



RE: Special Exception Application - The Farm

To the Floyd County Board of Zoning Appeals,

On behalf of The Farm, we respectfully submit this Special Exception application requesting modifications to certain operational conditions currently governing the property. These requests are intended to better align existing restrictions with the property's size, layout, natural safety features, and established operating practices, while continuing to prioritize public safety and compatibility with surrounding land uses.

Specifically, this application seeks approval for:

1. Expansion of approved shooting boundaries consistent with existing terrain, wooded buffers, and demonstrated safe shot-fall distances, as shown on the attached site plan; and
2. Modification of the current fixed headcount limitation to allow for appropriately scaled special events consistent with comparable venues in Floyd County.

The Farm encompasses over 700 acres of varied topography, dense wooded buffers, elevation changes, and natural barriers that function as effective safety features. During a prior site visit, BZA members observed these characteristics firsthand and acknowledged that the site's layout significantly limits potential impacts on neighboring properties. Subsequent field testing related to shooting boundaries and shot fall further supports the adequacy of the proposed buffers and safety margins.

When the original conditions were established, both the BZA and the property's operators had limited experience with sporting clays and archery facilities of this scale. As operations have matured and familiarity with this type of use has increased, it has become clear that certain restrictions are more limiting than necessary to achieve their intended safety objectives. Comparable venues within Floyd County operate without similar fixed limitations, often on significantly smaller properties.

The requested modifications are narrowly tailored to the unique characteristics of the site and are supported by operational experience, site-specific observations, and industry standards. As discussed during the BZA site visit, The Farm will clearly and reasonably mark approved shooting boundaries to ensure ongoing compliance and operational clarity.

We appreciate the BZA's time and consideration and welcome the opportunity to provide any additional information or clarification as needed.

Addendum to Special Exception Application

Supplemental Operational Clarifications The Farm – Floyd County, Indiana

This addendum is submitted to include two operational items that were regrettably omitted from the original Special Exception application. These items are directly related to existing operations and are necessary to allow The Farm to operate responsibly, efficiently, and without unnecessary or disproportionate operating costs, while maintaining compliance with safety, environmental, and regulatory standards.

