ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL No. 1008

DIGEST OF HB 1008 (Updated February 11, 1998 1:10 pm - DI 51)

Citations Affected: IC 2-3; IC 10-2; IC 15-5; IC 20-3; IC 25-14; IC 33-4; IC 35-34; IC 36-8.

Synopsis: Jury selection process. Allows any county to follow the one-day or one-trial jury selection system currently in effect for Porter County. Specifies that jurors who are selected for trial serve until the conclusion of the first trial in which the juror is sworn. (Current law applicable to counties other than Porter County requires a three-month period of juror service.) Requires the judges of the circuit and superior courts to specify by court rule the procedure for the selection and service of jurors. Repeals the current Porter County jury selection statute and restates it in a form applicable to any county that chooses to follow the procedure. Makes names drawn or any list of jurors compiled for jury service a public record unless the judge rules that the names or list is confidential. States the exemptions from jury service in a single statute and repeals or removes the separate exemptions for certain staff members of the governor's staff, members of the

Indianapolis board of school commissioners, members of the general assembly, veterinarians, dentists, and members of town fire departments. Allows a person to be excused from jury service if the person, or the person's spouse or parent, is an employee of the department of correction whose duties require contact with inmates confined in a department of correction facility. Provides for one alternative juror on a grand jury. (The introduced version of this bill was prepared by the commission on courts.)

ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL No. 1008

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning courts and court officers.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 10-2-1-5 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS
2 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 5. The governor may appoint an
3 honorary staff to consist of such number of honorary aides with the
4 brevet title of colonel, lieutenant-colonel or major, or comparable naval
5 rank, as he may desire. All of these staff officers shall be appointed by
6 the governor and hold office at his will and their commissions shall
7 expire with the term of office of the governor making such
8 appointment. ~~Staff officers shall not be subject to jury duty during the~~
9 ~~period of their service.~~ The adjutant-general shall be ex officio chief of
10 staff.

11 SECTION 2. IC 10-2-8-12 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
12 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 12. (a) Whenever such
13 forces or any part thereof shall be ordered out for active service or
14 armory drill, the uniform code of military justice governing the national
15 guard of this state relating to courts-martial, their jurisdiction and the

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1 limits of punishment, and the rules and regulations prescribed
 2 thereunder shall be in full force and effect as provided for in
 3 IC 10-2-5-1.

4 (b) No officer or enlisted person of such forces shall be arrested on
 5 any warrant, except for treason or felony, while going to, remaining at,
 6 or returning from a place where ordered to attend for military duty.
 7 Every officer and enlisted person of such forces shall, during the
 8 service therein, be exempt from service upon any posse comitatus. ~~and~~
 9 ~~from jury duty.~~

10 SECTION 3. IC 20-3-11-2 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
 11 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 2. (a) Each member of
 12 the board of school commissioners must be a resident voter of the
 13 school city, and must have been a resident for at least one (1) year
 14 immediately preceding the member's election. A board member may
 15 not serve in any elective or appointive office under the board of school
 16 commissioners or under the government of the civil city while serving
 17 on the board. A board member may not knowingly have a pecuniary
 18 interest (as defined in IC 35-44-1-3(g)) in any contract or purchase with
 19 the school city in which the member is elected. If, at any time after the
 20 member is elected to the board, a board member knowingly acquires a
 21 pecuniary interest in any contract or purchase with the school city, the
 22 member shall be disqualified to continue as a member of the board, and
 23 a vacancy in the office is created.

24 (b) Each member of the board shall, before assuming the duties of
 25 office, take an oath, before a person qualified to administer oaths, that:

- 26 (1) the member possesses all the qualifications required by this
 27 chapter for membership on the board;
 28 (2) the member will honestly and faithfully discharge the duties
 29 of office;
 30 (3) the member will not, while serving as a member of the board,
 31 become interested, directly or indirectly, in any contract with or
 32 claim against the school city, except as authorized by law; and
 33 (4) in the performance of official duties as a member of the board,
 34 including the selection of its officers, agents, and employees, the
 35 member will not be influenced by any consideration of politics or
 36 religion and that the member will be controlled in the selection
 37 only by considerations of the merits, fitness, and qualifications of
 38 the persons to be selected.

