Cover up to 80% of the cost of care for children

50k scholarships available to Hoosier workers and their children

The Indiana Family and Social Services Administration Build, Learn, Grow initiative has made 50,000 scholarships available to help get Hoosier children from families working in essential industries—regardless of income—enrolled in early care and education, summer learning or out-of-school care. Scholarships will cover up to 80% of the early care and education program's tuition for each child age 12 and younger. Information is available at www. BuildLearnGrow.org.

For families to qualify for Build, Learn, Grow scholarships, an adult in the household must work in an essential business (examples include health care, human services, retail, restaurant and food service, essential infrastructure, media, manufacturing and logistics, religious and charitable organizations and many others).

Families will qualify for the Build, Learn, Grow scholarship to cover 80% of their cost with incomes of up to 250% of the federal poverty level. Families with incomes between 251% and 400% of FPL will qualify for 60% of costs covered and those with incomes at 401% of FPL and above will qualify for 20% of costs covered.

The scholarships are funded by more than \$101 million provided to

Indiana by the federal Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, or CRRSA.

To administer the Build, Learn, Grow scholarship program, the Office of Early Childhood and Out-of-School Learning has partnered with Early Learning Indiana and Indiana Afterschool Network, the state's leading organizations supporting early care and education and out-of-school-time programs. Supporting young children and their families in inclusive child care

Every young child and their family have the right to quality early child-hood care and education. Therefore, for families that have young children with developmental delays and medical conditions, it can be challenging to find child care without support. In this INBest Practice, you will discover ways you can support families as they navigate inclusive child care.

What is inclusive child care and education?

Early childhood inclusion is the belief and practice that all children have the right to access and participate in high-quality early childhood care and education. It is through inclusive values, program policies and classroom practices that young children with developmental delays and medical conditions experience full membership, participation and a sense of belonging. When programs have supports and engage in collaboration with families, child care and early intervention providers, inclusive child care can be successful for everyone.

How can First Steps providers support families and collaborate with child care programs?

As a First Steps provider, you are in a unique position to support families as they learn how to advocate for their child and navigate inclusive child care. It is through intentional conversations that you can best understand the family's needs and



Access

Participation

All children have what they need to participate and be engaged in play and learning.



Supports

The child care program has supports for their staff to create inclusive experiences and policies.

open doors to meaningful collaboration with programs. As you collaborate with families and child care programs, you will enhance outcomes for children, families' capacity to meet specific needs and inclusive child care opportunities.

Consider the following recommendations as you support families and collaborate with child care programs:

- ▶ Begin a conversation with families about child care. Ask families open-ended questions that will help you identify how to best support the child in their child care program. For example, "What concerns do you have about child care?" or "Are there ways that I can help support your child at school?"
- Encourage families to share essential information with their child's teacher and program. This can include Individualized Family Service Plan outcomes, treatment plans and team meeting dates. With the program present at the IFSP meeting, you can collaborate with the family and child care provider to exchange knowledge and ways to implement interventions at home and in the classroom.
- Collaborate with the family and

- child care program to create specific intervention plans for child care. Due to classroom factors such as the environment and supports available to the teacher, it is critical to collaborate in order to empower the program to implement interventions in the classroom.
- Model interventions to the family as well as the teacher. Teachers are likely to implement an intervention if they are able to watch the intervention being modeled in the classroom during the targeted activity. If needed, this will also help you modify the intervention for the environment.

However, as documented in the First Steps Policy Manual, please remember to retain your certificate of attendance documentation for a period of seven years.

First Steps providers needed for study

FGRBI update

Professional development opportunities

Last year, First Steps announced the adoption of the Family Guided Routines-Based Intervention model for early intervention home visiting. This family coaching model focuses on partnering with families to help caregivers support child development within the context of typical family routines.

The shift to FGRBI will not happen overnight and it will involve the entire early intervention system. In an effort to build awareness and create readiness, First Steps has partnered with Dr. Juliann Woods at Florida State University, the creator of FGRBI, to provide a series of professional development opportunities. You can find multiple webinars on the new IN EIHub Learning Management System.

If you attended the 2021 virtual First Steps Conference, you had an opportunity to participate in a pre-conference workshop and breakout session facilitated by Dr. Woods. Recordings are now available on the conference platform and will be made available in the LMS within the next few months.

A cohort of 15 First Steps providers just completed the first FGRBI Community of Practice, which included special access to a series of learning modules and monthly meetings with Dr. Woods to discuss the content, ask questions and share their feedback on how they used FGRBI techniques in their own practice.

As the First Steps state team works to craft a multi-year plan to introduce and implement the FGRBI model, provider and stakeholder feedback will be critical. Beginning in August and September, Indiana University Early Childhood Center staff will be extending an invitation to provider agencies across the state to provide feedback on the new model. Mission: To partner with Hoosier families whose young children are experiencing developmental delays and connect them with services that help them promote their child's development.


Vision: All Indiana families have a strong foundation to advocate for their infants and toddlers to grow and flourish to their highest potential.
