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

Are you still looking for a New Year's Resolution, & hoping to find one that's easy to keep? We have some ideas:

The OUCC is inviting written public comments in the Northern Indiana Public Service Co. (NIPSCO) gas rate case through Jan. 18. Comments received by that date will be filed for the case's formal record. They will also carry equal weight with comments provided at the IURC's Jan. 13 public field hearing in Ft. Wayne. NIPSCO's proposal would raise the monthly residential gas customer charge from \$14.00 to \$24.50.

East Chicago residents can submit comments on the local Sanitary District's rate request through Feb. 2. In addition, an IURC public field hearing is scheduled for Jan. 11 in East Chicago. The utility's request would implement new rates in three phases through 2024, paying for aging infrastructure improvements & covering higher operating & maintenance costs.





American Suburban Utilities (ASU) is seeking permission to raise its flat, monthly residential sewer rate from \$59.08 to \$99.66. The utility's service territory is in Tippecanoe County, near West Lafayette. ASU's last rate case was in 2016, when it received approval for a 3-phase increase. The 3rd phase was implemented in September 2021. The OUCC expects to file testimony this spring. Consumer comments are invited.

ADDITIONAL CASE UPDATES

Energy

- The IURC's evidentiary hearing on <u>CenterPoint Energy's</u> proposal to build a new power plant in Posey County is set to start on Jan. 26 & continue through Jan. 31 if needed. A Commission order is expected later this year. The OUCC is recommending denial of CenterPoint Energy's request. The agency's analysis shows that converting the A. B. Brown facility's coal-fired generation units to natural gas would be more cost-effective while meeting customer needs for reliable electricity.
- All filings are complete in the <u>Indiana Michigan Power</u> (I&M) rate case. The pending settlement agreement would reduce base rates by more than \$94 million if approved, while keeping the monthly residential customer charge at its current \$15.00 level. A separate agreement received Commission <u>approval</u> in December, including ratepayer protections regarding ownership changes at the Rockport Generating Station.
- NIPSCO's 5-year electric infrastructure plan has received Commission approval. The OUCC is reviewing <u>Duke Energy's</u> 6-year infrastructure plan with testimony due in mid-February.

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Water/Wastewater

- \bullet The settlement agreement in the $\underline{\sf Bloomington}$ municipal water rate case has received Commission approval.
- All fillings are complete in the <u>Evansville</u> water rate case, with an IURC order expected in the coming weeks.
- The OUCC is reviewing <u>Community Utilities of Indiana's</u> newly requested water & sewer rate increases. CUII serves portions of 4 northwest Indiana counties.
- OUCC analysts recently filed testimony in the <u>North Dearborn Water Authority</u> rate case & reached an agreement with <u>Tri-Township Water Corporation</u> on its pending rate request. OUCC testimony on the <u>Jackson County Water Utility's</u> financing request is due on Jan. 26.
