

## Plan Summary

**Mission Statement:** To provide an organization through which the community can develop, plan, and implement coordinated, comprehensive efforts to address adult and youth substance abuse and to reduce the negative effects associated with such abuse.

**History:** The Shelby County Comprehensive Community Plan is the culmination of a long collaborative process. It represents several years of effort by various community leaders, concerned citizens, elected officials and human service providers. The Coalition itself is the result of a recognized need for a more coordinated and organized effort, which officially began on September 28, 1990. Its broad-based representation draws from all segments of the community. The group has also drawn participation from non-members. A Steering Committee is designated to coordinate and provide leadership in developing a Comprehensive Plan of Action to address substance abuse in Shelby County. The plan, which is submitted to the Governors Commission for a Drug Free Indiana, reflects the group's efforts to: 1) assess the extent of the problem, 2) identify existing services, 3) assess the identified needs. The Coalition has focused on the areas of Prevention/ Education, Intervention/Treatment, Law Enforcement/Justice. The needs of youth, adult and senior populations have been considered

**Summary of the Comprehensive Community Plan:** Over the years, utilizing a variety of techniques, the Coalition has played a key roll in assessing the community and providing support for addressing the identified substance abuse issues. As we seek to be the best steward of our time and resources, we have determined that while all substance abuse issues that plague our community are worthy of attention, we are most successful in affecting population level change if we more narrowly focus our initiative. After thorough evaluation of our community including key informant interviews, data collection, review of law enforcement, hospital, community corrections, probation, and local school reports, state epidemiology report, and surveys conducted at the local level, the Coalition Steering Committee has identified six substance abuse problems which will be the focus of our work for the next two year.

With a focused approach, it is our desire to strengthen the Coalition by forging stronger working relationships with other agencies and organizations who share our mission and objectives. Secondly, with a more limited focus, our hope is to provide greater support to those who share our mission and objectives. And finally, we are following CADCA's seven strategies for community change as a model for our activities, specifically focusing on educating and implementing environmental strategies. We believe that this new plan will allow us the opportunity to make a more significant impact at the population level. In addition,

we have received DFC funding that has been awarded to address the same problems in our community.

Based on the evaluation of our comprehensive community assessment, the Coalition has determined the following problems as the basis for the new plan:

- Underage Drinking
- Adult and Youth Prescription Drug Abuse
- Adult and Youth Marijuana Use
- Methamphetamine Use
- Heroin Use

## **Problem Identification**

### **A. Problem Statement #1: Underage Drinking is a problem in Shelby County**

#### **B. Supportive Data:**

1. According to Shelbyville Police reports, in 2010 17% of alcohol related charges were for illegal possession/consumption/transportation
2. According to Shelby County Sheriff's reports, there were 25 illegal possession/consumption/transportation arrests in 2010. 13 Juvenile/12 Adult
3. According to preliminary review of our local community assessment, about 51% of people surveyed rank alcohol abuse between 4 and 5 on a scale from 1 (not a problem) to 5 (very much a problem)
4. According to our recent needs assessment, 34% of those surveyed believe kids perceive alcohol as harmless.

#### **End of Year 1 Update:**

1. According to Shelbyville Police reports, in 2011 24% of alcohol related charges for underage possession/consumption/transportation. (114 arrests)
2. According to Shelby County Sheriff's reports, there were 35 illegal possession/consumption/transportation arrests in 2011. 10 Juvenile/25 Adult
3. According to preliminary review of our local community assessment, about 40% of people surveyed rank alcohol abuse between 4 and 5 on a scale from 1 (not a problem) to 5 (very much a problem)
4. According to our recent needs assessment, 47% of those surveyed believe kids perceive alcohol as harmless.

#### **End of Year 2 Update:**

1. According to Shelbyville Police reports, in 2012 5% of alcohol related charges for underage possession/consumption/transportation. (177 arrests)
2. According to Shelby County Sheriff's reports, there were 21 illegal possession/consumption/transportation arrests in 2012. 4 Juvenile/17 Adult
3. According to preliminary review of our local community assessment, about 15% of people surveyed rank alcohol abuse between 2 and 3 on a scale from 1 (not a problem) to 5 (very much a problem)
4. According to our recent needs assessment, 39% of those surveyed believe kids perceive alcohol as harmless.
5. According to Major Hospital reports, there were 55 cases of alcohol poisoning recorded in the ER in 2012. No reporting if any were minors.

### C. Goals:

#### 1. Reduce the number of underage alcohol related incidents in Shelby County.

##### End of Year 1 Annual Benchmarks:

1. The percentage of underage alcohol related charges increased by 7%, the number of arrests increased by 7%
2. 7% increase in illegal possession/consumption/transportation of Alcohol
3. There is an 11% decrease in perception of underage use of alcohol as a problem in Shelby County.
4. According to recent needs assessment there is a 13% increase believe that kids perceive alcohol as harmless.

##### End of Year 2 Annual Benchmarks:

1. According to 2012 Shelbyville Police reports the percentage of underage alcohol related charges decreased by 19%, the number of arrests increased by 8%
2. According to 2012 Shelby County Sheriff's CAPS report 4% increase in illegal possession/consumption/transportation of Alcohol
3. There is an 25% decrease in perception of underage use of alcohol as a problem in Shelby County.
4. According to recent needs assessment there is a 8% decrease believe that kids perceive alcohol as harmless.
5. According Major Hospital reports, there was a 99% increase from 2 reported ER visit due to alcohol poisoning in 2011 to 55 reports of alcohol poisoning cases of alcohol in 2012.

5. Underage drinking tip line is being promoted – over the last year the Police and Sheriff's department have reported several calls leading to the arrest of several juveniles.

