Chris Lowery

Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education

Chris Lowery was appointed in 2022 to serve as Commissioner for Indiana's Commission for Higher Education, the coordinating agency charged with ensuring the state's postsecondary education system is aligned to meet the needs of students and the state. Prior to joining the Commission, Lowery was senior vice president, workforce, careers, and adult strategy at Ivy Tech Community College where he provided overall leadership of Ivy Tech workforce and career initiatives and organization. Before working in higher education, Lowery led public policy and engagement for Hillenbrand, Inc. and served as an aide to former Indiana Governor Robert D. Orr and then-Senator Dan Quayle.



As Commissioner, Lowery is committed to increasing postsecondary attainment, economic and social mobility and outcomes, and return on investment by increasing the college-going rate, engaging adult learners, improving completion rates, and retaining college graduates. He is focused on ensuring students of all ages understand the value proposition of higher education. He collaborates with policymakers, higher education leaders and community partners to maintain college affordability and guarantee quality higher education is delivered and tied to career relevance as the Commission continues its efforts to realize the state's goal of at least 60 percent of Hoosiers with quality education and training beyond high school.

Currently, Lowery serves on the Boards of the Richard M. Fairbanks Foundation, United Ways of Central Indiana and Executive Committee, Council for Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL), and the Higher Education Working Group of the American Enterprise Institute. In addition, he serves on the Board and Executive Committee of the State Higher Education Executive Organization.

Lowery is a recipient of the Sagamore of the Wabash, the Distinguished Alumni Award of the Indiana University O'Neill School of Public Affairs, and the Distinguished Alumni Award of Indiana Wesleyan University. In addition, he was named to the "Indiana 250" most influential business leader by the Indianapolis Business Journal in 2023 and 2024. He is a regular speaker in Indiana and nationally on topics ranging from the future of higher education, the economy and workforce preparedness to innovation, leadership, and social impact investing. Lowery holds a Bachelor of Science in Public Affairs from Indiana University and a Master of Science in Management from Indiana Wesleyan University.

Chad Lochmiller

Faculty Commission Member Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education

Chad Lochmiller, Ph.D., is an Associate Professor in the School of Education at Indiana University and currently chairs the Department of Educational Leadership and Policy Studies. In addition, he serves as Associate Director for Policy and Advocacy with the University Council for Educational Administration (UCEA), a national consortium of more than 100 research-intensive universities. His research examines education policy issues that are relevant to both K-12 and higher education. For example, he has evaluated career ladder programs in community colleges, studied participation in dual enrollment and dual credit programs, assessed the structure of workforce training



activities, and examined workforce issues for classroom teachers and education professionals. He has also studied funding practices and allocation formulas for K-12 schools. His current research is focused on the continuous improvement of educational programs.

Professionally, Lochmiller has served as a delegate to the Carnegie Project on the Education Doctorate, a member of the National Faculty for Improvement Science with the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, a fellow with the Big10 Academic Alliance's Departmental Executive Officer's Program and has been deeply involved in accreditation activities related to the Council for the Advancement of Educator Preparation. He is a past recipient of the UCEA Jack A. Culbertson Early Career Award, and his published work has appeared in *Educational Administration Quarterly*, Journal of Educational Administration, and other outlets. Lochmiller earned his Ph.D. in Education Policy from the University of Washington in 2010.

educators. Dr. Leftwich investigates ways to teach
computer science and ways to prepare preservice and inservice teachers to teach CS. She is a co-PI for the ECEP
alliance, which seeks to broaden participation in



computing at the K-16 levels. Her research focuses on the adoption and implementation of technology and computer science at the K-12 levels.
