#### **Clean Water Indiana Grants Report**

#### March 2023

#### 2023 Grants

Contracts have been completed and communication has been sent to grantees to make initial claims of 50% of the awarded funds.

#### 2021 and 2022 Grants-REPORTS WERE DUE JANUARY 31ST

#### 2020 Grants-FINAL REPORTS WERE DUE JANUARY 31

District Support Specialists are summarizing grant outcomes and successes to showcase in story maps.

#### 2019 Grants-1 extension wrapping up

-Grant Co. extension ended December 31<sup>st</sup> with final report being due January 31<sup>st</sup>, 2023. Report was submitted. Waiting on verification of final payments and other documentation to landowners to process final claims. Not all funds were spent.

#### **CWI Training Funds**

The CWI Training funds application opportunity closed March 15, 2023. The funds were available in the form of reimbursements and are reserved for training registration fee reimbursements only. All \$30,000 in training funds have been allocated. An additional \$12,670 in applications were unable to be funded but were received prior to the deadline on 3/15/23.

These funds assisted District supervisors and staff to attend trainings such as IASWCD Annual Conference, IDEA Fall Conference, Indiana Watershed Leadership Academy, MS4 related trainings and Pesticide applicator trainings.

#### **SUCCESSES**

#### **Huntington 2020**

The main goal for the Huntington Co SWCD grant project was to build awareness of the benefits cover crops provide and increase the number of acres seeded each year. Throughout the term of the grant, Huntington County SWCD staff met with landowners to discuss the importance of adding cover crops in their crop rotation and assisted them in completing applications for the cost share program. During the second year they hosted a field day, which included a demonstration cover crop plot. Guests heard from guest speakers about Nutrient Cycling and about the different varieties of cover crops and their benefits they provide in helping to improve our soils health.

Total acres seeded with cost-share funds was over 1830 acres, with additional acres of over 550 acres seeded without cost share funds or received cost share through our local program. Total load reductions achieved from seeding cover crops during the term of the grant were: Phosphorus - 2,572 lb./year, nitrogen - 5,138 lb./year and sediment 1,712 ton/year.

#### Fulton 2020

The main goal of this CW project was to reclassify the current SWCD staff from part time to full time. "Thanks to the CWI grant, the SWCD staff is now a full-time paid county position which is a huge accomplishment after trying for several years." The district also utilized CWI funds to further the education of the staff and supervisors by attending local, regional, and state workshops and conferences.

- Directs ISDA to conduct an inventory of lost farmland in Indiana from 2010-2022
- Inventory will categorize what the acres were lost to. Residential, Industrial, etc.
- ISDA will provide report and recommendation to the legislature by July 2024
- Bill was third read and passed on 3/20/23, heads to the Governor

# HB 1638: Watershed Development Commissions

- Rep. Mike Aylesworth, Sen. Susan Glick
- o Rep. Cindy Ledbetter, Rep. Carey Hamilton, Rep. David Abbott, Sen. Jean Breaux
- Basin Development Commission) Creates framework for other watersheds to create development commissions such as KRBYRBDC (Kankakee River Basin and Yellow River
- Requires the Natural Resources Commission to answer certain questions when voting to recognize a proposed commission.
- Allows a commission to be funded through an annual special assessment against each taxable parcel in the designated watershed.

## 2023 Farm Bill



## CLEAN WATER INDIANA BUDGET OVERVIEW





The Clean Water Indiana (CWI) Program was established by the legislature to provide financial assistance to landowners and conservation groups.

The Indiana State Department of Agriculture Division of Soil Conservation (ISDA-DSC) administers the Clean Water Indiana fund under direction from the State Soil Conservation Board. The CWI budget is derived from a portion of cigarette tax funds. (IC 6-7-1-29.3) The cigarette tax fund is 4.22 percent of total cigarette tax revenue, and the CWI fund receives one sixth of this amount. In recent years, the CWI budget has also included a general fund appropriation from the legislature.

### CWI funds are utilized in three key ways. Direct Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) Distribution:

- Competitive CWI grants provide funds for locally prioritized projects to address local water quality concerns.
- For each dollar an SWCD receives from local government or other outside funding sources, the SSCB will provide a match up to \$10,000. (IC 14-32-8-8)
- In FY23 the SSCB voted to direct \$184,000 to district capacity payments (\$2000 per district)


#### **SWCD Support:**

- Each SWCD has an assigned District Support Specialist who aids in district capacity building, including providing training, developing business plans, and assisting with grant writing.
- · CWI bonds all SWCD supervisors.
- ISDA will hire a grant & training coordinator to support SWCD employee development and to secure additional outside funding.

#### **Key Program Support:**

- Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) funds provide incentive payments to plant native grasses, trees, or other vegetation on converted cropland. ISDA employs CREP leaders to provide technical support for this program. Ten SWCDs administer CREP locally.
- The SSCB awarded funds to the Indiana District Employees Association and State of Indiana Cooperative Invasives Management (SICIM).

