## **Tippecanoe Co SWCD 2023 CWI Grant**

The Tippecanoe SWCD 2023 Grant was for conservation tools to be loaned or rented. We have purchased the broadcast seeder, conservation tools and a shed for storage. We have also started a platform for the scheduling and payment of tools and equipment.

Funds awarded: \$24,000

Total purchases equal \$39,400.15.

The goal was to provide tools and equipment to people wanting to add conservation practices to the land. We now have additional equipment to loan and rent to landowners, farmers, and residents to help get conservation in the ground. We are in the early days of getting the program up and running. The SWCD has hosted or presented at events such as the Native PlantFest, Green Expo, RiverFest and Specialty Crop Tour where we have discussed the coming tool loan program with landowners. The Tippecanoe SWCD sees a great potential in the outreach to landowners with the availability of equipment for projects. The added income from the broadcast seeder will also allow us to continue to offer our cost-share programs such as the cover crop and invasive removal programs. 

### **CWI Competitive Grants 2024**

- Budgeted \$2,375,000. Today I'm requesting the CWI Grants Committee plan to award \$2,300,000. We've done this in the past.
  - Largely due to a swing in the staffing salary estimate. We voted off ~\$1,500,000, actual dollar figure as of Sept 2023 is ~\$1,650,000.
- CWI Contracts Typically in December.

### <u>CREP</u>

- CREP Environmental Assessment item will be absorbed into CREP General budget item.
- Staff investment supports CREP.

### **Staffing**

- Set a goal for FY2024 to be fully staffed for the first time since 2019 and we are there!
- Monica Pohlar started with ISDA on September 5<sup>th</sup>. She is housed in the SE at the Connersville USDA Service Center. This position will cover Fayette, Hancock, Henry, Wayne, and Union counties.

- All positions hired this year were out of "Soil Conservation" budget, and not Clean Water Indiana.





### Program Updates

### **Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program**

- Work on the expansion of the CREP program is continuing:
  - These last two months I have been working to try and get a company lined up to complete the required Programmatic Environmental Assessment (PEA). There has been a delay on this.
  - We still have not heard back from the national FSA office on the review of our proposed draft amendment/contract between ISDA and FSA. We may not hear anything until after the start of the new federal fiscal year.
  - ISDA's goal for the program expansion to start is in the first quarter of the calendar year 2024, but it will all depend on the completion of the required PEA and also on the approval of our contract with the FSA.
  - A letter was sent to all of the SWCD offices in early August to gauge the interest of the SWCDs in being a CREP Administrating District for the new CREP watersheds. A Q&A session was held on September 7<sup>th</sup> with the SWCDs regarding the SWCD CREP Administration. There was a lot of interest from the districts in this session. Internal discussions will take place over the next couple of months, and then the final selection of the Administrating SWCDs will be made at the discretion of the SSCB at the January Board meeting.
- Approximate acres signed up so far this calendar year are 1,228 acres.
- Attached to this report is the usual report showing the current status of acres and dollars in CREP, including total completed acres and total enrolled acres since the beginning of the program, and total dollars paid out through the CREP program.
- To date, the state has paid out more than \$10.7 million. For every state dollar that is spent, the federal match is approximately \$4-\$13 for every state dollar, which is currently between \$39.5 million and \$128.4 million of federal dollars depending on the practice.

### IN State Nutrient Reduction Strategy (SNRS)

- Component 1 ISDA is working on the development of a web tool that will display the results of the
  water quality trends report and to make the results more accessible to conservation partners and the
  public. This web tool is planned to be available later in 2023. The information within the water
  quality trends report will be used to draw comparisons of the basins in the state to determine the
  watersheds with the highest trends in nutrient loads and concentrations.
- Component 2 Work on the Science Assessment is continuing. Work on the first 10 practices is almost complete. Fact sheets showing the results of each individual practice will be available soon. The current grant that has been used to carry out the 2<sup>nd</sup> Component is almost expired, and work on getting INREP up and running is happening so that the work of the Science Assessment can continue without interruption. More details to come on this.

- Work on the next revision of the SNRS to be completed in calendar year 2025 will begin in 2024. I have met with IDEM to begin this discussion and determine next steps and a timeline.

