RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

House Concurrent Resolution 51

Representatives Saunders and Denbo introduced House Concurrent Resolution 51:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring J. Reid Williamson, Jr. on his retirement from the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana.

Whereas, J. Reid Williamson, Jr. was hired to lead the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana in 1974;

Whereas, At the end of April 2005, J. Reid Williamson, Jr. will retire from that position;

Whereas, During J. Reid Williamson, Jr.'s 31-year tenure, the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana has grown to unequalled status among statewide preservation organizations in the United States;

Whereas, When J. Reid Williamson, Jr. arrived in Indiana, the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana had one house museum, 300 members, and a staff of three;

Whereas, Today the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana has three house museums, 11,000 members, ten offices around the state, and a staff of 53, making it the largest historic preservation organization in the United States apart from the National Trust;

Whereas, Under J. Reid Williamson, Jr.'s leadership, the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana has helped to create more than 200 local preservation groups and commissions throughout Indiana and devised several funding programs to assist these groups in carrying out preservation projects in their communities;

Whereas, J. Reid Williamson, Jr. has also been a highly visible presence in the Indiana General Assembly for many years, advocating for Hoosier landmarks and preservation-friendly laws; and

Whereas, J. Reid Williamson, Jr. has made a difference in the quality of life for Hoosiers in the twenty-first century; his presence will be missed by the staff of the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana and by Hoosiers everywhere: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly wishes J. Reid Williamson, Jr. all the best and thanks him for his many contributions to the state of Indiana.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to J. Reid Williamson, Jr. and the Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana.

House Concurrent Resolution 52

Representatives Welch, Pierce, and Tincher introduced House Concurrent Resolution 52:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring Jeff Rudkin and his students at Batchelor Middle School.

Whereas, Jeff Rudkin and his group of budding cinematographers have received numerous awards and recognition for their outstanding work with B-TV;

Whereas, B-TV has had 28 winning projects in the Association for Educational Communications and Technology International Student Media Festival in the last four years—23 at the middle school level, four at the high school level, and one at the elementary school level and has won three Best of Festival Awards;

Whereas, In November, B-TV had two films selected for screening at the prestigious International Student Film Festival in Hollywood: "Reflections—A Tribute to Jill Behrman" produced by Bloomington South High School students who were alumni of B-TV and "Evil Exposed—The Tragedy of the Holocaust";

Whereas, Only 132 projects were selected from the 300 entries submitted to the International Student Film Festival, many of them from top film schools such as UCLA, USC, and the New York Film Academy;

Whereas, Only 23 projects won awards, with B-TV's "Evil Exposed—The Tragedy of the Holocaust" winning the Best High School Documentary Award even though it was produced by middle school students;

Whereas, In recognition of its fine work, B-TV was officially selected as a member of the press corps for the 60th Anniversary of the Liberation of Auschwitz ceremony by the Polish government in January;

Whereas, B-TV students have won three prestigious Telly Awards, one Communicator Award, one Videographer Award, and numerous awards in the Windsong Film Festival, have been featured twice in AECT's TechTrends Technology Journal, and have been featured as the Classroom in the Spotlight on MacroSystems' web site; and

Whereas, These talented young people are not resting on their laurels; they have set their future goals even higher: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly congratulates Jeff Rudkin and his talented students and encourages them to keep setting their goals high and reaching them.

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing the Indianapolis Museum of Art.

Whereas, Throughout the centuries, art has played an important role in the life of man;

Whereas, For more than 120 years, the Indianapolis Museum of Art has worked to foster a better understanding of the arts and of nature;

Whereas, It is becoming more apparent that the arts are beneficial in ways that were previously unknown;

Whereas, Visual arts can improve academic performance in children;

Whereas, Their involvement in the creative process allows children to blossom and become more productive;

Whereas, The Indianapolis Museum of Art encourages children and their parents to become more involved in art and art as it presents itself in nature through educational programs, festivals, and events, and the Stout Reference Library, which is on the grounds of the Indianapolis Museum of Art;

Whereas, The Indianapolis Museum of Art also offers significant collections of African, American, Asian, European, contemporary, and decorative art;

Whereas, Also on the grounds of the Indianapolis Museum of Art is the Oldfields-Lilly House and Gardens, a historic house museum restored to 1930 era splendor, and the Virginia B. Fairbanks Art and Nature Park, an urban oasis for art and nature consisting of 100 acres of woodlands, wetlands, lake, and meadow, offering both temporary and permanent installations of art and recreational experiences; and

Whereas, The Indianapolis Museum of Art has established itself as one of the premiere art museums in the country and has established a connection with the people of Indiana that promotes a better understanding of the arts and a stronger collaboration among other arts and cultural institutions in the area: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives expresses its support and gratitude for all the effort put forth by the Indianapolis Museum of Art resulting in countless hours of pleasure for the citizens of Indianapolis and surrounding areas.

House Resolution 46

Representatives Klinker, Micon, and T. Brown introduced House Resolution 46:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION honoring Habitat for Humanity.

Whereas, Providing all Hoosiers with homes that have suitable living environments has long been recognized as a key to the advancement and development of Indiana;

Whereas, According to the Indiana Housing Finance Authority's 2003 Indiana Consolidated Plan Update, one-third of Indiana renters are paying more than 30 percent of their household income on gross rent and are thus exceeding the affordability threshold;

Whereas, Habitat for Humanity works in partnership with these families and their communities to build homes that are sold at cost and financed without interest;

Whereas, Habitat for Humanity has constructed over 1,500 affordable homes for Hoosier families and continues to produce nearly 200 new homes each year;

Whereas, Habitat for Humanity will be celebrating the opening of the 2005 building season with a week-long bicycle tour of Indiana and a May 14 celebration; and

Whereas, This celebration honors the accomplishments of a large community of volunteers and donors who have worked tirelessly to improve housing conditions in Indiana: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives recognizes the value of the work performed by Habitat for Humanity and urges Governor Mitch Daniels to proclaim the week of May 8 through May 14 as Habitat for Humanity Week.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit a copy of this resolution to Habitat for Humanity of Greater Indianapolis.

House Resolution 47

Representatives Pierce, Welch, and Tincher introduced House Resolution 47:

Whereas, Because of their basketball skills, all five Duany children were able to earn full scholarships at Division I colleges;

Whereas, After helping his team reach the final four, Duany graduated from the University of Wisconsin with a degree in behavioral science and prelaw and is currently pursuing a master's degree in sports management at Indiana University; Nyagon played for Bradley University and is currently in her final year at Indiana University's medical school; Kueth, the senior captain of the Syracuse University team that won the 2003 NCAA title, graduated with a double major in political science and information management and technology; Nok starred for Georgetown University and after graduation played on a professional team in Portugal and is currently employed in the marketing department of a Chicago bank; and Bil is currently playing for Eastern Illinois University;

Whereas, Basketball was the tool the Duany children used to "meet" Indiana, and Indiana welcomed them with open arms; and

Whereas, While the Duany family lives have not been without hardship, their tremendous courage and work ethic have enabled them to overcome all obstacles: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:
