
FRANK O'BANNON GRANT (FOB)

- Indiana's primary need-based financial aid program for Indiana residents attending Indiana institutions.
- Made up of two separate awards:
 - ► Higher Education Awards (IC 21-12-3) for public/proprietary institutions
 - ➤ Freedom of Choice Grant (IC 21-12-4) for private institutions


FRANK O'BANNON GRANT (FOB) CONTINUED

- Since fiscal year (FY) 2021, the Indiana General Assembly has appropriated \$167.7M annually for FOB Grants.
 - This continues for both FY 2026 and FY 2027.
- Last year, more than 37,000 students were served by this grant, over half of all State scholarship recipients.
- This represents \$167.7M of approximately \$400M total in state student financial aid each year for postsecondary education and training.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS PER STATUTE



Per IC 21-12-3-1 and IC-12-4-2, to be eligible, a student must:

- ► Be an Indiana resident by December 31, the year prior to applying for aid.
- Remain a resident throughout academic year.
- ► Be a U.S. Citizen or <u>eligible non-citizen</u>;
- Be a high school graduate or hold a GED;
- > Attend, or plan to attend, an <u>eligible Indiana postsecondary institution</u>;
- ➤ Be enrolled, or plan to enroll, in a course of study leading to an associates or first bachelor's degree; or must be seeking a certificate at Ivy Tech or Vincennes University;
- ► Be a full-time student, or plan to enroll as a full-time student;
- Abide by credit completion requirements each academic year to renew award:
 - **24-29 credit hours** earned will result in a 'Full-time' award amount
 - > 30 or more credit hours earned will result in an 'On-time' award amount (i.e. maximum award)
 - ▶ Must meet SAP (Satisfactory Academic Progress) requirements as determined by the institution the student is attending.
- File the FAFSA by the April 15, deadline each year.

FRANK O'BANNON GRANT FUNDING APPROVAL PROCESS & TIMELINE

- **Step 1:** Commission approval (IC 21-18.5-4-3(6)) November Commission Meeting (dependent on October claims data)
- **Step 2:** State Budget Committee review and approval (IC 21-18.5-4-3(6)) December State Budget Committee Meeting
- Step 3: Commission communicates to institutions after December State Budget Committee Meeting
- **Step 4:** Institutions release financial aid packages to students February/March (starts around Valentine's Day)
- Step 5: Institutions submit claims to Commission July through June
- Step 6: Commission releases funds to institutions July through June
- Step 7: Institutions release funds to students July through June


FRANK O'BANNON GRANT STUDENT EXPERIENCE & TIMELINE

Note: the below timeline is for students enrolling in the fall semester.

- **Step 1:** Student applies to college August through March (except for rolling admissions campuses)
- Step 2: Student files the FAFSA October through April (April 15, deadline for Indiana)
- Step 3: Student receives financial aid letters from institutions February through April
- **Step 4:** Student accepts admission offer May 1, national deadline (except for rolling admissions campuses)
- **Step 5:** Institutions release funds to students July through June (approximately half of the award is distributed in the fall; the remaining half is distributed in the spring)

FRANK O'BANNON GRANT HISTORICAL CONTEXT

For years, grant awards were lower than the annual appropriation.

- ➤ 2022 the Commission proposed increasing the maximum award amounts by 35% to return to pre-Great Recession levels.
- ► Early 2024 unexpected changes to the Federal Student Aid Index (SAI) calculations further increased spending.
- ► Late 2024 after federal changes to the FAFSA and Federal SAI calculations, the Commission recommended reducing the award schedule to realign spending to the state appropriation.
- ➤ 2025 Per HEA 1001, \$77.5M from the Frank O'Bannon multi-year reserves was reverted to the state's general fund.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- The Commission used the following as guiding principles for determining the 2026-2027 Frank O'Bannon Grant Schedule of Awards:
 - Continue to remove barriers to education beyond high school for Hoosier students and families.
 - Keep investment aligned with the appropriation.
 - Maintain a stable schedule to minimize award fluctuations for students.
 - Deliver a schedule in a timely manner to institutional partners.


FRANK O'BANNON GRANT CURRENT METHODOLOGY

- To predict future awards spending, the Commission utilizes the following factors:
 - Claims Data from Higher Education Institutions
 - Institution Type (public, private, etc.)
 - On-Time/Full-Time Designation of Recipients
 - FAFSA Completion Data
 - Federal Student Aid Index (SAI)



FRANK O'BANNON GRANT

FUTURE AWARD YEARS - PROJECTED



- ► All seven public institutions will hold tuition and fees flat through the 2026-2027 academic year.
- Recommendation: due to current financial projections, maintain the current award amounts for the 2026-2027 academic year.
- ➤ Per IC 21-12-3-20, <u>any remaining balance</u> can be transferred into the 21st Century Scholars Fund or Adult Student Grant Fund.