#### FY 2023 CWI Budget Overview



- Includes \$970,000 general fund appropriation Total: \$3,969,388
- The Clean Water Indiana dedicated fund received a 15% cut in FY23.
- This fund is non-reverting.
- The Division of Soil Conservation has a separate budget.
- All funds are subject to a 2% reserve.
- \*SSCB Voted to direct \$184,000 to district capacity payments (\$2,000 per district)
- \*SSCB Voted to hold back \$150,000 from CWI competitive grants for ISDA staffing capacity (2 years)
- In 2022 the Governor's NextLevel State Work initiative resulted pay adjustments for state employees

Clean Water Indiana supports the implementation of conservation practices which will reduce nonpoint sources of water pollution through education, technical assistance, training, and cost sharing programs (IC 14-32-8).

#### **Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program**


- Still working with FSA and the CREP Steering Committee on what it will take to do an expansion of the program.
- Attached to this report is the usual report showing the current status of acres and dollars in CREP, including total completed acres and total enrolled acres since the beginning of the program, and total dollars paid out through the CREP program.
- We are at approximately 155 acres signed up so far this calendar year.
- According to the states tracking system, there are currently 22,306 acres completed, which is 85% of the goal.
- To date, the state has paid out more than \$10.4 million. For every state dollar that is spent, the federal match is approximately \$4-\$13 for every state dollar, which is currently between \$38.3 million and \$124.6 million of federal dollars depending on the practice.


#### **IN State Nutrient Reduction Strategy (SNRS)**




#### Gulf of Mexico Hypoxia Task Force (HTF)


- I continue to co-chair the HTF Research Needs Workgroup to provide pertinent and relevant research literature to the Hypoxia Task Force states.
- NOAA has released the 2023 National Hydrologic Assessment as part of their Spring Outlook. There is a section near the end of the National Hydrologic Assessment that discusses the implications for Gulf of Mexico hypoxia for this summer. Here is a summary paragraph on the Gulf of Mexico..."The predicted spring flood risk across the MARB will likely lead to average or normal hypoxic conditions in the northern Gulf of Mexico this summer. Large portions of the basin are predicted to have a normal risk of flooding this spring. Absent major flooding, normal springtime discharges of nutrients and freshwater from the Mississippi River are predicted."... To read more about this, check out the link above.

#### **FARM BILL PROGRAMS**

Participants and field staff are reminded that applications are accepted at all times for all Farm Bill programs. Early application is encouraged as conservation planning is a year-round process that does not always align with internal program deadlines.

#### **Inflation Reduction Act**

Indiana received a limited amount of 2023 Inflation Reduction ACT or IRA funds. IRA funds are authorized only for contracts with one or more conservation practices or activities, identified by NRCS, that directly improve soil carbon, reduce nitrogen losses, or that reduce, capture, avoid, or sequester carbon dioxide, methane, or nitrous oxide emissions, associated with agricultural production. Indiana will be using the ACT NOW process to obligate these dollars timely so the field staff can continue conservation planning and working on other program priorities.

In Indiana, \$6.6 million are being made available to IRA-EQIP and IRA-CSP. Applications for the current funding cycles for IRA-EQIP and IRA-CSP are being accepted through <u>April 28</u>. Applications for the current ACEP funding cycle are due to your local NRCS office by March 17, 2023.

#### National Water Quality Incentives Program (NWQI) - Lake Wawasee watershed

Funding is available to producers in Noble and Kosciusko counties through the National Water Quality Incentives Program (NWQI) to help address water quality concerns in the Lake Wawasee watershed. Applications for the current funding cycle are due by <u>April 28</u>.

NWQI provides a way to accelerate voluntary, on-farm conservation investments where they can deliver the greatest benefits for clean water. This targeted funding will help eligible farmers adopt conservation practices that will reduce the amount of nutrients flowing from agricultural land into waterways, curb erosion and improve the resiliency of working lands in the face of droughts and floods. Funding for NWQI comes from the Farm Bill's Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

#### Farmers Helping Hellbender-RCPP

Funding is now available to producers in the Blue River-Sinking Watershed to implement conservation practices on their land to assist with the recovery of Eastern Hellbenders and improvement of aquatic resources. This funding is provided through the Farmers Helping Hellbenders RCPP project and will assist farmers in implementing practices designed to keep nutrients and soil resources on fields and improve their watershed. Applications for the current funding round are being accepted through March 31.

The Farmers Helping Hellbenders RCPP project is led by Purdue University with assistance from 13 collaborating public and private organizations on the state and local level including NRCS. The total financial assistance to landowners over the three-year project is more than \$1.9 million and is available for agricultural lands in portions of Washington, Harrison, Crawford, and Floyd counties, the only remaining area in Indiana where the Eastern Hellbender can be found and is currently being actively managed.

