Chris Lowery

Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education

Chris Lowery was appointed in 2022 to serve as Commissioner for Indiana's Commission for Higher Education, the coordinating agency charged with ensuring the state's postsecondary education system is aligned to meet the needs of students and the state. Prior to joining the Commission, Lowery was senior vice president, workforce, careers and adult strategy at Ivy Tech Community College where he provided overall leadership of Ivy Tech workforce and career initiatives and organization. Before working in higher education, Lowery led public policy and engagement for Hillenbrand, Inc. and served as an aide to former Indiana Governor Robert D. Orr and then-Senator Dan Quayle.



As Commissioner, Lowery is committed to increasing college completion by improving the college-going rate, engaging adult learners and ensuring

students of all ages understand the value proposition of higher education. He collaborates with policymakers, higher education leaders and community partners to maintain college affordability and guarantee quality higher education is delivered and tied to career relevance as the Commission continues its efforts to realize the state's goal of at least 60 percent of Hoosiers with quality education and training beyond high school.

Currently, Lowery is on the Board of Trustees of the Sagamore Institute think tank where he previously served as chair. Additionally, he serves on the Boards of Directors of AgriNovus Indiana and Shepherd Community. He's also a member of the Advisory Council for the Council for Adult and Experiential Learning.

Lowery was Chair of the Career Coaching and Navigation Action Team for Governor Eric Holcomb's Workforce Cabinet. He has served on various other boards of directors including Gleaners Food Bank, the Indiana Construction Roundtable Foundation, the Indiana Council for Continuing Education, the State Workforce Innovation Council, the Distinguished Alumni Council of the Indiana University O'Neill School of Public Affairs and the Batesville Community School Corporation. He is a regular speaker in Indiana and nationally on topics ranging from the future of higher education, the economy and workforce preparedness to innovation, leadership and social impact investing.

Lowery holds the degree of Bachelor of Science in Public Affairs from Indiana University and a Master of Science in Management from Indiana Wesleyan University.


Jud Fisher

Dr. Edward Berger

Faculty Commission Member, Indiana Commission for Higher Education Associate Vice Provost for Learning Innovation, and Director of the Innovation Hub, Purdue University

Professor of Engineering Education and Mechanical Engineering, Purdue University

Edward Berger is the Inaugural Associate Vice Provost for Learning Innovation, and Director of the Innovation Hub, as well as Professor of Engineering Education and Mechanical Engineering at Purdue University. He is also the Executive Director of the Mechanical Engineering Education Research Center at Purdue (MEERCat Purdue), which pursues fundamental research and research-to-practice projects in student success, teaching with technology, and institutional culture and change. He has been a tenured engineering professor at three institutions (University of Cincinnati 1996-2004, University of Virginia 2005-2014, Purdue University 2014-present).



He began his faculty career with a research portfolio broadly in the area of tribomechanics, including dynamics of interfaces and structures with friction. From 2005-2010, his research portfolio underwent a transformation into engineering education research, and since then he has be a PI or co-PI on \$12M+ in federally-funded projects for engineering education research. He has 50+ journal publications across mechanical engineering and engineering education topics. In 2008, he won a Commonwealth of Virginia state-wide teaching award for his integration of technology into undergraduate education.

He recently completed an IPA assignment at the National Science Foundation (August 2019 – December 2020) in the Engineering Directorate, Division of Engineering Education and Centers. He oversaw a \$15M annual budget for engineering education research and collaborated across the agency on programs including ERC, AI Institutes, and Advanced Manufacturing.




Chad Addie

Chad Addie seeks to be a transformational educator and workforce innovator. He currently serves as the Assistant Superintendent of College and Workforce Readiness for South Bend Community School Corporation. Changing the face of Education through strength-focused, workforce-infused learning is a personal passion. As a K-12 School Administrator with graduate degrees from Indiana University-South Bend and Bethel University (Mishawaka), Chad leads the development of system-wide career pathway programs and facilities that build opportunities inclusive for all students.

As a result of exceptional community partnerships, the U.S. Department of Education awarded Chad's team with a 7-year federal GEAR UP grant of \$13.2 million in 2021 to benefit 2400 students in their postsecondary college and workforce development journeys. Subsequently, the GEAR UP South Bend! work was selected to be highlighted before the U.S. House of Representatives DOL/HHS/EDUCATION subcommittee and entered into the congressional record in testimony in March 2023.



Prior to joining the Commission, Michelle served as the director of Purdue Promise at Purdue University and previously worked for the University of Kentucky in New Student & Parent Programs.






Greg Harrell

Director of Academic Affairs & Talent Credentialing at the Indiana Commission for Higher Education



Karen L. Dace is vice chancellor for Diversity, Equity & Inclusion at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI). Previously, she served as Deputy Chancellor for Diversity, Access & Equity at the University of Missouri-Kansas City and Associate Vice President for Diversity at the University of Utah. She holds a tenured faculty appointment in Communication Studies and is an adjunct professor in Africana Studies at IUPUI.

Dace had a joint faculty appointment in the Department of Communication and in the Ethnic Studies Program which housed American Indian Studies, Asian Pacific American



Studies, African American Studies and Chicana/o Studies while at the University of Utah. She served Director of the Ethnic Studies Program with a faculty of 20-25 tenure-track scholars as well as Director of African American Studies at the University of Utah. As the Associate Vice President for Diversity at the University of Utah, the following offices reported to Dr. Dace: Women & Gender Studies Program; Ethnic Studies Program; American Indian Resource Center; Utah Opportunity Scholars; Center for the Study of Empowered Students of Color; Center for Ethnic Student Affairs; LGBT Student Center; and the Utah Math, Engineering and Science Achievement K-20 Consortium.

As the campus' first Chief Diversity Officer at the University of Missouri—Kansas City, Dace introduced a number of initiatives designed to enhance community-campus relations including the Cesar Chavez, Martin Luther King and Pride Lectures, as well as the First-Year Book and Lecture Program. Additionally, she revamped the tenure-track search process and instituted a faculty retention program to ensure the university held on to faculty.

Dr. Dace's research and teaching experience includes gender and race relations, intercultural communication, conflict management and decision-making. In 2012, she edited, and contributed two chapters to, Unlikely Allies in the Academy: Women of Color and White Women in Conversation (Routledge), a book that brought together 10 women of Color and 10 White women to discuss the challenges, barriers and successes in creating alliances across race in university settings. A native of Chicago, Dr. Dace earned bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Illinois at Chicago and the doctorate in Communication Studies from the University of Iowa.
