Summary of Legislation: This bill requests the Legislative Council to consider establishing a 15 member Juvenile Justice Study Commission consisting of legislators and professionals working in the juvenile law area. The bill requires the Commission, if established, to study issues concerning juvenile law, including: (1) modifying the juvenile code to effectively address the rising juvenile crime rate; and (2) examining the delivery of juvenile justice services to delinquent, abused, neglected, and mentally ill children. It provides that the Commission operates under the policies and procedures of the Legislative Council.

Effective Date: July 1, 1999.

Explanation of State Expenditures: This bill requests that the Legislative Council establish a Juvenile Justice Study Commission which would consist of eight legislators and seven lay members. The bill allows the members who are not state employees to receive per diem and all members to receive travel reimbursement. Current Legislative Council Resolution establishes a budget of \$9,000 for Commissions with less than 16 members.

The bill requires the Legislative Services Agency to provide staff for the Commission.