3. Limited Flexibility in Shooting Hours for Pre-Approved Special Events

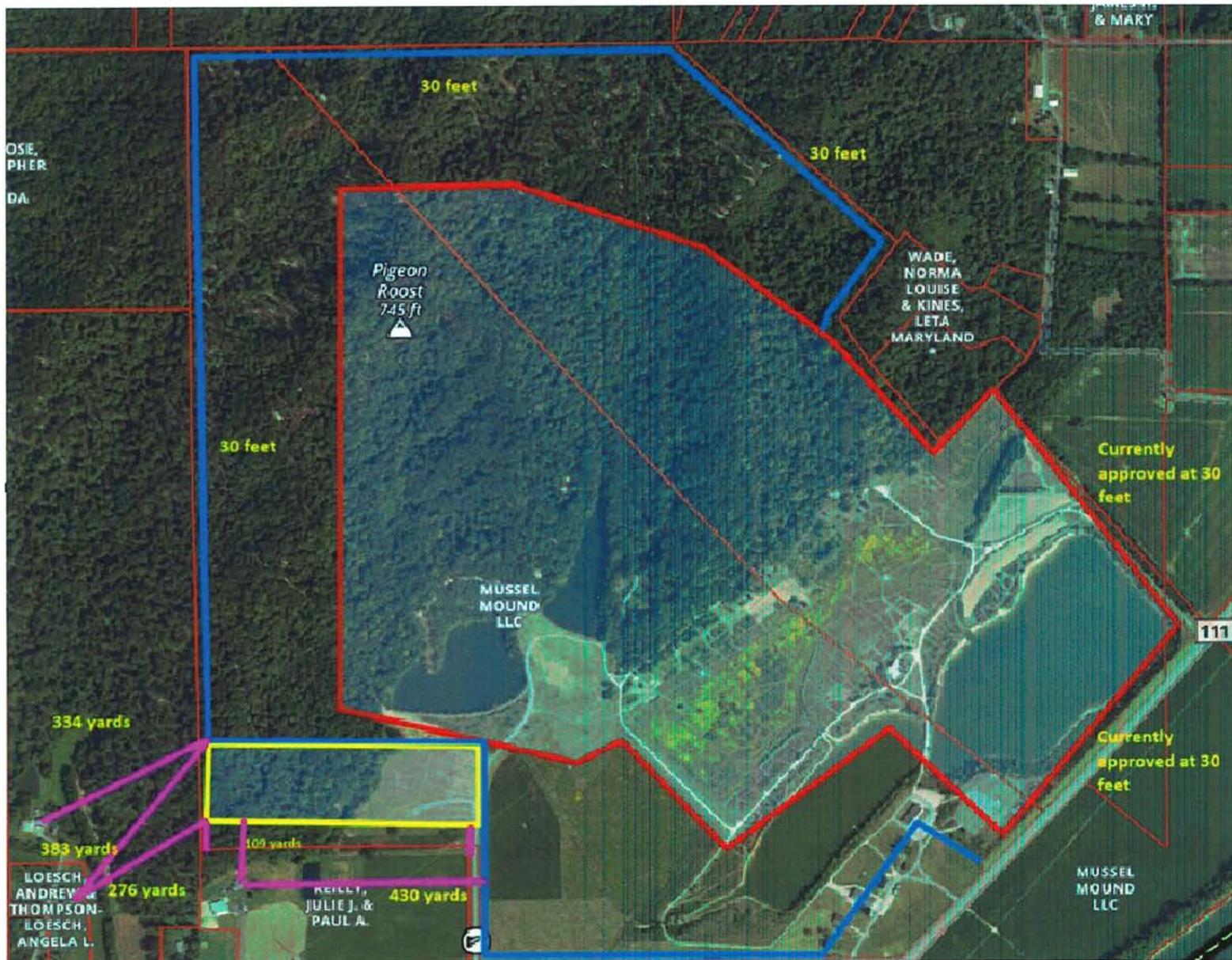
The Farm respectfully requests limited flexibility in shooting hours for infrequent, pre-approved special events (such as Glow Clays), potentially administered through a permit or pass-based system. Any such flexibility would be event-specific, limited in frequency, and subject to advance approval, and would not constitute a general expansion of regular operating hours. This clarification is intended to allow the Farm to responsibly accommodate occasional specialty events in a controlled and compliant manner consistent with comparable venues.

4. Extension and Continuation of Lead Reclamation Operations

The Farm respectfully requests confirmation of the extension and continuation of its lead reclamation activities in accordance with industry best practices and applicable environmental standards. These activities are part of the Farm's ongoing environmental stewardship and land management efforts and do not represent an expansion of use, intensity, or operational footprint.

The Farm further requests flexibility to align the timing and frequency of lead reclamation activities with site-specific conditions and professional recommendations, rather than a rigid fixed interval. If helpful to the Board, input from a qualified industry professional with expertise in lead management and reclamation practices may be provided. In the event such an individual is unavailable to attend the March meeting in person, participation via phone or video conference would be possible. This addendum is submitted for inclusion in the record to supplement the original Special Exception application and to further clarify existing operational practices associated with The Farm.

Response Summary to BZA Questions

The Farm – Special Exception Modification Clarification

ITEM 1 – Shooting Stations / Sound Buffers / Backstops

New Shooting Stations

- No permanent / new sporting clays course is being created.
- The proposed boundary expansion is intended **only for large or special events** (e.g., archery tournaments or rotating event layouts).
- No permanent structures or fixed installations are planned outside the established course.
- We want the ability to use the expanded space for upland hunts during season

Backstops

- Backstops are standard for pistol and rifle ranges.
- Sporting clays shooting does not require traditional backstops due to:
 - Use of birdshot
 - Rapid energy dissipation
 - Overlapping shotfall zones
 - Inward orientation of shooting stations
- The Farm will continue to follow NRA Range Source Book design guidance for shotgun ranges.

Sound Buffers

- The Farm will purchase and plant additional fast-growing trees to create:
 - Enhanced visual screening
 - Supplemental sound diffusion
- This buffer will be installed particularly along the Reilly property line.
- Shooting stations will continue to be oriented inward toward the property interior.
- Existing terrain, wooded areas, and elevation changes remain primary natural sound buffers.
- A range sound expert will take decibel readings – from NRA or NSSF
- Prior decibel readings taken at the property boundary were below the 75 dB maximum.
- The proposed boundary expansion and event flexibility will not materially increase sound intensity at the property line.

