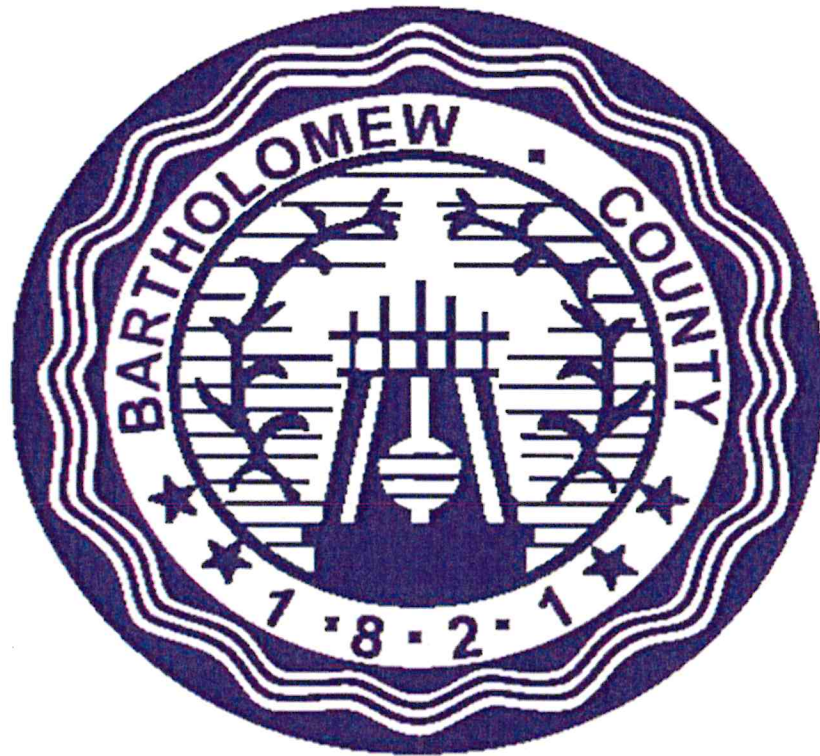

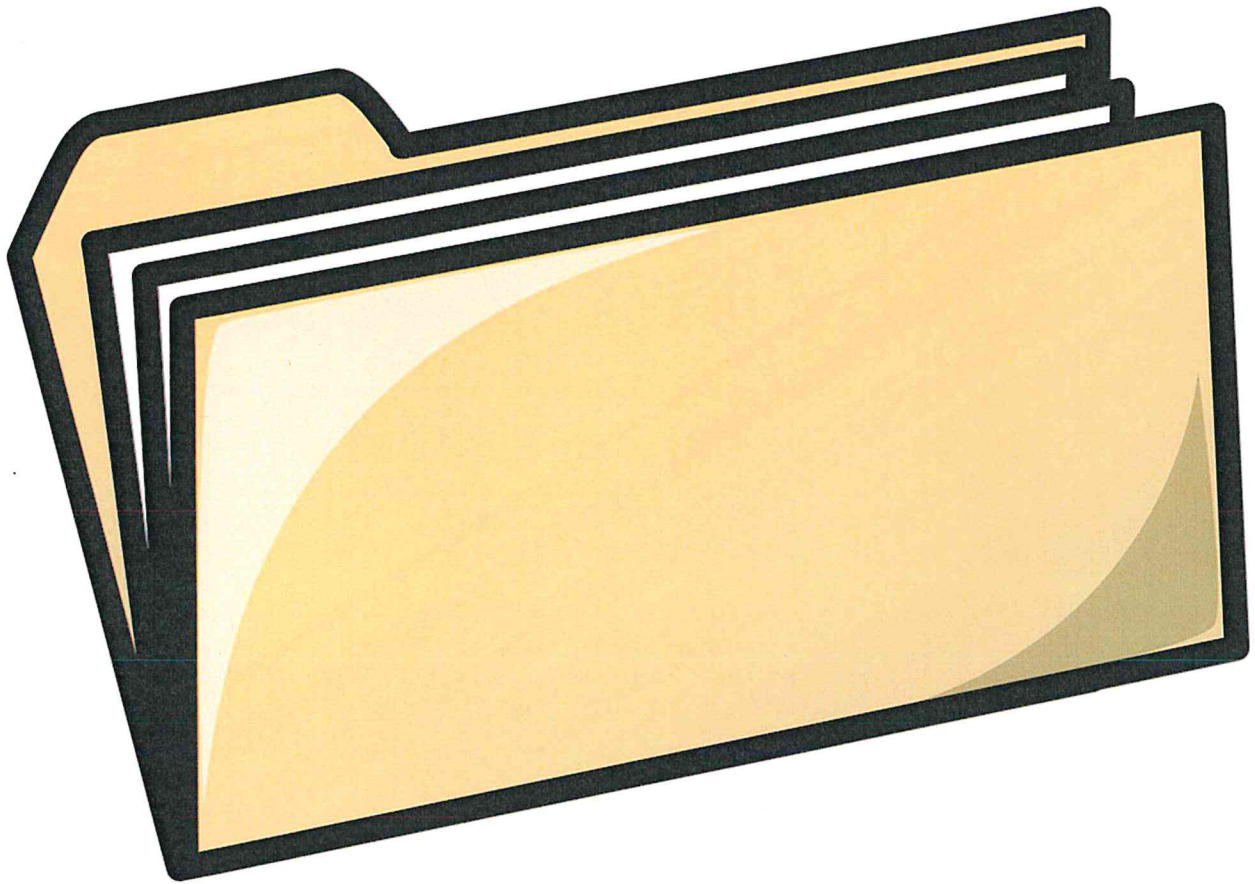

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH DIVISION SERVICES

FOOD PROTECTION PROGRAM

- ◆ **Plan Review** - Review all architectural plans of proposed or extensively remodeled retail food establishment facilities for compliance with equipment and facility design criteria in accordance with Indiana State Department of Health Rule 410 IAC 7-24.
- ◆ **License** - Issue annual retail food establishment licenses in accordance with Bartholomew County Code Title 11, Chapter 110.
- ◆ **Investigations** - Investigate reported cases of food-borne illness outbreaks and public reports of code violations.
- ◆ **Inspections** - Conduct biannual routine inspections and reinspections in accordance with state and county codes. Administrative hearings are conducted for noncomplying establishments. Numerous temporary social events with food sales as well as Farm Market.

ON-SITE WASTEWATER TREATMENT PROGRAM

- ◆ **Site Evaluations** –site soil boring locations at proposed building sites. Review certified soil analysis to ascertain the soil characteristics profile and loading rate to determine the suitability for an on-site sewage disposal system.
- ◆ **Permits** - The type of permit issued is based on the plat status of the property and whether it has been developed or not.
 - **Site Assessment**: This document may approve or deny the use of an on-site system based on the data collected from the site evaluation.
 - **Preliminary Permit**: Issued for properties that are undeveloped and going through the platting process. Will specify system requirements per bedroom.
 - **Conditional Permit**: Issued for properties that have an existing on-site sewage disposal system. May state that the septic system does not appear to be malfunctioning and will be repaired according to state and county codes in the event that it ever malfunctions. Also noted is the presence or absence of a conflict of system placement with construction activities.
