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4 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Good morning.

5 MS. ALLEN: Good morning.

6 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Pending the arrival
7 of our Chairperson, I would call our August
8 meeting, August meeting of the Indiana Civil
9 Rights Commission, to order. And we do have a
10 quorum, so we can proceed.

11 The first item is approval and adoption of
12 the meeting minutes. Do I have -- do I hear a
13 motion to accept the minutes?

14 COMM. BAYNARD: I'll make a motion to
15 accept the minutes as they're presented.

16 CHAIRMAN CARTER: And a second?

17 COMM. GIDNEY: Second.

18 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Any discussion?

19 (No response.)

20 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Okay. All in
21 favor, please say aye.

22 COMM. CRENSHAW: Aye.

23 COMM. BAYNARD: Aye.

COMM. GIDNEY: Aye.

1 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Aye.

2 Opposed? Are there any in opposition? Is
3 there any opposition?

4 (No response.)

5 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you.

6 Financial Support, Ms. Cook. That's
7 Financial Report.

8 MR. SMITH: Well, good afternoon, or
9 good morning.

10 MS. RINCONES-CHAVEZ: Good morning.

11 MR. SMITH: I first want to make sure
12 that all of the Commissioners got a copy of the
13 Financial Report, had an opportunity to review
14 it. Pretty status quo.

15 A few things I want to make mention of is
16 the fact that the Agency has fulfilled our HUD
17 partnership, contract agreement, and those funds
18 have been or will be released very soon, which
19 would be added to that line item. We -- a few
20 months ago, actually, we completed the EEOC
21 cooperative agreement, so that piece has been
22 completed.

23 Operating account and budget, which is

1 line one on the general -- from the general fund,
2 is pretty standard, no conversation -- or no
3 further conversation about any additional
4 reversions, so we are pretty happy about that.
5 All of the cultural commissions are on par and
6 doing a job imagining their respective budgets.

7 The other thing to note is that we have,
8 in notice by way of the CLE line item, that
9 amount has continuously decreased.

10 (Comm. Blackburn arrived.)

11 MR. SMITH: That is due in large part
12 to the activity that we've had, with the number
13 of CLE's that we've held throughout the state.

14 Outside of that, nothing more to note
15 unless any of the Commissioners have questions.
16 Any questions involving the budget?

17 COMM. GIDNEY: No.

18 MR. SMITH: Hearing none, that will
19 complete the report on the budget. Thank you.

20 COMM. BAYNARD: Thank you.

21 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you,
22 Ms. Cook.

23 (Laughter.)

1 CHAIRMAN CARTER: All right. I will
2 turn over the meeting to our -- no, not yet?
3 Okay. Old Business Then, I'll do Old Business,
4 then I'll turn over the meeting to our
5 Chairperson, who has arrived.

6 Report by Commissioners on Complainant
7 Appeals. Do we have a report from --

8 MS. RINCONES-CHAVEZ: No.

9 CHAIRMAN CARTER: -- Comm. Ramos?
10 Okay. So, that will be continued, leaving my two
11 cases, J.D. McClane versus Teachers Credit Union
12 and Claudette Roberts versus Teachers Credit
13 Union, which are essentially the same case, and I
14 recommend that we uphold the no reasonable cause
15 in the housing case finding. May I have a motion
16 to accept that recommendation?

17 COMM. GIDNEY: So moved.

18 COMM. CRENSHAW: Second.

19 CHAIRMAN CARTER: All in favor?

20 COMM. CRENSHAW: Aye.

21 COMM. BAYNARD: Aye.

22 COMM. GIDNEY: Aye.

23 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Aye.

1 Any opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 CHAIRMAN CARTER: No. Thank you.

4 And now I will turn over the Assignment of
5 New Appeals to Comm. Blackburn, who, as I
6 understand it, wants to assign them, or it.