ITEM 2 – Fixed Headcount Limit

Current condition:

- Maximum 500 people per day.

Proposed modification:

- Remove the fixed numerical cap.
- Replace with a traffic-control-based standard.

Proposed language concept:

Events exceeding 500 attendees will require certified traffic control for the duration of the event.

- The Farm encompasses extensive acreage significantly larger than typical outdoor venues.
- Comparable outdoor festivals and agricultural events are regulated based on traffic management and safety planning, not fixed headcounts.
- In The Farm's six year existence there has not been ONE accident correlated to a large event. Brook will be gathering reports to back this statement up

ITEM 3 – Shooting Hours Flexibility

Current condition:

- Hours tied to Daylight Savings Time.
- Special events limited to sunrise/sunset parameters.

Proposed modifications:

1. Remove DST-based limitation.
2. Adopt DNR hunting hours
3. Allow shooting until ½ hour prior to dusk during Spring and warmer months.
4. Permit Glow Clays events on Friday afternoons/evenings from November through February.
5. Glow Clays would be limited in number – up to 4/month
6. Glow clay events to end at 10pm
7. Shoot location will be at our 5-stand locations – opposite of Reilly property

ITEM 4 – Lead Reclamation Operations

Current Condition:

- Mandatory reclamation at minimum every two years.

Proposed Modification:

Replace fixed 2-year requirement with EPA-aligned, performance-based language.

EPA Best Management Practices Summary:

The EPA's Best Management Practices for Lead at Outdoor Shooting Ranges:

- Do not require fixed calendar-based reclamation.
- Recommend site-specific reclamation frequency.
- Suggest triggers based on:
 - Target volume
 - *Arjan recommends every 10 years for clubs who through average of 1 million targets / year (see Arjan's Q&A PDF sent over)*
 - Professional evaluation

The Farm's current 2-year requirement is significantly more stringent than EPA guidance.

The Farm submitted a Q&A given to Lead Reclamation expert Arjan (submitted to Frank at onsite visit 2/18/26). Arjan is also willing to be present if possible or call into next BZA meeting to answer questions.

Additional Environmental Commitments:

- Continue operating under the Environmental Stewardship Plan (ESP).
- Increase pH testing from 2x/year to 4x/year.
- Maintain vegetative stabilization in shotfall areas.
- Maintain overlapping shotfall containment zones.

Environmental Stewardship Plan (ESP) Update

- The ESP remains active and in effect.
- No material change to shot fall distribution.
- No material change to drainage or containment areas.
- Increase pH monitoring from 2x to 4x annually as enhancement.
- Continue soil stabilization and vegetation management.

Stormwater Prevention Plan (SWPPP)

- No material operational changes requiring revision.
- No change to drainage patterns or stormwater flow.
- No change to shotfall zones affecting runoff.
- The existing SWPPP remains appropriate and compliant.
- The Farm will continue ongoing monitoring and coordinate with the Stormwater Department if future changes occur.

3. Special Exception Request:

Detail the special exception request:

1. Expansion of approved shooting boundaries to better align with existing natural buffers, terrain, and safe shot-fall distances, as shown on the attached site plan.
2. Modification of the current fixed headcount limitation (500 persons) to allow for appropriately scaled special events consistent with comparable venues in Floyd County.

4. Special Exception Justification:

Indiana Code and the Floyd County Zoning Ordinance establishes specific criteria that each must be met in order for a Special Exception (Use Variance) to be approved. Describe how the request meets each of the following criteria:

1. The special exception will not be injurious to the public health, safety, morals, and general welfare of the community:

The proposed modifications will not be injurious to public health or safety. The Farm's property includes extensive natural safety features, including significant wooded buffers, elevation changes, ravines, and irregular terrain that inherently limit projectile travel and visibility beyond the property.

During a prior site visit, members of the Board of Zoning Appeals observed firsthand the depth and density of these wooded buffers and acknowledged that, given the terrain and shooting orientations, there is no realistic scenario in which an arrow or shotgun shot could travel into a neighboring property or residential area.

