures**



The graph above highlights HIDTAs methamphetamine/ice seizures across all HIDTA from 2011-18.






The above map reflects HIDTA methamphetamine seizure percentages of change over the past seven years, by comparing 2018 to 2011

Stimulant Prescription Rates for Representative States Rate of Rx per 1,000 Population - 2010-2016








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



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
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Past Year Nonmedical/Illicit Users in (000s) - Opioids




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
The graph above reflects heroin new Initiate data versus HIDTA Seizures from over a eight year period



The graph compares Opioid & Other Prescription Rates for Representative States per 1,000 population against Opioid prescription New Initiates over a eight year period.



The above graph reflects cocaine new Initiate data versus HIDTA Seizures from over a eight year period






The graph reflects methamphetamine new Initiate data versus HIDTA Seizures from over a eight year period




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The above graph compares HIDTA Heroin seizures to heroin related drug overdose deaths over a eight-year period.




Opioid & other non-stimulant controlled substances Rx as reported by 7 state PDMPs for 2011 through 2017 compared to the provisional number of overdose deaths involving opioid Rx, as reported from CDC.




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The comparison of HIDTA seizures of Cocaine to deaths involving cocaine show rapid increases from 2011 through 2016, suggesting that the increased deaths are highly correlated with increasing supply.




Methamphetamine seizures and deaths, while smaller in numbers than cocaine, are both increasing at a faster rate from 2011 to 2018.








#### **Cocaine OD Deaths in New York City**

Age Adjusted Rate per 100,000 residents




- Rate of cocaine overdose (OD) deaths doubled from 5.2 per 100,000 first half of 2015 to 10.4 last half of 2016.

- Primarily, cocaine was in combination with opioids, i.e. heroin and/or fentanyl.


- Cocaine with fentanyl accounted for 90% of the overall increase in rate of Cocaine OD deaths.