39 (c) The members of the board are entitled to receive compensation
 40 not to exceed the amount allowed under IC 20-5-3-6 and a per diem not
 41 to exceed the rate approved for members of the city-county council
 42 established under IC 36-3-4 for attendance at each regular and

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1 committee meeting as determined by the board.

2 (d) Members of the board are exempt from jury duty during their
3 term of office:

4 SECTION 4. IC 33-4-5-7 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS
5 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 7. (a) A person shall be excused
6 from acting as a juror ~~who~~ **if the person:**

7 (1) is over sixty-five (65) years of age;

8 (2) **is a member in active service of the armed forces of the
9 United States;**

10 (3) **is an elected or appointed official of the executive,
11 legislative, or judicial branches of government of:**

12 (A) the United States;

13 (B) Indiana; or

14 (C) a unit of local government;

15 **who is actively engaged in the performance of the person's
16 official duties;**

17 (4) **is a member of the general assembly who makes the
18 request to be excused before being sworn as a juror;**

19 (5) **is an honorary military staff officer appointed by the
20 governor under IC 10-2-1-5;**

21 (6) **is an officer or enlisted person of the guard reserve forces
22 authorized by the governor under IC 10-2-8;**

23 (7) **is a veterinarian licensed under IC 15-5-1.1;**

24 (8) **is serving as a member of the board of school
25 commissioners of the city of Indianapolis under IC 20-3-11-2;**

26 (9) **is a dentist licensed under IC 25-14-1;**

27 (10) **is a member of a police or fire department or company
28 under IC 36-8-3 or IC 36-8-12; or**

29 (11) **would serve as a juror during a criminal trial and the
30 person is:**

31 (A) **an employee of the department of correction whose
32 duties require contact with inmates confined in a
33 department of correction facility; or**

34 (B) **the spouse or child of a person described in clause (A);**

35 and desires to be excused for that reason.

36 (b) A prospective juror is disqualified to serve on a jury if any of the
37 following conditions exist:

38 (1) The person is not a citizen of the United States, at least
39 eighteen (18) years of age, and a resident of the county.

40 (2) The person is unable to read, speak, and understand the
41 English language with a degree of proficiency sufficient to fill out
42 satisfactorily a juror qualification form.



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1 (3) The person is incapable of rendering satisfactory jury service
 2 due to physical or mental disability. However, a person claiming
 3 this disqualification may be required to submit a physician's or
 4 authorized Christian Science practitioner's certificate confirming
 5 the disability, and the certifying physician or practitioner is then
 6 subject to inquiry by the court at the court's discretion.

7 (4) The person is under a sentence imposed for an offense.

8 (5) A guardian has been appointed for the person under IC 29-3
 9 because the person has a mental incapacity.

10 **(6) The person has had rights revoked by reason of a felony**
 11 **conviction and the rights have not been restored.**

12 (c) A person may not serve as a petit juror in any county if the
 13 person served as a petit juror in the same county within the previous
 14 three hundred sixty-five (365) days. The fact that a person's selection
 15 as a juror would violate this subsection is sufficient cause for
 16 challenge.

17 (d) A grand jury, a petit jury, or an individual juror drawn for
 18 service in one (1) court may serve in another court of the county, in
 19 accordance with orders entered on the record in each of the courts.

20 (e) The same petit jurors may be used in civil cases and in criminal
 21 cases.