In addition to these natural features, The Farm conducted field testing related to shooting boundaries and shot fall. Based on this testing, approximately 150 yards represents a safe and conservative distance for shotgun shot fall. The proposed shooting boundaries remain well within these accepted safety margins and are consistent with industry standards and operational best practices.

The requested adjustments maintain appropriate safety controls while better reflecting the actual conditions and operational realities of the site.

In accordance with discussions held during the site visit, The Farm will clearly and reasonably mark approved shooting boundaries on the property. Boundary markings will be implemented in a manner appropriate to the terrain and operational use areas, utilizing visible signage, physical markers, and natural reference points as needed to ensure staff and participants remain within approved shooting zones. The Farm welcomes continued coordination with BZA staff and Board members regarding boundary marking methods and verification.

2. The use and value of area adjacent to the property will not be adversely affected in a substantially adverse manner:

The proposed modifications will not adversely affect the use or value of adjacent properties. The Farm's operations are buffered from neighboring parcels by substantial wooded areas and significant distances from nearby residences, as shown on the submitted site plan.

The natural terrain and vegetation significantly limit noise transmission, visibility, and any potential impact to surrounding properties. The proposed shooting boundaries and event operations remain well removed from adjacent residential areas and do not alter the existing character of the surrounding rural environment.

Additionally, the dispersed nature of activities across the property further reduces concentrated impacts in any single location. These conditions ensure that adjacent properties are protected from substantial adverse effects.

3. The need for the special exception (variance of use) arises from some condition peculiar to the property involved:

The need for the requested special exception arises from conditions unique to The Farm's property. The site encompasses over 700 acres with highly irregular topography, extensive wooded buffers, elevation changes, and multiple natural barriers that are not typical of standard recreational or event venues.

These unique physical characteristics allow for safe, dispersed operations that differ substantially from smaller or more uniform parcels. The original restrictions applied to the property did not fully account for these site-specific features or the operational realities of a large-scale outdoor recreational facility.

The proposed modifications are tailored specifically to the property's unique layout and natural safety features and would not necessarily be appropriate for other properties lacking similar characteristics.

4. The strict application of the terms of the Floyd County Zoning Ordinance would result in an unnecessary hardship in the use of the property:

Strict application of the existing conditions results in unnecessary hardship by preventing reasonable and safe use of the property consistent with its size, layout, and intended purpose. The current shooting boundary limitations and fixed headcount restriction do not reflect the actual safety conditions, terrain, or operational capabilities of the site.

At the time the original restrictions were established, the Board had limited experience with sporting clays and archery facilities and relied heavily on representations made during early development stages. As operations have matured, it has become clear that those limitations are overly restrictive and not aligned with current understanding, site observations, or comparable facilities.

Without modification, these restrictions unnecessarily limit the property's ability to function as a viable outdoor recreation and event facility despite the presence of substantial safety buffers and operational controls.

5. Approval of the Special Exception will not contradict the goals and objectives of the Floyd County Comprehensive Plan:

Approval of the requested special exception is consistent with the goals and objectives of the Floyd County Comprehensive Plan, which supports appropriate rural land uses, outdoor recreation, and economic activity compatible with surrounding land uses.

Comparable large-scale events and venues within Floyd County operate without fixed headcount limitations of this nature, even on parcels significantly smaller than The Farm. Examples include St. Mary's

of the Knobs (Knob Fest), Harvest Homecoming, and Mount Fest at Mount St. Francis, all of which accommodate substantially larger attendance without comparable restrictions.

Given the scale of The Farm's property, the natural dispersion of guests, extensive buffers, and established operational controls, the requested modifications align with county practices and planning objectives while maintaining public safety and community welfare.

- For proposals using sanitary sewer systems, a letter from the service provider shall be included verifying that any proposed new development will be served.