7 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: In that I
8 normally do that anyway, we thought we'd try to
9 confuse the minutes. So, I'm pleased to be here
10 and to assign the single case there to -- who did
11 not have a case at all to review last month?
12 That's most of us, right?

13 COMM. GIDNEY: I didn't.

14 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Would you
15 please --

16 COMM. GIDNEY: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- take that
18 case, Barbara Ortiz o/b/o Pablo Ortiz versus
19 St. Mathews Cathedral School?

20 COMM. GIDNEY: Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: All right.

22 Thank you.

23 Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and

1 Order. There are one, two, three, four, five,
2 six, seven such. Have you had a chance to look
3 at those?

4 COMM. CRENSHAW: Uh-huh.

5 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I'd like to,
6 as a group, ask for an acceptance of those.
7 There are comments, I understand.

8 MS. ALLEN: Yes, there are, and good
9 morning.

10 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Good morning.

11 COMM. GIDNEY: Good morning.

12 MS. ALLEN: In the matter of Jessica
13 Spaulding v. Sweet Home Chicago Restaurants, LLC,
14 and Randy Duran, EMha1060260, I received -- well,
15 the office received, it was not made to my
16 attention. Staff attorney on this case,
17 Mr. Bremer, received a letter from the Law Office
18 of Travis Van Winkle, LLC, essentially notifying
19 us that the Respondent Rudy Duran, Sweet Home
20 Chicago Restaurants, LLC, filed for bankruptcy in
21 the U.S. Bankruptcy Court.

22 So, what that means, pursuant to the U.S.
23 Code, we as the Commission need to halt any

1 further proceedings until the bankruptcy action
2 is complete. We don't know if they are going to
3 discharge the debts of this individual
4 Respondent, and so what that means is, as it
5 relates to any Title VII claims for
6 discrimination, we need to just, again, halt any
7 further judicial proceeding until the conclusion
8 of the bankruptcy action.

9 So, with that being said, I know the
10 findings of fact are in front of you today. I
11 would defer until a later date before a vote is
12 taken on that particular case.

13 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Thank you
14 very much.

15 Are there any questions?

16 (No response.)

17 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Any other
18 case in which you want to comment?

19 COMM. CARTER: Madam Chair, I did
20 not -- for whatever electronic reason, the main
21 reason of e-mail attachments, I didn't get an
22 attachment, so I haven't reviewed these cases.
23 So, I'll be abstaining from these, because I

1 haven't had a chance to review.

2 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I understand.

3 COMM. CARTER: Since we have a quorum
4 without me.

5 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: In that case,
6 if there are no other objections, I would ask for
7 a motion to accept the group --

8 COMM. GIDNEY: So moved.

9 COMM. CRENSHAW: Second.

10 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- with that
11 one exception, of course.

12 All in favor?

13 COMM. CRENSHAW: Aye.

14 COMM. BAYNARD: Aye.

15 COMM. GIDNEY: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Aye.

17 Anyone opposed?

18 (No response.)

19 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Thank you.

20 Next we'll have the Administrative Update,
21 and our Executive Director's here.

22 MR. SMITH: Good after -- or good
23 morning again.

1 And Comm. Carter, I apologize for you not
2 receiving those. What we'll -- I think -- well,
3 do you guys have other read receipts on e-mails
4 that you guys get with the packets? Do we do
5 read receipts?

6 MS. RINCONES-CHAVEZ: I think we had
7 to send it three times, and there was a failure
8 of delivery of this part, so he said it might be
9 his service.

10 MR. SMITH: Okay. Maybe we --

11 MS. RINCONES-CHAVEZ: But I suggested
12 that the next one, send hard copy as well as
13 e-mail.

14 MR. SMITH: We'll talk a little bit
15 more off-line about that, but we need to make
16 sure that we get all of those in the hands of the
17 Commissioners prior to the Commission meeting.