22 **(f) A person may not be excluded from jury service on account**
 23 **of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or economic status.**

24 SECTION 5. IC 33-4-5-11, AS AMENDED BY P.L.214-1996,
 25 SECTION 1, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 26 JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 11. (a) This chapter does not apply to a county
 27 having a population of:

28 (1) more than four hundred thousand (400,000) but less than
 29 seven hundred thousand (700,000); and

30 (2) more than one hundred twenty-five thousand (125,000) but
 31 less than one hundred twenty-nine thousand (129,000);

32 **that chooses under subsection (b) to follow the procedure for jury**
 33 **selection and service set out in IC 33-4-11.**

34 (b) **The court administrator or the clerk of the circuit and**
 35 **superior courts of a county may choose to follow the procedure for**
 36 **jury selection and service set out in IC 33-4-11 instead of the**
 37 **procedure set out in this chapter. The court administrator shall**
 38 **serve as the jury commissioner under IC 33-4-11. If the decision to**
 39 **follow IC 33-4-11 is made, all of the provisions of IC 33-4-11 must**
 40 **be followed.**

41 SECTION 6. IC 33-4-5.5-5 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
 42 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 5. (a) The court

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1 administrator of the court shall also serve as the jury commissioner for
 2 the county, and shall have the powers and perform the duties prescribed
 3 in this chapter for jury commissioners, under the direction of the chief
 4 judge.

5 (b) The court administrator in his role as jury commissioner, shall
 6 not receive any compensation in addition to his regular salary.

7 (c) Performance of certain duties of the jury commissioner may be
 8 delegated to a deputy court administrator with the express approval of
 9 the chief judge.

10 **(d) The jury commissioner may choose to follow the procedure**
 11 **for jury selection and service set out in IC 33-4-11 instead of the**
 12 **procedure set out in this chapter. If the decision to follow**
 13 **IC 33-4-11 is made, all of the provisions of IC 33-4-11 must be**
 14 **followed.**

15 SECTION 7. IC 33-4-5.5-12 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
 16 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 12. (a) The jury
 17 commissioner shall maintain a qualified jury wheel and shall place in
 18 the jury wheel the names or identifying numbers of all prospective
 19 jurors drawn from the master list who are not disqualified or excused.

20 (b) A judge of any court or any other state or county official having
 21 the authority to conduct a trial or hearing with a jury within the county
 22 by order may direct the jury commissioner to draw and assign to that
 23 court or official the number of qualified jurors necessary for one (1) or
 24 more petit jury panels. Upon receipt of the order and in a manner
 25 prescribed in section 14 of this chapter, the jury commissioner shall
 26 publicly draw at random from the qualified jury wheel the number of
 27 qualified jurors required by the order and assign said qualified jurors
 28 so drawn to the court's jury panel.

29 (c) Upon receipt of an order for a grand jury, the jury commissioner
 30 shall publicly and in a manner prescribed in section 14 of this chapter,
 31 draw at random from the qualified jury wheel twelve (12) qualified
 32 jurors who shall be directed to appear before the chief judge. The chief
 33 judge shall randomly select six (6) jurors **and one (1) alternate juror**
 34 after having explained to the twelve (12) prospective jurors the duties
 35 and responsibilities of a grand jury and having excused jurors as
 36 prescribed in section 15 of this chapter.

37 (d) An alphabetic listing of grand and petit jurors assigned to each
 38 court location shall be maintained by the jury commissioner and a copy
 39 transmitted to the judge for whom the names have been drawn.

40 (e) If a grand, petit, or other jury is ordered to be drawn, the clerk
 41 thereafter shall cause each person drawn for jury service to be served
 42 with a summons either personally or by registered or certified mail,

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1 return receipt requested, addressed to him at his usual residence,
 2 business, or post office address, requiring him to report for jury service
 3 at a specified time and place.

4 (f) Whenever there is an unanticipated shortage of available petit
 5 jurors drawn from a qualified jury wheel, the court may require the jury
 6 commissioner to:

7 (1) draw additional jurors at random from the qualified jury
 8 wheel; or

9 (2) send available jurors from another panel to the court location
 10 requiring additional jurors.

11 In no instance may talesmen be solicited from among bystanders or
 12 from any source except from among names drawn from the qualified
 13 jury wheel.

14 (g) The names of qualified jurors drawn from the qualified jury
 15 wheel and the contents of jury qualification forms completed by those
 16 jurors shall not be made available to the public until the period of
 17 service of those jurors shall have expired, except that attorneys in any
 18 cases in which these jurors may serve, shall have access to the
 19 information.

