There shall be elected, in each county by the voters thereof, at the time of holding general elections, a Clerk of the Circuit Court, Auditor, Recorder, Treasurer, Sheriff, Coroner, and Surveyor, who shall, severally, hold their offices for four years; and no person shall be eligible to the office of ~~Clerk, Auditor, Recorder, Treasurer, Sheriff or Coroner~~ more than eight years in any period of twelve years.

**HJR 2** — Ripley (Rules and Legislative Procedures)

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article 4 of

the Constitution of the State of Indiana concerning the general assembly.

*Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Indiana is proposed and agreed to by this, the One Hundred Eleventh General Assembly of the State of Indiana, and is referred to the next General Assembly for reconsideration and agreement.

SECTION 2. ARTICLE 4, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF INDIANA IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. (a) The Legislative authority of the State shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and a House of Representatives.

(b) **The term of a General Assembly begins on the first Wednesday after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year and ends on the first Wednesday after the first Monday of November of the following even-numbered year.**

(c) The style of every law shall be: "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana"; and no law shall be enacted, except by bill.

SECTION 3. ARTICLE 4, SECTION 3 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF INDIANA IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Section 3. (a) **Senators shall be elected and serve as follows:**

(1) **Senators elected before November 2, 2004, shall be elected for a term of four years, and beginning the day after the general election.**

(2) **At the general election held November 2, 2004, successors to the Senators elected at the 2000 general election shall be elected and serve as follows:**

(A) **Seventeen Senators, chosen randomly as provided by law, shall be elected for a term of four years, beginning November 3, 2004.**

(B) **Eight Senators, chosen randomly as provided by law, shall be elected for a term of six years, beginning November 3, 2004.**

(3) **At the general election held November 7, 2006, successors to the Senators elected at the 2002 general election shall be elected and serve as follows:**

(A) **Nine Senators, chosen randomly as provided by law, shall be elected for a term of four years, beginning November 8, 2006.**

(B) **Sixteen Senators, chosen randomly as provided by law, shall be elected for a term of six years, beginning November 8, 2006.**

(4) **At the general election held November 4, 2008, the successors of the Senators elected under subdivision (2)(A) shall be elected for a term of six years, beginning November 5, 2008.**

(5) **At the general election held November 2, 2010, the successors of the Senators elected under subdivision (2)(B) and the successors of the Senators elected under subdivision (3)(A) shall be elected for a term of six years, beginning November 3, 2010.**

(6) **At each general election held after 2010, Senators shall be elected for a term of six years, beginning the day after the general election.**

(b) **Representatives shall be elected and serve as follows:**

(1) **Representatives elected before November 2, 2004, shall be elected for a term of two years, from beginning the day next after their general election. One half of the Senators, as nearly as possible, shall be elected biennially.**

(2) **Beginning with the general election held November 2, 2004, Representatives shall be elected for a term of four years, beginning the day after the general election.**

SECTION 4. ARTICLE 4, SECTION 5 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF INDIANA IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Section 5. ~~The General Assembly elected during Before January 1 of the third year in which after the year of a federal decennial census, is taken;~~ **The General Assembly shall fix by law the number of Senators and Representatives and apportion them among districts according to**

the number of inhabitants in each district, as revealed by that federal decennial census. The territory in each district shall be contiguous.

**HJR 3** — D. Young (Rules and Legislative Procedures)

*Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 2. ARTICLE 6, SECTION 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF INDIANA IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: Section 2. (a) There shall be elected, in each county by the voters thereof, at the time of holding general elections, a Clerk of the Circuit Court, Auditor, Recorder, Treasurer, Sheriff, Coroner, and Surveyor, who shall, severally, hold their offices for four years. ~~and~~

**(b) The General Assembly may provide by law for uniform dates for beginning the terms of the county officials listed in subsection (a). If the General Assembly enacts a law to provide a uniform date for beginning the terms of a county official listed in subsection (a), the General Assembly may provide that the term of each county official initially elected after enactment of the law to provide the uniform date for beginning the terms of the county official is for less than four years in order to establish a uniform schedule of dates for the beginning of terms for the office. However, after the initial election for each office, the term for that office shall be for four years.**

(c) No person shall be eligible to the office of Clerk, Auditor, Recorder, Treasurer, Sheriff, or Coroner more than eight years in any period of twelve years.

### House Resolution 5

Representative Gregg introduced House Resolution 5:

*Whereas, On May 25, 1993, President Clinton signed Public Law 103-32 authorizing the American Battle Monuments Commission to establish a World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.;*

*Whereas, This memorial will be the first national memorial dedicated to all those who served during World War II and to the commitment and achievement of the entire nation;*

*Whereas, The memorial will honor the 16,500,000 men and women who served in the U.S. armed forces during World War II, 406,000 of whom gave their life for their country;*

*Whereas, The memorial will honor the spirit, sacrifice, and commitment of the American people in the defense of the nation and the causes of peace and freedom throughout the world;*

*Whereas, The memorial will "stand as an important symbol of American national unity, a timeless reminder of the moral strength and awesome power that can flow when a free people are at once united and bonded together in a common and just cause";*

*Whereas, The proposed National World War II Memorial in Washington, D. C. will be built in the Rainbow Pool site at the east end of the Reflecting Pool between the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument, a site that was dedicated by President Clinton during a formal ceremony on Veterans Day, 1995;*

*Whereas, Construction of the \$100,000,000 memorial, funded almost entirely by private contributions, is scheduled to begin on Veterans Day, 2000;*

*Whereas, Most of the funds are to be collected from private sources but the Commission has asked each state to contribute one dollar for each citizen who served during World War II;*

*Whereas, All states have responded to this request except two, Indiana and Wyoming;*

*Whereas, The fact that the citizens of Indiana realize the great debt that is owed to the World War II veterans is indicated by a single donation to the memorial by an Indianapolis veterans' organization of \$38,000 to be applied to the construction of the monument; and*

*Whereas, It is fitting and proper that the state of Indiana contribute the requested funds to the American Battle Monuments Commission for the construction of the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly will in the next budget year appropriate the funds to fulfill the requested contribution of one dollar for each Indiana resident who fought in World War II to be used to construct the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to retired Army General Fred Woerner, the Chairman of the American Battle Monuments Commission.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.

### House Concurrent Resolution 6

Representative Gregg introduced House Concurrent Resolution 6:

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Indiana General Assembly to approve funding for a donation to be applied to the construction of the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.

*Whereas, On May 25, 1993, President Clinton signed Public Law 103-32 authorizing the American Battle Monuments Commission to establish a World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.;*

*Whereas, Although most of the funds are to be collected from private sources, the commission has asked each state to contribute \$1 for each citizen who served during World War II;*

*Whereas, All states have responded to this request except two - Indiana and Wyoming;*

*Whereas, The citizens of Indiana realize the great debt that is owed to the World War II veterans, as indicated by a single donation of \$38,000 by an Indianapolis veterans organization to be applied to the construction of the monument; and*

*Whereas, It is fitting and proper that the state of Indiana contribute the requested funds to the American Battle Monuments*

*Commission for the construction of the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, the Senate concurring:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana General Assembly will in the next budget year appropriate the funds to fulfill the requested contribution of one dollar (\$1) for each Indiana resident who fought in World War II to be used to construct the National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives transmit a copy of this resolution to General Fred Woerner, United States Army (Ret), chairman of the American Battle Monuments Commission.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote. The Clerk was directed to inform the Senate of the passage of the resolution. Senate sponsors: Senators Garton and R. Young.
