

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# MESSAGE FROM THE ELECTION BOARD

Citizens of Clinton County,

Since the vote center concept became a reality in Indiana elections in 2007, leaders in Clinton County have been carefully observing its effect on voters, county budgets, and on the election process.

The following pages layout our plan to make vote centers a reality in Clinton County. The vote center concept gives any voter in Clinton County the opportunity to cast their ballot at any vote center location throughout the county. No one is restricted to one polling place on Election Day. In addition to making it easier for voters on Election Day, the vote center concept also calls for increased early voting opportunities at what are called "satellite vote centers" that are open prior to Election Day.

Another important part of the vote center concept is the financial impact it will have on Clinton County. Having to staff fewer locations and provide less equipment and support on Election Day will help the county to realize a cost savings on items such as rental costs, poll worker costs, and equipment costs.

By moving to vote centers, voter convenience is improved; election administration is streamlined and made simpler; and this improves the county's long-term fiscal stance when it comes to elections.

Most Americans have been voting under the same process for over 150 years. Vote centers represent a major step forward and bring elections into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.

We want to thank all the wonderful people who have worked so hard and in a bipartisan manner to move the county toward vote centers. Clinton County should be proud of its community leaders who work together for what will be best for all citizens. To all the churches, libraries, community centers, and businesses that have willingly allowed us to use their facilities as vote centers, we are forever grateful.

# INTRODUCTION

## What is a Vote Center?

A vote center is a place where any registered voter in the county can vote on Election Day. Vote centers bring to bear new technologies to revolutionize the voting process. Instead of traditional precinct-based polling sites on Election Day, the vote center concept calls for vote center locations where any registered voter from any precinct can go to cast their ballot and retrieve their correct ballot. Every precinct ballot type is available at every vote center location. In addition, because of electronic poll books, when a voter signs in at one vote center, every other vote center's electronic poll book is automatically updated to reflect that voter as having cast their ballot.

## Why Clinton County?

Since 2007, Indiana has been experimenting with the vote center concept through a pilot program launched by the Indiana Secretary of State's office and the Indiana General Assembly. In 2011, the Indiana General Assembly passed legislation to allow any Indiana county to pursue becoming a vote center county. Since 2007, government and civic leaders in Clinton County have been observing vote centers' impact on voters and election administration. The pilot programs showed that vote centers streamlined election administration and improved voter convenience. In addition, vote center counties have seen a cost reduction in their elections over time.

Because of these results from the pilot programs in Indiana (which can be found at [www.VoteCenters.IN.gov](http://www.VoteCenters.IN.gov)), leaders in Clinton County decided to pursue this exciting new approach to election administration for the 2015 Election Cycle.

## What is required to become a Vote Center County?

Indiana Code 3.11-18.1-3 sets forth the requirements for a county to become a vote center county. The first step to becoming a vote center county requires a draft vote center plan which details specifics of how such a transition would occur. This document serves as the vote center plan for Clinton County. Indiana Code 3-11-18.1-4 sets forth the requirements of a county's vote center plan. Once a draft plan is submitted for public review and comment at a public meeting of the County Election Board, the opportunity for the public to review the draft plan and submit comments must remain open for 30 days. After 30 days of opportunity for the public to review and comment on the draft plan, the County Election Board holds another public meeting to consider all public comments and then votes to adopt the vote center plan as is or as amended. In order for the county to become a vote center county, the County Election Board must by unanimous vote approve a vote center plan, and the County Commissioners and County Council must approve by majority vote resolutions approving the status of the county as a vote center county.

If all three of those things occur, the plan must be filed with the Indiana Election Division and Clinton County will officially become a vote center county. Any future amendments to the plan or a decision to return to traditional precinct-based elections must be voted on by unanimous vote of the County Election Board and filed with the Indiana Election Division.

# OVERVIEW OF THE PROCESS

## The Vote Center Task Force

Once a vote center plan is adopted by the County Election Board and filed with the Indiana Election Division, the County Election Board, the County Election Staff, County IT Staff, and the Indiana Team from KNOWink innovative election solutions (Collectively known as "the Vote Center Task Force") will move forward with preparing for this major change in Election Administration for the 2015 Election cycle.

The Task Force is made up of people with tremendous experience in the election process. The County Election Board has a track record of working in a bipartisan way to ensure the process is free and fair. The County Election Staff works hard year round preparing Clinton County for elections. Our County IT Staff continue to be a tremendous asset to this process. Our voting machine vendor brings to the table experienced managers who both understand Indiana law, the vote center concept, and have an intimate knowledge of electronic poll books.