20 SECTION 8. IC 33-4-5.5-13 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
 21 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 13. ~~No~~ A qualified
 22 prospective juror is **not** exempt from jury service except **for the**
 23 **following:**

24 (1) Members in active service of the Armed Forces of the United
 25 States **who are actively engaged in the performance of their**
 26 **official duties.**

27 (2) Elected or appointed officials of the executive, legislative, or
 28 judicial branches of government of the:

29 (A) United States;

30 (B) State of Indiana; or

31 (C) counties affected by this chapter;

32 who are actively engaged in the performance of their official
 33 duties.

34 (3) A person who:

35 (A) would serve as a juror during a criminal trial; and

36 (B) is:

37 (i) an employee of the department of correction whose
 38 duties require contact with inmates confined in a
 39 department of correction facility; or

40 (ii) the spouse or child of a person described in item (i);
 41 and desires to be excused for that reason.

42 SECTION 9. IC 33-4-5.5-15 IS AMENDED TO READ AS



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1 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 15. (a) ~~No persons shall~~
 2 **Except as provided in section 13 of this chapter, a person may not**
 3 be automatically excused under this chapter. The chief judge or jury
 4 commissioner, upon request of a prospective juror, shall determine on
 5 the basis of information provided on the juror qualification form,
 6 correspondence from the prospective juror, or interview with the
 7 prospective juror whether the prospective juror should be excused from
 8 jury service. The jury commissioner shall enter this determination in
 9 the space provided on the juror qualification form.

10 (b) A person who is not disqualified for jury service may be excused
 11 from jury service only upon a showing of undue hardship, extreme
 12 inconvenience, or public necessity, until the time of the next drawing
 13 at which time he will be resummoned. Appropriate records shall be
 14 maintained by the jury commissioner to facilitate said resummoning.

15 (c) Requests for excuse, other than those accompanying return of
 16 the qualification form, shall be made by the prospective juror in writing
 17 to the Presiding Judge no later than three (3) weeks in advance of the
 18 date upon which he has been summoned to appear.

19 SECTION 10. IC 33-4-5.6-20, AS ADDED BY P.L.214-1996,
 20 SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 21 JULY 1, 1998]: Sec. 20. (a) The jury commissioner shall maintain a
 22 qualified jury wheel and shall place in the jury wheel the names or
 23 identifying numbers of all prospective jurors drawn from the master list
 24 who are not disqualified or excused.

25 (b) The judges of the courts shall, by local court rule, specify the
 26 procedure to be used for the selection of qualified prospective jurors
 27 under this section and the procedure for summoning qualified
 28 prospective jurors whose names are drawn from the qualified jury
 29 wheel.

30 (c) Upon receipt of an order for a grand jury, the jury commissioner
 31 shall publicly, and in accordance with section 22 of this chapter, draw
 32 at random from the qualified jury wheel twelve (12) qualified jurors
 33 and direct them to appear before the supervising judge. The supervising
 34 judge shall randomly select six (6) jurors **and one (1) alternate juror**
 35 after:

36 (1) explaining to the twelve (12) prospective jurors the duties and
 37 responsibilities of a grand jury; and

38 (2) excusing jurors under section 23 of this chapter.

39 (d) Whenever there is an unanticipated shortage of available petit
 40 jurors drawn from a qualified jury wheel, the supervising judge may
 41 require the jury commissioner to draw additional jurors at random from
 42 the qualified jury wheel. Talesmen may not be solicited from among

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1 bystanders or from any source except from among names drawn from
2 the qualified jury wheel.

3 (e) The names of qualified jurors drawn from the qualified jury
4 wheel and the contents of jury qualification forms completed by those
5 jurors may not be made available to the public until the period of
6 service of those jurors has expired. However, attorneys in any cases in
7 which these jurors may serve may have access to the information.

