	<u>Prevention:</u> Due to COVID-19, a couple of the prevention programs that were normally implemented in the high school and middle school, were unable to fully use their funds and had to return them to the auditor. To mitigate any possible future spending difficulties, we will encourage grantees to submit an amendment to their application. This will allow for grantees, if approved, to adjust their program and ensure they use all of the awarded funds.		
	<u>Justice Services:</u> The LCC only received one application, which was from the Sheriff's Department. Historically, this has been a category that sees a lower amount of applicants. To bolster the amount of applications in the future, we will recruit more members within the justice services category and enhance out communication with entities within this category, such as probation services, court services and public safety programs. By increasing contact and membership within this category, we should see an increase in applications in the justice services category.

<u>Problem Statement 2, Goal 2:</u> This goal was not on track to be achieved because of the disruption of the prevention programming in the schools and therefore the youth of the community were not reached as we had planned. The goal was to decrease the amount school expulsions related to youth substance abuse by 10 students during the course of the year. Because school was not regularly held in person, and it is unknown when students will return to a permanent in person schedule, we are going to extend this goal from until the end of 2023 in order to make it more achievable.

<u>Problem Statement 3, Goal 1:</u> This goal was not achieved because we did not grant enough dollars to justice services. The goal was to increase the amount of substance use related arrests by 2% by the end of the year. This goal was not meant to encourage substance use, but rather to enhance justice services pursuit of substance use interdiction. Because we only received one application, we did not fully expend justice services funding. Based on the arrests reports provided to us from local law enforcement, it appears that there was no increase in the amount of substance use arrests over the course of the year. Therefore, we are adjusting our goal to increase substance use arrests by 1% and ensuring that we are able to expend all of the justice services dollars.
