I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Union City Housing Authority, as of and for the year ended September 30, 2009, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Authority's management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these basic financial statements based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, in my opinion, is fairly stated in all materials respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Our discussion and analysis of the Union City Housing Authority financial performance provides the reader with an overview to the Authority's financial activities for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2009. The information contained in this MD&A should be considered in conjunction with the Authority's basic financial statements which are included with this MD&A.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The Authority's cash balance at September 30, 2009 was \$58,982 representing a decrease from \$109,918 in September 30, 2008.
- The assets of the Authority exceeded its liabilities at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$54,589 (net assets).
- The Authority had HUD operating grants of \$656,976, and investment income of \$1,385 for the year ended September 30, 2009.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

This annual report consists of the Management's Discussion and Analysis, the basic financial statements, and notes to the financial statements. The MD&A provides a narrative of the Authority's financial performance and activities for the year ended September 30, 2009. The basic statements provide readers with a broad overview of the Authority's finances. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.

The basic financial statements consist of three statements:

- Statement of Net Assets - presents information on all of the Authority's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial situation of the Authority is improving.
- Statement of Activities - presents information showing how the Authority's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Certain revenues and expenses are reported in this statement that will result in cash flows in future periods.
- Statement of Cash Flows - presents information showing how the Authority's cash changed during the most recent fiscal year. It shows the sources and uses of cash.

HOUSING AUTHORITY ACTIVITIES AND HIGHLIGHTS

The Union City Housing Authority achieved a 98.81% occupancy rate in the Housing Choice Voucher Program for the FYE September 30, 2009. This rate increased from the previous FYE September 30, 2008 Housing Choice Voucher Program occupancy rate of 96.27%.

FINANCIAL OPERATIONS HIGHLIGHTS

The Union City Housing Authority expended \$70,727 more in additional housing assistance payments for very low income families in Union City in FYE September 30, 2009 than in the previous FYE September 30, 2008. Fraud recovery for FYE September 30, 2009 exceeded fraud recovery for FYE September 30, 2008 by \$2,948.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Organization and Reporting Entity -

The Union City Housing Authority was established by the City pursuant to the laws of the State of Indiana, to transact business and to have powers as defined therein. The Housing Authority was established to provide low-rent housing for qualified individuals in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and other applicable Federal Agencies.

Under the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) had direct responsibility for administering housing programs in the United States. Accordingly, HUD has entered into a contract with the Authority for the purpose of providing annual contributions (subsidies) to the program for the purpose of maintaining its low-rent character.

In evaluating the Authority as a reporting entity, management has addressed its relationship with the City of Union City and concluded that the City does not maintain an oversight responsibility for the Authority's operations. An independent Board of Commissioners, appointed by the City, is responsible for the activities of the Authority. The Authority recruits and employs its executive staff and has substantial legal authority to control its affairs without requiring approval of the City government. Debt incurred by the Authority is not an obligation of the City; the City does not review or approve the Authority's budget, is not entitled to any surplus funds generated by the Authority's operations and is not responsible for any deficits incurred by the Authority.

The Authority is governed by a Board of Commissioners appointed by the office of the Mayor, and has governance responsibilities over all activities related to all housing activities within the City. The Board of Commissioners has decision making authority and the power to designate management. The members do not serve at the discretion of the Mayor, i.e. they can only be removed for cause. The Authority's Board elects its own chairperson.

Consequently, in accordance with evaluating the criteria set forth in Section 2100 and 2600 of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board Codification, management has concluded that the Union City Housing Authority is a separate reporting entity. All funds and programs of the Housing Authority are included in these statements. The Housing Authority has no component units.

(b) Method of Accounting -

The financial statements of the Housing Authority have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

The Housing Authority applies all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements. The funds apply Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) pronouncements and Accounting Principles Board (APB) opinions issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict or contradict GASB pronouncements, in which case, GASB prevails.

(c) Financial Statement Presentation

Although a formal policy has not been adopted, in financial statement preparation the Authority distinguishes operating revenues and expenses from non-operating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services in connection with the Authority's principal ongoing operations. Principal operating revenues are tenant rents and HUD grants. Operating expenses include administration, maintenance, insurance, depreciation, utilities, housing assistance payments and other general expenses. All revenues and expenses not meeting these definitions are reported as non-operating revenues and expenses.

(d) Funds -

Each of the programs of the Housing Authority are organized on a basis of fund accounting, using a separate set of self balancing accounts as prescribed by HUD. The programs of the Housing Authority are:

- * Housing Choice Vouchers
- * Business Activities - Royal Oaks Apartments

These programs are all accounted for within the 'Proprietary' (enterprise) fund as described below:

Proprietary Fund Types:

Proprietary funds use the economic resources measurement focus and utilize the accrual basis of accounting. All assets and liabilities associated with a proprietary fund's activities are included on the fund statement. Proprietary fund equity is segregated into Invested in Capital Assets Net of Related Debt, Restricted Net Assets and Unrestricted Net Assets.

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents -

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the practice of the Housing Authority is to consider all highly liquid investments to be cash equivalents. The term "highly liquid" refers to investments with a maturity of three (3) months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

(f) Investments -

Investments are stated at cost which approximates market.

(g) Due To/From Other Programs -

During the course of operations, numerous transactions occur between individual programs for goods provided or services rendered. These receivables and payables are classified as "due from other programs" or "due to other programs" on the combining statement of net assets and have been eliminated in the basic financial statements.

