Summary of Legislation: (Amended) This bill establishes the Worker's Compensation Study Committee. It requires the Committee to study the following issues:

- Worker's compensation insurance premiums;
- the use of independent contractors; and
- homeowner's liability for worker's compensation.

The bill also requires the Committee to report the results of the study to the Legislative Council before January 1, 2000.

Effective Date: July 1, 1999.

Explanation of State Expenditures: (Revised) This bill creates the eight-member Worker's Compensation Study Committee which would consist of four members of the House of Representatives and four members of the Senate. Each member would be entitled to per diem, mileage, and travel expense allowances. Legislative Council Resolution 1-98 establishes an annual budget of \$9,000 for such study committees (this committee would exist only during FY 2000). The Legislative Services Agency would provide staff support to the Committee.