18 COMM. CARTER: It hasn't ever been a
19 problem before, so --

20 MR. SMITH: Okay. We'll work that
21 out, but we do apologize for you not receiving
22 that.

23 The Executive Director's Report, nothing

1 abnormal to report. The Commission has been very
2 busy. The most recent activity was a back to
3 school, the event that we took part in, in light
4 of our conversation last month as it relates to
5 education and our involvement. Here in
6 Indianapolis, very well attended. I want to say
7 a couple thousand on hand --

8 COMM. CRENSHAW: Oh, wow.

9 MR. SMITH: -- for that event, of
10 course, it was held at the Julian Coleman Academy
11 Middle School, again, here in Indianapolis
12 yesterday evening, and we will continue to look
13 for opportunities like that in other parts of the
14 state. That has been a well run, a family and
15 fun-filled back-to-school event, and they've been
16 doing it for quite some time.

17 Last year's numbers were somewhere around
18 nine thousand, I believe, folks who attended. I
19 haven't gotten the hard numbers for this year's
20 attendance yet, but from the verbal report that I
21 received from staff, it was just as well if not
22 even better attended than it was last year. So,
23 a great event and opportunity for us.

1 We have invested in -- one of the things
2 we've been trying to do is capture people's
3 attention when having a booth at an event like
4 that, because we don't have bells and whistles
5 that we're selling; right? We don't have
6 trinkets, and I have kind of cut off at the knees
7 the purchase of pencils and pens and stuff like
8 that.

9 So, I have tasked the staff to thinking of
10 some other creative ways that we can grasp
11 everyone's attention. We've purchased kind of
12 this wheel, this Ferris -- not a Ferris wheel,
13 but this game wheel that people can come by and
14 take part in. You spin it, and we give away
15 prizes that we've received from some of the other
16 partnerships that we've forged, like the
17 Indianapolis Indians, for example, who gave us
18 tickets to give away at events like that.

19 And we've also purchased -- what we're
20 going to do is we've purchased a monitor. It
21 hasn't come in yet, but we'll have access to that
22 as well, where we plan to run a continuous PSA
23 and updates about what we have going on, what

1 we're doing, information that's pertinent to the
2 event.

3 In this case, it would have been special
4 education, the disparities there, or discipline
5 and things that parents need to know and/or be
6 aware of, and even if they're not necessarily
7 stopping at our booth, they would be next to our
8 booth and still hear and/or see that information.

9 So, we thought those were two good
10 ventures to dive into as it relates to our
11 involvement in trade shows or back-to-school
12 events or expos, et cetera, et cetera. So, we're
13 excited about that, and look forward to seeing
14 what the survey results bring back in terms of
15 the production of said involvement. So, that
16 went well.

17 Let's see. As mentioned before, the HUD
18 part -- well, no, I talked about having fulfilled
19 the contractual agreement that we have with HUD.
20 The other piece is that we are reapplying, as I
21 mentioned in last month's Commission meeting, for
22 the HUD Partnership Grant.

23 Last year we applied for and received a

1 quarter of a million dollars, to which we devoted
2 specifically to outreach by way of advertising
3 and promotions. Many of you have probably seen a
4 lot of those on the back of public
5 transportation. We did some billboards, we also
6 did some PSA's and things of that nature, so
7 those went well.

8 This year we want to build on that, but we
9 also added in the grant application funds for an
10 internal database that hopefully encapsulates
11 everything that the agency does, so that staff
12 doesn't have to duplicate a lot of that entry
13 that they are currently doing, and hopefully work
14 with our federal partners, EEOC and HUD, to
15 figure out a way to marry all of those databases
16 together into one comprehensive database. So,
17 we've applied for funds to make that happen.

18 In addition to the larger piece of that
19 grant is the statewide testing program, which,
20 again, if we pull off, will be the first of its
21 kind. There's not an agency in the country that
22 is doing testing to the magnitude that we are
23 proposing to do it, and so we're excited. The

1 agency or the Commission will be a pioneer in
2 that regard, and if we can pull this thing off,
3 it will be definitely a feather in the cap for
4 the Commission.