 - **Construction Permit**: Issued for repairs or new construction of on-site sewage disposal

systems. Will specify system requirements and location.

- ◆ **Inspections** - Inspect all on-site wastewater treatment system installations for compliance with Bartholomew County Code Title 5, Chapter 52, and Indiana State Department of Health Rule 410 IAC 6-8.3. A diagram of the system is kept on file and a copy is issued to the owner with maintenance instructions.
- ◆ **Investigations** - Investigate reports of malfunctioning on-site wastewater treatment systems. Take samples and check potential source with tracer dye.
- ◆ **Registration** - Administer tests and educate installers on system installations so that they may be registered to install on-site wastewater treatment systems in Bartholomew County.
- ◆ **Education** - Programs and workshops are given for the public, on-site wastewater contractors, builders, and realtors as needed.

VECTOR ABATEMENT PROGRAM

- ◆ **Animal Bite Reporting** - Report and track all warm blooded animal bite incidents in accordance with state and county codes.
- ◆ **Investigation/Identification** - Investigate all vector reports and issue corrective orders for arthropod and rodent investigations. Identify specimens for the public and participate in the Ball State University and State Department of Health tick programs.
- ◆ **Mosquito Control** - Conduct routine surveys to identify mosquito harborages and provide follow-up with larviciding and adulticiding control measures.
- ◆ **Education** - Educate citizens through multimedia public service announcements, newspaper articles, brochures, and school and public presentations.

