SENATE BILL No. 215**

DIGEST OF SB 215 (Updated April 3, 2011 10:59 am - DI 107)

Citations Affected: IC 34-24; IC 36-2.

Synopsis: Forfeiture. Requires counties to create a county offender fund, an asset forfeiture account, and a county school security fund. Provides that, in a forfeiture proceeding, 1/3 of the proceeds may be provided to the prosecuting attorney or an attorney retained by the prosecuting attorney in a forfeiture action. Provides that of the remaining proceeds, 5% of the proceeds shall be provided to a county's county offender fund, 12% of the proceeds shall be provided to the county school security fund, and 83% of the proceeds shall be distributed to an account for distribution to law enforcement agencies participating in the seizure. Specifies that money or the proceeds of seized property placed in a county asset forfeiture account may be disbursed only by action of the county legislative body under a claim submitted by a law enforcement agency or prosecuting attorney, and must be disbursed pursuant to an interlocal agreement, if applicable. Permits a prosecuting attorney to retain an attorney to bring a forfeiture

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action only if the attorney general reviews the compensation agreement between the prosecuting attorney and the retained attorney, and requires that the compensation agreement with the attorney be capped at: (1) 33 1/3% of the first \$10,000; (2) 25% of the amount between \$10,000 and \$100,000; and (3) 20% of the amount that is at least \$100,000; unless a court finds that the forfeiture action is unusually complex. Requires a court to notify the Indiana criminal justice institute of the amount and manner of a forfeiture distribution. Provides that a deputy prosecuting attorney who engages in a forfeiture action for the prosecuting attorney's office may not receive a contingency fee.

ENGROSSED SENATE BILL No. 215

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 34-24-1-4 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
2 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2011]: Sec. 4. (a) At the hearing,
3 the prosecuting attorney must show by a preponderance of the evidence
4 that the property was within the definition of property subject to seizure
5 under section 1 of this chapter. If the property seized was a vehicle, the
6 prosecuting attorney must also show by a preponderance of the
7 evidence that a person who has an ownership interest of record in the
8 bureau of motor vehicles knew or had reason to know that the vehicle
9 was being used in the commission of the offense.

- (1) Under a claim submitted by the prosecuting attorney.
- (2) Under a claim submitted by the county auditor, that has been approved by the county commissioner.
- (3) In accordance with the terms of an interlocal agreement or memorandum of understanding among local, state, out-of-state, and federal law enforcement agencies and the prosecuting attorney, if applicable.
- (4) If there is no interlocal agreement or memorandum of understanding among local, state, out-of-state, and federal law enforcement agencies and the prosecuting attorney, the court may distribute remaining proceeds among local, state, out-of-state, and federal law enforcement agencies and the prosecuting attorney.

~~(f)~~ (f) If property that is seized under this chapter (or IC 34-4-30.1-4 before its repeal) is transferred:

- (1) after its seizure, but before an action is filed under section 3 of this chapter (or IC 34-4-30.1-3 before its repeal); or
- (2) when an action filed under section 3 of this chapter (or IC 34-4-30.1-3 before its repeal) is pending;

the person to whom the property is transferred must establish an ownership interest of record as a bona fide purchaser for value. A person is a bona fide purchaser for value under this section if the person, at the time of the transfer, did not have reasonable cause to believe that the property was subject to forfeiture under this chapter.

~~(f)~~ (g) If the property seized was an unlawful telecommunications device (as defined in IC 35-45-13-6) or plans, instructions, or publications used to commit an offense under IC 35-45-13, the court may order the sheriff of the county in which the person was convicted of an offense under IC 35-45-13 to destroy as contraband or to otherwise lawfully dispose of the property.

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1 **(h) This subsection applies to every forfeiture action, including**

3 **forfeiture action must be filed with a court. Except for money or**
4 **property seized under this chapter that is transferred to a federal**

(D) any excess in value of the proceeds or the money over the law enforcement costs be forfeited and transferred to the treasurer of state for deposit in the common school fund; and

(3) the proceeds of the sale or money be deposited as follows:

(A) Eighty-five percent (85%) of the proceeds shall be deposited in the:

(i) state police asset forfeiture fund, if the property was seized by the state police department; or

(ii) local law enforcement forfeiture fund, if the unit has established a local law enforcement forfeiture fund. If there is no local law enforcement forfeiture fund, the proceeds shall be deposited in the safe schools fund established under IC 5-2-10.1.

(B) Fifteen percent (15%) of the proceeds shall be transferred to the treasurer of state for deposit in the common school fund.

If law enforcement agencies from more than one (1) jurisdiction participated in the seizure of forfeited property, the court shall determine how the proceeds of the sale or money shall be divided among the participating law enforcement agencies.

