



# New and Beginning Farmers Benefit from Conservation Programs

A career in farming can be very rewarding but does come with its share of challenges. Conservation may not be the first thing producers new to farming think about, but good conservation can help grow a successful sustainable farm business and address some of the challenges.

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) offers technical and financial assistance to farmers interested in implementing conservation practices on their farm. Practices can improve soil health and, in turn, increase crop yields. Practices can help decrease inputs like fertilizer and pesticide, and increase profitability of crops. Conservation practices can make the land and crops better, resilient to weather extremes, and even improve the space for wildlife. Popular conservation practices include things like cover crops, forest stand improvement, prescribed grazing, pollinator plots, fencing, and high tunnel systems.



For vegetable producers, NRCS can provide financial assistance for installing high tunnels. High tunnels, or hoop houses, can be used to extend the growing season and to protect plants from harsh weather, air pollution and pests. By making local produce available for more months in the year, fewer resources are used to transport food to plates. A number of soil health practices can be used in high tunnels, including cover crops and crop rotations, which also prevent erosion, suppress weeds, increase soil water content, and break pest cycles.

These voluntary conservation programs help producers make conservation work for them. Together, NRCS and producers invest in solutions that conserve natural resources for the future while also improving agricultural operations.

Beginning veteran farmers who have not operated a farm for more than 10 consecutive years are eligible for special benefits through the financial assistance programs for these NRCS conservation practices. Benefits include priority consideration for funding for a veteran's application, higher payment rates, and advanced payments on contracts.

To get started with a conservation plan and a financial assistance application, farmers can contact the NRCS district conservationist at their local USDA service center using the <u>Service Center Locator</u>.

Our program transitions homeless Veterans off the streets or out from under bridges into permanent housing, treatment, and appropriate employment. We develop the social, emotional and employment skills that sustain independence, and connect them to the VA, to their County Veteran Services Officer (VSO) and to local resources for eligible benefits.

The Journey Home loves our Veterans, so we lower the barriers that would otherwise prevent a homeless Veteran into placement and provide the specialized programing to support them. We personalize our programs and services to support Veterans through their recovery. Patience, with accountability, provide the Veteran stable support as they stay engaged in our programing. Mistakes are used as a stepping stone in the development of not only new skills but of confidence and hope.

Calling for Indiana Veterans with PTSD or TBI for a Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy Pilot Study:

- ·Be able to provide your own transportation to and from the Purdue MRI Facility
- ·Be able to provide your own transportation to and from state approved HBOT facility
- ·Be willing to provide a copy of DD214 to HBOT facility
- ·Undergo medical screening at HBOT facility
- ·Be tolerant to loud noise even with ear plug
- ·Be able and willing to comply with MRI screening protocol (e.g. remove metal piece/jewelry)
- ·Be safe for MRI scanning (e.g. no fear of small spaces, no cochlear implants, no shrapnel, etc.)



### ELIGIBILITY FOR BURIAL

#### Military Discharge:

Veterans separated under conditions other than Dishonorable are eligible for burial.

#### National Guard & Reservist:

Must have been eligible for retirement pay at time of death.

#### Active Duty Death:

Service members who die on active duty, in the line of duty.

#### **Surviving Spouse:**

The surviving spouse of an eligible veteran can be buried at the IVMC.

### The Child of a Veteran:

Child must be under age 21 or permanent dependent of the
