## Minutes

The December 11, 2024 meeting minutes were approved unanimously.

## Recap of regulatory reform workshop and next steps

Bob Rath presented a summary of the brainstorm session held on December 16, 2024. The group was made up of members of the Innovation Committee, Legal Future Commission, guests (Jessica Bednarz, Antonio Coronado, Lucy Ricca, Scott Wiley), and staff. The group was divided into three smaller groups and then was asked to brainstorm:

- What benefits can be achieved by implementing programs like allied legal professionals and community-based justice workers?
- What would be the possible mechanisms for making pilot recommendations to the regulatory sandbox?
- How should the success of the pilot recommendations be measured?

The three groups shared their top ideas and then the attendees were invited to add stickers to provide input on the ideas - good (green) or bad (red). To wrap up, the group was asked to identify their top ideas (blue). The top ideas were:

- early intervention and avoid court altogether
- build academic partnerships and relationships with established programs
- require data collection that would facilitate qualitative and quantitative evaluation

Prof. Henderson presented a “strawman version” for discussion on creating a foundational infrastructure of limited license legal professionals. In the first phase, lawyers would do the training and supervising; only certain employers would be eligible. Phase 2 would be building a credentialing model to scale production of limited license legal professionals. Phase 3 would be limited expansion to private law firms. The two types of limited licenses suggested were:

- Limited license legal technician would have no courtroom role, but scope based on completion of micro-certifications in low complexity, high volume areas. They would have a lawyer supervisor. This can be used to enable community justice workers.
- Limited license legal practitioners would be credentialed for court, employed by legal service nonprofit with lawyer supervisor (can be a pro bono volunteer).

He also suggested that there be a registry of attorneys interested in being legal supervisors and that the initial focus of legal clients is above legal aid eligible, but lower class and middle class.

In February, the Committee will design the process for evaluating and approving ideas.

## Designing and implementing legal regulatory reform

Questions or issues to clarify:

### Timing

- When would each of the individual pilots end? Would that timeline be up to the individual?
- What would be the deadline for people to submit ideas? Should proposals be evaluated in batch twice a year or quarterly to facilitate management of schedule and budget?
- Does the regulatory sandbox itself have an end date?

### Funding

- Should those applying address sustainable funding if the pilot is successful?

- Chuck Dunlap noted that Indiana Bar Foundation hopes to reserve funding for this project.

## Regulation

- Would regulation be addressed by a current Supreme Court agency?
- Prof. Henderson frames this as building a new infrastructure to solve a problem; the people who are interested in participating are the architects.
- Legislative and executive branch participation – this currently will be addressed within the Supreme Court’s rulemaking function. All branches of government are represented in the Legal Future Commission that created this request. This should be noted explicitly in the report.
- What does certification look like? Similar to CLE providers? Some entities would solely certify, some would certify and use allied legal professionals or community-based justice workers, some would only use allied legal professionals or community-based justice workers.
- Do more ex-post regulations need to be explicit?

## Other suggestions

- Circuit clerks should be on the list of people who can/should submit ideas. (P. 8 chart)
- Would there be reciprocity for those certified in other states?
- Requested removal of agency names, just “government agencies and offices” (p. 17)

## Moving forward

A formal vote will be taken at the February 26<sup>th</sup> meeting. If Committee members have concerns about the report, they should reach out to Bob Rath prior to the meeting. The deadline for the submission to the Supreme Court is March 1, 2025.

## Subcommittee report on online dispute resolution (ODR)

The report was presented by committee co-chairs Judge Kimberly Bacon and Judge Jennifer DeGroote, with Janelle O'Malley as staff. The report reviews the use of ODR in small claims, family law, traffic, and criminal misdemeanors. Judge DeGroote discussed her experiences with the small claims ODR pilot. Low engagement was an issue that would be addressed by a mandatory ODR program that allows for opting-out. For traffic, Marion and Lake County use ODR for deferral, but each have different rules for qualification. The Committee suggested amendment of the report to include working with IPAC on creating a default program that could be used more broadly. After discussion, the Committee unanimously approved the amended report to be presented to the Indiana Supreme Court.

## AI and the Courts: Overview of report by the Rapid Response Team at the National Center for State Courts (NCSC)

Justin Forkner talked through a couple national AI initiatives including a rapid response national taskforce with NCSC, consortium with monthly webinars on various issues, a sandbox for generative AI to test. He noted that Arizona is using AI avatars to report on their Supreme Court opinions to improve public outreach. Mike Moore noted that the Language Access Committee is working with interpreters to do interpretations for advisements.



## OJA policy on responsible use of AI

Janelle O'Malley presented the OJA policy on AI. The first phase is a policy for internal use; the second phase is guidance for trial courts to develop their own policies. The guidance will be presented at the September Annual Conference.

## Technology Subcommittee Launch

Judge Weissmann, who was the technology chair for the Commission on Legal Future, will chair the Innovation Technology Subcommittee. The Commission on Legal Future identified different ways that technology can aid the legal profession - judicial efficiency tools, document automation tools, expansion of wifi and access to prisoners, public wifi in courtrooms. The new subcommittee will focus on AI and technology for judges in the courtroom. The Committee broke into three teams to brainstorm ideas for the subcommittee to work on.