SCDFC is utilizing DFC funding to increase efforts in the four problem areas in Shelby County. Under the DFC Grant, SCDFC has hired an evaluation consultant (Community Systems Group – CSG)

#### A. Problem Statement #2: Adult Alcohol-related incidents are a problem in Shelby County

#### B. Supportive Data:

1. According to 2010 Shelbyville Police reports, there were 272 operating a vehicle while intoxicated criminal charges filed.
2. According to 2010 Shelby County Sheriff's CAPS report, 10% of all arrests were alcohol related (153 total arrests).
3. According to preliminary review of our local community assessment, about 51% of people surveyed rank alcohol as a problem between 4 and 5 on a scale from 1 (not a problem) to 5 (very much a problem)
4. According to the 2009 Indiana State Epidemiology Report, there were 77 Alcohol- related Collisions in Shelby County and 1 Alcohol-related Fatal Collision. There were 279 arrests for Driving Under the Influence (DUI)

### End of Year 1 Update:

1. According to the 2011 Shelbyville Police Reports, there were 350 adult alcohol related charges filed and arrests made.
2. According to the 2010 Shelby County Sheriff's CAPS report, 8% of all arrests were alcohol related. (122 total alcohol related arrests)
3. According to the Shelby County Community Needs Assessment about 40% % of people surveyed rank alcohol as a problem in Shelby County between 4 and 5 on a scale from 1 (not a problem) to 5 (very much a problem). Note: This does not reflect the ATOD survey that all high school students/middle school students in Shelby County were administered in August.
4. According to the 2011 Indiana State Epidemiology Report, Shelby County had 1112 collisions, of which 33 were alcohol related. In 2010, there were 14 fatal collisions in Shelby County, of which 0 was alcohol related.

### End of Year 2 Update

1. According to the 2012 Shelbyville Police Reports, there were 167 adult alcohol related arrests made.
2. According to the 2012 Shelby County Sheriff's CAPS report, 9% of all arrests were alcohol related. (185 total alcohol related arrests)
3. According to the 2013 Shelby County Community Needs Assessment 29 % of people surveyed rank alcohol as a problem in Shelby County between 4 and 5 on a scale from 1 (not a problem) to 5 (very much a problem).
4. According to the 2012 Indiana State Epidemiology Report, Shelby County had 9 fatal collisions, of which 3 were alcohol related.
5. According to Shelby County Community Health Clinic patient intake survey. 475 patient were surveyed 37 adults report receiving treatment

for alcohol abuse, 15 report being hospitalized for alcohol poisoning and 71 report being arrested for alcohol abuse.

6. According to Major Hospital in 2012, 215 patients were admitted to the ER for Alcohol relates illness. Of which 4 were alcohol poisoning.

4. According to the Indiana State Epodemiology report there was a 100% decrease in fatal accidents involving alcohol.

1. 52% decrease in alcohol related charges filed by the Shelbyville Police Department.
2. According to the Shelby County Sheriff department there was a 1% increase in alcohol related charges.
3. There is a 15% decrease in perception of alcohol as a problem in Shelby County.
4. According to the Indiana State Epodemiology report there was a 33% increase in fatal accidents involving alcohol.

Turning Point Domestic Violence Services SCDFC Grantee to facilitate Domestic Violence, Substance and Alcohol Abuse Education to adults in their treatment program.

#### **A. Problem Statement #3: Marijuana use is a problem in Shelby County.**

#### **B. Supportive Data:**

1. According to Shelbyville Police reports, there were 187 marijuana related arrests in 2010 (adults/juveniles).
2. According to the Shelby County Sheriff's Dept. there were 12 adult and 13 juvenile marijuana related arrests in 2010.
3. According to Major Hospital reports, there were 64 drug abuse cases admitted to the ED. We will try to obtain data on the specific drugs in order to better measure.
4. According to Shelby County Probation Dept. reports, there were 162 adult and 62 juvenile marijuana positive screens in 2010. There were a total of 224 positive screens (61% marijuana out of 375 screens that were positive for some substance, so over half of all positive screens were positive for marijuana).
5. According to Shelby County Community Corrections, there were 105 marijuana

positive screens (out of 529 total positives) in 2010. Marijuana is present in 56% of all positive screens.

6. According to Shelby County Priority Care, there were 85 marijuana positive screens (out of 110 total positives) in 2010. Marijuana is present in 77% of all positive screens.

### **End of Year 1 Update:**

1. According to Shelbyville Police Reports there were 166 marijuana related arrests made in 2011.
2. According the Shelby County Sheriff's CAPS report, there were 52 44 adult and 8 juvenile marijuana related arrests in 2011.
3. According to Shelby County Probation, reports there were 209 marijuana positive screens 2011. There were a total of 370 positive screens (56% marijuana).
4. According to Shelby County Community Corrections, there 92 marijuana positive drug screens (out of 510 total screens) in 2011. Marijuana is present in 18% of positive screens. 54% of all drug screens read positive in 2011.
5. According to Shelby County Priority Care, there were 74 marijuana positive screens (out of 107 total positives) in 2011. Marijuana is present in 69% of all positive screens

### **End of Year 2 Update:**

1. According to Shelbyville Police Reports there were 80 marijuana related arrests made in 2012.
2. According the Shelby County Sheriff's CAPS report, there were 59 54 adult and 5 juvenile marijuana related arrests in 2012.
3. According to Shelby County Probation, reports there were 139 marijuana positive screens 2012. There were a total of 236 positive screens (58% marijuana).
4. According to Shelby County Community Corrections, there 1569 marijuana positive drug screens (out of 11,598 total screens) in 2012. Marijuana is present in 14% of positive screens.