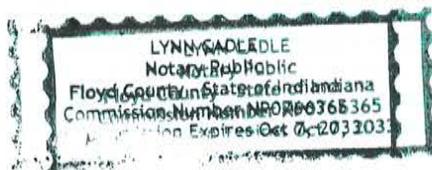

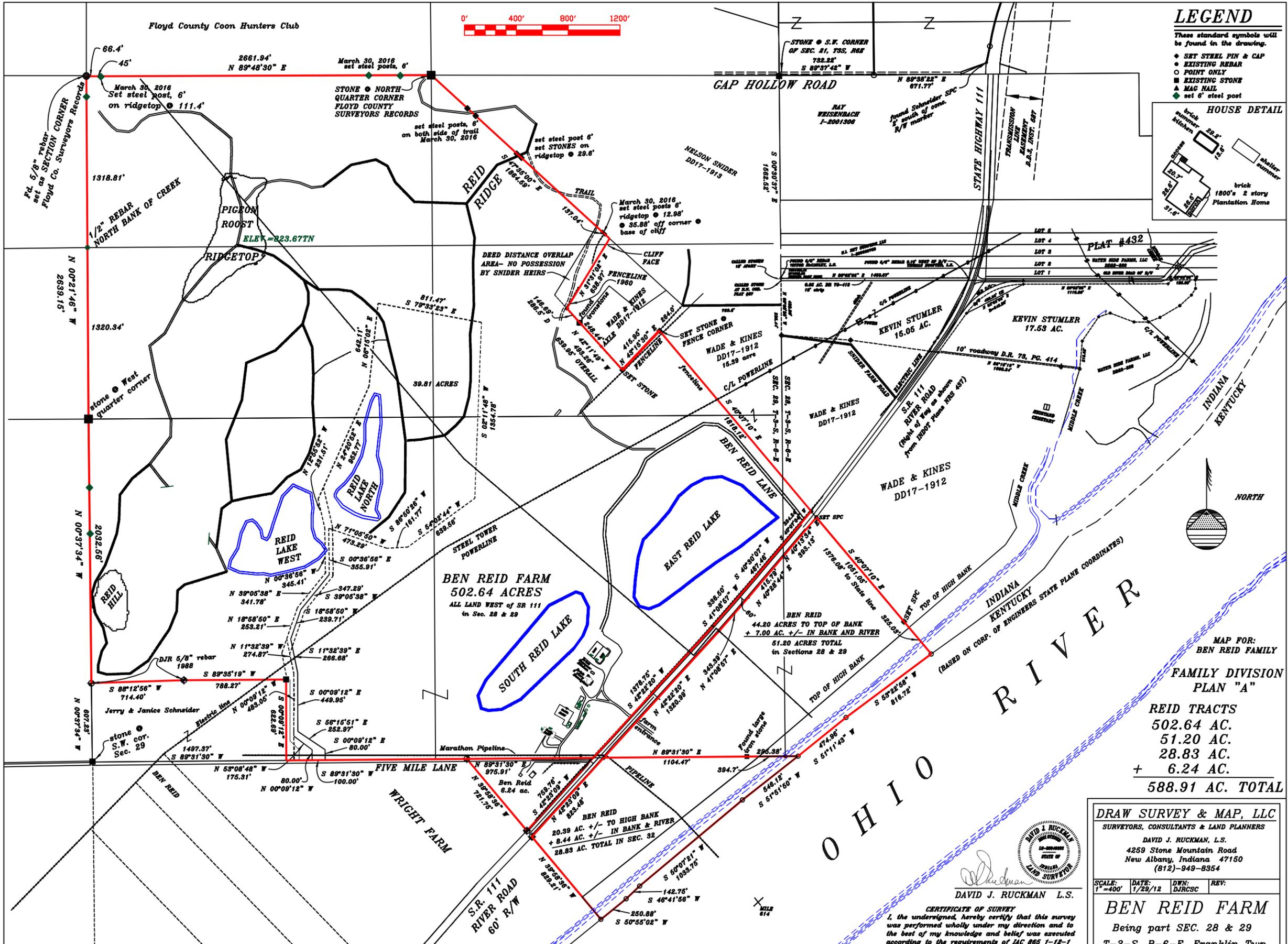

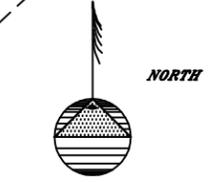

Questions Submitted to Arjean

(Lead Reclamation Expert, 20 years experience and have reclaimed more than 100 ranges, tested over 300 ranges.)

