

HOUSE BILL No. 1110

DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 11-10-4-6.5.

Synopsis: Department of correction drug formulary. Requires the department of correction to: (1) develop and review any drug formulary it uses for the treatment of mental illness; and (2) have policies and procedures that provide exceptions to the formulary. (The introduced version of this bill was prepared by the Indiana Commission on Mental Health.)

Effective: July 1, 1999.

HOUSE BILL No. 1110

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning corrections.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 11-10-4-6.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
2 AS A **NEW SECTION** TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
3 1, 1999]: **Sec. 6.5. If the department wants to use a drug formulary**
4 **for offenders, the department shall:**
5 **(1) with the advice of the division of mental health, develop**
6 **and not less than annually review the drug formulary to**
7 **assure that the drug formulary contains appropriate drugs**
8 **for the effective treatment of mental illness; and**
9 **(2) have policies and procedures that provide exceptions to the**
10 **formulary that are warranted by medical efficacy.**



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
