
SENATE BILL No. 82

DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 5-2-5-14; IC 34-24-5; IC 35-50-1-2; IC 35-50-2-2; IC 35-50-2-15.

Synopsis: Hate crimes. Requires law enforcement agencies to: (1) collect information concerning crimes that are apparently directed at an individual or a group because of the individual's or group's race, color, religion, sexual orientation, or national origin; and (2) submit the information to the Indiana central repository for criminal history information. Requires the Indiana central repository for criminal history information to submit a compiled report of this information to each law enforcement agency. Allows an individual who suffers a pecuniary loss as a result of: (1) being injured; or (2) having property damaged or destroyed by another individual; because of the individual's race, color, religion, sexual orientation, or national origin to bring a civil action against the individual who caused the loss. Defines bias crime offender. Requires a court, when sentencing an individual who has committed a crime motivated by a bias against another individual's race, color, religion, sexual orientation, or national origin, to impose an additional fixed term of imprisonment not to exceed five years.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 5-2-5-14 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
2 AS A **NEW SECTION** TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
3 1, 2000]: **Sec. 14. (a) A law enforcement agency shall collect**
4 **information concerning crimes that are apparently directed at an**
5 **individual or a group because of the individual's or group's race,**
6 **color, religion, sexual orientation, or national origin.**
7 (b) **At least two (2) times each year, a law enforcement agency**
8 **shall submit information collected under subsection (a) to the**
9 **Indiana central repository for criminal history information.**
10 (c) **At least one (1) time each year, the Indiana central**
11 **repository for criminal history information shall submit a report**
12 **that includes a compilation of information obtained under**
13 **subsection (b) to each law enforcement agency.**
14 (d) **Information collected, submitted, and reported under this**
15 **section must be consistent with guidelines established for the**
16 **acquisition, preservation, and exchange of identification records**
17 **and information by:**



1 **(1) the Attorney General of the United States; or**
 2 **(2) the Federal Bureau of Investigation under 28 U.S.C. 534.**
 3 SECTION 2. IC 34-24-5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS
 4 A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
 5 1, 2000]:

6 **Chapter 5. Civil Action for Victims of Bias Crime Offenders**

7 **Sec. 1. If an individual suffers a pecuniary loss because of the**
 8 **commission of an offense by another individual who was sentenced**
 9 **for the offense as a bias crime offender under IC 35-50-2-15, the**
 10 **individual may bring a civil action against the individual who**
 11 **caused the loss.**

12 **Sec. 2. In an action brought under section 1 of this chapter, the**
 13 **plaintiff may seek to recover the following:**

- 14 **(1) Actual, consequential, or incidental damages.**
- 15 **(2) The costs of the action.**
- 16 **(3) Reasonable attorney's fees.**

17 SECTION 3. IC 35-50-1-2 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
 18 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2000]: Sec. 2. (a) As used in this
 19 section, "crime of violence" means:

- 20 (1) murder (IC 35-42-1-1);
- 21 (2) voluntary manslaughter (IC 35-42-1-3);
- 22 (3) involuntary manslaughter (IC 35-42-1-4);
- 23 (4) reckless homicide (IC 35-42-1-5);
- 24 (5) aggravated battery (IC 35-42-2-1.5);
- 25 (6) kidnapping (IC 35-42-3-2);
- 26 (7) rape (IC 35-42-4-1);
- 27 (8) criminal deviate conduct (IC 35-42-4-2);
- 28 (9) child molesting (IC 35-42-4-3);
- 29 (10) robbery as a Class A felony or a Class B felony (IC
- 30 35-42-5-1);
- 31 (11) burglary as a Class A felony or a Class B felony (IC
- 32 35-43-2-1); or
- 33 (12) causing death when operating a motor vehicle (IC 9-30-5-5).

34 (b) As used in this section, "episode of criminal conduct" means
 35 offenses or a connected series of offenses that are closely related in
 36 time, place, and circumstance.