1. In your experience reclaiming ranges across the country, how common is a mandatory 2year reclamation schedule for a sporting clays facility of our size?
 - a *Never. Common is 10 years*
2. For clubs throwing approximately ___ targets per year, what is the typical reclamation interval you see?
 - a *1,000,000 targets/10 years*
3. Based on your experience, what factors usually determine when a range actually needs reclamation?
 - a *The amount of lead has to be 3-5 pounds per square foot in the heavy shotfall zone.*
4. Have you encountered other ranges operating successfully and responsibly with longer intervals than 2 years?
 - a Yes
5. Based on the amount of lead recovered from our property this past year, was the shotfall density typical of a range that truly needed reclamation?
 - a No, It was very hard to get any lead at all. For the amount of work we did, we would normally have recovered 100,000 pounds
6. In your professional opinion, was this reclamation done earlier than necessary?
 - a Yes
7. Is there an optimal lead density where reclamation becomes efficient and worthwhile?
 - a More lead is always better, but care has to be taken that there is no corrosion taking place.
8. Does reclaiming too early reduce recovery efficiency?
 - a Yes, it is more work with less results.
9. Is it common for early reclamation to result in the recovered lead not covering the cost of service?
 - a yes, it is normally not done until it is economically feasible.
10. Does mechanical reclamation disturb soil and vegetation?
 - a Yes, it disturbs the top 2 inches similar to agriculture

11. In your experience, does frequent reclamation increase the risk of erosion or destabilizing established ground cover?
 - a Yes, anytime there is no vegetation covering the ground. Then there is a higher chance for erosion.
12. Is there any operational downside to reclaiming too often?
 - a Shooting has to be curtailed during the reclamation.
13. Based on our annual target volume, how long would you estimate it would take before another reclamation would realistically be needed?
 - a 10-20 years
14. If this were your own range, when would you plan the next reclamation?
 - a 20 years
15. Would you recommend a fixed calendar schedule or a target-count/volume-based trigger?
 - a it should be based on the cumulative volume of shooting, because varies over the years.