5 So, excited about that piece in total.
6 We're asking for a little over a million dollars
7 as part of that grant application, and feel
8 strongly about receiving -- I'm sure they'll cut
9 some of it down, but at least a good portion of
10 the grants that we apply for.

11 Outside of that, you guys should have a
12 list of all of the events that we have coming up,
13 a laundry list of things that we're doing in a
14 number of different parts of the state, and
15 again, I'd like to encourage each and every one
16 of you, if you have the time, to get out to join
17 us as we do a lot of the education and outreach
18 that may take part -- or take place in your part
19 of the state.

20 So, with that, that ends the Executive
21 Director's Report unless there are any other
22 questions for me.

23 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: No, but I did

1 stop by the booth at Expo, so I wanted to commend
2 you on the quality of the handouts, because I
3 took two or three --

4 MR. SMITH: Awesome.

5 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- hog is
6 me -- related to housing options in the city and
7 a lot of information that I found helpful and
8 valuable, and not necessarily for me, but for
9 people who I may know, so I took it with me, and
10 thanks for that.

11 MR. SMITH: Certainly.

12 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I didn't see
13 the game wheel, or I might have won some tickets
14 or something; right?

15 MR. SMITH: Well, that is -- you
16 know, I can't recall whether we had -- if we had
17 it at Expo, we would have just received it, so --

18 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Oh, okay.

19 MR. SMITH: -- we may not have had it
20 then. I'm not sure.

21 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: But it helped
22 that the people who manned the booth were
23 pleasant and outgoing and engaged the passers-by,

1 so --

2 MR. SMITH: Yes, we had some very
3 good internal conversations about our customer
4 service.

5 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Well, good.
6 It must be working.

7 Okay. Any questions about administration?

8 (No response.)

9 MR. SMITH: Thank you guys for the
10 time.

11 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Hearing none,
12 thanks to you.

13 COMM. CRENSHAW: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Are there any
15 announcements?

16 (No response.)

17 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I have a
18 couple not related to the Civil Rights
19 Commission, so you may include or not these in
20 the minutes from the meeting.

21 An evening with the stars is performing,
22 of world class ballet dancers annually in
23 Indianapolis, and I encourage any of you who are

1 interested to take one of my special invitations,
2 which allows you to get a ticket at a lot less
3 than the normal patron ticket, which is quite
4 expensive. So, if you're interested, because I'm
5 on the committee, I have a few of these and I
6 will be glad to share. I'll get more if you need
7 more.

8 And the other thing I want to announce to
9 you is virtually free, not completely free, if
10 you're a member the Indianapolis Museum of Art, a
11 film has been made by Deborah Riley Draper on the
12 occasion that the top American fashion designers
13 showed their work alongside the best European
14 fashion designers for the first time. It was at
15 Versailles in 1973.

16 It was likewise the first time that an
17 African-American model appeared on the runway
18 with those models from around the world. So, the
19 film is actually a documentary, and it's going to
20 be shown September 12th at The Toby at the
21 Indianapolis Museum of Art.

22 They asked me if I would conduct the
23 Q-and-A session following the film to talk with

1 the filmmaker, and I have lots of those fliers.
2 If you know a young person or an older person
3 who's interested in that kind of history, share
4 the flier with them. I think the cost is nine
5 dollars if you don't belong to the Fashion
6 Society at the IMA.

7 Any other announcements?

8 MR. SMITH: Madam Chair, if I may,
9 another point of -- I won't say attention, but I
10 think it's important for the Commission to be
11 aware of, is a few things that are going on that
12 we received opinions and could indirectly be
13 involved in.

14 One is, we had an increased number of
15 complaints filed on behalf of law enforcement
16 agencies throughout the state. All right.
17 Nothing new in terms of what the complaints may
18 be, but I think the activity was a little rare,
19 and as a result, it ended up in us asking the
20 Attorney General for an advisory opinion in
21 regards to what kind of jurisdiction the agency
22 actually had.

