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# COMMISSION RESPONSIBILITY

- ► IC 21-18-6-1 Purpose
  - Sec. 1. The general purposes of the commission are the following:
  - (1) Plan for and coordinate Indiana's state supported system of postsecondary education.
  - (2) Review appropriation requests of state educational institutions.
  - (3) Make recommendations to the governor, budget agency, or the general assembly concerning postsecondary education.
  - (4) Perform other functions assigned by the governor or the general assembly, except those functions specifically assigned by law to the governor's workforce cabinet under IC 22-4.1-19.
  - (5) Administer state financial aid programs under IC 21-18.5-4.
  - (6) Provide staff and office space for the board for proprietary education established by IC 21-18.5-5-1.

- Dual Credit: \$30.4M

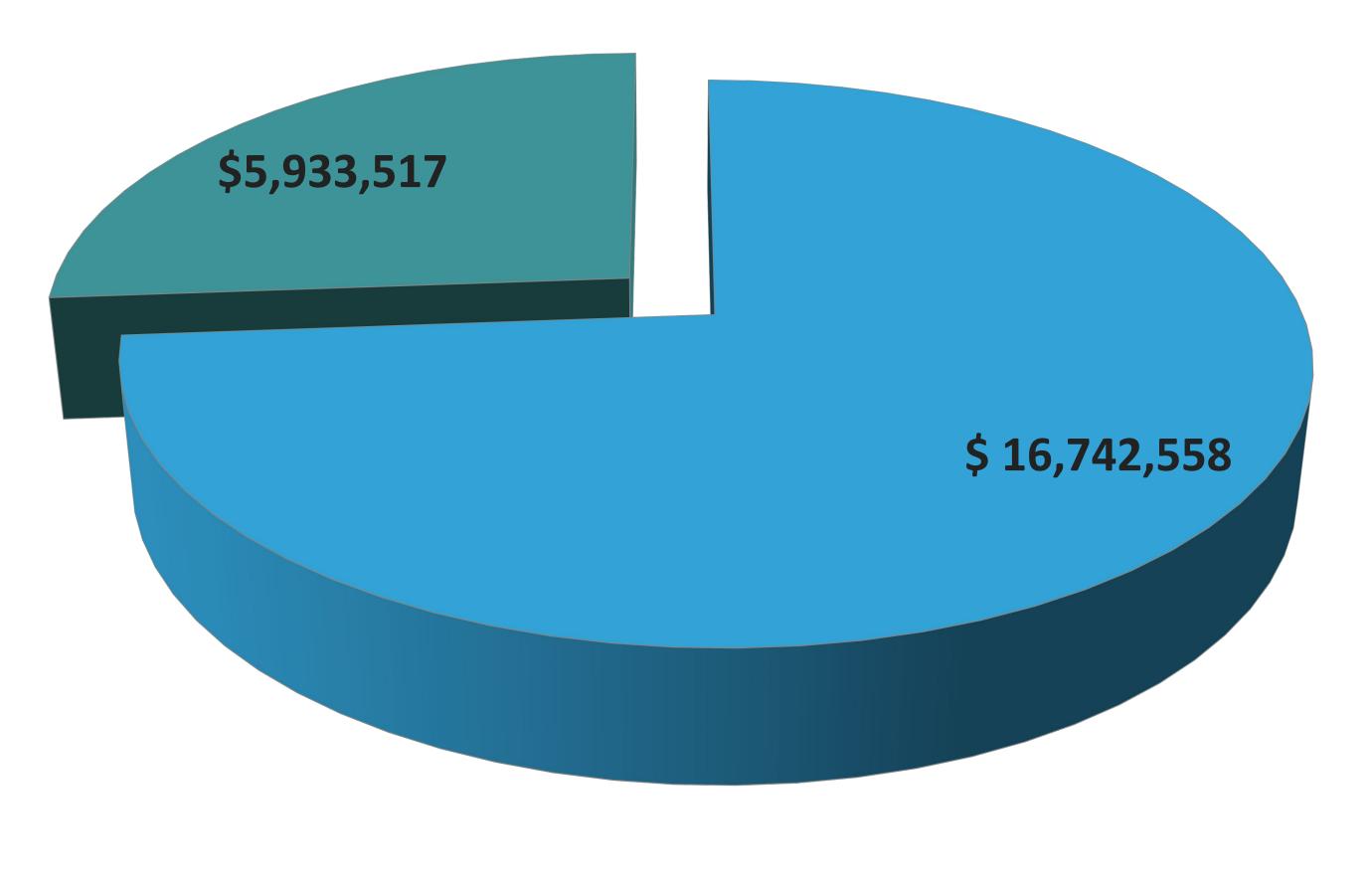


# OUTCOMES-BASED PERFORMANCE FUNDING UPDATE



# FY25 FUNDING OUTPUT

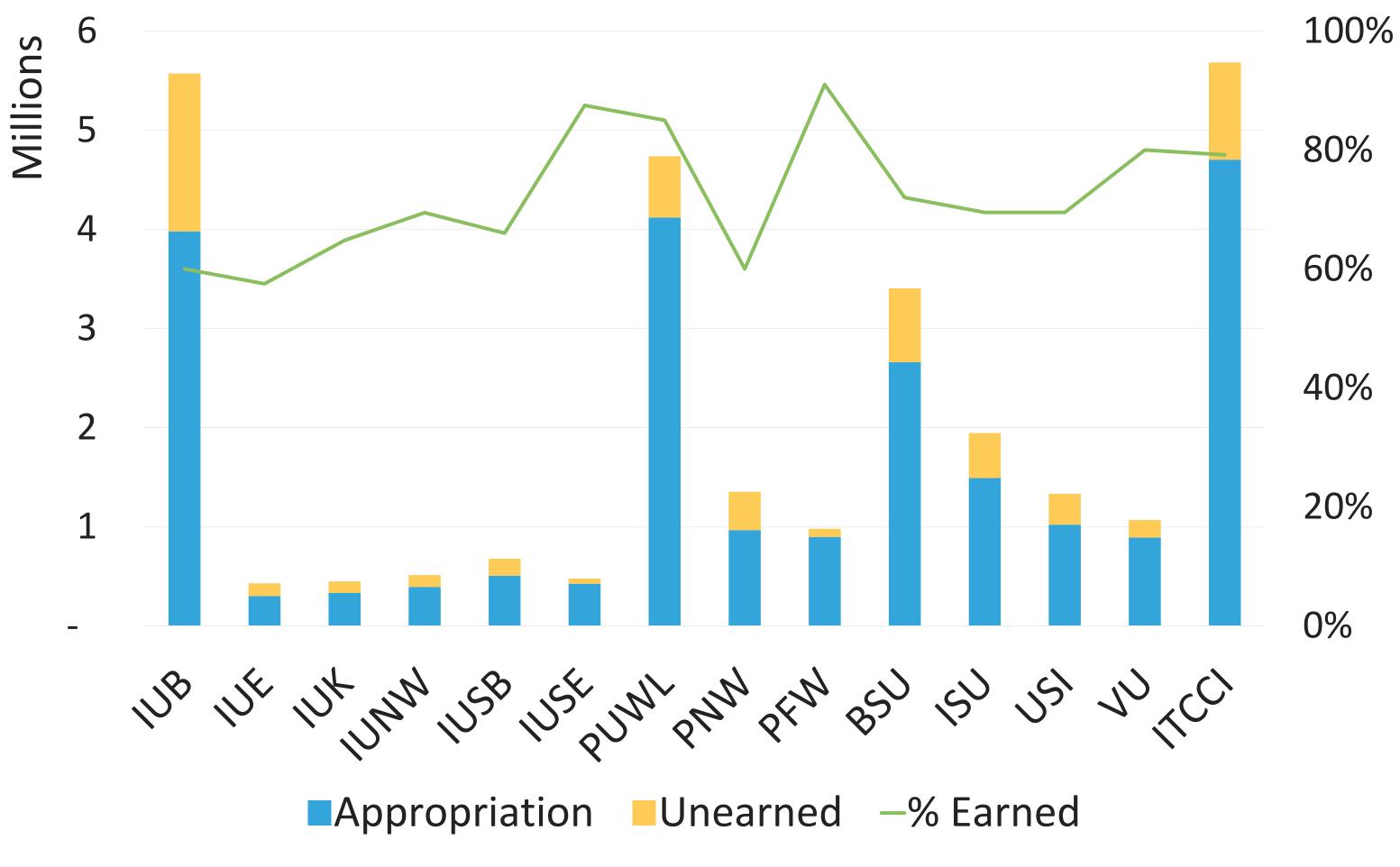
- ► Total Appropriation: \$22.6M
- > 74% funding earned
- CHE staff investigating potential legislative solutions to avoid reverting unearned monies.

