CHAIRMAN BORST: Welcome everybody. Second day of spring, how about that. Doesn't feel like it yet, but it will later the week. I want to thank Rick and Hoosier Park for hosting us again. This is a Great setup. We appreciate it. I know it takes a lot of work to figure it out. I think you have it down now because you've done it enough.

Also we want to welcome our new counsel, David Rothenberg to the proceedings. I think this is his first meeting. So he's dived in, and he has a good grasp of all that's going on helping Matt and Dale. All three are a pretty good team.

With that, I will call to order. Look for a
motion and second to approve the memorandum from
the December 1 public meeting.

9	order granting default judgment in the matter of
10	Erik N. Esqueda I'm not sure how you pronounce
11	that versus Indiana Horse Racing Commission
12	Staff. Matt, are you going to take that?
13	MR. EGGIMAN: Yes. Thank you, Chairman. All
14	right. Agenda item one is your consideration of
15	the recommended order of default judgment in favor
16	of petitioner IHRC Staff issued by Administrative
17	Law Judge Michael Buker in the matter of Erik
18	Esqueda versus Indiana Horse Racing Commission
19	Staff. For this one, I will act as your counsel.
20	Commission Staff is and has been represented by
21	Dale Pennycuff.
22	Mr. Esqueda, yeah, is not present today, nor
23	is he represented by counsel in the matter. The
24	case evolves from an appeal of Stewards Ruling No.

25 IG-2022-2822 filed on or about September 26, 2022,

for a violation of 71IAC 7.5-6-5(f)(9) during the tenth race held on September 22, 2022, setting a penalty of a \$500 fine and a suspension of 12 racing days for what was Mr. Esqueda's eighth violation of 71IAC 7.5-6-5(f)(9) during the 2022 race meet.

The matter was scheduled to be heard by ALJ 7 Buker after Mr. Esqueda had timely filed an appeal. 8 A telephonic prehearing was conducted with parties. 9 10 ALJ Buker made it abundantly clear to Mr. Esqueda 11 the importance of legal representation in the 12 matter. Mr. Esqueda did not file a request for 13 stay of his suspension despite his awareness of 14 that option from the prehearing. Mr. Esqueda 15 served all 12 days of his suspension with the final 16 day served on November 1, 2022. Because 17 Mr. Esqueda both served his suspension and did not 18 request relief from the \$500 fine, no claim 19 remained for which relief could be granted to 20 Mr. Esqueda.

The Administrative Orders and Procedures Act, known as AOPA from the Indiana Code, provides the statutory requirements for conducting administrative law proceedings and contains a section that allows the administrative law judge to issue a proposed default order if one of four events occurs during the proceeding. Mr. Esqueda failed on at least two of these. He failed to attend or participate in a prehearing conference, hearing, or other stated in the proceeding. And he took no action on a matter for a period of 60 days when he was the one responsible for taking the action.

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9 ALJ Buker issued a proposed default order on 10 December 20, 2022, one day after a final prehearing 11 was held. Mr. Esqueda did not attend that 12 prehearing. Pursuant to AOPA, Mr. Esqueda had 13 seven days to file a response to the proposed 14 default order, or ALJ Buker was required to issue a 15 final recommended order of default judgment.

16 With no response from Mr. Esqueda on 17 January 20, 2023, ALJ Buker issued the recommended 18 order that you have in front of you for your consideration today. Commissioners, feel free to 19 20 ask any questions. It must be noted that 21 Mr. Esqueda did not file an objection to ALJ 2.2 Buker's recommended order of default judgment. Τn 23 fact, pursuant to statute, he's prohibited from 24 filing an objection anyway due to being in default. 25 Therefore, the Commission really only has one

1	option to affirm the order. Feel free to ask any
2	questions.
3	CHAIRMAN BORST: Are there any questions,
4	Commission Members? Commissioner McCarty and
5	Estes, can you hear okay?
6	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Yeah. We're fine right
7	now.
8	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: So far.

10	we'll accept a motion and second to approve the
11	considerations here, the judgment.
12	COMMISSIONER ESTES: So moved.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Passes unanimously.

Second on the agenda is consideration of the settlement agreement between Indiana Horse Racing Commission Staff and Dr. Nicole Wettstein.

9 MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioners, you have in your 10 packet the settlement agreement that was fully 11 executed in February of 2023 between Commission 12 Staff and Dr. Nicole Wettstein. The stewards issued a ruling suspending Dr. Wettstein for a 13 period of 60 days beginning November 7, 2022, and 14 15 issuing a fine of \$5,000. Dr. Wettstein timely 16 appealed the stewards' ruling and requested a stay.

17 The case was assigned to ALJ Buker. The 18 request for stay was denied by ALJ Buker in an 19 order on December 26, 2022. Counsel for both 20 parties entered into settlement discussions which 21 resulted in the agreement before you today. 2.2 Dr. Wettstein agreed to serve the 60-day suspension 23 with the time having been served and pay the fine 24 of \$5,000 for the violations charged in the 25 stewards' ruling.

1	At this time, Commission Staff respectfully
2	requests approval of the settlement agreement
3	between Commission Staff and Dr. Wettstein.
4	CHAIRMAN BORST: Any Commissioners have any
5	questions? How about a motion and a second.

packet the settlement agreement that was fully executed in February of 2023 between Commission Staff and Melanie Wrenn. The judges issued a ruling suspending Miss Wrenn for a period of 180 days, of which Mr. Wrenn was required to serve 90 days with 90 days probation. Miss Wrenn timely appealed the judges' ruling.

8 The case was assigned to ALJ Brian Hahn. The 9 parties entered into settlement discussions, which 10 resulted in the agreement you have before you 11 today. Miss Wrenn agreed to serve a 75-day 12 suspension and to conditions on her 2023 IHRC 13 owner/trainer license for the violations charged in 14 the judges' ruling.

At this time, Commission Staff respectfully
requests approval of the settlement agreement
between Commission Staff and Miss Wrenn.

18 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions, Commissioners?19 Seeing none, I'll entertain a motion and second.

COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move.

21 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.

22 CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.

13 MR. ROTHENBERG: Like other administrative 14 agencies, the Commission's administrative rules 15 automatically expire every seven years. However, 16 we are given a chance to readopt these rules so long as the rule language remains identical to what 17 18 it was prior. There are a number of rules 19 scheduled to expire at the end of the year, each of 20 which is listed in the Notice to Readopt LSA 21 Documents No. 23-17 and 23-91. Both are in your 2.2 book.

The Commission Staff did post the rules with the LSA website as required by statute. This gives the opportunity for members of the general public 1 to ask us any questions considered to the rules 2 that were readopted. So far we've not had any 3 questions come in.

We also shared the list of readoption with the horsemen's association and Caesars just for informational purposes to allow them to give us feedback. Due to timing issues, the LSA document 23-71 last day for public comment is March 24th, and for 23-91 the last day for public comment is Friday, April 14th. So it falls after this Commission meeting.

12 Pursuant to 71IAC 2-2-1, the Commission may 13 delegate the authority to the Executive Director to 14 implement and execute the duty of regulating each 15 race meeting and persons participating in each race 16 meeting. At this time we respectfully request the 17 delegation of authority to Director Pitman to 18 approve these documents, Nos. 23-71 and 23-91 after 19 the public comment period has expired for each 20 document and to make any changes necessary to 21 comply with the public request to change a rule or 2.2 readopt as the case may be.

23 CHAIRMAN BORST: So would that be a motion the 24 delegation and the whole?

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MR. ROTHENBERG: Yes.

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MR. ROTHENBERG: So you've got some emergency 12 rules that are proposed, which cover both harness 13 racing and flat racing. The rule packet in your 14 meeting booklet was provided to stakeholders with request for any comments or suggestions. As of 15 16 now, we've received no comments or suggestions 17 regarding those. The current version of these 18 proposed rules were posted on the horse racing website so the public could also look at those and 19 20 make comments or suggestions as well.

21 Although the rules are presented on the agenda 2.2 separately, the Commission typically casts a single 23 vote in favor or opposition of the emergency rules as a single document, which is then sent to LSA. 24 25 Under the Commission's emergency rulemaking

1	authority, the rules will go into effect as soon as
2	they're filed.
3	At this time we would ask that you vote on
4	them as one document. Although, Commissioners, you
5	can certainly break out those rules if you feel
6	like a certain rule needs to be discussed
7	separately.
8	CHAIRMAN BORST: Are there any questions on
9	any particular rules to pull out? Keep them all
10	together. How about a motion and a second again.
11	COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move to accept.
12	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
13	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Second.
14	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded. Go
15	to the roll call vote.
16	MR. ROTHENBERG: Chairman Borst?

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. It's passed.

Next on the agenda is the review of Commission rulings November 22, 2022 through March 13th, although there are some in here, I got confused. On the second set there are some that are dated 6-27-2019. And I'm not sure how that one got I guess because -- well, that 188 days suspension would be over.

