

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Plan Summary

Mission Statement: Our mission is to provide an organization through which the community can plan and implement efforts to address the problems of substance abuse and dependency in Carroll County.

We believe the healthy development of our citizens is being threatened by the problems and challenges of the drug use in today's culture. Our purpose is to make a positive difference in the area of substance abuse issues.

Therefore, we will act to coordinate existing services and network to stimulate the development of new responses to substance abuse issues, to create community awareness and to join together in advocacy for the maintenance and improvement of standards and services to end substance abuse and dependency in Carroll County.

History: The Carroll County Substance Abuse Coalition was formed in 1990. The original name of the coalition was 'Don't Underestimate Carroll County' (DUCC). The name was changed in October of 2003 to Partners for a Drug Free Carroll County. The mission of the coalition is a comprehensive approach to substance abuse in the county. Since its formation the coalition has held public meetings to address community issues and solicit community involvement in the areas of prevention, treatment and law enforcement/justice. The coalition serves as the recognized Local Coordinating Council (LCC) for the Governor's Commission for a Drug-Free Indiana.

The focus of the coalition's activities has been two-fold. First, the coalition works to reduce substance abuse among youth and adults by encouraging effective responses by all sectors of the community. Second, the coalition has worked to implement a widespread community education program on substance abuse issues. The coalition's efforts have targeted reductions in all illegal drugs as well as tobacco, alcohol, inhalants, and prescription drugs.

Since its inception, the LCC has attempted to bring together a cross section of the community in a county-wide effort to address substance abuse issues facing the county. Carroll County has a population of approximately 22,000. It covers a geographic area that consists primarily of farming and some light industrial businesses. We have two school corporations in the county. Our social services agencies have agreed to work closely with our LCC to address substance abuse issues.

Summary of the Comprehensive Community Plan: We are attempting to lower the use of drugs and alcohol in our community, especially with the youth of our community. We are doing this with cooperation of the schools and law enforcement courts and the community. This plan was developed using data to determine the alcohol, tobacco, and other drug problems that exist in the county. The LCC approved the Comprehensive Community Plan as the direction for the next 3 years.

At the beginning of 2010, the LCC gathered data and reviewed what had been done in 2009 to determine if there were any changes that needed to be made in 2010. This review allowed the LCC to determine that there were some areas in which no work had been completed and in 2010 efforts will be made to move the objectives forward. All of this was completed in order to put the Comprehensive Community Plan Update together.

Law Enforcement/Justice

2. New probation cases in 2009 included 119 adults and 24 juveniles for substance abuse violations.
In 2009 there were 126 Drug related arrests and 100 Alcohol related arrests for adults. Broken down into these results: Drug Abuse Violations: 41, Selling/Manufacturing: 2, Marijuana: 32, Cocaine/Opium: 3, Possession: 40, Syn Narcotics: 2, Dangerous Non Narcotics: 6, OWI: 75, Liquor Laws: 25, Public Intoxication: 30
3. 2009 arrests for youth under 18 were 9 drug related and 19 alcohol related. Broken down to: Drug Abuse Violations 3, Marijuana 3, Liquor Laws 9, and Drunkenness 10.
4. In 2009 there was one alcohol related traffic fatality and 32 alcohol related collisions in Carroll County.

Law Enforcement/Justice

1. New probation cases in 2010 included 177 adults and 25 juveniles for substance abuse violations.
2. In 2010 there were 32 Drug related arrests and 79 Alcohol related arrests. Broken down into these results: Drug Abuse Violations: 32, Selling/Manufacturing: 1, Marijuana: 28, OWI- Narcotic 1: Possession of Paraphernalia 2: OWI: 21, Public Intoxication: 18
3. 2010 arrests for youth under 18 were 40 alcohol related. (Increase in Law Enforcement.)

Partners for a Drug Free Carroll County (DUCC) 2011 Report and Review of 2010

For 2010, we served over 300 Substance Abuse clients. (173 were served from Carroll County Court). For 2010, we had a 94% attendance rate in the Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP). 163 were in the IOP program. Approximately 90% completed the program with approximately 11% dropping out. Drug testing became approved as a company wide policy for 6 outpatient sites. For our FY 2009/2010 as a company we did over 10,602 drug tests .We had 96% negative findings.

The graph shows the drug testing at our Delphi Clinic. In 2010, as a clinic, we averaged 617 tests. 579 were negative (93%). Approximately 7% were positive.

End of Year 2 Update:

IPRC results for 2011 are as follows: Data from Delphi Community School Corporation and Carroll Consolidated School Corporation are unavailable. Both schools stated they participated in the IPRC. We have not yet received the results back from the State of Indiana.

