Notice of Intent to Adopt a Rule

LSA Document #19-454

Under [IC 4-22-2-23](#), the Home Inspectors Licensing Board intends to adopt a rule concerning the following:

OVERVIEW: Adds a new rule concerning convictions of concern for licensure by the Indiana Home Inspectors Licensing Board. This rule implements the provisions of [IC 25-1-1.1-6](#) requiring every board, commission, or committee under [IC 25](#) to revise its licensing or certification requirements to explicitly list the convictions of concern that may disqualify an individual from receiving a license; to establish criteria to determine whether an applicant should be denied a license if the applicant has a conviction of concern; and to establish a procedure for an individual to receive a pre-application determination as to whether the individual's criminal history would preclude the individual from obtaining a license.