MR. PENNYCUFF: I believe the way the original violation may have occurred it gets entered into the database, but the final resolution didn't occur until 2013 so you get those weird dates that show up sometimes.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. Just wondered. It makes sense. Anybody have any questions on any of the rules?

Seeing none, we'll go next on the agenda is the presentation of the 2023 Thoroughbred Breed Development Advisory Committee program. Jessica Barnes is here to take this one and the next one too.

JESSICA BARNES: Good morning. First of all, I'd like to apologize for the late modification that the Commissioners received yesterday afternoon. I'll address that modification in a moment. But first I would like to give a quick
 overview of the Thoroughbred Breed Development
 program for 2023.

4 Our program closely mirrors that of 2022 with 5 some small changes in it. We worked closely over the past two years with racetrack management, the 6 HBPA, ITOBA, all the parties were involved to move 7 to create a sliding base purse throughout the meet. 8 9 This has helped us to meet the needs of the 10 racetrack in regards to the number of Indiana-bred 11 races that they need. For example, last year we 12 started with a \$12,000 base purse. We ended up with a much higher one by the end of the meet. 13 14 That just allows us to maximum the amount of breed 15 development races based on what the track is 16 putting into an overnight purse.

17 So this year's base purse is starting out at 18 15,000, which overall was the average that we had last year. We're kind of learning from what we're 19 20 doing and hoping to do that. I would say with the 21 track's help and HBPA and ITOBA and everyone being 22 on board, we have seen tremendous growth in this 23 The average payout for the Thoroughbred program. 24 Breed Development program from 2014 to 2019 was 14 25 to 16 million on an annual basis. And the 2021

1 value of the program was just over \$21 million, and 2 last year it was \$22 million. So we are able to do 3 that with the racetrack's help. I think it's a 4 great thing for our program.

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The second thing here is the late modification that I sent to the Commissioners yesterday afternoon, which is we discovered Friday afternoon that the HISA regulations considers our breed development program stake races in there as a stake race. We were under the understanding that the Lasix prohibition would only apply to graded stakes or listed stakes. And we found out that they're not.

14 And so after putting our heads together 15 talking with racetrack's management, Commission's 16 equine medical director, Eric Halstrom, and then 17 also my breed development committee members, we 18 really feel that it is in the best interest of our 19 program to modify those races so they're no longer 20 stake races. So the two things that made those, 21 three things that made those races stake races was 2.2 the word stake in its name, which you will see a 23 modification to remove that reference. We had 24 moved away from actually taking nomination payment 25 on those races several years ago. So we already

don't take nominations like a traditional stake race would.

And then the third thing is that we have those races set up as added money races. And we're making a change to no longer have added money races so they're not meeting that requirement. This would allow that our Indiana Breed Development horses that have been competing all year, the three year olds and up, on Lasix to still be able to be on Lasix for that race, which we feel is very important to the welfare of the horses in our program.

So we did make that modification. We think it's very important especially now as we get under HISA so we have some time to study how this whole thing is going to shake out. That's why you saw the late change.

I was not able to hold a breed development 18 19 I did talk to all three breed development meeting. 20 committee members individually. They are all three 21 on board with this modification to the program. Ι 2.2 know that Eric Halstrom has also talked with Brian 23 Elmore of the HBPA and got their input. And they are in favor of the change as well. And I also 24 25 believe that the racetrack is going to take a

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similar course of action with the races that they
 change. I would be happy to answer any questions
 that you have about that.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Sounds like your changes make sense so we can still use the Lasix. As far as voting, are we going to vote on -- are we voting on what was in the book, and we have to amend it, or can we vote on what was sent to us yesterday?

9 MR. PENNYCUFF: You can vote on what was sent 10 to you.

11 CHAIRMAN BORST: We don't have to make an 12 amendment or anything?

MR. PENNYCUFF: No, just vote on what was sent.

15 CHAIRMAN BORST: Are there any questions, 16 comments? Any from the public to speak to the 17 program? I guess not. Ready for a motion and a 18 second.

19 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Move to accept.

20 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.

21 CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded. 22 Roll call vote.

23 MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
24 CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.

PENNYCUFF: 7 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Ave. 8 CHAIRMAN BORST: Passes unanimously. Next is 9 presentation of the 2023 Quarter Horse Breed 10 Development Advisory Committee program. 11 JESSICA BARNES: The 2023 Ouarter Horse 12 program has a few changes in it from last year's 13 program, which is in the program that was provided 14 The biggest change is we have seen a to you. 15 slight decline in the number of mares being bred 16 and foals being born. So the committee really 17 wanted to take a look at that and see how we could 18 earmark some dollars to try to help that situation. 19 So that's why you see an increase in the percentage 20 that goes to breeder's awards. 21 So and we were able -- I know that Deena asked

21 So and we were able -- I know that Deena asked 22 a question when she initially approved this 23 program. We were able to do that just with some 24 items that have come under budget. There was an 25 adjustment of races. We didn't use as many races as we had scheduled last year. We've adjusted that down a little bit to be more realistic about what we think we can fill.

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We do change the breeder's award percentage from 12 and a half percent to 17 and a half percent. You've actually already approved the rule change that goes along with that in agenda item five.

9 So overall, the program, other than that, 10 stays the same as it did last year so with some 11 minor adjustments to the budget. We are utilizing 12 a little bit more of the money we have built up in 13 reserves. If nothing changes, we're able to 14 sustain this program, if we don't see any increase 15 in revenue over the next three years, we're able to 16 sustain it for at least three years. We think 17 that's a long enough time to see if it does indeed 18 produce the results we want and encourage people to 19 invest more on the brood mare population and 20 increase the number of foals.

21 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions, Commissioner 22 members?

23 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Jessica, what do you see 24 in three years with this lack of mares? Is that a 25 tough question?

1 It's tough because it's a JESSICA BARNES: two-sided thing. On one hand the number of mares 2 3 has went down some, but we're also seeing an increase in quality. So you can also equate that 4 5 to both the Thoroughbred and the Quarter Horse programs. So as people over the years, as 6 competition has gotten tougher, people have, you 7 know, maybe sold -- they had five mares. They sold 8 9 five mares, and they've gotten three and gotten 10 better ones because they needed to up their ante in 11 order to be able to compete. At the same time we 12 need those foal numbers. So we want to provide 13 some incentive to get people to invest more. It's 14 a delicate balance between quantity and quality when you deal with these breed development 15 16 programs.

17 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Just for a point of 18 reference, are you talking about 100 that went down 19 to 90?

JESSICA BARNES: No, on average the Quarter Horse program is a fairly small program when you compare it to the Thoroughbred and Standardbred program. So you're looking at about 20 to 30 mares when you're fluctuating.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions? Any other

1	questions? Any members of the public have any
2	comments, questions, concerns? Seeing none, I
3	guess we're ready for our we have to have our
4	motion and second here, I guess.
5	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Move approval.
6	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
7	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Second.
8	CHAIRMAN BORST: Moved and seconded. Roll
9	call vote.
10	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
11	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
12	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
13	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
14	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
15	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
16	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes?
17	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.
18	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood?

20	CHAIRMAN BORST: Passes unanimously.
21	JESSICA BARNES: Thank you.
22	CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you for all the work
23	putting puzzles together. Next on the agenda is
24	the approval of Harrah's Hoosier Park 2023
25	Standardbred racing official list. And I don't

1	know. I looked at it. I couldn't find mine from
2	last year. I don't know if it's changed any, has
3	the same amount of people. Maybe you and Eric can
4	tell us.
5	RICK MOORE: On Harrah's Hoosier Park side,
6	it's an experienced group of racing officials all
7	who have been previously licensed by the IHRC. We
8	are glad to have everyone back and hopefully get
9	your approval today, Mr. Chairman.
10	CHAIRMAN BORST: So no material changes?
11	RICK MOORE: No, sir.
12	CHAIRMAN BORST: Anybody have any questions on
13	the list? Okay.
14	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I would like to. Rick,
15	how is the state of horse racing? How is the
16	handle? Has it gone up, down?
17	RICK MOORE: Our handle, we set an all time
18	record handle last year, Mr. Pillow, 117 million is
19	an all time record handle. I'm proud to say that.
20	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I'm sure Caesars is glad
21	of that. You maintained your position pretty well.
22	RICK MOORE: Well, I think we're all in this
23	together. The ISA, Harrah's Hoosier Park, we're
24	really proud what we're able to produce.
25	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: That's great.

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1	Congratulations.
2	RICK MOORE: Thank you, sir.
3	CHAIRMAN BORST: Seeing no further questions,
4	I'll accept a motion and second to approve.
5	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Move approval.
6	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Second.
7	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.
8	Move to the roll call vote.
9	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
10	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
11	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
12	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
13	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
14	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
15	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes?
16	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.

20	unanimously.
21	RICK MOORE: Thank you chairman.
22	CHAIRMAN BORST: Next on the agenda is the
23	approval of Horseshoe Indianapolis 2023 No. 10,
24	I'm lost official racing. Same questions, same
25	amount of people?

