W.K. Kellogg Foundation

SUMMARY: The Foundation gives grants to a variety of projects that support children, families, and communities in need, including Education Health & Welfare and Civic Engagement.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: U.S. and world wide groups. Seed money awards reflect the foundations' desire to create and nurture new programs in numerous locations. Successful requests get support form other sources and may be applied on a large scale. Grants for operating support, endowments, gifts and related investments are sometimes available.

DUE DATE: Apply anytime

AWARD AMOUNT: Funding sources are around \$358.9 million

Jessie Smith Noyes Foundation

SUMMARY: Foundation has four priorities of:

- Environment Health: Reduce toxins and hold corporations accountable for their impact on the environment.
- Environmental Justice: Counter degradation of low-income communities.
- Sustainable Agriculture: Advocate for community food systems.
- Quality Women’s Health: Policy initiatives to protect reproductive rights.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Only U.S. grant seekers. Noyes supports nonprofits working in low-income communities that cover multiple priorities or develop partnerships. Requests for endowments, capital construction, **fundraising and media programming are not accepted.**

DUE DATE: Inquiries are accepted year round.

AWARD AMOUNT: Funding sources around \$3.5 million

Public Welfare Foundation

SUMMARY: Three competitive programs:

- Criminal Justice: Lower rates of incarceration and decrease prison population.
- Health Reform: Advocate for impaired healthcare system at state levels.
- Worker’s Rights: Promote new job health and safety standards.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: U.S. nonprofits. No funds for international or endowment campaigns.

DUE DATE: Letters of inquiry should be sent six to eight weeks before proposal deadlines on Nov 14, March 23, and Jul 27

AWARD AMOUNT: Funding sources around \$20.7 million.

The Annenberg Foundation

SUMMARY: The Annenberg Foundation's primary grant-making interests are in education and youth, culture, the arts, and community and civic life.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: The foundation only considers organizations that are defined as public charities and are tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

DUE DATE: The Annenberg Foundation accepts electronic letters of inquiry at all times during the year.

Dow Corning Foundation

SUMMARY: Funding focuses on Education (teacher training, hands-on learning for students, and equipment acquisition), and Civic & Community (improve quality of life).

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Focus areas in Indiana, Michigan, Kentucky and North Carolina. Equipment and products are sometimes given to groups that meet requirements. Grants are not given for religious activities, conferences, travel costs, dinners, fundraisers or advertisements.

DUE DATE: Applications are reviewed on a quarterly basis.

AWARD AMOUNT: Funding sources up to \$1.1 million.

SUMMARY: Focus splits between two program issues:

- Human Rights & Democracy: Activities include, advocacy, education, outreach, research and policy analysis.
- Reproductive Health & Rights: Promotes leadership development, organizing, education and other women’s well-being issues.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Grant seekers in the United States and Mexico. This foundation awards seed grants to new projects to encourage risk-taking and new strategies and ideas. Not supported: environmental issues, relief projects, unrelated research and publications, or Planned Parenthood affiliates.

DUE DATE: Letters of inquiry are accepted Feb 1 and Sept. 1

AWARD AMOUNT: Funding sources around \$3.1 million

SUMMARY: Funds are given to groups working in Marine Conservation, including Research and Education.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: U.S. and international organizations. The foundation looks for projects that promote partnerships with other groups and have clear community benefits. Preference is given to groups with other funding sources. Overhead funds are not given.

DUE DATE: Letters of intent are due June 30.

AWARD AMOUNT: Grants range from \$25,000 TO \$50,000, no set maximum.

SUMMARY: Two Program areas:

- Arts: Education activities and outreach associated with contemporary art.
- Education: Programs keeping children in school and improving academically.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: U.S. organizations. The foundation offers seed, challenge and matching grants.

DUE DATE: Submit inquires anytime

AWARD AMOUNT: Funding sources around \$1.2 million

Energy Foundation

SUMMARY: This funds supports Alternative Energy Research and Public Policy initiatives

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: U.S. and international groups. No grants for political activities, community energy projects, endowments, debt reduction, fundraising, capital constructions, renovations, technology development or demonstration projects.

DUE DATE: Proposals should be sent 12 weeks before board meetings in March, June, and November.

AWARD AMOUNT: Grants up to \$600,000.

RGK Foundation

SUMMARY: The RGK Foundation awards grants in the broad areas of education, community, and medicine/health.