HOUSING PROGRAM

- ◆ **Home Loan Inspections** - Conduct well water and septic system inspections for the transfer of residential properties and give educational programs to realtors and lending institutions.
- ◆ **Minimum Standards** - In accordance with Bartholomew County Code Title 15, Chapter 152, investigate reports of substandard housing. Issue orders of corrective action and condemn those of noncompliance.

COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAM

- ◆ **Environmental Disease** - Conduct investigations of reported environmental illnesses, sample if necessary, and track all reports geographically.
- ◆ **Pool Inspections** - Inspect all public access swimming pools for water quality to ensure against disease transmission; enforce pool safety rule, under Indiana State Department of Health Rule 410 IAC 6-2.1.
- ◆ **Indoor Air Testing** - Test for indoor air pollutants using the Draeger Hand Pump and/or other equipment in residential and commercial facilities.
- ◆ **Chemical Spills and Hazardous Wastes** - Work with county, state, and federal agencies on hazardous materials investigations and chemical spills.

Conduct a variety of miscellaneous tests and inspections including but not limited to collecting water samples, investigating surface or ground water contamination, open burning, illegal dumping, lead paint, and asbestos. Take public complaints and document all information.

EDUCATION PROGRAM

- ◆ **Job Shadowing** - Allow interns and students interested in the environmental field to job shadow with an environmental health specialist for the day. Participate in the Hospital's Fellowship program.
- ◆ **Ordinances** - Develop and enforce county ordinances pertaining to public health.

Give presentations on environmental health issues to schools, civic groups, professional organizations, and the regulated community upon request. Television, radio, and newsprint are also used to disseminate information.