ERIC HALSTROM: Yes, Chairman Borst. We're almost to Rick's, kind of mimmicking his. There are a couple of positions that have turned over coming into this next year. That's not uncommon as people kind of come and go and stay south.

I will say I'm excited because Chris Polzin, our director of racing here, is continually trying to move the staff forward. You'll see on that list our assistant racing secretary actually left their position at Gulfstream Park in Florida to come work for us, which I think as we keep going forward get an A level racetrack, that's what we want to be at some point. So moving that forward, we're pretty pleased with what we have to offer.

Commissioner Pillow, I'm going to answer the question you asked to Rick as well. Last year at Horseshoe Indianapolis, we also set an annual record of 235,000,000 over the course of the year. We're heading for -- we've got a staff incentive. We're trying to make that quarter of a billion this year. We're going to get there, 250 million.

22 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Congratulations. That's23 very good.

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ERIC HALSTROM: Thank you.

MR. ROTHENBERG: Chairman, I will note that

1 there are a couple people on the list who are still going through security background checks because 2 3 they're new to the state. When we ask you to vote, 4 we would actually ask you to be voting contingent 5 upon, on the list contingent upon them subject to them passing their background checks. 6 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Would you inform us 7 going forward if someone did not, or is that a 8 9 personal record? 10 MR. ROTHENBERG: Certainly. We'll have to let 11 you know if the list changes because we'll have to 12 get a replacement. 13 CHAIRMAN BORST: If we don't see anything 14 else, we'll know they pass. How about a motion and second on the list for Horseshoe? 15 COMMISSIONER ESTES: 16 So moved. 17 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second. 18 CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and second. Go to 19 roll call vote. 20 MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst? 21 CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye. 2.2 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty? 23 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Ave. MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow? 24 25 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Ave.

1 Commissioner Estes? MR. PENNYCUFF: 2 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye. 3 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood? 4 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Ave. 5 CHAIRMAN BORST: Passes unanimously. Next on the agenda is the ratification of Executive 6 Director Pitman's interim approval of Caesars debt 7 financing activity request dated January 19, 2023. 8 9 Matt, are you going to handle that? 10 MR. EGGIMAN: Yes. Thank you, Chairman Borst. 11 Commissioners, pursuant to 71IAC 11-1-12-85, the 12 Commission or the Executive Director must approve 13 any contract between a permit holder and any party 14 that equals or exceeds \$50 million in value. Τn 15 January, Caesars Entertainment provided notice to 16 the IHRC that it intended to undertake debt 17 financing transactions. Caesars intends to use the 18 proceeds of the potential financing transactions to 19 make strategic business decisions. They are 20 confident that these potential transactions are in 21 the best interest of the company. 2.2 In accordance with Indiana Code 4-33-4-21, the 23 proposed financing transactions do not result in

25 Harrah's Hoosier Park Racing and Casino or

the lease, hypothecation, or borrowing against

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Horseshoe Indianapolis Racing and Casino. In addition, these new financings do not change the terms of the existing put-call contained in the lease with VICI nor is the Commission being asked to review the put-call at this time.

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Pursuant to applicable securities in Indiana public access laws, such activities, including the transaction terms and structure were described in detail to the Commission but are kept confidential and not subject to public disclosure. This process to undertake and receive approval for a debt financing transaction is longstanding and utilized not only by Caesars but other Indiana casino owner's licensees.

15 Information concerning the debt activity 16 required pursuant to Indiana Gaming Commission 17 regulations was provided to the IGC and the IHRC. After conducting a review on January 31, 2023, the 18 Indiana Gaming Commission approved of these 19 potential activities, and ratification of the 20 21 approval was placed on the agenda for March 9, 2023 2.2 business meeting and was indeed ratified.

23 On January 26, 20203 after consulting with 24 Chairman Borst, Executive Director Pitman issued an 25 interim approval based on the review conducted by the IGC and its confidential report, as well as the IGC's interim approval.

Commission Staff respectfully requests the Commission ratify Executive Director Pitman's interim approval concerning the proposed transactions. I know Mr. Jeff Hendricks is here from Caesars to take any questions that you may have.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Are there any questions from Commission members? I guess I was surprised because I don't deal in the numbers like they do. I was surprised in this day and age there was any chance of doing any refinancing. I guess a little bit of change makes a big difference.

JEFF HENDRICKS: It's a great point. Jeff Hendricks, assistant general counsel Caesars Entertainment. I appreciate the opportunity to be in front of you today, Commissioners, Executive Director, Staff.

To your point, Chairman Borst, I will make a quick review of this transaction as we were mining credit markets, we have approached for the last several to refinance our debt when we possibly could. And February was a very opportune time to do so. We ended up with great terms on these

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1	refinancings. As we sit here in mid March, we're
2	really happy we executed this debt in early
3	February. It's just been a really tumultuous time
4	in all the credit markets.
5	Thank you for everyone's swift and
6	professional review of this. It was
7	transformational for the company. It did find that
8	sweet spot where the markets were instrumental for
9	us.
10	CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Seeing no
11	questions, I guess we'll take a motion.
12	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: You didn't bank in
13	Silicone Valley, did you?
14	JEFF HENDRICKS: We have no holdings in SUV.
15	We are actively monitoring all of our deposits
16	across the country. We didn't have any exposure to
17	any of the banks that dealt with the bankrupts in
18	the past several weeks.
19	I also want to note these financings are
20	ultimately beneficial to all of our properties,
21	including our Indiana racetracks. So what this did
22	is lower our cost of debt across the portfolio and
23	improved financial strength of the company, no
24	detrimental impact to the properties, no
25	incremental debt to the properties or the company.

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1	It allowed us to switch out existing money with a
2	sooner maturity with new money at a cheaper rate
3	with a longer maturely. We're thrilled with the
4	outcome. And we're thrilled with where we are
5	currently depositing our money.
6	CHAIRMAN BORST: You weren't in that bank,
7	were you?
8	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: No.
9	CHAIRMAN BORST: Ready for the motion and
10	second.
11	COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move approval.
12	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I'll second it.
13	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.
14	We'll go to roll call vote.
15	MR. EGGIMAN: Chairman Borst?
16	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
17	MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner Pillow?
18	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
19	MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner Levengood?
20	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye.
21	MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner McCarty?
22	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
23	MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner Estes?
24	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.
25	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: That's an incredible

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1 undertaking, unbelievable.

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JEFF HENDRICKS: We appreciate that. We worked very hard on that.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thanks for being here to explain it. Appreciate it.

Next on the agenda is ratify Executive Director Pitman's interim approval of petition to amend Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company d/b/a TwinSpires SPMO license reflecting the addition of DK Horse as an affiliate. Dale, are you going to take that one?

12 MR. PENNYCUFF: Yes. Commissioners on 13 February 2, 2023, the SPMO Churchill Downs 14 Technology Initiatives Company, doing business as 15 TwinSpires or CDTIC, submitted a petition for the 16 addition of New While Label Affiliate along with an 17 updated Plan of Operations Affiliate section. 18 CDTIC requested the approval of the Commission to 19 add DK Horse as an affiliate to their SPMO license 20 through a service agreement. The Oregon Racing 21 Commission approved the Digital Service Agreement 2.2 on January 23, 2023. The Oregon Racing Commission 23 is the organization that licenses the ADW hubs and 24 has a yearly audit schedule for all hub licensees 25 and keeps a close aye on all their activities.

CDTIC's request is similar to NYRA Bets request to add Caesars RaceBook or to TVG's request to add FanDuel to their SPMO license, both of which were previously approved. The goal being to build interest in the horse racing product through a familiar brand. In this case DK Horse is a Draft King operation. The back end of DK Horse is under complete control of CDTIC.

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Because the addition DK Horse represents a 9 10 material change to their SPMO license, the 11 application requires Commission approval. And 12 based on the delegation of authority to approve race matters prior to the next Commission meeting, 13 14 with review of the Commission at this meeting given 15 to Executive Director Pitman on December 1, 2022, 16 Director Pitman gave CDTIC interim approval on 17 March 3, 2023, due to their planned launch date occurring before this meeting. 18

At this time, Commission Staff respectfully
requests Commission affirm the interim approval of
CDTIC's petition.

CHAIRMAN BORST: A lot of A, B, Cs in there, but hopefully we understand they're adding another way of betting is another way of putting it. Any questions by Commission members? Seeing none, I

quess we'll take a motion and a second to ratify 1 2 Executive Director. 3 COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move to ratify. 4 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second. 5 CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded. Go 6 to roll call vote. MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst? 7 CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye. 8 9 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty? 10 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye. 11 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow? 12 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye. 13 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes? 14 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye. 15 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood? 16 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye. 17 CHAIRMAN BORST: Passed unanimously. 18 Next on the agenda is approval of RMTC 19 certified split sample laboratories for 2023 and 20 beyond. Who wants to take that? 21 MR. PENNYCUFF: I'll be taking that one. 2.2 Pursuant to our administrative rules, the 23 Commission must approve the list of laboratories that are used as a split laboratory. A split 24 25 laboratory is a lab that does the test on the

1 portion of the sample not sent to our primary laboratory for testing. A licensee has the right 2 3 to ask that the split sample be tested if the 4 primary sample returns a positive result. As a reminder, the Racing Medication Testing Consortium, 5 the RMTC, is an association that works closely with 6 the Racing Commissioners International, which is a 7 nationally recognized trade association. 8

Because of a couple of things to do with some 9 of the labs, I'm going to be asking you for three 11 separate motions so bear with me.