37 (c) Except as provided in subsection (d) or (e), the court shall
 38 determine whether terms of imprisonment shall be served concurrently
 39 or consecutively. The court may consider the aggravating and
 40 mitigating circumstances in IC 35-38-1-7.1(b) and IC 35-38-1-7.1(c)
 41 in making a determination under this subsection. The court may order
 42 terms of imprisonment to be served consecutively even if the sentences

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1 are not imposed at the same time. However, except for crimes of
 2 violence, the total of the consecutive terms of imprisonment, exclusive
 3 of terms of imprisonment under IC 35-50-2-8 and IC 35-50-2-10, to
 4 which the defendant is sentenced for felony convictions arising out of
 5 an episode of criminal conduct shall not exceed the presumptive
 6 sentence for a felony which is one (1) class of felony higher than the
 7 most serious of the felonies for which the person has been convicted.
 8 **If a court determines under IC 35-50-2-14 that a person was a bias**
 9 **crime offender when the person committed the offense for which**
 10 **the person was convicted, the term of imprisonment for the**
 11 **underlying offense and the additional term of imprisonment**
 12 **imposed under IC 35-50-2-14 may be served consecutively or**
 13 **concurrently.**

14 (d) If, after being arrested for one (1) crime, a person commits
 15 another crime:

- 16 (1) before the date the person is discharged from probation,
 17 parole, or a term of imprisonment imposed for the first crime; or
 18 (2) while the person is released:
 19 (A) upon the person's own recognizance; or
 20 (B) on bond;

21 the terms of imprisonment for the crimes shall be served consecutively,
 22 regardless of the order in which the crimes are tried and sentences are
 23 imposed.

24 (e) If a court determines under IC 35-50-2-11 that a person used a
 25 firearm in the commission of the offense for which the person was
 26 convicted, the term of imprisonment for the underlying offense and the
 27 additional term of imprisonment imposed under IC 35-50-2-11 must be
 28 served consecutively.

29 SECTION 4. IC 35-50-2-2, AS AMENDED BY P.L.188-1999,
 30 SECTION 8, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
 31 JULY 1, 2000]: Sec. 2. (a) The court may suspend any part of a
 32 sentence for a felony, except as provided in this section or in section
 33 2.1 of this chapter. **The court may suspend any part of an additional**
 34 **term of imprisonment imposed under section 15 of this chapter.**

35 (b) With respect to the following crimes listed in this subsection, the
 36 court may suspend only that part of the sentence that is in excess of the
 37 minimum sentence:

- 38 (1) The crime committed was a Class A or Class B felony and the
 39 person has a prior unrelated felony conviction.
 40 (2) The crime committed was a Class C felony and less than seven
 41 (7) years have elapsed between the date the person was
 42 discharged from probation, imprisonment, or parole, whichever



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1 is later, for a prior unrelated felony conviction and the date the
 2 person committed the Class C felony for which the person is
 3 being sentenced.

4 (3) The crime committed was a Class D felony and less than three
 5 (3) years have elapsed between the date the person was
 6 discharged from probation, imprisonment, or parole, whichever
 7 is later, for a prior unrelated felony conviction and the date the
 8 person committed the Class D felony for which the person is
 9 being sentenced. However, the court may suspend the minimum
 10 sentence for the crime only if the court orders home detention
 11 under IC 35-38-1-21 or IC 35-38-2.5-5 instead of the minimum
 12 sentence specified for the crime under this chapter.

13 (4) The felony committed was:

14 (A) murder (IC 35-42-1-1);

15 (B) battery (IC 35-42-2-1) with a deadly weapon;

16 (C) sexual battery (IC 35-42-4-8) with a deadly weapon;

17 (D) kidnapping (IC 35-42-3-2);

18 (E) confinement (IC 35-42-3-3) with a deadly weapon;

19 (F) rape (IC 35-42-4-1) as a Class A felony;

20 (G) criminal deviate conduct (IC 35-42-4-2) as a Class A
 21 felony;

22 (H) child molesting (IC 35-42-4-3) as a Class A or Class B
 23 felony;