## **Pilot National Soil Health education event**

- 45 attendees. States represented included: Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, North Dakota, Ohio, Texas – and Indiana. The NRCS National Soil Health Division was also represented
- Based upon initial survey results, most attendees indicated a desire to host a similar event in their region. These results meet an event goal of 'kick-starting' on-farm soil health trainings for NRCS, Extension, SWCDs, and other conservation staff traveling in from multiple states

## Ecdysis 1000 Farms Initiative

- Helped coordinate 25 farm sites to sample from Vanderburgh to Tippecanoe Counties over a 1week period Note that due to extreme heat, not all sites were sampled.
- Agronomists accompanied team on sampling runs
- Parameters included standard soil tests, "soil health tests", bird counts, insect counts, % of ground cover, leaf and tissue analysis.

## 2024 National No-Till Conference

  - Final registration discounts will be calculated by the number of ICP staff attending the more in attendance, the better the discount
  - Most expensive discount is less expensive than the 'early-bird' discount that ended on 08/31
  - Single day discounts have never been offered.

## Indiana NRCS State Conservationist Report

September 2023 State Soil Conservation Board Meeting

### **CONSERVATION INNOVATION GRANTS (CIG)**

CIG is a competitive grants program. Through creative problem solving and innovation, CIG partners work to address water quality, water quantity, air quality, soil health and wildlife habitat challenges, all while improving agricultural operations. Two separate CIG funding opportunities are now available on grants.gov: \$50 million through <u>CIG On-Farm Trials</u> and \$15 million is available through <u>CIG Classic</u>.

For CIG On-Farm Trials, this year's funding priorities are:

- Irrigation water management technologies
- Nutrient management
- Feeding management and enteric methane reduction
- Grazing lands
- Soil health demonstration trials

For CIG Classic, this year's funding priorities are:


- Forestry
- Habitat conservation and restoration for wildlife and invertebrates
- Managing agricultural lands to improve local water quality
- Energy conservation
- Economics
- Strengthening conservation through indigenous knowledge

This opportunity is open to all domestic non-federal entities and individuals based in the United States. Strong consideration will be given to proposals that include Historically Underserved entities and individuals. Applications are being accepted now through October 30, 2023.

### ACEP - WETLAND RESERVE EASEMENT (WRE)

The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program -Wetland Reserve Easements (ACEP-WRE) land value offers are expected to remain the same for FY2024. The appraisal analysis for this year indicates only slight increases in land values and requires NRCS to keep the FY23 Geographic Area Rate Caps (GARCS). These are the easement payments to the selected applications per acres of easement area offered.

The application due date for ACEP-WRE FY24 is anticipated to be mid-November timeframe.

### FARM BILL PROGRAM FUNDING UPDATE

### LOCAL WORKING GROUPS TO CONVENE

Local Working Groups in each county are an important part of implementing the FY23 Farm Bill programs. In each state, NRCS has established a State Technical Committee to assist in making recommendations regarding implementation of technical aspects of natural resource conservation activities and programs. This is an advisory committee that may be utilized by any USDA agency with conservation obligations. The Farm Bill designates the Local Working Groups as a subcommittee of the State Technical Committee.

The Local Working Group's role is to provide similar recommendations and advice as the State Technical Committee, with a focus on the resource priorities of the local community. These priority resource concerns will be used to prioritize the rankings for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP.) The Local Working Groups should consist of representatives who are able to provide input on the wide range of natural resource and agricultural concerns for their county. The Local Working Groups provide recommendations on local natural resource priorities and criteria for conservation activities and programs, within the scope of state outlined resource priorities.

### NATURAL RESOURCE INVENTORY DATA COLLECTION

NRI is the National Resources Inventory, a statistical survey of land use and natural resource conditions and trends on U.S. non-Federal lands. Information collected includes the status, condition, and trends of land, soil, water, and related resources on the non-federal lands. The sampling units are areas of land called "segments", within which detailed data on soil properties and land use are collected at a random sample of points. Indiana's NRI data collection will begin on <u>September 1, 2023</u>, and run through until the end of January 2024. The soils staff at the state office will collect the data. Field office staff and FSA may be contacted to provide producer-specific information, such as, tillage practices, conservation plans, cropping history, etc.

During the summer, a Pasture NRI study is also done. The main difference between the pasture NRI and the regular NRI is points are only on active grazing land and a lot more detailed information is collected at each point. Producers are usually interested in the statistics of forages and plants found on their site.

### **INDIANA NRCS STAFFING UPDATE**

We currently have 245 employees with an additional 80 vacancies. There is no national update as to when a permanent state conservationist will be announced for Indiana.