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12 First, Commission Staff respectfully requests 13 approval of all RMTC accredited laboratories to be 14 approved as split laboratories except for our 15 primary lab, Industrial Laboratory.

16 CHAIRMAN BORST: Do you want to go ahead and 17 do them separately?

MR. PENNYCUFF: Yes, do them separately.

19 CHAIRMAN BORST: So is this, I quess, HISA 20 related, or is this?

21 No, this is just standard what MR. PENNYCUFF: 2.2 we do every year.

23 CHAIRMAN BORST: All of them except 24 Industrial. Anybody have a motion and a second on this one? 25

1	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
2	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: We need a first.
3	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Move to approve.
4	CHAIRMAN BORST: And are you still second?
5	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I'm still second.
6	CHAIRMAN BORST: Any other questions? I guess
7	we'll do the roll call vote.
8	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
9	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
10	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
11	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
12	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?

20	MR. PENNYCUFF: So next we respectfully
21	request a waiver for the 2023 cobalt laboratories
22	pursuant to 71IAC 8-4-3 and 71IAC 8.5-3-3 because
23	the University of Kentucky Veterinary Diagnostic
24	lab is not an accredited laboratory through the
25	RMTC for cobalt.

1	CHAIRMAN BORST: Do we have a motion on this
2	waiver and a second?
3	COMMISSIONER ESTES: So moved.
4	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
5	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded. Go
6	to roll call vote.
7	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
8	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
9	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
10	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
11	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?

24	understand. Any questions on that? Accept a

4	a second out of those two. We'll go to roll call
5	vote.

22	them are more than double so I guess people
23	probably will take University of Illinois since
24	it's a lot more reasonable.
25	Okay. Moving on, next is consideration of

Horseshoe Indianapolis request to approve the continued takeout of 11.99 percent on the Pick 5 to stimulate wagering and approve reductions on Pick 4 and Pick 6 wagering as well. Eric, will you handle that one?

ERIC HALSTROM: Chairman Borst, Members of the 6 Commission, really the request is mainly keep the 7 status quo from what we've done for the last two 8 9 years with this reduced takeout. Commissioner 10 Pillow, I think this has been a legitimate driver 11 of handle for us and looking out for some of our 12 best customers around the country. You'll note 13 that letter comes from, and it needs to by rule, it 14 comes from not just myself but Joe Davis, the president of the HBPA, Paul Martin, president of 15 16 the OHRAI. We're all in agreement that it's been a 17 very good thing for us. We would like to go 18 forward this year too.

19 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions of anyone,20 Commission members?

21 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I make the motion we 22 approve.

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COMMISSIONER ESTES: I second.

24 CHAIRMAN BORST: Good. Been moved and25 seconded. Go to roll call vote.

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1	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
2	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
3	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
4	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
5	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
6	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.

12	Next is consideration of Horseshoe Indianapolis
13	2023 race date calendar alteration request to move
14	racing off Tuesday, July 4, 2023, and instead race
15	on Monday, July 3, 2023, with a beginning post time
16	of 2:30 p.m. to allow for the drone show marketing
17	opportunity.
18	ERIC HALSTROM: Yes, Chairman Borst and
19	Members of the Commission. This is one our staff
20	is extremely excited about. I'll tell you and
21	she wasn't able to make it today but Alicia
22	Mummert, our director of marketing, came up with an
23	opportunity we'd really love to try. Fireworks
24	aren't really a thing. Horsemen don't really want

the fireworks around the horses and all that. 25

We're in the same boat.

I'm not sure if you saw the Super Bowl several years ago. They did a really, really cool drone show where they synchronized hundreds and hundreds of drones changing colors, flying different directions. One second you're looking at a flag, the next second a silhouette of the state of Indiana, a horse and whatnot.

9 But we really think that we're really prepared 10 to go and race on July 4th, but everybody's 11 working July 5th. So the show needs to be run at 12 night. It will be sometime 9:45, 10 o'clock type 13 thing. With nobody working on the holiday or as a 14 general rule, except for us, we think this is a great opportunity and even in the simulcast market 15 16 to be one of the few tracks running on that Monday 17 night, the 3rd, and then just pack the place with 18 people who've never seen a drone show, including 19 us.

I will tell you my staff is waiting on pins and needles. I've got the text all ready to send them thumbs up or down on this vote. We really think it could be something that draws a lot of people to the track on a day of racing. We do know that once people have something they're coming for,

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1	they'll show up early and take advantage of some
2	racing and some music in between while we wait for
3	dusk to get here. This is not a change in the
4	number of race days but just moving from the
5	Tuesday for that Monday night, the 3rd.
6	CHAIRMAN BORST: That's something different, a
7	drone show. Any questions on moving the racing
8	date? Seeing none, I guess we'll accept a motion
9	and a second to approve the change.
10	COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move to accept the
11	change.
12	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Second.
13	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded. We
14	will go to roll call vote.
15	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
16	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
17	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
18	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
19	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
20	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
21	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes?
22	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.
23	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood?
24	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye.
25	CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Passes

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unanimously. I would imagine you can get a lot of
 good PR. You can get some TV stations to show up.
 This is unique.

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ERIC HALSTROM: Thanks for the approval because now we can really start the marketing. We obviously want to take the right steps, but the staff is really excited about this one.

CHAIRMAN BORST: You can push the button on the evening then.

Next is the consideration of Harrah's Hoosier Park 2023 first post time change beginning April 8th from 6:15 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturdays and racing 12 races on Saturdays rather than 14. Rick's going to handle that.

RICK MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Members 15 16 of the Commission. I want to point out before I 17 talk about exactly why we want to do this, but we met with the Indiana Standardbred Association to 18 19 discuss this. We discussed it at length. Thev 20 were very much behind this change. So I think I 21 come to you today on behalf of Harrah's Hoosier 2.2 Park and the ISA to ask for this approval of the 23 post time change.

24 What this will do to move to 7 p.m., if you 25 watch what has happened over the last couple years, the afternoon primarily Thoroughbred tracks are racing later and later into the evening. This will allow us to get away from some of the afternoon tracks to give us a clean start in the evening. Just that 45 minutes will play a big part in getting us away from some of the afternoon tracks.

By going from 14 races to 12, we're actually 7 going to save some purse money. This is something 8 9 else we discussed with ISA. Again, they are very much behind this in that this will help us to safeguard our purse account by racing a couple less races on Saturday. We're going into the season with the first surplus. We want to make sure we maintain that. And by racing a couple less races typically early in the evening don't throw a lot of handle. We will be able to protect that purse account. That's the reason for requesting the post time change starting Saturday, April 8th.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any questions about the post time change? Anybody from the public have any comment on that? Seeing none, I guess we're ready for a motion and a second.

COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move approval of the time change.

COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Second.

1	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.
2	We'll go to roll call vote.
3	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
4	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
5	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
6	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
7	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
8	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
9	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes?
10	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.
11	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood?
12	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye.
13	CHAIRMAN BORST: Passes unanimously.
14	RICK MOORE: Thank you again, Mr. Chairman.
15	CHAIRMAN BORST: Next on the agenda is
16	consideration of Horseshoe Indianapolis request to
17	amend the expected 2023 Capital Expenditure
18	Equipment Plan and substitute with alternate 2023
19	purchases.
20	ERIC HALSTROM: Correct. So Chairman Borst,
21	as you can see the list is rather long. I defer to
22	you for how you'd like to me to address this. I
23	can go through them one by one or if you want to go
24	individually. You tell me.
25	CHAIRMAN BORST: It was just interesting that

1 so much equipment was ordered, so many that you don't need them now. You only need one. 2 That's 3 just what got me, but this was done years ago.

> ERIC HALSTROM: Yeah.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Maybe they thought they would be worn out by now.

ERIC HALSTROM: Correct. I can't tell you, as it predates us, myself and Joe. I have understood though that the intention really was more just to put a placeholder for the amounts of money to be spent. We can sure get there. We have plenty of stuff that we can do.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: No tracks in the US have that many harrows.

15 ERIC HALSTROM: Deena and I were chatting. Ι said the purchase for this year is supposed to be 17 two rollers, six floats, and 12 harrows. If we 18 started our own track, we couldn't come close to 19 buying that.

