## RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

### House Concurrent Resolution 8

Representatives Friend and McClain introduced House Concurrent Resolution 8:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION honoring the Young Americans, a high wire group from Circus City Festival in Peru, Miami County, Indiana, for outstanding achievement.

*Whereas, The Young Americans of Circus City Festival, Inc., publicly performed the eight person human pyramid on the high wire for the first time on July 11, 1998;*

*Whereas, The Young American High Wire Group of the Peru Circus has been duly certified by The Guinness Book of Records as setting a new record for the most people to participate in a pyramid on a high wire;*

*Whereas, The eight young people in the group, Amy Fread - age 13, Maggie Jackson - age 13, Jeremy Julian - age 15, Starr Miser - age 16, Nick See - age 17, Katie Cohee - age 18, Caroline Godoy - age 18, and Brad Smith - age 19, have been invited as the only Americans to perform in the "olympics" of circus competition, the "Premiere Rampe," in Monte Carlo on January 30, 1999;*

*Whereas, The Young American High Wire Group is trained by Randy Wallick, himself a veteran of the seven person pyramid, who will accompany the group to the Premiere Rampe, created in 1987 by His Highness Prince Rainier III of Monaco;*

*Whereas, The Young Americans' high standards of discipline, teamwork and dedication to excellence set a notable example for the young people of Indiana: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:*

SECTION 1. The General Assembly of the State of Indiana congratulates the Young Americans and the Circus City Festival of Peru, Miami County, Indiana for their world record achievement of the eight person high wire pyramid.

SECTION 2. The Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives is directed to transmit copies of this resolution to Circus City Festival, Inc., Randy Wallick, Amy Fread, Maggie Jackson, Jeremy Julian, Starr Miser, Nick See, Katie Cohee, Caroline Godoy, and Brad Smith.

### House Resolution 2

Representative Fry introduced House Resolution 2:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing Dorothy "Dottie" Wayne as

a dedicated wife and mother of two. Also, a woman who has played a key role in the City of Mishawaka, St. Joseph's County, and for the State of Indiana.

*Whereas, Dorothy Wayne was born January 24, 1924, in Omaha, Nebraska and moved to South Bend, Indiana in 1953. She graduated from South Bend Riley High School and attended Indiana University in the years 1954-1955;*

*Whereas, She married in 1957 to Chuck Wayne and started a family in Mishawaka, Indiana. Dorothy is the mother of two sons, Scott Wayne and David Wayne, who both married and started their own families;*

*Whereas, She began her career working part time with George Gulyanics in the Penn Twp. Assessor's Office in the mid 1970's. During this time she worked in the political campaigns including: Brainerd; Ferettie; Bradernas; Nome; and Kovach;*

*Whereas, Dorothy served two terms on the Mishawaka – Penn Library Board having been appointed by now former Mayor Bob Kovach;*

*Whereas, In 1983 Dorothy was elected to Mishawaka Common Council and reelected in 1987, 1991, and 1995;*

*Whereas, Dorothy is the first and only woman in the political history of the Mishawaka Common Council to serve as its President;*

*Whereas, In 1994 Dorothy was chosen as the "Mishawaka Woman of the Year" by the Mishawaka Business Association;*

*Whereas, In doing all this Dorothy still dedicated herself as a Sunday school teacher, finance committee member at First United Methodist Church, Mishawaka. She held offices at Beiger School and Mishawaka High School PTA's and Tri-Kappa Sorority: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives does hereby recognize the vital contributions of Dorothy Wayne to her family, residents of the City of Mishawaka, St. Joseph's County, and the State of Indiana.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the Indiana House of Representatives deliver a copy of the House Resolution to Dorothy Wayne.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

### House Resolution 3

Representative Fry introduced House Resolution 3:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION to honor the Jimtown High School football team for winning the 1998 Indiana High School Class 2A State Football Championship for a second straight year.

*Whereas, The 1998 Indiana High School Athletic Association Class 2A State Football Championship game was held in the RCA Dome in Indianapolis on Friday, November 27th;*

*Whereas, The top-ranked Jimtown High School football team won their second straight Class 2A championship and third overall state crown with an outstanding 28-0 victory over No.2 Western Boone;*

*Whereas, The Jimtown High School football team played an outstanding defensive game limiting their opponent to a mere 37 yards on the ground and 114 total offensive yards. Landon Gilbert, Jimtown's cornerback, not only had an interception and a fumble recovery, but also ran in a 25-yard touchdown pass from quarterback, Keith Kinder;*

*Whereas, Jimtown High School's football team has some top achievers throughout the year: Craig Hisey, a three-year letterman in both football and baseball, was awarded the Phil N. Eskew Award for Mental Attitude; Robert Menchinger, the junior kicker for Jimtown, broke the state record for career extra-points and set a Class 2A state championship best 47-yard field goal in the first quarter;*

*Whereas, Jimtown High School football team has not only won 30 straight games, but became the first team to post back-to-back 15-0 seasons: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives does hereby

recognize and congratulate the 1998 IHSAA Class 2A football champions, the Jimtown High School "Jimmies" for their tremendous accomplishments.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the Indiana House of Representatives is directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to Baugo Township School Superintendent Jerry Cook, and Jimtown High School Football Coach Bill Sharpe.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

### RESOLUTIONS ON FIRST READING

#### Senate Concurrent Resolution 9

The Speaker handed down Senate Concurrent Resolution 9, sponsored by Representatives Murphy, Mannweiler, Atterholt, Bosma, Buell, Frizzell, and M. Young:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION to memorialize and honor the life and achievements of L. Keith Bulen.