8 SECTION 11. IC 33-4-11 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
9 AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
10 JULY 1, 1998]:

11 **Chapter 11. Circuit and Superior Court Jury Selection and**
12 **Service**

13 **Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "courts" means the circuit and**
14 **superior courts of a county that chooses to follow the procedure for**
15 **jury selection and service set out in this chapter.**

16 **Sec. 2. As used in this chapter, "juror qualification form" means**
17 **the form prescribed for use by the courts and mailed to each**
18 **prospective juror, or an electronic data processing facsimile of that**
19 **form such as might be created on magnetic tape, punched cards, or**
20 **computer discs.**

21 **Sec. 3. As used in this chapter, "jury commissioner" means the**
22 **court administrator or the clerk of the court and includes a deputy**
23 **court administrator designated by the jury commissioner from**
24 **time to time to act in the jury commissioner's place.**

25 **Sec. 4. As used in this chapter, "jury wheel" means any list,**
26 **physical device, or electronic system for the storage of the names**
27 **or identifying numbers of prospective jurors.**

28 **Sec. 5. As used in this chapter, "master list" means:**

- 29 (1) a serially printed list;
- 30 (2) a magnetic tape;
- 31 (3) an addressograph file;
- 32 (4) a punched card file;
- 33 (5) a computer record; or
- 34 (6) another form of record determined by the supervising
35 judge to be consistent with this chapter;

36 that fosters the policy and protects the rights secured by this
37 chapter and that contains all current, up-to-date voter registration
38 lists for each precinct in the county and that is supplemented by
39 names derived from other sources identified under this chapter.

40 **Sec. 6. As used in this chapter, "qualified jury wheel" means the**
41 **jury wheel in which there are placed the names or identifying**
42 **numbers of prospective jurors drawn at random from the master**



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1 list and who are not disqualified.

2 Sec. 7. As used in this chapter, "supervising judge" means a
3 judge of the courts who is designated by the judges of the courts to
4 supervise the jury selection process.

5 Sec. 8. As used in this chapter, "voter registration lists" means
6 the official records of persons registered to vote.

7 Sec. 9. The jury commissioner and supervising judge under the
8 plan required by section 13 of this chapter shall provide a uniform
9 system of jury selection for the courts ensuring that:

10 (1) persons selected for jury service are selected at random
11 from a fair cross section of the population of the area served
12 by the courts; and

13 (2) qualified citizens have the opportunity under this chapter
14 to:

15 (A) be considered for jury service in the county; and

16 (B) fulfill their obligation to serve as jurors when
17 summoned for that purpose.

18 Sec. 10. (a) The supervising judge is responsible for the selection
19 of jurors as prescribed by this section.

20 (b) The supervising judge may authorize use of a computerized
21 jury selection system under this chapter. However, a system
22 authorized under this subsection must be fair and may not violate
23 the rights of persons with respect to impartial and random
24 selection of prospective jurors. Jurors selected under a
25 computerized selection system must be eligible for selection under
26 this chapter.

27 Sec. 11. (a) The court administrator shall serve as the jury
28 commissioner for the county, and has the powers and shall perform
29 the duties prescribed in this chapter for the jury commissioner,
30 under the direction of the supervising judge.

31 (b) The court administrator, when acting as jury commissioner,
32 may not receive any compensation in addition to the court
33 administrator's regular salary.

34 (c) Certain duties of the jury commissioner may be delegated by
35 the court administrator to a deputy court administrator with the
36 approval of the supervising judge.

37 Sec. 12. (a) The jury commissioner, under the supervision of the
38 supervising judge, shall prepare a written plan for the selection of
39 grand and petit jurors in the county. The plan must be designed to
40 achieve the objectives of, and otherwise comply with, this chapter.
41 The plan must specify the:

42 (1) source of names for the master list;



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- 1 (2) form of the master list;
- 2 (3) method of selecting names from the master list;
- 3 (4) forms of and method for maintaining records of names
- 4 drawn, jurors qualified, and juror's excuses and reasons to be
- 5 excused;
- 6 (5) method of drawing names of qualified jurors for
- 7 prospective service;
- 8 (6) procedures to be followed by prospective jurors in
- 9 requesting to be excused from jury service; and
- 10 (7) number of petit jurors that constitutes a panel for civil and
- 11 criminal cases or a description of the uniform manner in
- 12 which this determination is made.