20 CHAIRMAN BORST: That's what I was wondering. 21 You had to put a placeholder. I guess a couple 2.2 questions I had that I'm not sure they fit into 23 this, the upgrade of the paddock area irrigation 24 and then the jogging spot. Those really aren't 25 equipment. I wasn't sure those belonged on here,

1 but you can make a case for those. The rest of them are certainly equipment.

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ERIC HALSTROM: Sure. No, I understand. Ι can give you the background for why we need them. I understand your question. Deena and I were talking Friday. I understood the point. Paddock irrigation will make the place obviously look much nicer. You're right. I'm not sure what level of equipment that would be in.

10 The prerace jogging spot is something that's 11 kind of borne out of HISA. We're trying to clean 12 up some of these other things. It's been 13 Dr. Hardy's feeling that having this area will give 14 him a better idea of prerace inspections and making 15 sure every horse is healthy before they hit the 16 racetrack.

17 I will say this, if you think those belong in 18 a different area, you know, Joe is here. 19 Mr. Elmore is here. We can move this to a 20 different spot or at least have a discussion on it. 21 But I will leave that to you, whatever you guys 2.2 think is the most appropriate way.

23 CHAIRMAN BORST: I think they're both 24 necessary. There's no two ways about it. I just 25 hate to start the precedent of putting things like this in here that really didn't expect that. I don't know. Anybody from the staff have any comments to help us with this?

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: I think my thoughts are that, you know, we just had the conversation about placeholders for the equipment. I think the real thing is that we want to make sure that the improvements that need to be made on the backside don't slide. And these are additional improvements that are necessary that nobody ever really thought about back in the day when this sheet, this Excel sheet was put together.

13 So with HISA coming on board and the 14 additional infrastructure that's needed to basically qualify for certification, I believe, 15 16 along with the irrigation, which is to me could 17 lead to an equine slipping issue, I think that it 18 might be okay in this instance to go ahead and 19 include those types of things because, number one, 20 they're not huge dollar amounts. And the fact, I believe, Brian -- is Brian here? Yeah. Brian, do 21 2.2 you have any comments or thoughts on this?

BRIAN ELMORE: Yeah, I think it's a good idea.
I would encourage the Commission to approve that.
CHAIRMAN BORST: At first blush, it just

1	didn't seem like it was equipment. But you're
2	right, the numbers I guess we'll have to watch
3	in the future. I don't want to open the door and
4	have a whole bunch of stuff.
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: Exactly.
6	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: That's really your
7	comment, you want to be sensitive and passing along
8	those tidbits to you gives you a hint of what we
9	would look for or not in the future.
10	ERIC HALSTROM: I think that's a fair point.
11	And we'll keep that noted.
12	CHAIRMAN BORST: He's my spokesman.
13	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: I'm a building guy.
14	Trust me, I get it. But what he's really saying is
15	it fish or fowl. When you're doing this, you
16	really need to be sensitive to those issues because
17	sometimes appearance or even the wording that you
18	put on the line item can affect how people like us
19	judge it.
20	ERIC HALSTROM: Thank you.
21	CHAIRMAN BORST: Any other questions,
22	comments? Anybody from the public? Brian has
23	already put his two cents in. Seeing none, I guess
24	we're ready for a motion and a second.
25	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Move approval.

1	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
2	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Second.
3	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.
4	Ready for a roll call vote.
5	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
б	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
7	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty?
8	COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye.
9	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
10	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
11	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes?
12	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.
13	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood?
14	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye.
15	CHAIRMAN BORST: It passes unanimously.
16	Next on the agenda is consideration and
17	discussion of Quarter Horse Racing Association of
18	Indiana board of directors' unanimous vote to
19	support the installation of cameras in the barn
20	stall area of Horseshoe Indianapolis. I'm not sure
21	if there's anybody.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: I was under the
23	impression Diane Bennett is.
24	CHAIRMAN BORST: The executive director.
25	Maybe you can give us some background on what

started it.

DIANE BENNETT: I'm here representing Paul Martin. He just came back from Texas. He is still recovering so he couldn't attend. It was at the February director's meeting, this was brought up in our meeting. And there was lengthy discussion about needing backside cameras to monitor what's going in the barns. If someone is walking by someone's horse, and they throw something in there, we have it on camera so you could tell. Also it would help the integrity of the Quarter Horse racing group.

On top of that, we're really concerned about the backside's safety of the grooms. We've had two deaths from drug overdose. We've had thefts reported. We have cars being broken into, and we've even had assaults. If we have these backside cameras set up, maybe that would deter some of this activity. That is one of our main concerns, and we would like you to consider those.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. I realize that's a pretty expensive proposition. Is that something that's in the works at all?

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: Chairman, and,
25 Diane, maybe you can help me with this, but I seem

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1	to remember I think it was the December meeting
2	where I think Joe Morris had submitted information
3	related to the committee actions.
4	DIANE BENNETT: Yes.
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: One of the things
6	I noticed was maybe there was a discussion or
7	something on barn cameras that had been tabled. Is
8	that kind of where all of this kind of came from?
9	DIANE BENNETT: Yes, I'm not sure how far in
10	the future that is. I don't recall.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: As far as I can
12	tell, the committee has already scheduled what they
13	were going to be spending for 2023, correct?
14	DIANE BENNETT: Uh-huh.
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: So anything you
16	want to add to that and how the process works would
17	be helpful.
18	DIANE BENNETT: They were just so concerned
19	because we've had so many problems on the backside.
20	Concern not only for the grooms, trainers, owners,
21	it's something maybe we don't install all of the
22	cameras, just a few key points at the gates or
23	receiving barns. Maybe we could have stopped these
24	two deaths if we knew what was happening.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: What I do see

1	right now is a commitment to install a few
2	cameras
3	DIANE BENNETT: Uh-huh.
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: in some of
5	those key areas for this year. And I believe it
6	might be on the list for 2024 as well, but that's
7	not near what Hoosier Park has here as far as
8	cameras fully installed in each of the barn areas,
9	correct?
10	DIANE BENNETT: I'm not sure what's exactly
11	installed here.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: Maybe somebody
13	else could help me out here. Where's Joe?
14	CHAIRMAN BORST: Whose radar do we need to get
15	this? How about the Thoroughbreds, do the
16	Thoroughbreds have the same feeling on this? I
17	would think so.
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: We would need to
19	talk to Brian.
20	JOE MORRIS: Good morning, Joe Morris from
21	Caesars Entertainment Racing. I'm just going to
22	back up here for a second. When the RCFAC funds
23	that Caesars funded for both tracks, 12.5 went to
24	this track, 12.5 went to Horseshoe. We put
25	3 million of it in the middle so there's 11 million

1 at each track to spend. Up here as we analyzed 2 what we needed, we did the cameras in the stalls. 3 There's one camera splitting each stall so you can 4 see one camera to two stalls. We put that in. We 5 changed the lighting this year. We changed all the 6 barn roofing, you know, a number of things like 7 that.

Down at Horseshoe when we met with Brian and 8 9 Joe Davis, who's on the committee, and Paul and 10 Eric Halstrom, we felt we needed stalls. And we 11 felt we needed more grooms quarters. We thought a 12 Eurociser would really help down there. That was almost 8 million, but it got us another 105 stalls, 13 14 which you'll see are really going to pay off for 15 this year. It got us another 50 dorm rooms.

The committee actually has a meeting next week, next Thursday. We meet in March, and we meet in September. We try to keep a two-year rolling schedule going.

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20 Cameras have been brought up. It's on the 21 list. We did identify that we didn't have some of 22 the outdoor coverage we wanted around the guard 23 shacks to see who's coming in and out of the guard 24 shack. There was some blind areas around some of 25 the dorms and specifically around the receiving 1 barn where you go on and off the track. So we've set aside, I think, it's \$35,000 a year to be 2 3 upgrading the outside cameras. The new one is on the list of topics that we'll take up. 4

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The project here was around a million three and change. We have 650 stalls here. We have 1150 stalls down there. We did this project two years ago. My guess is that means the price has gone up. It hasn't gone down. I haven't priced it out yet. If it's something we're considering, I'll need to at least get a rough price for what that might cost and how we do it. I know we have some fiber issues down there, some conductivity that would have to get fixed as part of the whole thing.

On the list we've discussed it certainly for 15 last year's meeting because it was on the sheets 17 that I sent in. We'll meet next week. And we 18 think we can put it on for discussion again.

19 CHAIRMAN BORST: I think that would be a good 20 idea. The question I have, is this one where it's 21 better to go all in, or can you go a little at a 2.2 time?

JOE MORRIS: You could phase it. There's no 23 question you can phase it. I think some of you 24 25 have gone back with our control room. Just setting 1 that up takes guite a bit, and then you need to get the fiber run, and get the conductivity run. And that's some infrastructure work. You can certainly phase it in over a period of time.

As I said earlier, we have spent quite a bit more of that money at Horseshoe with the results we wanted to get out of it. We will have to find the money. It always comes down to the money. We need to find out what the ballpark is for that. I'11 investigate that.

Maybe you do something like CHAIRMAN BORST: you run the fiber for everything and then eventually the cameras.