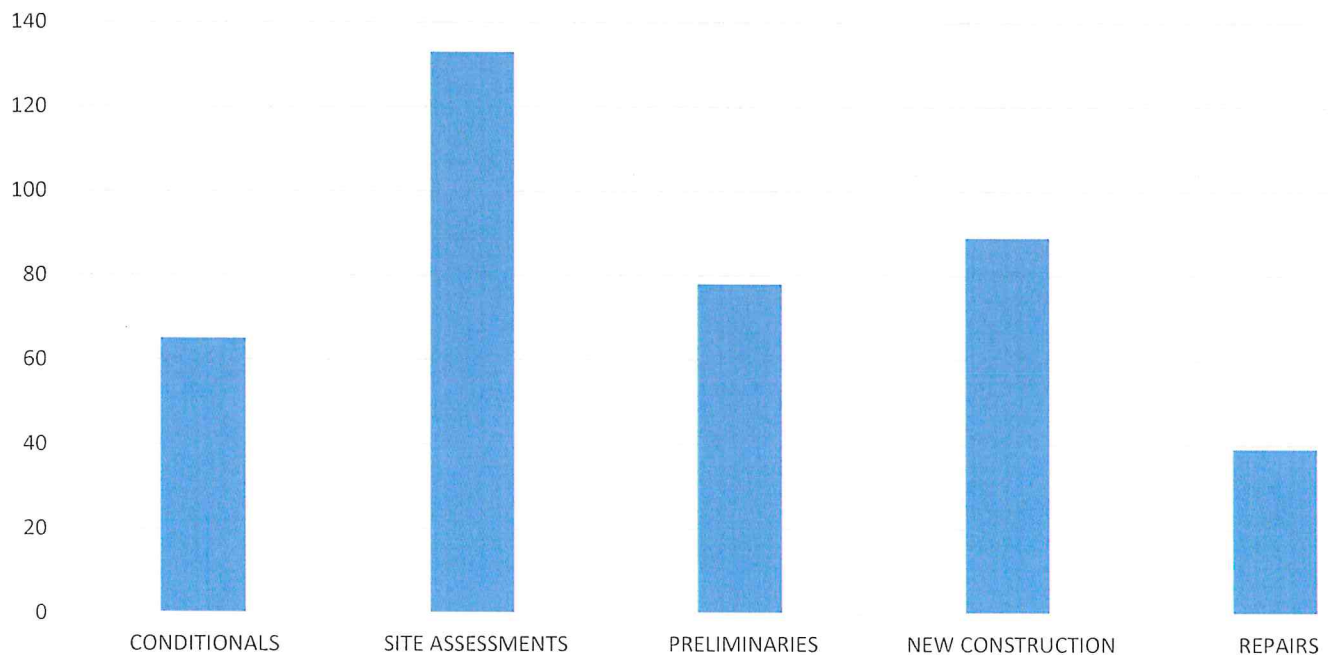

2024 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS OF NOTE

Vector Control (Mosquitoes)

A local mobile home park experienced a sewer line break causing much sewage to accumulate on the ground surface between, under and around many of the mobile homes, resulting in a mosquito harborage. This department, while working to resolve the sewage problem by coordinating with the Indiana Department of Health (which issues mobile home park licenses and conducts inspections of mobile home parks) and the mobile home park owner, set traps to collect adult mosquitos to determine the extent of the mosquito population. In one overnight period, using one trap, this department collected over 1800 adult mosquitoes. These mosquitoes were sent to IDOH for testing. Fortunately no disease transmission was found. This department took immediate steps to protect the public and lower the mosquito population. Larvaciding was conducted and multiple nights were spent adulticing the area. After two weeks of treatment, adult mosquito trapping was done again. This time, only 25 mosquitoes were collected. This area was continually monitored for the rest of the season. After several attempts and monitoring , the sewer line was repaired.

The EHD investigated 138 mosquito breeding sites. Larvae were found in 19% of these sites necessitating treatment. This department collected 2905 adult mosquitoes using gravid traps. These mosquitoes were sent the Indiana Department of Health Laboratory to be tested for West Nile Virus, St. Louis Encephalitis, and LaCrosse Encephalitis. Six of the mosquito pools tested positive for WNV. Fortunately there were no human cases of mosquito borne diseases reported. However, due to the increased risk of disease transmission indicated by the adult trapping surveillance, additional adulticiding was conducted. Approximately 226 miles were traveled while adulticiding with the fogging equipment .

The total cost of chemicals used in the mosquito control program exceeded 7000 dollars. When added to the labor cost, the cost of materials for trapping, and fuel cost associated with the program, the vector control program requires a substantial budgetary contribution .

Retail Foods

2024 saw a large increase in the number of mobile retail food establishment licenses issues. There are now 85 such units licensed to prepare and sell food in Bartholomew County, not including mobile units licensed for temporary events, such as, the fair and festivals. This brings increasing complexity and variety of foods available to the public.

These units range from the classic ice cream truck to large kitchens on wheels preparing items as diverse as tacos, bar-b-que and lobster. Unlike brick and motor retail food establishments that are inspected at least biannually, these mobile units are inspected prior to being licensed each year and then may not be seen again until the next license deadline. All mobile units must either have a licensed commissary kitchen or a serving location that is not licensed to report to for cleaning and maintenance.

Home based vendors are increasing in numbers and complexity. These vendors are not licensed nor inspected by health departments, but serve many different types of foods to the public. It seems like every year the home based vendor community is trying to stretch the boundaries of what they can do. In 2024 a number of home based vendors are now selling freeze dried foods, such as candy and small whole fruits. There is on-going research being conducted by Purdue University on health and safety issues with other types of foods being freeze dried.

Housing

This department provides support for residents that rent residential properties in the county under the Housing Program. This program enforces the Minimum Housing Ordinance, which establishes minimum requirements for rental housing. If property owners fail to provide the minimum standards, then this department can enforce this ordinance to bring the dwelling back into compliance. In the event that a property cannot meet minimum standards and is declared unfit for human habitation, this department has the authority to condemn the dwelling. If a dwelling is condemned, this department conducts routine follow-up inspections to ensure the dwelling is unoccupied. The number of condemned dwellings in the county typically averages 12-15. Dwellings can be released from condemnation, once they are brought up to minimum standards. This department works with other local and state agencies to remedy situations that cross lines of jurisdiction.

