**IMPACT:** State

**Summary of Legislation:** (Amended) This bill provides that an individual who holds a probationary license may receive an operator's, chauffeur's, public passenger chauffeur's, or a commercial driver's license when the individual is at least 18 years of age unless in the 12 months that immediately precede the date upon which the individual applies for the license either of the following occurs at least twice or both the following have occurred: (1) the individual has been convicted of a moving traffic offense, (2) the individual has been determined to be more than 50% at fault in an accident. It provides that a probationary license is valid for not more than 4 years and may not be renewed. The bill provides that the Bureau of Motor Vehicles may not disclose the Social Security number, federal identification number, driver's license number, or digital image of the driver's license applicant of any person except to a law enforcement officer or an agent or a designee of the Department of State Revenue.

**Explanation of State Expenditures:**

**Explanation of State Revenues:** (Revised) The fiscal impact regarding the issuance of probationary licenses is indeterminable. The fee for both a probationary license (issued to an individual less than 18 years of age) and a regular drivers' license is \$10. The funds affected are the Motor Vehicle Highway Account that supports the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, the State License Branch Fund that supports the operation of the state's approximately 168 license branches, and Crossroads 2000. Crossroads 2000 supports highway construction for the Department of Transportation. The Bureau of Motor Vehicles reports that not disclosing the digital image of the driver's license applicant will have no fiscal impact.