#### CONNECTING INDIANA BIPOC FARMERS AND PRODUCERS TO SUSTAINABLE APPROACHES TO AG SERVICES AND PROGRAMS

Indiana NRCS has recently been awarded an agreement titled "Connecting Indiana BIPOC Farmers and Producers to Sustainable Approaches to Ag Services and Programs." The purpose of this project is to advance NRCS' equity goals by providing critical outreach and technical assistance to BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) farmers and producers throughout the State of Indiana. This project will build networks and increase community support for historically underserved growers in urban and rural settings.

The agreement supports a range of outreach and assistance activities including farm management, climate smart agriculture management, soil health, marketing, application and bidding procedures and will:

- Build, strengthen and support relationships with historically underserved BIPOC farmers and producers in owning and operating successful farms and ranches through Black Loam education series. FY23 Black Loam dates are:
  - Saturday, March 18 in Evansville. Tentative location is Indiana Ag and Tech School at University of Southern Indiana
  - o Friday, March 24 and Saturday, March 25 in Bloomington.
  - o Saturday, April 8 in Gary.
  - o Friday, May 5 in Fort Wayne
  - o Friday, May 19 and Saturday, May 20 in Indianapolis.
- Improve participation among urban, underrepresented farmers of access in USDA/NRCS programs (identify barriers and opportunities to accessing information and resources) and services.
- Build relationships and collaborate between current and prospective underrepresented BIPOC farmers and USDA's local, state, regional and national offices, agricultural offices and stakeholders to identify unique needs, challenges and gaps regarding access to services.
- Develop and introduce agricultural education targeting historically underserved BIPOC famers/producers and youth as well as increase BIPOC youth's agricultural career awareness.
- Launch a new regenerative agriculture demonstration farm in Lyles Station, Indiana to teach and model practical ways that BIPOC farmers and producers across the state can improve overall soil health.

#### **URBAN AGRICULTURE AND INNOVATIVE PRODUCTION GRANTS**

USDA is making available up to \$7.5 million for grants through its Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production (OUAIP). The competitive grants will support the development of urban agriculture and innovative production projects through two categories, Planning Projects and Implementation Projects. USDA will accept applications on Grants.gov until 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time on March 27, 2023. A pre-recorded webinar on Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production Grants | USDA provides an overview of the grants' purpose, project types, eligibility and basic requirements for submitting an application.

#### **Planning Projects**

Planning Projects initiate or expand efforts of farmers, gardeners, citizens, government officials, schools and other stakeholders in urban areas and suburbs. Projects may target areas of food access, education, business and start-up costs for new farmers and the development of plans related to zoning and other needs of urban production.

#### Implementation Projects

Implementation Projects accelerate existing and emerging models of urban, indoor and other agricultural practices that serve farmers and communities. Projects may improve local food access, include collaboration with partner organizations, and support infrastructure needs, emerging technologies, and educational endeavors.

#### USDA SEEKING APPLICATIONS TO EXPAND CONSERVATION ASSISTANCE TO UNDERSERVED PRODUCERS

NRCS is seeking applications for projects that will improve outreach to underserved producers and communities about conservation programs and services and opportunities for students to pursue careers in agriculture, natural resources and related sciences. NRCS is offering up to \$70 million nationally in cooperative agreements with entities for two-year projects that encourage participation in NRCS programs, especially in underserved communities and among urban and small-scale producers. Applications must be received by 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time on April 27, 2023. See the grants.gov announcement for details and application instructions.

The Equity in Conservation Outreach Cooperative Agreements will include projects that:

Promote the benefits of NRCS programs through education or demonstration of conservation practices:

- Develop community conservation partnerships that engage underserved producers to plan and protect farmland ecosystems, watersheds, and wildlife habitat in underserved communities
- Inform small-scale or urban agriculture producers about opportunities to participate in conservation programs
- Support education on, planning for and adoption of climate smart conservation practices

Projects should reach underserved groups through a combination of program outreach and technical assistance in one or more of the following five NRCS priority areas:

- Addressing local natural resource issues
- Promoting conservation career opportunities
- Expanding adoption of climate-smart conservation
- Encouraging conservation in small-scale and urban agriculture
- Developing conservation leadership skills and opportunities

#### **COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS FOR COMPOST AND FOOD WASTE REDUCTION**

USDA's Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production (OUAIP) announced the availability of up to \$9.5 million for Compost and Food Waste Reduction (CFWR) pilot projects for fiscal year 2023. The cooperative agreements support projects that develop and test strategies for planning and implementing municipal compost plans and food waste reduction plans.

Applications will be accepted on Grants.gov until 11:59 p.m. Eastern Time on <u>June 15, 2023</u>. Projects should span two years with a start date of Dec. 1, 2023, and completion date of Dec. 1, 2025. Eligible entities in Indiana are encouraged to apply.