DUE DATE: There is no deadline for submitting an electronic letter of inquiry. Foundation staff review electronic letters of inquiry on an ongoing basis and typically respond within two days, but ask that applicants allow up to two weeks for a response.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIRMENTS: Grants are made only to nonprofit organizations certified as tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) or Section 170 (c) of the Internal Revenue Code and classified as "not a private foundation" under Section 509(a).

AWARD AMOUNT: While the foundation does award some grants of more than \$25,000, it anticipates that most grants will be under \$25,000.

Women Helping Others Foundation

SUMMARY: This funder gives to groups serving Health, Education and Social needs of women and children.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Nonprofits with operating budgets under \$3 million get preference. Previous recipients must wait three years before re-applying. Grants aren't given to endowment campaigns, religious or political causes, advertising, conferences or charity functions, or capital or building campaigns.

DUE DATE: Second Tuesday in September

AWARD AMOUNT: The foundation awards \$5,000 to \$25,000 to grantees.

Brookdale Foundation

SUMMARY: Funds go to Social, Arts, and Recreational activities for patients with Alzheimer's disease, their families and caregivers.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Grants can't be used to expand service capacity of existing respite programs, or for building, renovation, or capital improvements.

DUE DATE: Proposals are due July 1

AWARD AMOUNT: \$7,500, renewable for \$3,000 in the second year.

Job Opportunities for Low Income Individuals (JOLI)

SUMMARY: Program supports business development and expansion opportunities (including micro-enterprise and self-employment) in an effort to help Temporary Assistance for Needs Families (TANF) recipients and other low-income individuals to achieve economic sufficiency.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Applicants must be a nonprofit organization with 501 c3 or 501c4 status. Faith-based and community organizations are eligible to apply.

DUE DATE: May 8, 2009

AWARD AMOUNT: Grant amount ceiling is \$475,000. Total grant funding source is \$4,838,000 and 11 awards are expected to be made.

The Hearst Foundations

SUMMARY: The Hearst Foundations assist institutions in providing opportunities to underserved and underrepresented populations. The foundation's specific areas of interest include: Education, health, culture, social service.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Grant funds must be used for charitable purposes exclusively within the United States and territories. Private sector organizations are favored over those financed through taxation. Organizations serving larger geographical areas are favored over those of a neighborhood, grass-roots, or community-based nature.

DUE DATE: Ongoing

Skoll Foundation

SUMMARY: The Social Entrepreneurship awards fund programs devoted to:

- Human Rights: Women's' rights, social equality and immigration
- Health: Disease control, healthcare access and population control.
- Environment: Water scarcity, global warming and biodiversity.
- World issues: Nuclear proliferation, drug trafficking and terrorism.
- Civic Responsibility: Ethics in labor and government,
- Socials Services: Housing and Education

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Nonprofits nationwide. This funder looks for models that can be replicated on a larger scale with long-term goals, along with a three-year track record. Not funded: film financing, endowments, or religious or political activities.

DUE DATE: Send applications anytime; the foundation chooses awards at the beginning of August and November.

AWARD AMOUNT: Funding sources around \$13.4 million

SUMMARY: The foundation awards funds to community organizations that team up to develop local history Education and Historical Preservation initiatives.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Funds usually go to libraries, museums, historical societies, archives, and preservation groups . High-rated appalications clearly explain the project's importance to history and community.

DUE DATE: June 5

AWARD AMOUNT: Grants are up to \$10,000 each.

Charles Lafitte Foundation (CLF)

SUMMARY: CLF's mission is to provide for and support inventive and effective ways of helping people help themselves and others around them to lead healthy, satisfying, and enriched lives. To fulfill this mission, the foundation acts as grant maker, innovator, and volunteer for four main programs: education, children's advocacy, medical issues and research, and the arts.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: The foundation funds organizations throughout the country but is limited to supporting 501(c)(3) institutions.

SUMMARY: Proposals are accepted for both new and established program working toward the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual Welfare of Children.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Programs should help children in multiple states. No grants for operation expenses, equipment, translating materials, personnel expenses or operation costs.

DUE DATE: Letter of intent are due June 1

AWARD AMOUNT: Grants are as high as \$70,000

Wellpoint Foundation

SUMMARY: Improving health outcomes is the goal of the foundation. Projects receive funding if they focus on covering the uninsured. (Expand community healthcare access)

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Funds given to Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and other areas of company operations. This foundation supports ongoing programs with measurable outcomes and replicable models.

DUE DATE: Apply by May 9, August 19, and October 1.