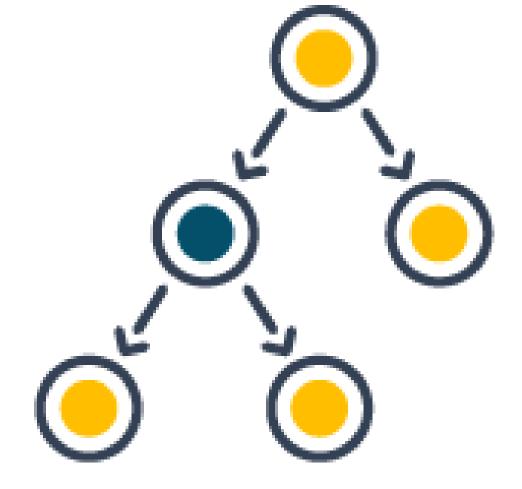
# COMMISSION BUDGET (FY25)

- Operating: \$8.5M
- Financial Aid: \$400M
  - ► 15+ unique scholarship and grant programs
- Other Grants: \$20M
  - Significant growth following HEA 1002
- One Time Funding: \$12.5M

# CAPITAL BUDGETING

### ► IC 21-18-17-1 Required presentation at budget hearings

- Sec. 1. In even-numbered years, the executive officer of the commission, or the executive officer's designee, shall present at the same time as budget hearings are held under IC 4-12-1-8 and at the meeting at which the commission makes its presentation under IC 21-18-9-1(3):
- (1) each of the capital projects for which the commission received funding requests from each state educational institution;
- (2) the capital projects that the commission recommends the state fund in the upcoming budget bill; and
- (3) how the capital projects recommended by the commission will advance the state's progress in meeting the goals outlined in the long range plan for postsecondary education developed under IC 21-18-8.



# COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION HISTORY

- 2023 #1 Priority for each System (\$476M)
- 2021 No capital (\$0)
- 2019 #1 Priority for each System (\$324M)
  - ▶ #1-3 for VU
  - #1 & 3 for ITCC
- 2017 #1 Priority for each System (\$382M)
  - ▶ #1-3 for VU
  - ► #1-2 for ITCC
- 2015 #1 Priority for each System (\$258M)



# UNIVERSITY SOLICITATION

- Focus on individual project merit (vs. formulaic distribution)
- Align with state need and initiatives
- Consider cost and enrollment trends
- Prioritize renovation over new construction
- Consider non-state dollars
- No penalty for a single project
- Reasonable cost comparisons
- Return on investment for taxpayers
- Establish priority criteria in advance

- Economic development
- Definition of R&R
- Flexibility of campus capital plan & budgeting
- Debt to operating ratio





# NATIONAL LANDSCAPE

- NASBO -2013 Study
  - 26 states use their General Fund
  - 44 states allow the use of student fees
  - 47 states allow for capital requests by state institutions
- SHEEO 2022 Member Survey
  - 47% of Coordinating Boards approve capital projects
  - ▶ 33% of Coordinating Boards approve capital funding
  - > 37% of Coordinating Boards plan capital projects
  - ▶ 17% of Coordinating Boards implement capital projects
- ► SHEEO 2022 SHEF Report
  - 21st ranking in state capital appropriations





### NATIONAL LANDSCAPE

- Oregon Higher Education Coordinating Commission
  - Capital rubric 100 points total
    - Strategic Capital Development Plan (52 points)
    - Operational Savings & Sustainability (8 points)
    - Life Safety, Security, or Loss of Use (10 points)
    - Institutional Priority (5 points)
    - Student Success for Underserved Populations (10 points)
    - Leveraging Institutional Resources (15 points)
