
SENATE BILL No. 116

DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 36-7-11-23.

Synopsis: Altering historic preservation districts. Provides the exclusive method for removing the designation of a historic district. Provides that a petition requesting the removal of a designation of a historic district may be filed with the legislative body of the unit by the owners of: (1) a building, structure, or site designated as a single site historic district; or (2) in the case of a historic district with two or more parcels, at least 51% of the owners of the real property of the historic district. Requires the legislative body to submit the petition to the historic preservation commission (commission) of the unit. Requires the commission to conduct a public hearing on the petition not later than 60 days after receiving the petition. Requires the commission to make findings and a recommendation to grant or deny the petition not later than ten days after the public hearing. Requires the legislative body of the unit to grant or deny the petition not later than 45 days after receiving the petition from the commission. Provides that the legislative body adopt an ordinance granting a petition by: (1) a majority vote, if the recommendation of the commission is to grant the petition; or (2) by a two-thirds vote, if the recommendation of the commission is to deny the petition. Provides that if the legislative body does not act upon the petition within the 45 day period, the petition is considered granted or denied in accordance with the recommendation of the commission. Provides that if a petition is granted, the legislative body must adopt an ordinance to remove the designation of the historic district and record the ordinance with the county recorder. Provides that the designation of the historic district is considered removed on the date the ordinance is recorded with the county recorder.

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SENATE BILL No. 116



A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning local government.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 36-7-11-23 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
2 AS A **NEW** SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
3 1, 2012]: **Sec. 23. (a) This section provides the exclusive method for**
4 **removing the designation of a historic district. The owner or**
5 **owners of a building, structure, or site designated as a single site**
6 **historic district may sign and file a petition with the legislative**
7 **body of the unit requesting removal of the designation of the**
8 **building, structure, or site as a historic district. In the case of a**
9 **historic district containing two (2) or more parcels, at least**
10 **fifty-one percent (51%) of the owners of the real property of a**
11 **historic district may sign and file a petition with the legislative**
12 **body of the unit requesting removal of the designation of the**
13 **historic district.**
14 **(b) The legislative body shall submit a petition filed under**
15 **subsection (a) to the historic preservation commission of the unit.**
16 **The historic preservation commission shall conduct a public**
17 **hearing on the petition not later than sixty (60) days after receiving**



1 the petition. The historic preservation commission shall provide
2 notice of the hearing:

- 3 (1) by publication under IC 5-3-1-2(b);
- 4 (2) in the case of a historic district involving fewer than fifty
5 (50) property owners, by certified mail, at least ten (10) days
6 before the hearing, to each owner of real estate within the
7 historic district that is the subject of the petition; and
- 8 (3) in the case of a single building, structure, or site designated
9 as a historic district, by certified mail, at least ten (10) days
10 before the hearing, to each owner of the real estate abutting
11 the building, structure, or site designated as a historic district
12 that is the subject of the petition.

13 (c) The historic preservation commission shall make the
14 following findings after the public hearing:

- 15 (1) Whether a building, structure, or site within the historic
16 district continues to meet the criteria for inclusion in a
17 historic district as set forth in the ordinance approving the
18 historic district map under section 7 of this chapter. The
19 determination must state specifically the criteria that are
20 applicable to the buildings, structures, or sites within the
21 district.
- 22 (2) Whether failure to remove the designation of the historic
23 district would deny an owner of a building, structure, or site
24 within the historic district reasonable use of the owner's
25 property or prevent reasonable economic return. Evidence
26 provided by the petitioner may include information on:
 - 27 (A) costs to comply with regulations;
 - 28 (B) income generation;
 - 29 (C) availability of contractors to perform work;
 - 30 (D) real estate values;
 - 31 (E) assessed values and taxes;
 - 32 (F) revenue projections;
 - 33 (G) current level of return;
 - 34 (H) operating expenses;
 - 35 (I) vacancy rates;
 - 36 (J) financing issues;
 - 37 (K) efforts to explore alternative uses for a property;
 - 38 (L) availability of economic incentives; and
 - 39 (M) recent efforts to sell or rent property.
- 40 (3) Whether removal of the designation of a historic district
41 would have an adverse economic impact on the owners of real
42 estate abutting the historic district based on testimony and

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evidence provided by the owners of the real estate and licensed real estate appraisers or brokers.

(4) Whether the failure to remove the designation of the historic district would have an adverse impact on the unit's historic resources, and specifically whether it would result in the loss of a building, structure, or site classified as historic by the commission's survey prepared under section 6 of this chapter.

(d) Not later than ten (10) days after the public hearing, the historic preservation commission shall submit:

- (1) its findings on the petition; and
- (2) a recommendation to grant or deny the petition;

to the legislative body of the unit.

(e) Not later than forty-five (45) days after receiving the historic preservation commission's findings, the legislative body of the unit shall do one (1) of the following:

- (1) Deny the petition.
- (2) Grant the petition by adopting an ordinance that removes the designation of the historic district by:
 - (A) a majority vote, if the recommendation of the historic preservation commission is to grant the petition; or
 - (B) a two-thirds (2/3) vote, if the recommendation of the historic preservation commission is to deny the petition.

The legislative body shall record the ordinance with the county recorder not later than ten (10) days after the legislative body adopts the ordinance. The historic district designation is considered removed on the date the ordinance is recorded with the county recorder.

(f) If the legislative body of the unit does not grant or deny the petition within forty-five (45) days after receiving the historic preservation commission's findings:

- (1) the petition is considered granted or denied in accordance with the recommendation of the historic preservation commission; and
- (2) if the petition is considered granted, the legislative body shall, not later than fifty-five (55) days after receiving the historic preservation commission's findings:
 - (A) adopt an ordinance that removes the designation of the historic district; and
 - (B) record the ordinance with the county recorder.

The historic district designation is considered removed on the date the ordinance is recorded with the county recorder.

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