Identify the control room, get JOE MORRIS: the stuff pulled back around. The good news is the 25 million, the 12.5 and 12.5 replenishes itself in ten years, which is six more now. So there'll be another 12.5 there for both tracks as part of Caesars' commitment to capital.

20 CHAIRMAN BORST: I think everybody has to sit 21 down and figure out the priority, I guess. Ιt 2.2 seems like it has helped here quite a bit. I think 23 it's something that should be done at some point. 24 It's just a matter of how you do it, I guess. 25 JOE MORRIS: Let us take the next step and I

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1 | can at least ballpark what it might cost.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Maybe at the next meeting you can tell us what you find out.

Any other comments or questions? Anybody from the public have any comments or questions?

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: I do. I know way too much about cameras so I have a couple questions but take it just for what it's worth. Are these all monitored 24-7, or are they just on a recording basis?

JOE MORRIS: Joe Morris again. We staff that room 40 hours a week. And there's about a 20-day recording for each stall. So the guy's got a checklist. He comes and makes sure the cameras are all working. Then we have a random system of different stables we look at. We use it more focused on race days so we'll pick a few out.

18 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Who has access to the 19 storage?

20 JOE MORRIS: Our employee, then state 21 officials upon request.

22 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Do you have a23 protocol who can access it?

24JOE MORRIS: Yes, there's a chain of custody25situation. So we keep it with our people. And

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1 then your staff is able upon request to come in. And we will have pulled the segment of time they're 2 interested in looking at. Then they get to look at 3 the specific segment. And then during racing, 4 there's another person that will come in and do 5 spot checks also. It's a detention system. 6 They're under 24-7 detention. 7 8 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Do you have any 9 cameras that are not known to the general group, be 10 it whoever you're trying to monitor? Do you have 11 cameras? 12 JOE MORRIS: We do not. 13 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Do you propose -- is 14 there a reason you don't? 15 JOE MORRIS: We just didn't. In transparency 16 working with our horsemen, we told them where we 17 were putting them all. And they're where the 18 horses are. 19 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: So you've been open 20 in saying --21 JOE MORRIS: Yes. 2.2 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: -- they're all here. 23 You can tell where they are. There's no hidden 24 ones. 25 JOE MORRIS: Correct, yeah.

1 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: I probably have 20 2 other things, but have a great day. 3 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any other questions? I see 4 Brian coming down. He just can't resist. 5 BRIAN ELMORE: Can't. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: He's very quiet 6 7 today. CHAIRMAN BORST: It wouldn't be a meeting 8 9 without you coming down and saying something. 10 BRIAN ELMORE: Thank you, I think. 11 CHAIRMAN BORST: No, that's positive. 12 BRIAN ELMORE: Brian Elmore, Executive 13 Director of the Indiana HBPA. First, I'd like to 14 say we support 100 percent the proposal that Joe 15 Morris has put out there of the additional cameras 16 on the backside, stable gate, around the dorm area 17 to monitor activity to try and reduce some of the things that Diane talked about. We are not happy 18 about that either. 19 20 Regarding cameras, I guess we should all rest 21 assured because HISA says they're starting in six 2.2 days with the medication testing, six days. 23 However, as of today that we learned last Friday, 24 there's only one state they have a contract with to 25 do the testing. That's California. Huh? It's

going to get real interesting.

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Anyhow, as we talked about expense, my father served in the Navy. When I was a young boy, and I'd get my allowance of 50 cents a week, I'd jump on my Schwinn bicycle and went off to the dime store, my 50 cents was gone in a matter of minutes. My dad said that I reminded him of some of his fellow Navy mates as being a drunken sailor.

9 The capital expenditures down at Horseshoe 10 Indianapolis have been new dormitory, great; new 11 Eurociser, great; paving project, great; new barn, 12 great, which is about -- I know you're into 13 building, a custom stall \$22,000 per 12 by 12 14 stall. I know this is not on the table today, but 15 we've spent about 8 million of our 11 and a half in 16 two years and eight months. We've got seven years 17 and four months to go before this is refunded.

18 And what's on our radar -- and I've talked to 19 Joe Morris about it. I've talked to Eric Halstrom 20 about it. I've talked to Steve Jarmus about it --21 is eventually we would like to build a worship 2.2 center outside the gate across the street from the 23 race office whereby people in the general area 24 could come. You don't necessarily have to be 25 badged to get in and put in more programs to reach 1 people who may have substance abuse problems, bring in more speakers and try to do more of those 2 3 things.

And I'm going to give this to you, Commissioner Levengood, if that's all right, so you have an idea of the 40 by 80 building we're looking at. By the way, what does it cost to build a parking lot for 60 cars now? What's it cost? Τs it 6,000, 5,000?

10 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: I'll get back to you 11 on that.

12 BRIAN ELMORE: All in, that thing is going to 13 end up costing a million dollars. I think this is on down the road in the future. One thing we want 14 to do is look at serving the backside people and in 15 16 the best interest of them. I just want to share 17 that. We support Joe's proposal that he's got for 18 cameras this year to go in identified areas 19

100 percent. Thank you.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Thanks.

21 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: You need a family 2.2 restroom in here.

BRIAN ELMORE: We have the men's and women's. 23 24 Should we need the third one?

> COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Unfortunately, again,

1	I know too much. You probably need a, quote,
2	family restroom.
3	BRIAN ELMORE: Mark my office out and put a
4	bathroom. You just mark that thing up and send it
5	back to me. Thank you. Appreciate it.
6	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Just giving you a
7	hard time. Thank you.
8	CHAIRMAN BORST: We'll just all come in your
9	office. That's okay.
10	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: This is one of the
11	best blueprints I've ever seen.
12	CHAIRMAN BORST: Anybody have any other
13	comments?
14	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: I'd like to say, I was
15	around when the transfer of ownership happened from
16	local ownership to Caesars. I know we had some
17	issues early on about how things would work from
18	that point on. But I would like to say I think
19	Caesars as a whole, you've done an outstanding job
20	of living up to your commitment that you made when
21	you bought the tracks. I would just like to
22	applaud the entire organization for really doing a
23	great job of making sure you maintained these
24	tracks at the highest of levels.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Now with HISA, that's going

to be more fun yet.

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Okay. Next on the agenda is review of the 2 3 Executive Director's Indiana Horse Racing 4 Commission request for exemption from the HISA 5 Lasix prohibition (also known as HISA Furosemide Exemption Request) with respect to the use of 6 furosemide on covered horses during the three-year 7 period beginning on the program effective date, 8 9 currently cited as March 27, 2023 ending March 26, 10 2026. This exemption does not apply to 11 two-year-old covered horses and covered horses 12 competing in stakes races. Do you want to take 13 that?

MR. EGGIMAN: Yeah, I can take it. This is what triggered Miss Barnes' amendment to the Thoroughbred program.

Commissioners, the HISA Act itself bans 17 administration of any foreign substance to a 18 covered racehorse within 48 hours of racing. 19 This includes furosemide, also known as Lasix. However, 20 21 the Act has carved out an exception for Lasix for a 2.2 three-year period if a state racing commission so 23 decides to do so, again, except for two-year-old 24 horses and stakes races.

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Based on the delegation of authority to

1 approve race matters prior to the next meeting given to Executive Director Pitman in the December 2 3 Commission meeting, Executive Director Pitman requested this exemption on behalf of the 4 Commission from the 48-hour ban for Lasix on 5 March 1, 2023. This gives HISA time to evaluate 6 the request and Commission time to respond to 7 questions from HISA before racing begins at 8 9 Horseshoe Indianapolis.

I know we had at least one or two members of the audience who want to speak to the Lasix exception. I think Dr. Mann, I don't know if you want to come speak to that.

14 DR. MANN: Dr. Michael Mann. Basically, we 15 have used it for years. The other option that they 16 used to use was take horses off hay and feed and 17 water for 24 hours. I definitely don't like this 18 I think that Lasix has been proven to be option. 19 safe over and over again. It's used a fair amount. The side effects are minimal. I have seen horses 20 21 that have been out training without Lasix. And 2.2 they will pass out on the track because they bleed or something like that. I think taking the 23 24 therapeutic medication away that has shown no side 25 effects that anybody has proved to me yet away

1 would be detrimental to the horses and to the 2 betting public if we have a horse coming down the 3 stretch that's got blood gushing out because we 4 made a rule without using scientific evidence 5 behind it.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any questions?

MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioners, as you can see in your packets from Mr. Elmore, the IHBPA endorses the Lasix exemption as well. So at this time Commission Staff would respectfully request a vote to ratify the HISA Lasix exemption request for three years.

13 CHAIRMAN BORST: Which is in the packet the 14 letter that will be submitted to HISA. Now I think 15 it's good idea too. There has been a zillion 16 studies done. I don't know why they want to do 17 more, but they do. So let them do what they want 18 to do, but at least we buy three more years for 19 Indiana anyway.