(h) Fixed Assets -

For the purpose of determining, distinguishing and recording materials and non-expendable equipment and personal property purchased or acquired in connection with development, management, and maintenance of public housing developments owned or operated, the Housing Authority follows the following capitalization policy:

If the anticipated life or useful life of said equipment or property is more than one (1) year, the same shall be capitalized and recorded as non-expendable equipment and charged as a capital expenditure.

Land, buildings and equipment contains the following:

- 1) The total development construction costs incurred for each project at the end of the initial operating period,
- 2) nonexpendable equipment, and
- 3) property betterments and additions
- 4) land acquisitions.

These are recorded at cost. Depreciation of property and equipment is provided using the straight line method for financial reporting purposes at rates based on the following estimates:

Buildings	40	years
Furniture and fixtures	5-15	years
Improvements	15	years

(i) Net Assets -

GASB Statement 34 requires the classification of net assets into three components as defined below:

- 1) Invested in capital assets, net of related debt - this component of net assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, costs to be recovered from future revenues and unamortized debt expense reduced by outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets.
- 2) Restricted - this component of net assets consist of constraints placed on net assets use through external constraints imposed by creditors, contributors or laws and regulations of other governments or constraints imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- 3) Unrestricted - this component of net assets consists of net assets that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt."

(j) Income Tax -

The Authority, organized as a non-profit corporation subsidized by the Federal government, is exempt from Federal and State income taxes.

(k) Annual Contributions/Subsidies and Other Grants -

Annual contributions and subsidies received from the Department of HUD are recorded as grant revenues.

(l) The Housing Authority adopts a budget annually. The budget is submitted to the Board of Commissioners for approval. Subsequent budget revisions may also be required to be submitted for approval.

(m) The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles require the Housing Authority to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Note 2 - Cash and Investments

Statutes authorize the Housing Authority to invest in certificates of deposit, money market funds, United States government securities and repurchase agreements fully collateralized by United States government securities.

All cash and investments are insured up to \$100,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or other equivalent insurance company of the depository financial institutions. The deposits exceeding the insured or registered limits are public funds covered by the State of Indiana Public Deposit Fund.

Custodial Credit Risk

- a. Deposits - Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a financial institution failure, the Authority's deposits may not be returned to or that the Authority will not be able to recover collateral securities in the possession of an outside party.
- b. Investments - Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of the failure of the depository, the Authority will not be able to recover the value of its investments or collateral securities that are in the possession of the outside party.

Note 2 - Cash and Investments

Credit Risk Investments, Concentration of Credit Risk and Interest Rate Risks - Investments

Credit Risk is the risk that an issuer or other counter party to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. The Housing Authority has no investment policy that limits its investment choices other than the limitation of state law and/or the Department of Urban Development regulations.

Concentrations of Credit Risk is the risk of loss attributed to the amount of the investment in a single issuer. The Authority does not have a formal investment policy covering the concentration of credit risk.

Investment Rate Risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. The Housing Authority has no formal policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

The cash deposits held at financial institutions can be categorized according to three levels of risk. These three levels of risk are as follows:

- Category 1 - Deposits which are insured or collateralized with securities held by the Housing Authority or by its agent in the Housing Authority's name.
- Category 2 - Deposits which are collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the Housing Authority's name.
- Category 3 - Deposits which are not collateralized or insured.

Based on the three levels of risk, all of the Housing Authority's funds are classified as Category 1.

Note 4 - Defined Contribution Plan

Plan Description

The Housing Authority contributes to the Indiana Public Employees' Retirement Fund (PERF), a defined benefit pension plan. PERF is an agent multiple-employer public employee retirement system, which provides retirement benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. All full-time employees are eligible to participate in the defined benefit plan. The PERF retirement benefit consists of the pension annuity savings account. The annuity savings accounts consists of member's contributions, set by state statute of three percent of compensation, plus the interest credited to the member's account. The employer may elect to make the contributions on behalf of the member.

During the current year the Housing Authority no longer contributed with the City plan. The PHA is now on its own plan. To start the plan the PHA had to pay an administrative fee of \$329 to enroll and then did not start plan until fourth quarter of fiscal year.

The Authority made the required contributions, amounting to \$1,681 from the Authority and \$348 from the employees. Total annual payroll expense was \$49,145.

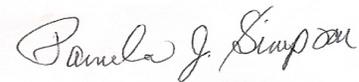

In planning and performing my audit of the financial statements of Union City Housing Authority as of and for the year ended September 30, 2009, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United State of America, I considered the Housing Authorities internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing my auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing my opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Union City Housing Authority's internal control. Accordingly, I do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Union City Housing Authority's internal control.

The administration of the Housing Authority is responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of internal accounting control. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgements by the administration are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of a system are to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use of disposition and that transactions are executed in accordance with authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting control, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

My study and evaluation made for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph would not necessarily disclose all material weaknesses in the system. However, my study and evaluation disclosed certain conditions in the following areas of which you should be aware in order to improve operating efficiencies and strengthen internal controls:

1. During the audit of the Section 8 participant files it was noted that the PHA should retain all detailed documentation. Some of the files, the initial income verification could not always be located, but matched EIV printed for subsequent recert, PHA should retain calculations for amounts - income and deductions with the notations, and should keep the inspection forms in the files for all initial, annual and interim re-certifications.
2. While auditing a sample of the PHA's disbursements, it was noted that not all documentation of these disbursements could be provided. In the sample of one travel advance, a conference registration, one set of dues and a gas bill could not be found. PHA should retain all documentation of purchasing as required by internal policies.