## The Voting Equipment

Clinton County has and will continue to use Micro Vote Infinity voting machines for elections.

## Electronic Poll Book

Clinton County has reviewed numerous electronic poll book options and has decided to recommend to the Clinton County Commissioners to utilize KNOWink innovative election solutions, pending contract negotiations ongoing with the Clinton County Commissioners. This electronic poll book will be securely connected to every vote center and to the County Election Board at the Clinton County Courthouse on Election Day. It will securely connect every satellite vote center and meets all standards set out by Indiana law under IC 3-11-8-10.3. In addition, KNOWink election managers have intimate knowledge and experience with electronic poll books.

## E-POLL BOOK DESCRIPTION AND SECURITY

We will use iPad Air notebooks with software and peripherals provided by KNOWink as described on Appendix F.

During Election Day, a poll worker using the KNOWink system cannot open other programs on the unit, as it is a dedicated electronic poll book. In addition, the electronic poll books cannot be accessed without the coordinated action of two (2) precinct election officers who are not members of the same political party. The precinct election officers will be provided passwords.

When a voter arrives at the vote center, his/her eligibility will be brought up on the KNOWink screen. In a primary election, the clerk will indicate which party ballot the voter has requested (Republican or Democrat). The system will record the time that the voter was checked in and the records will be updated back to the Clinton County Clerk's Office/Voter Registration office main server. The updated record will be available instantly to the County Election Board and the electronic poll books used by

precinct election officers at all other vote centers in Clinton County. If a voter attempts to vote again, the database will show him/her to be ineligible.

### **Method for Providing Data**

The E-poll books from KNOWink comes with printers that will attach to each unit that will allow precinct election officials or officials at election central to print lists of voters who have voted by precinct. Reports can also be downloaded and emailed out.

### **Satellite Vote Centers**


A key element to the success of the vote center concept has been the concept of satellite vote centers, which are sites open as determined by the Election Board during the 29 day period prior to each Election Day. Satellite vote centers are places where any voter in the county may vote early absentee-in-person. As required under IC 3-11-10-26.3 and IC 3-11-18.1-4(16), Clinton County will designate seven (7) satellite vote centers, in addition to the courthouse. In vote center counties, early voting percentages have risen dramatically, allowing the fewer locations on Election Day itself to work well. ### **Poll Workers**

Clinton County will require fewer poll workers to administer Election Day vote centers. However, the use of poll workers will increase during the week prior to an Election Day, in order to staff the satellite vote centers. Each satellite vote center and Election Day vote center will have at least one traditional precinct election board made up of an Inspector, at least two election judges of opposite parties, and then at least two clerks of opposite parties, depending on the election size and location of the vote center. Training procedures for poll workers will be designed so each poll worker will be able to complete every function.

### **Vote Center Layout**

Vote centers will be set up differently based on location, but the general layout of a vote center in Clinton County will be as follows:

**Voter Education Efforts**

The Clinton County Election Board has a full media and community outreach strategy that will involve press releases to widely circulated newspapers, television stations, and radio stations. In addition, we will use our county website ([www.co.Clinton.in.us](http://www.co.Clinton.in.us)) and the state's voter information website ([www.IndianaVoters.com](http://www.IndianaVoters.com)) to prepare Clinton County citizens for this change. Moreover, each voter will receive a postcard in the mail prior to the initial elections, informing them of this change and where each vote center is located. We will also plan to attend community events where the Circuit Court Clerk, her staff and the Election Board will speak about the change. Here is a copy of our **sample press release**:

FRANKFORT- Effective for the May 2015 election, Clinton County will officially gain status as a vote center county.

"I am so excited that Clinton County has decided to make the switch to vote centers," County Clerk Sherri Crews said. "It's taken a lot of planning and hard work from all those involved, but the benefits to the voters of our county will be well worth the effort we have spent implementing the new model."

Simply put, vote centers are polling places where any eligible voter in the county may go to vote. They eliminate the need for traditional polling places and allow voters in the county more flexibility regarding when and where they cast their ballots. Vote centers throughout the county are linked by secure

internet connections and an electronic poll book is instantaneously updated as ballots are cast. In addition, significant cost saving are expected over time.

Wayne, Tippecanoe and Cass counties piloted the vote center program in Indiana from 2007-2010. Now, because of the success those counties experienced, both the Indiana House and Senate passed legislation that allows all Indiana counties the option of becoming a vote center county.