Swimming Pools

This department licensed 49 public and semi-public swimming pools located in the county. Each pool received a full pool inspection to ensure compliance with both Indiana Code and Bartholomew County Ordinance. Routine water quality checks were also performed to monitor pools for compliance. The department continues to work toward tablet-based inspections in the near future. The added level of technology will allow inspections to be more efficient compared to handwritten inspections conducted today, especially when paired with advanced analytic testing devices for water chemistry.

Public Health Emergency Preparedness

Public Health Emergency Preparedness has worked to provide required deliverables remaining from our Indiana PHEP Annual Grant: Attachment A. These deliverables include but are not limited to attending regular meetings/communication with IDOH and Local Health Department Partners from District 8, working on assigned sections of the Emergency Operations Plan Document, and sharing contact and population information with ISDH. In addition to Attachment A deliverables, PHEP has worked with IDOH to assist in organizing local vaccine clinics, table top exercises, and trainings. PHEP has acquired additional Memorandums of Understanding, MOU, throughout the community for potential resource and facility use in the event of a public health emergency. PHEP has also established a list of all public health volunteers that have signed up to work with the Bartholomew County Health Department.

Lead Program

In 2024, this department conducted six lead risk assessments. A lead risk assessment is conducted to identify possible lead hazards in the home of a child who has been diagnosed with an elevated blood lead level. During a risk assessment many samples are taken. Dust wipes are taken from the floors, any chipping or peeling paint is collected, and soil samples are collected in the yard from play areas, gardens and along the dripline of the foundation. In some cases, food samples are collected as well. These samples are then submitted to the Indiana Department of Health laboratory for analysis. A written risk assessment is then sent to the homeowner, tenant and other affected parties, outlining the risks found and corrective actions that may be taken. These risk assessments are very time consuming. The risk assessor will spend between four and eight hours on each case.

Tattoo Ordinance /Program Creation

Towards the end of 2024, the county Tattoo Ordinance, 2024-09 was passed. Since the passing of the ordinance, the environmental department has been working diligently to create the program to begin inspections for the county. This includes documentation creation such as the Plan Review Application, Artists Application and Inspection Forms. An EHS with this department has also been attending trainings to better understand the tattoo inspection process and ways to better the county to reduce communicable disease transmissions such as hepatitis through needle sharing. Along with the training, this department has invited all of the local tattoo facilities in Bartholomew County to attend and Q&A session on April 1, at 10:00am in the Council Chambers. This meeting will last an hour discussing the new ordinance and regulations being implemented as well as the timeline we anticipate to follow for the remainder of 2025.

Vital Records

The County Registrar and Assistant Registrar attend on-going trainings on Birth and Death record retrieval, issuance and policies and procedures for the Vital Records Division. The Indiana Vital Records Association has educational conferences in the spring and fall as well as additional monthly Webinars provided by the Indiana Department of Health. Meetings are held with the Suicide /Overdose Fatality Review Team monthly, and the Child Fatality Review Team every quarter.

Inspect 2 Go Data Management

The Inspect 2 Go Software data program began in 2021, with the goal of uploading existing septic and food files into a digital filing cabinet. As of January 2025 Inspect 2 Go is live and able to be used for inspection reports. We are currently negotiating with the IT Department to get tablets, mobile printers, and hotspots for Environmental Health Specialists to be able to complete inspections in the field. We meet twice a month with the Inspect 2 Go team to keep in touch with any programming bugs or issues we may face while we transition into going digital.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING DIVISION

Immunization Program/Clinic – The focus of the Health Department immunization program is to provide individuals with immunity against vaccine preventable diseases. Vaccines are available for infants, children, and adults. We accept Medicaid and most insurances. Some individuals may qualify for no cost vaccines if they are uninsured or underinsured for the State Publicly (317) funded program or the state funded Vaccine for Children (VFC) program. Immunization clinics for individuals age 6 years and younger is held every Thursday by appointment. Immunization clinics for children 7 years and older and adults are held on Mondays and Tuesdays by appointment. A record of previous immunizations is required for individuals who are not currently in the Indiana Immunization Registry.