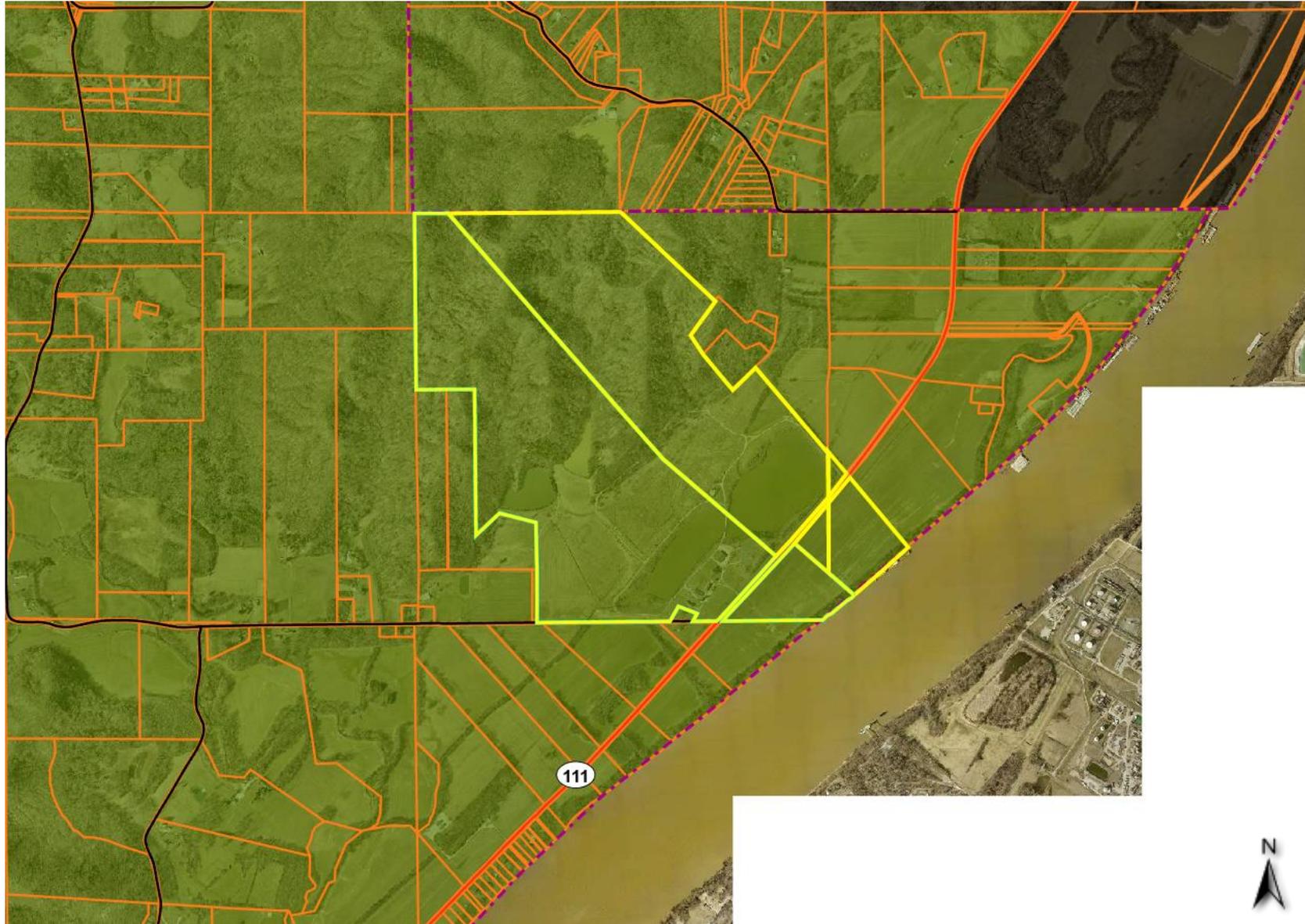

Frequently Asked Questions

1. How can I find out more about this docket?

You can either visit to the Floyd County Building and Development Services Office and review the file between the hours of 8AM to 4PM Monday through Friday or you can review the proposed application on-line at www.floydcounty.in.gov under the Plan Commission page

2. How does this process work?

Depending on the docket, there are several different processes. The Board of Zoning Appeals will take public comments on each proposal and values public comment in their decision-making process. The Board of Zoning Appeals is required to follow state statute when considering each application. Below is a brief description of application that may come before the board. Please note the check marked application on the notification form to the corresponding process listed below:

- **Development Standards Variance** – The applicant is seeking to vary from the County’s development standards in the County’s Zoning Ordinance. Per Indiana State statute, the Board of Zoning Appeals holds a public hearing. From the applicant, it determines if the applicant has met the standard that will allow for the requested variance of County rules. The Board of Zoning Appeals has the ability to approve, disapprove or may place reasonable conditions on the request per the ordinance standards.
- **Conditional Use**– The applicant is seeking to conduct a use on the property not otherwise permitted by right. By the County Zoning Ordinance, the proposed use must be reviewed and determined by the Board of Zoning Appeals if how the applicant is proposing the use to be conducted will affect the adjoining property owners. The Board of Zoning Appeals has the ability to approve, or disapprove. The Board can also place reasonable conditions on the request per the ordinance standards.
- **Special Exception** – The applicant is seeking to conduct a use that is not permitted by right in the certain zoning district. Similar to the conditional use, ordinance, and the proposed use must be reviewed and determined by the Board of Zoning Appeals if how the applicant is proposing the use to be conducted will affect the adjoining property owners. The Board of Zoning Appeals has the ability to approve or disapprove. The Board can also place reasonable conditions on the request per the ordinance standards.

Board of Zoning Appeals & Plan Commission Order of Meetings:

- Meeting is called to order, roll call, and approval of minutes
- Director presents docket item and staff report
- Petitioner will be given a total of ten (10) minutes to present application request
- Board members will ask petitioner questions
- Public comments are opened:
 - Favorable comments are allowed a combined total of ten (10) minutes
 - Opposition comments are allowed a combined total of ten (10) minutes
- Public comments are closed and will remain closed
- Petitioner will be given a total of five (5) minutes to respond to public comments
- Board discusses the case and makes a ruling