(e) If property that is seized under this chapter (or IC 34-4-30.1-4 before its repeal) is transferred:

(1) after its seizure, but before an action is filed under section 3 of this chapter (or IC 34-4-30.1-3 before its repeal); or

(2) when an action filed under section 3 of this chapter (or IC 34-4-30.1-3 before its repeal) is pending;

the person to whom the property is transferred must establish an ownership interest of record as a bona fide purchaser for value. A person is a bona fide purchaser for value under this section if the person, at the time of the transfer, did not have reasonable cause to believe that the property was subject to forfeiture under this chapter.

(f) If the property seized was an unlawful telecommunications device (as defined in IC 35-45-13-6) or plans, instructions, or publications used to commit an offense under IC 35-45-13, the court may order the sheriff of the county in which the person was convicted of an offense under IC 35-45-13 to destroy as contraband or to otherwise lawfully dispose of the property.

(g) Twenty-five percent (25%) of the part of the sale proceeds

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or money under subsection (d)(3)(A) shall be transferred to the state general fund for disbursement to the prosecuting attorney for use in defraying the expense of initiating and maintaining a forfeiture action. However, a prosecuting attorney may not receive in one (1) action more than:

- (1) ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), if the total value of property seized under this article is less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000); or
- (2) twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), if the total value of property seized under this article is one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or more.

(h) Proceeds or money described under subsection (d)(3)(A) may be:

- (1) disbursed only from the local law enforcement forfeiture fund under an appropriation; and
- (2) used only for law enforcement purposes.

(i) This subsection applies to every forfeiture action, including a forfeiture action that is the result of a settlement. Every forfeiture action must be filed with a court. Money or other proceeds from a forfeiture action may only be disbursed under a court order.

(j) As soon as practicable after the proceeds of the forfeiture have been distributed, the court shall notify the state police department of the amount and manner of the distribution."

Madam President: I move that Senate Bill 215 be amended to read as follows:

Page 2, delete lines 27 through 42, begin a new line block indented and insert:

"(3) the proceeds of the sale or money shall be distributed as follows:

(A) Fifteen percent (15%) of the proceeds shall be transferred to the treasurer of state for deposit in the common school fund.

(B) Eighty-five percent (85%) of the proceeds shall be distributed as follows:

(i) If every law enforcement agency participating in the seizure is from one (1) county, the proceeds shall be transferred to the county auditor for deposit in a county asset forfeiture account established by ordinance. Funds in the county asset forfeiture account shall be disbursed in accordance with subsection (e).

(ii) If the state police department or a law enforcement agency outside the county participated in the seizure, the court shall order the proceeds distributed to the appropriate county asset forfeiture fund (in the case of another county) or the state police asset forfeiture account (in the case of the state police department) in accordance with the agreement or memorandum of understanding between the participating law enforcement agencies. If the disposition of all or any part of the proceeds is not addressed in the agreement or memorandum of understanding, the court shall determine the distribution of funds. Funds deposited in the county asset forfeiture account of another county shall be distributed in that county in accordance with subsection (e)."

- (iii) eighty-three percent (83%) of the remaining money or sale proceeds shall be distributed to the county auditor for distribution to law enforcement agencies, as directed by the court, as provided in subsection (e).**

(e) The distribution under subsection (d)(3)(B)(iii) must be made as follows:

- (1) Under a claim submitted by the prosecuting attorney.**
- (2) Under a claim submitted by the county auditor, that has been approved by the county commissioner.**
- (3) In accordance with the terms of an interlocal agreement or memorandum of understanding among local, state, out-of-state, and federal law enforcement agencies and the prosecuting attorney, if applicable.**
- (4) If there is no interlocal agreement or memorandum of understanding among local, state, out-of-state, and federal**

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law enforcement agencies and the prosecuting attorney, the court may distribute remaining proceeds among local, state, out-of-state, and federal law enforcement agencies and the prosecuting attorney."

Page 2, delete lines 28 through 42.

Page 3, delete lines 1 through 20.

Page 3, line 40, delete "Money" and insert "Except for money or property seized under this chapter that is transferred to a federal authority under IC 34-24-1-9, money".

Page 5, after line 27, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"SECTION 4. IC 36-2-21 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2011]:

Chapter 21. County Offender Fund

Sec. 1. (a) A county shall, by resolution, establish a county offender fund to receive money that may be used to defray the expenses of incarcerating, supervising, or treating offenders housed in the county, in particular those offenders housed locally who may have previously been transferred to the department of correction.

(b) Money in the fund may be spent only under an appropriation from the county fiscal body. In appropriating money from the fund, the fiscal body shall give first priority to programs that defray the expense of housing an offender in jail, second priority to probation and community corrections programs, and third priority to problem solving courts and work release programs.

SECTION 5. IC 36-2-22 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2011]:

Chapter 22. County School Security Fund

Sec. 1. (a) A county shall, by resolution, establish a county school security fund to receive money that may be used to assist public school districts with school security needs.

(b) Money in the fund may be spent only under an appropriation from the county fiscal body."

and when so amended that said bill do pass.