Delphi Community High School 2011 reports 25 students and Carroll High School reports 18 students seeking alcohol / drug assistance through school counseling by either self-help or in-school mandated sessions.

Law Enforcement/Justice

1. New probation cases in 2011 included 172 adults and 10 juveniles for substance abuse violations.
2. In 2011 there were 109 Adult Alcohol Arrest; 36 Adult Drug Arrest; 7 Juvenile Alcohol Arrest; 4 Juvenile Drug Arrest; 17 Marijuana Arrest; 83 OWI Arrest; and 26 Public Intoxication Arrest.
3. In 2011 there were 7 Juvenile Alcohol Arrest which is down from 40 arrests in 2010.
4. In 2011 there was one alcohol related traffic fatality and 22 alcohol related collisions in Carroll County.

Treatment/Intervention**Wabash Valley Alliance-Delphi Site****Partners for a Drug Free Carroll County (DUCC) 2011 Report and Review**

For 2011, we served approximately 250 clients in various combinations of drug and alcohol education, substance abuse assessments, individual, family therapy, and IOP (Intense Outpatient Program). Of that number 124 participated in IOP. During IOP we maintained an overall attendance rate of 93% throughout the year, with the range of attendance per quarter falling between 91% and 95%. The completion rate for the year was 84% which was down from 2010.

During the first half of the year 16 clients did not complete the program. Of those 16 clients, 11 were sent back to jail, 4 dropped out, and 1 was sent to residential treatment. During the second half of the year we lost 4 more clients. We conducted 372 drug tests during 2011 and had 97.3 % negative findings. This included a small percentage of tests that also screened for synthetic cannabinoids. THC, Opiate s and Amphetamines were the classed of drugs that returned the most positive test, accounting for 56 of the 61 positive tests.

Final Update (end of Year 3):**C. Goals:**

- 1. Lower drug and alcohol arrests in youth and adults by 2 to 3 %.**

End of Year 1 Annual Benchmarks:

1. The data shows an increase from 119 in 2009 to 177 in 2010 in adult drug and alcohol probation and increase of 58.
2. There was an increase of 1 for juveniles for substance abuse from 24 to 25.
3. There were 40 juvenile alcohol related arrests compared to 2009 figure 19. (Law enforcement personal has increased in the last year.)

End of Year 2 Annual Benchmarks:

1. The data shows a decrease from 177 in 2010 to 145 in 2011 in adult drug and alcohol probation a decrease of 32.
2. There was a decrease of 14 for juveniles for substance abuse from 25 to 11.

Final Report (end of Year 3):**D. Objectives:****Education/Prevention**

1. Participate in county schools drivers' education and health programs to educate the students on alcohol and drugs.
2. Educate the public on the major alcohol and drug problems we have in the county.
3. Promote more alcohol and drug education in and out of the schools to youth by providing funds to support programs.
4. Invite public leaders to become involved in the LCC to assist this organization in our goals.

Law Enforcement/Justice

5. Use OPO to make more arrests for OWI and drug related offenses.
6. Purchase equipment to assist officers in their work

Treatment/Intervention

7. Support treatment options to reduce repeat offenders.

End of Year 1 Update:**Education/Prevention**

1. County schools drivers' education and health program in which 30 students participated in.
2. Delphi Police and Carroll Co Sheriff's Department participated in three public civic functions, Carroll Co 4H fair, Old Settler's Festival in Delphi and Health Class in Delphi Community High School for 28 students.
3. DARE program in Carroll County facilitated by Carroll Co Sheriffs Dept. to all 5th graders, around 200 students, in all county schools. Mentoring program by Paw Pals – 37 students participated, all students exhibit known "at-risk" factors for drug and alcohol abuse.
4. LCC has invited the court, probation and prosecutor's office, local ministers, more school officials, media and public invitation in local news paper. We have had new individuals come to meetings and express interest in the organization, such as the media and local rescue mission.

Law Enforcement/Justice

5. Participated in OPO 2010 12 Portable Breath Tests administered & 14 Standardized Field Sobriety Tests administered, resulting in Open Container Violations – 2 arrests, Underage Consumption – 5 arrests, Misdemeanor DUI – 6 arrests and Felony DUI- 1 arrest.
6. Equipment purchased for Law enforcement, in car video/body camera to use video as evidence to prosecute alcohol and drug offenders.

Treatment/Intervention

7. Wabash Valley Mental Health served 300 substance abuse clients, funds were used as financial assistance for those nearing the end of treatment and drug and alcohol testing.