24 (I) robbery (IC 35-42-5-1) resulting in serious bodily injury or
 25 with a deadly weapon;

26 (J) arson (IC 35-43-1-1) for hire or resulting in serious bodily
 27 injury;

28 (K) burglary (IC 35-43-2-1) resulting in serious bodily injury
 29 or with a deadly weapon;

30 (L) resisting law enforcement (IC 35-44-3-3) with a deadly
 31 weapon;

32 (M) escape (IC 35-44-3-5) with a deadly weapon;

33 (N) rioting (IC 35-45-1-2) with a deadly weapon;

34 (O) dealing in cocaine or a narcotic drug (IC 35-48-4-1) as a
 35 Class A felony;

36 (P) dealing in a schedule I, II, or III controlled substance (IC
 37 35-48-4-2) if the amount of controlled substance involved has
 38 an aggregate weight of three (3) grams or more;

39 (Q) an offense under IC 9-30-5 (operating a vehicle while
 40 intoxicated) and the person who committed the offense has
 41 accumulated at least two (2) prior unrelated convictions under
 42 IC 9-30-5; or

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- 1 (R) aggravated battery (IC 35-42-2-1.5).
- 2 (c) Except as provided in subsection (e), whenever the court
3 suspends a sentence for a felony, it shall place the person on probation
4 under IC 35-38-2 for a fixed period to end not later than the date that
5 the maximum sentence that may be imposed for the felony will expire.
- 6 (d) The minimum sentence for a person convicted of voluntary
7 manslaughter may not be suspended unless the court finds at the
8 sentencing hearing that the crime was not committed by means of a
9 deadly weapon.
- 10 (e) Whenever the court suspends that part of an offender's (as
11 defined in IC 5-2-12-4) sentence that is suspendible under subsection
12 (b), the court shall place the offender on probation under IC 35-38-2 for
13 not more than ten (10) years.
- 14 (f) An additional term of imprisonment imposed under
15 IC 35-50-2-11 may not be suspended.
- 16 (g) A term of imprisonment imposed under IC 35-47-10-6 or
17 IC 35-47-10-7 may not be suspended if the commission of the offense
18 was knowing or intentional.
- 19 (h) A term of imprisonment imposed for an offense under
20 IC 35-48-4-6(b)(1)(B) may not be suspended.
- 21 SECTION 5. IC 35-50-2-15 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
22 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
23 1, 2000]: **Sec. 15. (a) As used in this section, "bias crime offender"**
24 **means an individual described in subsection (b).**
- 25 (b) **The state may seek to have an individual sentenced as a bias**
26 **crime offender by alleging, on a page separate from the rest of the**
27 **charging instrument, that the individual knowingly or**
28 **intentionally:**
- 29 (1) **selected another individual injured; or**
30 (2) **damaged or otherwise affected property;**
- 31 **by an offense committed by the individual named as defendant in**
32 **the charging instrument because of the race, color, religion, sexual**
33 **orientation, or national origin of the injured individual or of the**
34 **owner or occupant of the affected property.**
- 35 (c) **If an individual alleged to be a bias crime offender under**
36 **subsection (b) is convicted of an offense, the court, at the**
37 **sentencing hearing for the offense, shall determine whether the**
38 **individual is a bias crime offender.**
- 39 (d) **If, after the sentencing hearing, the court finds that the**
40 **individual convicted of the offense that is the subject of the hearing**
41 **is a bias crime offender based on proof beyond a reasonable doubt,**
42 **the court shall sentence the individual to an additional fixed term**



1 of not more than five (5) years to be added to the term of
2 imprisonment imposed under this chapter or IC 35-50-3.

3 SECTION 6. [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2000] IC 5-2-5-14,
4 IC 34-24-5, and IC 35-50-2-15, all as added by this act, and
5 IC 35-50-1-2 and IC 35-50-2-2, both as amended by this act, only
6 apply to:

- 7 (1) crimes committed; and
8 (2) civil causes of action accruing;
9 after June 30, 2000.

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