Clinton County will implement the use of vote centers during the upcoming May 8, 2015 Primary Election.

“Ultimately, our goal is to make voting easier and more convenient for the voters of our county while also saving county money,” County Clerk Crews said. “As always, we value the feedback of our constituents and encourage you to voice your questions or concerns.”

## **VOTE CENTER AND SATELLITE VOTE CENTER LOCATIONS**

Clinton County plans to utilize 8 vote center locations for State and Federal elections. Indiana Code 3-11-18.1-6 only requires one vote center per 10,000 active voters, but the Clinton County Election Board plans to provide one vote center per roughly 2800 active voters.

The following are vote center locations to be open on Election Day:

Community Schools of Frankfort Superintendent's Office

Paul Philippe Resource Center, Burgin Hall

Wesley Manor Retirement Center,

Colfax Town Hall

Kirklin Town Hal

Michigantown Library

Mulberry Health and Retirement Center

Rossville, Bennett Hall.

The satellite vote center locations, except Wesley Manor will be open the Friday and Saturday preceding election Day.

The number of vote centers to be operated for Municipal elections shall be determined based upon whether towns request the Election Board to conduct their election. For the city of Frankfort Municipal election three (3) vote centers will operate on election day and two (2) will operate as early voting centers the Friday and Saturday preceding the election.

For all elections the Courthouse will have early voting during the absentee period and will be open the two Saturdays prior to the election.

NOTE: Voters from every precinct may vote at any vote center location or satellite vote center location. Every ballot style for each precinct in Clinton County will be available at each vote center and each satellite vote center (Depending on the Election, the number of ballot styles varies greatly; therefore, this plan does not attempt to provide a specific number of ballot styles). Each vote center and early vote center will be connected to all other voter centers or early vote centers (as well as to the County Election Board) via electronic poll books connected via secured internet lines. At least two electronic poll book terminals will be available at each location. Each location, depending on the election, will also have at least one precinct election board, meaning one inspector, at least two judges of opposite parties, and at least two poll clerks of opposite parties. (See Appendix A for Certification that each location above is accessible to voters with disabilities as required by the Help American Vote Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act)

## **SECURITY**

### **Key Players**

The following narrative describes what would happen in case of an emergency during an election. The first responders to any emergency, either man-made or natural event, are local citizens. Poll workers, volunteers, and police and fire personnel will be the first to identify the problem. The next level of response will come from the Clinton County Commissioners and the Clinton County Election Board in cooperation with the local emergency management agency. If deemed necessary by the County Commissioners, the Office of the Governor (whose resources included IDHS, the Indiana National Guard, and the state police) and the Office of the Secretary of State's Election Division will be contacted for emergency assistance. In addition, any action taken either by the Office of the Governor or the Office of the Secretary of State may be taken in consultation with the Office of the Attorney General to ensure that interpretations of the laws are correct.

### **General Situations**

Five general situations exist in which decision-making may occur regarding the election process and activities in Clinton County:

- Situation Normal – the status quo exists and the process moves forward according to normal laws and procedures.
- Isolated Emergencies – individual precincts or parts of the county experience disruption to the election process and local agencies respond accordingly.
- Regional Emergencies – an emergency involving Clinton County and neighboring counties exists and a state-level response is required.
- Catastrophic Emergencies inside Indiana – a large disaster exists that diverts the resources and attention of the citizenry and a state-level response in cooperation with the federal government is required.
- Catastrophic Emergencies outside Indiana – a large disaster exists in the United States that diverts the resources and attention of the citizenry and a federal-level response is required.

### Local Preparation and Response

The Clinton County Commissioners have worked closely with the local emergency management director, the county sheriff, and local police and fire stations to ensure Clinton County is prepared for emergencies. In addition, the Clinton County Commissioners will be in close communication with the County Election Board should any emergency occur on or surrounding the election process.

In this endeavor to be prepared for an emergency that could occur on or surrounding an Election Day, Clinton County has taken the following steps prior to each Election Day:

- Review of IC 3-11-8-3.2 which outlines procedures for changing polling locations.
- Review of state's Quantity Purchasing Agreements (QPA) whereby Clinton County may buy or lease emergency generators and other supplies.
- Contact is made with power companies to ensure all vote centers have power on Election Day.
- The Clinton County Information Technology Department and Election Systems and Software will have employees at the Courthouse and in the field on Election Day in the event of any disruption.
- In the event of a power failure at a vote center, the voting machines and e-poll books will be switched automatically to a battery backup.
- In the event that the internet is inaccessible at a vote center location, the eligibility of a voter will be ascertained from records maintained by the Clinton County Voter Registration office via telephone/cell phone.