Lead Program - Every child should have a lead test done at 12 and 24 months of age. Any child three to six (3-6) years of age should also be tested, if never tested, regardless of risk factors. Lead and nutritional information are available to the public at the Health Department. Education is also provided to everyone receiving lead testing. Case management is required for all elevated/toxic lead levels. Pregnant women should also have lead testing. Lead testing is available and is free of charge.

Tuberculosis (TB) - The Health Department maintains a surveillance system and TB case registry to ensure prompt reporting. The Health Department offers TB testing. TB medicine (provided by the Indiana Department of Health) is dispensed when ordered by the client's doctor. Clients are seen on a regular basis by an RN for an evaluation regarding medication compliance and effects for those with Latent TB and Active TB.

Communicable Disease Investigation- A Health Department function is to prevent epidemics and the spread of disease. Information and communicable disease reporting can initiate from laboratories, hospitals, doctor offices, Indiana Department of Health, and other health departments. Surveillance and investigation activities involve communicating with the infected individual, his/her contacts, and medical care provider(s). Mandated reports are filed with Indiana Department of Health (IDOH). Immunizations and treatment are provided to individuals based on disease investigation.

Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) Program/Clinic – Clinic services include Sexually Transmitted Infection Screening, diagnosis, treatment, and risk reduction counseling. All services are confidential. Services are provided to minors, age 13 and above, without parental consent. Eligibility requirements will be reviewed when a client is making an appointment. Depending on the IDOH guidelines, a minimal fee or insurance may be required as established by the IDOH criteria. Clients, including those diagnosed at other providers/facilities, and partners of any patients with an STI may receive treatment with medication provided by the Department of Health (IDOH). An appointment can last 45-60 minutes. Condoms are available on request.

School Health Program – Provides assistance to all Bartholomew County Schools including immunization assistance, educational opportunities, Vision and hearing screenings as needed.

HIV Counseling and Testing — Confidential appointments are available to any individual requesting testing. Testing is completed with the finger stick Insti-test. All positive Insti-test results require a venipuncture follow up test sent to IDOH lab for confirmation. HIV/AIDS education is tailored to address each individual's risk factors for HIV infection. An appointment may last 45-60 minutes.

Pregnancy Testing/Prenatal Vitamins— Pregnancy testing and Prenatal Vitamins are available by the health department at no charge.

Vitamins are available for the entire pregnancy in a 90-day supply. Women testing positive for pregnancy or receiving vitamins receive information regarding pregnancy, safe sleep, immunizations, information on prenatal care providers, and community resources.

Public Health Nursing (Home Visits) – High-risk individuals are a priority for our department. A Registered Nurse on an as needed basis carries out home visits for medication setup. Patients are scheduled to be seen on a bi-weekly basis. Referrals accepted from MDs, other agencies, and individuals.

Children's Dental Health Program- Emphasizes good oral hygiene, nutrition, and regular visits to the dentist. Consultations provided to school personnel on student's specific needs. The hygienist provides education for community groups, long-term care facilities, and assists with referrals for dental care for children 18 years and under. Dental education is offered to all students in elementary, middle and high school in the county. Classes consist of age appropriate dental presentations, activities, hygiene kits, and reading books. Dental screenings are performed in grades Pre-K, 2nd, 5th, and 7th. All students receive a toothbrush, toothpaste, floss, and brushing/flossing educational brochure. Referrals to dentist made based on dental screening result of the child. Assistance obtaining dental care also provided.

Sharps Disposal Program- Sharps containers are provided to individuals with a medical need. A proof of need from the physician or pharmacy is required on the first visit. Full container is returned to the Health Department and a new one is issued.

My Vax Indiana— Provides access to immunization records at anytime, anywhere around the world. Individuals must register in person at the Health Department and are provided with a personalized PIN to access their vaccine record online.

Health Education-Information and printed materials are available to individuals upon request.

Tobacco Prevention & Cessation Program (NRT)- Tobacco users interested in quitting are provided education, referral to Quit Now Indiana, and nicotine replacement therapy (18 years of age and older).

A1C Testing- Available twice a month

Child Passenger Safety Technician- Available to inspect, install, and check for recalls on car seats and booster seats.

Bike Helmets- Available at no charge, will size for correct fitting

Medication Lock bags/boxes- Available at no charge.

Medication Disposal Bags- available at no charge

Gun Locks- Available at no charge.