23 The ask was for us to basically pursue

1 investigation of police departments or
2 prosecutor's office because of perceived
3 discrimination on their behalf. The opinion came
4 back that we do not have jurisdiction over those
5 authorities, but the reason I bring that up is my
6 guess is that's not going to stop the complaints
7 coming in in that regard.

8 And one of the things that I continuously
9 say when I'm out is that just because, you know,
10 we find no probable cause or we say that we don't
11 have jurisdiction doesn't mean you haven't been
12 harmed or wronged in some kind of way. It just
13 means that we don't have jurisdiction over the
14 complaint that you are filing.

15 And so, we try to do our best in directing
16 the complainants to an appropriate agency or
17 someone that can help them, but, you know, that
18 puts a little bit of a burden and responsibility
19 on the agency to be either that advocate for
20 right, or the voice for the voiceless.

21 And as the Commission, you guys are an
22 extension of those complaints that might come in,
23 and so I just wanted to make you aware of that.

1 We can get, if you need it, a copy of that
2 advisory opinion so that you guys are aware of
3 what the Attorney General said.

4 The other -- any questions on that piece?

5 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Yes. I do
6 think that even though we don't have
7 jurisdiction, it would be -- something that I
8 would advocate is that we would issue, on our
9 own, a statement in response to those kinds of
10 occurrences that clearly explains, while we are
11 without the ability to justify or bring justice
12 to the situation, that we want to weigh in on the
13 side of whether it's right and prudent and fair
14 and just, and so that not just those involved,
15 but the public in general sees us as an advocate
16 in that way. And you can word it better than I.

17 MR. SMITH: Oh, well, I don't know
18 about that, but I will definitely take that into
19 consideration, and we'll have a number of
20 different venues that we can potentially release
21 such a statement, partnership with the Recorder,
22 as well as the business magazine that goes out
23 throughout the state, as a part of that

1 partnership, we are allowed to put in an op-ed
2 out there about whatever topic that we wish to
3 write about. So, maybe that's a venue that we
4 could explore.

5 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Right. And
6 if they're seen as official statements, I would
7 want the Commissioners to be -- to be aware of
8 the wording of the statement, to render an
9 opinion about whether or not it represents all of
10 us --

11 MR. SMITH: Uh-huh.

12 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- and to
13 sign off on it, quite literally.

14 MR. SMITH: Yes, ma'am. So, we'll
15 make sure that we do that.

16 Any other questions about that piece?

17 (No response.)

18 MR. SMITH: The other side was the --
19 in addition to education, we talk about
20 special ed and discipline; right? So, the other
21 side, with the passing of Law 1003 is the school
22 choice and school voucher component. There is
23 concern about whether that is going to inherently

1 lead to some kind of discrimination by way of the
2 application process or the acceptance of young
3 people into the school that they choose.

4 We've been asked to weigh in. We've more
5 so diverted that because it doesn't fall within
6 our bag, but stating that, if someone does feel
7 that they have faced discrimination, that's what
8 this agency is here for, and we encourage
9 whomever the person is to inquire and/or file a
10 complaint and let the process take care of
11 itself.

12 Just a little bit of background on that,
13 some of the points of contention about that is
14 just where the funding goes and who is
15 responsible for what services to the kids, and if
16 they choose to be a voucher, or even if you
17 qualify to have a voucher or not, and having
18 private schools, having the opportunity to accept
19 and/or deny, if a young person, for example, has
20 a disability and whether that, you know, is
21 discrimination or not.

22 So, there's conversations going on well
23 above my pay grade and, you know, in various

1 rooms across the state, and I just wanted to make
2 you guys as Commissioners aware of those
3 conversations or aware that whether we do or do
4 not have any jurisdiction over, you know, what
5 the conversations are, I'm telling you that we
6 will probably be at least brought into that
7 conversation by way of complaints being filed.

