

Lawrence J. Brodeur -- Larry Brodeur obtained a BA from Alma College (Alma, Michigan) in 1976. He received his law degree from Indiana University – Bloomington in 1979. Larry served twice as a deputy prosecutor in Monroe County and also served as the Chief Deputy in Brown County. Most recently, Larry served as a deputy prosecutor in Marion County for 16 years. His assignments included Chief Counsel, Director of Training, Chief of the Grand Jury and 8 years as Chief of Narcotics. Larry joined the IPAC staff in January 2011. When not writing Caselaw Updates, Larry, his wife, Carolyn, and step-son Steve farm approximately 400 acres in Owen County.

Stephen R. Creason -- Steve Creason is the Chief Counsel of Appeals in the Office of the Indiana Attorney General. In that capacity, he leads the team of over 35 attorneys in the Appeals Division who are responsible for representing the State before Indiana's state and federal appellate courts. Having served four attorneys general of both political parties, Steve has also served for six years supervising the State's litigation of death penalty and life without parole appeals and federal habeas corpus petitions; four years as a Deputy Attorney General handling general criminal and civil appeals; and as a law clerk. During the U.S. Supreme Court's 2005 Term, he was a United States Supreme Court Fellow through a program of the National Association of Attorneys General. In Marion County, he was the Director of Trial Advocacy and a member of the Homicide Division. Rodney was selected as a faculty member at the National Advocacy Center in Columbia, South Carolina for 13 courses, teaching trial advocacy skills to our nation's prosecutors. He supervised the prosecution of 67 homicide cases as Prosecuting Attorney and personally tried approximately 50 homicides with one successful death sentence. After law school, Chris worked at the St. Joseph County Prosecutor's Office for five years as a Deputy Prosecutor before joining IPAC as the full-time Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor. In St. Joseph County, Chris specialized in alcohol related cases, primarily Felony Operating While Intoxicated cases. Chris was a member of the Fatal Alcohol Crash Team, a specialized team dedicated to O.W.I. cases that result in serious bodily injury or death from 2007 until 2011. In addition, Chris was a member of various groups with the shared goal of preventing underage drinking, including the Stop Underage Drinking Taskforce. In his position at IPAC, Chris is responsible for coordinating training for prosecutors statewide, as well as keeping abreast of upcoming legal decisions and legislative changes that have an effect on traffic safety.

Kent T. Eastwood -- Kent T. Eastwood is a graduate of Santa Clara University and received his law degree from Indiana University Law School – Indianapolis in 1999. He currently serves as the Chief Deputy for the Boone County Prosecutor's Office. He has served in that capacity since January 1, 2011. Prior to his appointment, he served as a Deputy Prosecutor for the office beginning in February of 2005. Kent's responsibilities include prosecuting major felony matters and cases from the Boone/Hamilton County Drug Task Force. Before joining the Boone County Prosecutor's Office, Kent worked as a Deputy Prosecutor in Marion County 1999-2005. Joel Gabrielse -- Joel graduated with honors from Notre Dame Law School in 2001. During school he worked as a law clerk in the U.S. Attorney's Office in South Bend. After graduation, he joined a small law firm and worked on diverse legal topics. He has been serving as a Deputy Prosecuting Attorney in St. Joseph County, Indiana since 2003. As a Deputy Prosecutor, Joel handles primarily homicide cases. 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Steven Godfrey -- Steven Godfrey graduated from Ball State University in 1987 with a degree in criminal justice and a minor in political science. In addition to working on the ISETS project in several capacities over the years, Cynthia worked on child support projects in Delaware, North Carolina, Illinois, Idaho, and New Jersey. Karla Mantia -- Karla Mantia was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She received a B.S. in Political Science and an A.A.S. in Business Administration from Gannon University in Erie, Pennsylvania, and received a J.D. from Ohio Northern University. Ms. Mantia was admitted to practice law in Indiana in 1989. She has served in the role of Title IV-D Policy Liaison with the Indiana Prosecuting Attorneys Council (IPAC) since 2008. She started this new position in September, after legislative changes moved the Child Fatality Review Program from the Department of Child Services (DCS) to ISDH. Prior to serving in her current position, Gretchen was with DCS for 19 years, and served in a variety of roles. She spent 15 years investigating allegations of child abuse and neglect and supervising DCS Family Case Managers. The last 4 years of her tenure with DCS were spent reviewing child fatality cases from all over the State as part of the DCS fatality unit. She has served as the liaison to the Statewide Child Fatality Review Committee for the last 4 years, and has been involved in child fatality review for more than 14 years. 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James P. McKay, Jr. -- Mr. McKay is an Assistant State's Attorney for the Cook County State's Attorney's Office in Chicago, Illinois. Donald J. Mote -- DJ Mote graduated from Wabash College in 1994 with an A.B. in German. He received his law degree from IU Indianapolis in 1998 and worked at the Indiana Supreme Court Disciplinary Commission as a Staff Attorney until 2000 when he accepted a Deputy Prosecutor position in Marion County. DJ worked as a major felony prosecutor and later in the homicide division. He has been the Chief Deputy Prosecutor in Jefferson County, Indiana since 2007.

Aaron Negangard -- Mr. Negangard was appointed and later elected as Dearborn and Ohio County Prosecutor in 2006.