20 Any questions, Commission members? Any other 21 members of the public want to speak to the Lasix 22 furosemide issue? Seeing none, I guess we're ready 23 for a motion and a second.

COMMISSIONER ESTES: I move acceptance. COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.

1 CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded. Go 2 to roll call vote. 3 MR. EGGIMAN: Chairman Borst? 4 CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye. Commissioner Pillow? 5 MR. EGGIMAN: COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye. 6 MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner Levengood? 7 8 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye. 9 MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner McCarty? 10 CHAIRMAN BORST: He may have left. He had 11 another meeting. 12 MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner Estes? 13 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye. 14 CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. It passes. I don't 15 believe we have any old business, but I think we 16 have some news business. So who wants to take new 17 business? Director Pitman. 18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: Wanted to take the 19 opportunity under new business to invite maybe Tony 20 from the ISA -- here he comes -- and Joe Morris to 21 give us an update on this year's Breeders Crown 2.2 event and where the committee is on making their 23 plans for this huge event that's going to take 24 place this fall. 25 TONY RENZ: Good morning to everyone.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Good afternoon. CHAIRMAN BORST: Tony, if you would identify yourself for the reporter.

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TONY RENZ: Sure. I'm Tony Renz, the Executive Director of the ISA. You know I'm pleased to be here today to give you an update on our planning for the Breeders Crown. The ISA is very excited to be a part of this Breeders Crown and to be planning and helping Hoosier Park along the way.

11 Our small committee of Emily Dever, Ernie 12 Gaskin, Sarah Conrad, and myself have spent several 13 months meeting with Hoosier Park weekly to plan the 14 Even more exciting is that for the first event. 15 time a portion of the sponsorship money will come 16 back to the horsemen's purses. After a couple 17 months negotiating with Hoosier Park, the split of 18 the sponsorship money will be as follows: Hoosier 19 Park will receive the first 100,000. The ISA 20 horsemen will receive the next 75,000, and 21 everything after that is a 50/50 split.

To give you an idea, in 2017, Hoosier Park raised 194,000 in sponsorships. In 2020, Hoosier Park raised 254,000. Currently our total is \$247,500. Of that, the ISA committee has secured the confirmation of 205,000 of that.

We have worked extra hard to put the Indiana stamp on this Breeders Crown. We included such sponsors as Victory Hill, Premier Acres, Sugar Valley, and Country Lane.

Finally, the most sensational news is the Indiana Breed Development and the ISA collaborated to become the presenting sponsor of the 40th edition of the Breeders Crown. We are all proud to be a part of this Breeders Crown.

As mentioned, we are working along with Hoosier Park to make sure we put on the best Breeders Crown possible. With our names on the event, it is most important the guests walk away the same way they did in 2017 knowing that Hoosier Park and Indiana are true leaders in the North American Standardbred world.

With sponsorships moving along well, now operations begin to be the focus from here out. Seating, staffing, and food options continue to be a concern and have heavy focus as we continue our planning, as much as changed since 2017. The ISA feels with the migration from the northeast Standardbred horsemen and also the horsemen from Florida to the Midwest, this year's attendance is

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sure to pass 2017. The strength in Indiana's
 program and the ever growing strength of programs
 in Ohio and Kentucky, we feel many will attend the
 Hoosier Park Breeders Crown.

Finally, do not forget the Hoosier sale will also be held on Breeder Crown elimination weekend. It is a must that we have enough seating for our owners, sponsors, and fans. And we also need to serve and feed this group.

10 They will arrive with high expectations. We 11 must exceed those expectations. Any level less is 12 not acceptable. We are available here for any 13 questions you have. I am joined by our ISA 14 president John DeLong, ISA director Ernie Gaskin 15 and our counsel Robert Young.

16 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions? Date again?
17 TONY RENZ: October 27th and 28th, last
18 weekend of October.

19 CHAIRMAN BORST: Put that on your calendars. 20 It's one heck of an event. Deena will be there 21 probably wearing a hat or something she always 22 wears for the fancy events, of course. Thank you. 23 Appreciate that. Joe, you're going to speak to it 24 also.

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JOE MORRIS: Joe Morris, Caesars Entertainment

Racing. Just want to add to what Tony has said, I
 know in Indiana we like unique, and we like firsts.
 And this is the first in my experience, which goes
 back a little bit, where a track and horsemen share
 sponsorships, and more important than that, work
 together to sell and secure them.

We've been meeting for a couple months now on it. Tony gave you the splits. Those are all accurate. The crew that he has with Ernie and Emily and Sarah, we fit right in. We're working together, selling the stuff. It's been a first in the industry type of situation where we collaborate and share like that. So we're proud of that.

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14 I think we have shown over the last, this will 15 be the fourth meets now with Caesars, but over the 16 last few, we throw a party at Caesars. So this will be a party. You've been to the Indiana Derby 17 18 over the couple years. You've been to the Dan 19 This will be on Fox Sports. We're Patch. 20 negotiating that deal out. We're actually adding 21 Fox to our Dan Patch Day and Caesars Pacing Derby 2.2 this year. That's a new for what we're doing.

23 Seating is a question. We went down through 24 it again. We're going to be using Ticketmaster to 25 sell the seats. We've already got the seat plans 1 done through our relationship that Caesars has with them. Right now we're right around 2,150 seats 2 3 that people can set in. There's always the 4 walkups. We figure walkups probably five to 600. 5 So we've got capacity right now for around 2700. Is that the right number? It's a good starting 6 number, I will tell you that. 7

The sales, the tickets will go on sale in July 8 so we'll be able to monitor that. We'll be able to 9 10 monitor. A lot of this comes down to, different 11 breed, but is there a Secretariat of the group 12 where everybody has to come and watch this horse. 13 But we're on weekly meetings working with Tony and 14 his crew. And we'll continue to make sure we throw 15 that correct party.

So, I mean, as we gauge this thing, there's going to be some number, I'm going to guess 2500 to There's some in the group that think it 3,000. might be a little higher, but we're not throwing the party to fail. This will be a well run event.

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We'll be using some outsourcing of food with 22 that number of people. The staffing, I think, 23 we'll get to but even restaurant capacity won't 24 work as well. So we'll outsource some of the food requirements. And I've got other tracks in the

1 area that are driving distance. So we'll be bringing people in from other tracks to help us 2 3 with the event also. So we're excited about it and 4 excited working with the horsemen. We think it's 5 going to be a great event.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: I just caution you. Do you do any reserve seating events now?

I believe we do for our concert 8 JOE MORRIS: series and other casino events. We don't on the 9 10 racing side. We use Ticketmaster a lot on global Caesars. We're plugged into that. They've helped 11 12 negotiate many of their famous charges and stuff 13 away. That's all a part of the bigger picture.

14 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Who gets what piece. 15 JOE MORRIS: We're calling down a little bit 16 on the Caesars relationship to make sure we don't 17 get hit with that.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: You have somebody on 19 your side that's worked.

> JOE MORRIS: Right.

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21 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: The second thing is 2.2 the staff -- I'm being technical. But this could 23 be a bust or huge. And believe it or not, marking 24 seats and having your ushers know where it is and 25 what to do, if you're not used to it, you really

need to think through that small piece of the
 customer service experience in a -- even if it's
 only 2,000 seats because it can go bust.

JOE MORRIS: We'll be using an ambassador 4 5 system. I know Breeders Cup uses it. We've used it some. Working with our committee, us and the 6 ISA, there's probably 10 or 12 people on the 7 committee. But we'll have ambassadors. We'll have 8 9 ambassador training. They'll have maps. I mean, 10 we have to get you out of the parking lot so you 11 know how to get in.

12 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Duplicate tickets, go 13 to box office. That whole world, if you're not 14 used to it, you ought to make sure you have a 15 couple of people that have been used to it in 16 attendance. Okay. Enough said.

17 CHAIRMAN BORST: I'm ready. Sign me up.18 Let's go.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: Joe, Commission Staff has also been meeting with the ISA committees. And one of the committees that we've been working with are also very involved in the Breeders Crown committee. So when you talk about outsourcing food requirements, what do you mean when you say "outsourcing"?

1	JOE MORRIS: So we will have a tent out on the
2	apron that will hold probably somewhere in the low
3	600 people. We will outsource that food and
4	beverage service, I am told, to the same group that
5	did it in 2017. I wasn't here then, but just in
6	the last week, our head of food and beverage says
7	they have that. There will be a separate kitchen
8	set up behind it, and they will support the tent on
9	the food and beverage side.
10	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Who's the health
11	care who's the administrator from a it's the
12	guy that shows up with the inspector and the
13	thermometer, sticks it in and says it's 100, and
14	it's supposed to be 120.
15	JOE MORRIS: If we outsource that to that
16	group, that will fall on them.
17	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: They will have a
18	license.
19	JOE MORRIS: They will be licensed and a
20	vendor that we will have confidence in that will
21	succeed with us and for us.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: And as the tickets
23	go on sale and you start seeing an uptick in the
24	numbers, and you find out, oh, my gosh, you know,
25	there is a big interest in people coming in to this

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1 event, do you have any plan B as far as -- you know, you're planning on, let's just use the tent out here as an example, 600 there. Do you have a plan B so if you need to up that, you can do that?