End of Year 2 Update:**Education/Prevention**

1. County schools drivers' education and health program in which 28 students participated in. Officer's are teaching the students the laws regarding traffic safety with an emphasis on impaired driving. Students volunteer to wear the drunken goggles and are put through the same field sobriety tests that officer's use in the field. Students are also informed about the penalties associated with driving while intoxicated. Officer's are also speaking to Health classes about illegal drugs and what effects it has on them both in the short term and long term.
2. Delphi Police and Carroll Co Sheriff's Department participated in three public civic functions, Carroll Co 4H fair, Old Settler's Festival in Delphi and Health Class in Delphi Community High School for 30 students.
3. DARE program in Carroll County facilitated by Carroll Co Sheriffs Dept. to all 5th graders, around 100 students, in all county schools. Mentoring program by Paw Pals – 25 students participated, all students exhibit known "at-risk" factors for drug and alcohol abuse by 25 high school mentors.
4. LCC has invited the court, probation and prosecutor's office, local ministers, more school officials, media and public invitation in local news paper. We have had new individuals come to meetings and express interest in the organization, such as the Keeping It Real and Freedom Mission, Inc. which provide treatment programs.

Law Enforcement/Justice

5. Participated in OPO 2011 - 13 Portable Breath Tests administered & 19 Standardized Field Sobriety Tests administered, resulting in Open Container Violations – 1 arrests, Underage Consumption – 1 arrests, Misdemeanor DUI – 6 arrests and Felony DUI- 2 arrest.
6. Equipment purchased- portable video cameras for law enforcement, to record interviews and videograph evidence to prosecute alcohol and drug offenders.

Treatment/Intervention

7. Wabash Valley Mental Health served 250 substance abuse clients, funds were used as financial assistance for those nearing the end of treatment and drug and alcohol testing.

Final Update (end of Year 3):

A. Problem Statement #2: Those affected by substance abuse have trouble affording treatment and full continuums of treatment services are not available.

2. In 2009, 75 adults were arrested for OWI, 41 Drug Related arrests, and 25 Juveniles were processed through the jail.
3. In 2009, there were 30 adult arrests for public intoxication and 41 drug arrests.
4. Youth and adults who return from inpatient treatment or are in intensive outpatient therapy have few options for support groups or local therapy.
5. There were 41 adult drug related arrests in 2009. Some of those include the following arrests:

 - Marijuana: 32
 - Cocaine/Opium: 3
 - Possession: 40
 - Synthetic Narcotics: 2

End of Year 1 Update:

1. New probationers in 2010 included 177 adults and 25 juveniles for substance abuse violations. Most of those are required to seek treatment.
2. In 2010, 21 adults were arrested for OWI, 32 Drug Related arrests, and 40 Juveniles were processed through the jail.
3. In 2010, there were 18 adult arrests for public intoxication and 32 drug arrests.
4. Youth and adults who return from inpatient treatment or are in intensive outpatient therapy have few options for support groups or local therapy.
5. There were 32 adult drug related arrests in 2010. Some of those include the following arrests:
 - Selling/Manufacturing: 1,
 - Possession of Marijuana: 28
 - Possession of Paraphernalia: 2
 - OWI with a Schedule Drug: 1

Treatment/Intervention

6. Any students who admit or who are discovered to have a problem with substance abuse are required to meet with the school counselor for an initial assessment. Students are then given information regarding free/low-cost treatment options. Wabash Valley has assisted many of these students.

7. Youth and adults who return from inpatient treatment or are in intensive outpatient therapy have few options for support groups or local therapy.
8. In 2010, 48 people benefited from the payment assistance at WVMHC. There are still a large number of residents living in the county that need assistance for substance abuse.

End of Year 2 Update:

1. New probationers in 2011 included 172 adults and 11 juveniles for substance abuse violations. Most of those are required to seek treatment.
2. In 2011, 83 adults were arrested for OWI, 36 Drug Related arrests, and 11 Juveniles were processed through the jail.
3. In 2011, there were 26 adult arrests for public intoxication and 36 drug arrests.
4. Youth and adults who return from inpatient treatment or are in intensive outpatient therapy have few options for support groups or local therapy.
5. There were 36 adult drug related arrests in 2011.

Treatment/Intervention

6. Any students who admit or who are discovered to have a problem with substance abuse are required to meet with the school counselor for an initial assessment. Students are then given information regarding free/low-cost treatment options. Wabash Valley has assisted many of these students.
7. Youth and adults who return from inpatient treatment or are in intensive outpatient therapy have few options for support groups or local therapy.
8. In 2011, 30 people benefited from the payment assistance at WVMHC. There are still a large number of residents living in the county that need assistance for substance abuse.
9. In 2011, 52 people benefited from substance abuse classes through Freedom Mission. These classes are available to the public as well as inmates in the Carroll County Jail.
