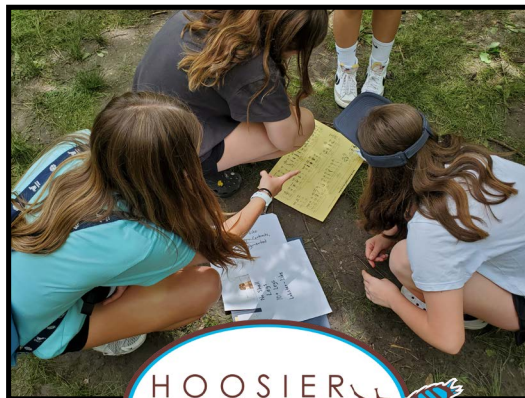
Hoosier Riverwatch Junior!

An exciting new program is coming to Indiana this fall: **Hoosier Riverwatch Junior!** [Hoosier Riverwatch](https://www.in.gov/riverwatch) (HRW) is a stream monitoring program managed by IDEM to engage the public in the process of water monitoring and to contribute to the collection of water quality data throughout the state.

While HRW is geared toward adult volunteers, there has been a need and demand for similar education geared toward youth in grades K-12. This hands-on experience can be adapted to indoor or outdoor spaces and may include exploring stream habitats near you. The lessons will explore concepts like watersheds, pollution, and water monitoring. Students will learn how to collect and identify macroinvertebrates and determine the physical and chemical characteristics of the stream. When they put this information together, they can assess the health of the stream.

All lessons are tied to Indiana's education standards, and the lesson modules come at little to no cost. Information for this program will be available on the HRW website this fall.

Reviving the Grand Calumet River

[The Great Lakes Areas of Concern story map](#) is a great way to engage your middle and high school students on real world environmental topics in Indiana and throughout the Great Lakes region. They can learn about human impacts on these habitats, past and current restoration efforts, and best management practices going forward.

Activity Corner

Candy Wrapper Turkey

- 1. Have students collect Halloween candy** wrappers that were going to be thrown away.
- 2. Print out template/outline** of a turkey body, if needed.
- 3. Bring glue**, scissors, googly eyes, and anything else that would be a fun addition!
- 4. Have students either glue down candy wrappers** or color in the body section of the turkey.
- 5. The main fun is the feathers!** Students should make the turkey feathers in whatever pattern they want out of candy wrappers.
- 6. To give them extra creative freedom**, let them decide what they will create with their candy wrappers. It could be a Halloween theme (spiders, bats, jack-o-lanterns) or a fall theme (leaves, turkeys, pumpkins, etc.).