13 (b) The plan must be placed into operation after approval by the
 14 judges of the courts. The judges of the courts shall examine the
 15 plan to determine whether it complies with this chapter. If the plan
 16 is found not to comply, the court shall order the jury commissioner
 17 to make the necessary changes to bring the plan into compliance.

18 (c) The plan may be modified at any time according to the
 19 procedure specified under this chapter.

20 (d) The plan must be submitted by the jury commissioner to the
 21 judges of the courts. The judges of the courts shall approve or
 22 direct modification of the plan not later than sixty (60) days after
 23 its receipt. The approved plan must go into effect not later than
 24 sixty (60) days after approval by the judges of the courts.

25 (e) The plan is a public document on file in the office of the jury
 26 commissioner and must be available for inspection at all
 27 reasonable times.

28 **Sec. 13. (a)** The jury commissioner shall compile and maintain
 29 a master list consisting of all the voter registration lists for the
 30 county, supplemented with names from other lists of persons
 31 resident in the county that the Indiana supreme court shall from
 32 time to time designate as necessary to obtain the broadest cross
 33 section of the county, having determined that use of supplemental
 34 lists is feasible. The Indiana supreme court may designate
 35 supplemental lists for use by the courts from time to time in a
 36 manner that fosters the policy and protects the rights secured by
 37 this chapter. Supplemental sources may consist of lists of utility
 38 customers, property taxpayers, persons filing income tax returns,
 39 motor vehicle registrations, city directories, telephone directories,
 40 and driver's licenses. Supplemental lists may not be substituted for
 41 the voter registration list. In drawing names from supplemental
 42 lists, the jury commissioner shall avoid duplication of names.

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1 (b) Whoever has custody, possession, or control of any of the
 2 lists making up or used in compiling the master list, including those
 3 designated under subsection (a) by the Indiana supreme court as
 4 supplementary sources of names, shall furnish the master list to the
 5 jury commissioner for inspection, reproduction, and copying at all
 6 reasonable times.

7 (c) When a copy of a list maintained by a public official is
 8 furnished, only the actual cost of the copy may be charged to the
 9 courts.

10 (d) The master list of names is open to the public for
 11 examination as a public record. However, the source of names and
 12 any information other than the names contained in the source is
 13 confidential.

14 **Sec. 14. (a)** Names must be drawn for juror service quarterly,
 15 based on a calendar year commencing in January. A public
 16 drawing of names for the next quarter must be held during the first
 17 week of the second month of the quarter next preceding that for
 18 which names are being drawn, at a time and place prescribed by
 19 the jury commissioner.

20 (b) The jury commissioner shall create and file an alphabetical

If the court finds the requesting party is an indigent defendant, the cost of the transcript or copy of the recording supplied to the defendant shall be paid by the county.

(e) The following oath must be administered to the grand jury:

"You, and each of you, do solemnly swear or affirm that you will diligently inquire and make true presentment of all offenses committed or triable within this county, of which you have or can obtain legal evidence; that you will present no person through malice, hatred, ill will, nor leave any unrepresented through fear, favor, or affection, or for any reward, or the promise or hope thereof, but in all your indictments you will present the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth; that you will not disclose any evidence given or proceeding had before the grand jury; that you will keep secret whatever you or any other grand juror may have said or in what manner you or any other grand juror may



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have voted on a matter before the grand jury."

(f) The court shall provide a printed copy of the provisions of this chapter to the grand jury upon the request of any member of the grand jury. In addition, the court shall give the grand jurors any instructions relating to the proper performance of their duties that the court considers necessary.

(g) If a member of the grand jury has reason to believe that an offense has been committed which is triable in the county, the member may report this information to fellow jurors, who may then investigate the alleged offense.

Page 11, line 26, delete "Neither the names" and insert "**The names drawn or any list compiled from the alphabetical list may be ruled confidential by order of the supervising judge if the judge reasonably believes disclosure would either:**

- (1) endanger the safety of potential or selected jurors; or**
- (2) lead to jury tampering."**

Page 11, delete lines 27 through 29.
