What are some examples of a 'rogue' character appearing in 19th century Hungarian novels?



The 19th century was a transformative period for Hungarian literature, as it saw the rise of national consciousness and the development of the Hungarian novel. During this time, numerous works featured roguish characters who embodied cunning, resourcefulness, and defiance of authority. These characters often served as critiques of societal norms or represented the romanticized outlaw archetype.

#### **Examples of Rogue Characters in 19th-Century Hungarian Novels:**

#### 1. Jókai Mór's Novels

Jókai Mór, one of Hungary's most prolific and celebrated authors, frequently included rogue-like characters in his works. These figures often combined charm, wit, and moral ambiguity:

- Sárga rózsa (The Yellow Rose, 1893): Features a roguish figure with deep ties to the Hungarian puszta (plains) culture, embodying the free-spirited nature of the betyár (outlaw).
- Az arany ember (The Man with the Golden Touch, 1872): While not a traditional rogue, the
  protagonist, Timár Mihály, navigates morally complex situations with a mix of
  resourcefulness and cunning, often bending the rules to secure his fortunes.

#### 2. Betyár (Outlaw) Stories

The betyár, a romanticized outlaw figure, became a staple of 19th-century Hungarian literature.


These characters, often based on real historical figures, operated outside the law but were seen as folk heroes:

#### **Distribution of Assessment Scores by Treatment Condition**