*Whereas, Mr. Lawrence Keith Bulen was born and raised in Madison County, Indiana. He graduated from Pendleton High School in 1944, where he was a varsity letterman in both baseball and basketball. He went on to Indiana University and graduated with both undergraduate and law degrees;*

*Whereas, Mr. Bulen's long and varied service in government began when he was elected to serve in the House of Representatives in 1960, 1962, and 1990;*

*Whereas, Mr. Bulen served with distinction in Switzerland and in Africa as a committee member with the United Nations. Additionally, he was appointed to the International Joint Commission of the United States and Canada by President Reagan in 1981, where he was a principal in crafting what is known as the Bulen-Olson Treaty of 1984;*

*Whereas, Chief among Mr. Bulen's many accomplishments in government was his role with several others to successfully enact and implement the consolidated form of government in Marion County now known as Uni-gov;*

*Whereas, Mr. Bulen was most active in organized Republican politics, serving as a precinct committeeman, ward chairman, Marion County GOP chairman, 6th District chairman, and Indiana GOP national committeeman;*

Whereas, Mr. Bulen was a driving force with the Republican Action Committee that successfully reorganized the Marion County Republican Party in 1966. His vision and organizational skills shaped the landscape of politics in Indiana for many years;

Whereas, Many famous and influential political leaders maintained close relationships with Mr. Bulen, and of these, he was most proud of his friendships with President Ronald Reagan and United States Senator Richard G. Lugar, both of whom he helped to elect and re-elect;

Whereas, Mr. Bulen was quite active as an owner of successful standardbred horses, including Abercrombie, a national horse of the year at three years of age. Abercrombie had career purse winnings of nearly one million dollars, and now is recognized as one of the most outstanding sires of all time; and

Whereas, Of the many recognitions and awards that Mr. Bulen received during his lifetime, he was most proud of having been inducted into the Sigma Nu Fraternity Hall of Fame and into the Standardbred Hall of Fame: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the Senate  
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana,  
the House of Representatives concurring:*

SECTION 1. L. Keith Bulen's lifetime of political service, his endeavors and achievements for Indiana, and his love of our great state serve as an inspiration to us all. We salute his life and honor his memory.

SECTION 2. The Secretary of the Senate shall send a copy of this resolution to L. Keith Bulen's daughters, Leslie K. Bulen Mills, Lisa K. Bulen Rodda, L. Kasse Bulen, and L. Kellee Bulen; to his granddaughters, Lawren K. Mills and Lindsey K. Rodda; and to his most special friend, Sandra Donovan.

A HOUSE RESOLUTION to commemorate the life of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and his contributions to our nation.

Whereas, We remember Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., one of our nation's truly great leaders for justice and righteousness, who was born 70 years ago on January 15, 1929;

Whereas, Dr. King had many dreams - of an America where "justice rolls down like water and righteousness like a mighty stream," and America where neighbors look "beyond the external accidents and discern those inner qualities that make all men human and, therefore, brothers," a time when "this nation will rise up and live out the true meanings of its creed, 'we hold these truths to be self evident: that all men are created equal';

Whereas, Dr. King a dream "that one day...the sons of the former slave owners will be able to sit together at the table of brotherhood...that one day even (states) sweltering with the heat of oppression, will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice...that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character";

Whereas, The dreams of Dr. King continue to inspire the American people - his people;

Whereas, We must continue to take inspiration from the life of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., striving with renewed spirits to realize his dreams; and

Whereas, It is fitting and proper that at this time we remember Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and the cause to which he dedicated his life: Therefore,

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives  
of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the General Assembly calls upon the people of Indiana, the businessmen and businesswomen, the professionals, the laborers, the men, the women, the children, the black, the white, all Hoosiers, to remember Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., to affirm as our

creed the words of the Declaration of Independence, "all men are created equal," and then rise up and live out the true meaning of that creed.

SECTION 2. That on January 18, the day set aside this year to honor Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and of us pause to remember him and his dream.

SECTION 1. ARTICLE 10, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF INDIANA IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. (a) The General Assembly shall provide, by law, for a uniform and equal rate of property assessment and taxation and shall prescribe regulations to secure a just valuation for taxation of all property, both real and personal. The General Assembly may exempt from property taxation any property in any of the following classes:

(1) Property being used for municipal, educational, literary, scientific, religious, or charitable purposes.

(2) Tangible personal property other than ~~property being held for sale in the ordinary course of a trade or business~~; property being held, used, or consumed in connection with the production of income or property being held as an investment.

(3) Intangible personal property.

(b) The General Assembly may exempt any motor vehicles, mobile homes, airplanes, boats, trailers, or similar property, provided that an excise tax in lieu of the property tax is substituted therefor.