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Part of our RCFAC this 5 JOE MORRIS: We do. year is 100,000 in apron improvements. Again, 6 working with that same committee with the ISA, we 7 have a design team coming in to help us with that, 8 9 but we have space down there for an upscale beer 10 We haven't sold the area in front of Slice garden. 11 and behind that bar. That's an area we prefer to 12 use for walkup, but we have space there. We have 13 space in our simulcast area still. Then we have 14 space in this lower level where we're not selling 15 that we can look at. And then we have the apron 16 where we could do another kind of structure to put 17 more people.

The fact of the matter is, you get up towards 18 19 3,000, we're pretty full here. We'll have to watch 20 If we have to cap tickets, you see all the that. 21 major racing events as of late capping tickets. 22 Belmont gets capped. The Preakness gets capped. 23 We could look at that. I'm not a fan of that. I'd 24 like to have people be able to come, but if it goes 25 to that level, that's another thing we would do.

1 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Do you currently have a Ticketmaster scanning system where it can go off 2 3 of phones? That's a whole world. JOE MORRIS: That's all part of the system. 4 5 We have the seating charts done. They're loaded And we are run through. On the steakhouse and 6 in. the clubhouse, which we'll be able to use to full 7 8 capacity this year, that's open table so that will be similar to that. 9

10 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: You can tell I'm 11 nervous for you.

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JOE MORRIS: We have to get to the size of the events you've done. Behind the buffet area, we're going to open that up. That will have tables and big screen TVs and seating.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: How will you be able to exclude people from the reserve seating area that do not have a ticket to that area? Are you going to rope it off or just use an honor system?

JOE MORRIS: The walkups we still like to have be a part of this event. That will be more of an honor system on that. We'll have ushers so to speak in our areas where they're reserved to make sure the right people get in their paid seats.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Good luck.

JOE MORRIS: This is going to be sold. This will be tables. That's a great place to set tables overlooking, which knocks the first few of these rows out unless you're looking at the big screen so that pushes those seats back a little further. So we're going to be using about every inch we have I hope.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Sounds good. You'll have to get the bleacher people in.

JOE MORRIS: We may have to put bleachers in. The good news is we have time. And nothing can ever get too far out ahead of an event, but we have a good team working on it, good dialogue. We're well ahead of the game as far as the planning. It happens like that though.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: If you have the numbers that are coming in, then, of course, you will have to respond food wise as well.

JOE MORRIS: Absolutely. We can do what we can do in the building. Again, we'll be using other vendors. And we've had to do that at every track I've been that. So maybe we can find some other local restaurants that want to come in.

We'll do some themed areas.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Invite your fire

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1 marshal in early. I know enough to be dangerous. 2 In 2011, Jerry Jones in Dallas blew it. It was a 3 disaster. Mike Fox and I went down there ahead of 4 time. We could see it coming. I'm just sharing 5 with you the undertaking you are about to do is a 6 big deal. And I would like you to succeed.

That's certainly our full intent. 7 JOE MORRIS: We did a Breeders Cup at Santa Anita in 2016, drew 8 9 72,000 people and had five different local LA 10 restaurants come in for themed areas. So I'm kind 11 of taking a back page from that playbook. 12 Seventy-two there would be like having four or 13 5,000 people here. It was just a much bigger 14 facility.

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COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Good luck.

JOE MORRIS: We'll be using other properties and other groups within Caesars to help us succeed in the whole thing.

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COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Exciting.

20 CHAIRMAN BORST: Yes, it is. Okay. Thank you 21 for the update. Do we need to do any delegation 22 type motion to Deena? I know we already did one or 23 two. Are we okay?

24 MR. PENNYCUFF: Not on this particular item 25 but we do have three more new business items to go over. Delegation will be one of those.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: What else do we have?

MR. PENNYCUFF: The first one is to approve 3 4 material changes to Xpressbet's Secondary Pari-Mutuel Organization License. Xpressbet's addition of a new betting feature Quick Picks through its advance deposit wagering and 7 handicapping product, 1/ST Bet and addition of Plaid as a payment processor vendor. Both of those were sent to you, I think, yesterday as kind of a 11 last minute addition.

12 So, again, Xpressbet will be offering a new 13 feature Ouick Picks, which is detailed in the 14 confidential letter through the advance deposit 15 wagering handicapping product 1/ST bet. The 16 feature has been approved by the Oregon Racing Commission on January 18, 2023, and, again, as we 17 discussed previously, kind of set up as the 18 19 foremost authority on ADW operations, including 20 conducting yearly audits and maintaining strict 21 licensure requirements for all the SPMOs.

2.2 And the second one is Xpressbet is making a 23 change to its current Plan of Operation with the 24 addition of Plaid to its current list of account funding vendors. The details are in the 25

1	confidential letter. It's supposed to be a more
2	secure way to transfer payments back and forth for
3	ACH payments. And Plaid has also been approved by
4	the Oregon Racing Commission.
5	So at this time, Commission Staff respectfully
6	requests approval of both changes to Xpressbet's
7	SPMO license or Plan of Operation or both.
8	CHAIRMAN BORST: We do them both at the same
9	time?
10	MR. PENNYCUFF: Yes.
11	CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions, Commissioners?
12	How about a motion and a second.
13	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Move to accept.
14	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
15	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.
16	Roll call vote.
17	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
18	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
19	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
20	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
21	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes?
22	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.
23	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood?
24	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye.
25	CHAIRMAN BORST: Passes unanimously. Got

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another one?

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MR. PENNYCUFF: The next item of new business is request the Commission delegate authority to sign a Voluntary Implementation Agreement with the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority, known as HISA, regarding federal racetrack safety rules that became effective on July 1, 2022, and with the Horseracing Integrity and Welfare Unit, known as HIWU, regarding anti-doping and medication rules scheduled to become effective on March 22, 2023 if approved by the Federal Trade Commission.

12 The current version of the Voluntary 13 Implementation Agreement, or VIA, being written is 14 the result of input from the Indiana Attorney 15 General's Office, Commission Staff, and HISA and 16 HIWU attorneys over many weeks. Indiana's 17 agreement has a strong clause to indemnify the 18 Commission and our state employees. VIA will allow 19 the IHRC to receive credits for IHRC personnel's 20 time spent implementing HISA/HIWU.

Administrative Code 71IAC 2-2-1(b) allows the Commission to delegate to the Executive Director all powers and duties necessary to fully implement the purposes of the Pari-Mutuel Wagering Act on Horse Races Act, or the Act. Commission Staff

1	respectfully requests Commission delegate to
2	Director Pitman the authority to approve the VIA
3	and sign for the Commission on the VIA once the
4	final agreement has been negotiated.
5	CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any questions on
6	the delegation of authority? Seeing none, I guess
7	we are ready for the motion and a second to approve
8	the delegation.
9	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Move to delegate.
10	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
11	CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.
12	Roll call vote.
13	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
14	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
15	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
16	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.
17	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes?
18	COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye.
19	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood?
20	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye.
21	CHAIRMAN BORST: The "ayes" have it.
22	MR. PENNYCUFF: One final item, this item is
23	request the Commission delegate authority to
24	approve any 2023 racing matters prior to the next
25	Commission meeting to the Executive Director

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1 pursuant to 71IAC 2-2-1. As you know, there are matters that arise in the race meet that require 2 3 quick turnaround and quick decision making. 4 Because the Commission may not meet often enough 5 for these immediate matters to be handled, Commission routinely requests that the Commission 6 delegate authority to Executive Director Pitman to 7 handle matters that arise between meetings. 8

9 Pursuant to 71IAC 2-2-1, Commission may 10 delegate authority to the Executive Director to 11 implement and execute the duty of regulating each 12 race meeting, and persons participating in each 13 meeting.

At this time, Commission Staff respectfully requests delegation of authority to Director Pitman to make race meet decisions, including but not limited to equipment, race calendars, rule readoptions, and SPMOs that cannot be delayed until the next Commission meeting.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions on this
delegation? We do this one almost every meeting.
If not, accept a motion and second.

23 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Again, move to delegate.
24 COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
25 CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded.

1	Roll call vote.
2	MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst?
3	CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye.
4	MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Pillow?
5	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Aye.

14	CHAIRMAN BORST: Good. No offense, but that's
15	enough. Seeing none, I guess we'll thank you all
16	for coming. Our reporter, are you retiring?
17	COURT REPORTER: Next year.
18	CHAIRMAN BORST: Good. You've got another
19	year. So we don't have to say goodbye to you yet.
20	COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Motion to adjourn.
21	COMMISSIONER PILLOW: Second.
22	CHAIRMAN BORST: All those in favor?
23	THE COMMISSION: Aye.
24	CHAIRMAN BORST: No roll call on that one.
