% of children exiting at age level in SFY 2018 (State target is circle)



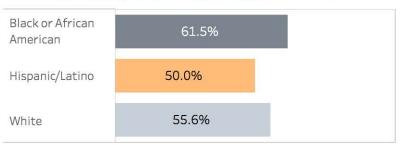
% of children showing impact in social development from SFY 2014-2018

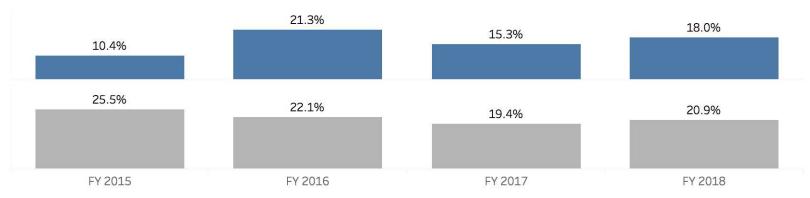