8 And so, if you get asked about any of
9 those questions, feel free to redirect them back
10 to the office, and/or if you want to be a little
11 bit more proactive about it, we'll try to provide
12 you with all of the information that we have as
13 we receive it. And, you know, we do as good of a
14 job as we can of keeping the Web site as up to
15 date as we can about those topics as well.

16 So, I just wanted to make you guys aware
17 of that so that you don't get caught off guard
18 with any of those questions.

19 Yes, ma'am.

20 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: While we are
21 being careful to make sure, to the best of our
22 ability, that there is access to public education
23 and charter schools are becoming increasingly

1 popular as a choice, do you feel it part of our
2 responsibility to also inform families that not
3 all charter schools are accredited? I think that
4 the issue arises, sometimes years after the fact,
5 that if students enter and even graduate from a
6 charter school that is not accredited, they will
7 have difficulty getting into an institution of
8 higher learning.

9 MR. SMITH: Yeah. I don't know if I
10 necessarily -- I don't disagree with that
11 statement. I would, however, encourage us to
12 kind of stay --

13 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I just think
14 that a cautionary note, if we're giving
15 information and telling parents or the public to
16 go to charter schools and here's how and here's
17 why, if --

18 MR. SMITH: Well, we don't do that.

19 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- any of
20 that happens, then I think any information of a
21 positive nature that --

22 MR. SMITH: Yeah.

23 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- would help

1 clarify some of those concerns would be good.

2 MR. SMITH: Well, we don't -- and I
3 have not authorized, nor has the agency taken any
4 stance in promotion of charter or public or
5 religious schools at all. We stand behind our
6 stance that equal access to a quality education,
7 wherever the parent finds that to be, is what we
8 promote.

9 So, you know, we are careful to
10 acknowledge the fact that not all charter
11 schools, not all religious private schools are
12 good, as well as not all traditional public
13 schools are bad, but we don't have any skin in
14 that game. Our -- you know, our lane is
15 disparities and discrimination.

16 And so, you know, we encourage those to
17 understand that we promote or advocate for equal
18 access to a quality education. If you find that
19 to be in the traditional public school, then
20 fantastic. If you find that to be in a religious
21 private school, then good for you. If that's a
22 charter school, then outstanding.

23 What I have cautioned the staff in is

1 staying away from the political piece, because
2 that's not -- it's not where our skin is, about
3 promoting charters or promoting public schools or
4 promoting private schools. We want to promote
5 access to that quality education, and I think,
6 more important, that's the most important thing
7 of all.

8 And so, that was a part of our deal last
9 evening was talking about -- specifically like
10 special education, so if your child is in a
11 special education program, whether that be in a
12 traditional -- or a special education track,
13 whether that be in a private setting, private
14 school setting, or a traditional public school
15 setting, you need to know what those ins and outs
16 are and what that means for your child long-term,
17 as a parent, and what rights and responsibilities
18 that you have and should enforce. And that's
19 been as an example of the stance that we've taken
20 at the Commission.

21 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: I think that
22 comes really close to the concern that I
23 raised --

1 MR. SMITH: Yes, ma'am.

2 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- about the
3 quality of the education, because discussions
4 that we have had around the issue of access and
5 students who may be tracked in a certain way, and
6 the pitfalls --

7 MR. SMITH: Uh-huh.

8 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: -- of that is
9 all part of the educational method.

10 MR. SMITH: Yes. So -- and we'll --
11 as long as it pleases the Commission, we'll
12 continue to do that and advocate or promote for
13 those things, and do our best job of trying to
14 touch as many of those parents as we can, which
15 is what I have interest in it for. The most
16 difficult part of that process is actually
17 engaging the parents that need it the most, so --
18 but, you know --

19 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Uh-huh.

20 MR. SMITH: -- that's we fight the
21 fight we fight, and we'll continue to do so.

22 CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Wonderful.

23 Any other announcements?

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(No response.)

CHAIRPERSON BLACKBURN: Hearing none.

MR. SMITH: Thank you, guys.