## **I.C. 3-11-18.1-4 COMPLIANCE CHECKLIST**

### Explanation

The following 17 items are the requirements for a vote center plan as defined in Indiana Code 3-11-18.1-4. Following each of the 17 requirements a page number listed in red type references where in this Clinton County Vote Center Plan the particular requirement(s) is met.

(1) The total number of vote centers to be established.

(2) The location of each vote center.

(3) The effective date of the order.

The order shall take effect immediately upon the filing of the order with the Indiana Election Division, pursuant to I.C. 3-11-18.1-8.

(4) The following information according to the computerized list (as defined in IC 3-7-26.3-2) as of the date of the order: (A) The total number of voters within the county. (B) The number of active voters within the county. (C) The number of inactive voters within the county.

(5) For each vote center designated under subdivision (2), a list of the precincts whose polls will be located at the vote center consistent with section 13 of this chapter.

See Page 9 "Note" for explanation that all precincts will be located at all vote centers. See Appendix D for a list of current county precincts.

(6) For each vote center designated under subdivision (2), the number of precinct election boards that will be appointed to administer an election at the vote center.

See Page 9 "Note" for an estimation of precinct election boards at each designated vote center location. See Page 6 regarding additional election judges and clerks.

(7) For each precinct election board designated under subdivision (6), the number and name of each precinct the precinct election board will administer consistent with section 13 of this chapter.

See Page 9 "Note" for explanation that all precincts will be located at all vote centers. Therefore, all precinct election boards will administer elections for all precincts in the county. See Appendix D for a list of current county precincts.

(8) For each vote center designated under subdivision 2), the number and title of the precinct election board will be appointed to serve at the vote center.

See Page 11 "Note" and page 6 for an estimation of the number of precinct election officials at each vote center location. Titles for precinct election officials will remain the same (also see Page 11 "Note").

(9) For each vote center designated under subdivision (2): (A) the number and type of ballot variations that will be provided at the vote center; and (B) whether these ballots will be: (i) delivered to the vote center before the opening of the polls; or (ii) printed on demand for a voter's use.

See Page 9 "Note" for the explanation that every ballot style will be available at each satellite vote center and each vote center. The exact number of ballot styles will vary by election. See Page 5 "The Voting Equipment" for a description of how ballots will be provided to voters. Provisional ballots will be issued by paper ballots so that each provisional ballot can be ruled on separately by the County Election Board following an election.

(10) A detailed description of any hardware, firmware, or software used: (A) to create an electronic poll list for each precinct whose polls are to be located at a vote center; or (B) to establish a secure electronic connection between the county election board and the precinct election officials

administering a vote center.

See Pages 5, and 6 for a complete description of the e-poll book equipment and procedures to be used in Clinton County.

(11) A description of the equipment and procedures to be used to ensure that information concerning a voter entered into any electronic poll list used by precinct election officers at a vote center is immediately accessible to: (A) the county election board; and (B) the electronic poll lists used by precinct election officers at all other vote centers in the county.

See Pages 5, and 6 for a complete description of the e-poll book equipment and procedures to be used in Clinton County.

(12) For each precinct designated under subdivision (5), the number of electronic poll lists to be provided for the precinct.

Each vote center will have every precinct's poll list in electronic form. At least two electronic poll books will be available at each vote center. (See Page 9 "Note")

(13) The security and contingency plans to be implemented by the county to do all of the following: (A) Prevent a disruption of the vote center process. (B) Ensure that the election is properly conducted if a disruption occurs. (C) Prevent access to an electronic poll list without the coordinated action of two (2) precinct election officers who are not members of the same political party.

(14) A certification that the vote center complies with the accessibility requirements applicable to polling places under IC 3-11-8.

(15) A sketch depicting the planned layout of the vote center, indicating the location of: (A) equipment; and (B) precinct election officers; within the vote center.

(16) The total number and locations of satellite offices to be established under IC 3-11-10-26.3 at vote center locations designated under subdivision (2) to allow voters to cast absentee ballots in accordance with IC 3-11. However, a plan must provide for at least one (1) vote center to be established as a satellite office under IC 3-11-10-26.3 on the two (2) Saturdays immediately preceding an election day.

(17) The method and timing of providing voter data to persons who are entitled to receive the data under this title. Data shall be provided to all persons entitled to the data without unreasonable delay.
