- 1. We will no longer have separate meetings for Probation providers.
- 2. Data PowerPoint will be shared with the minutes.
- 3. Documentation quality dashboard would we be able to expand boxes so we can see the entirety of the information?
  - a. Unfortunately, we are unable to make that change. The dashboard caps the amount of data that shows but initially we didn't know this would happen. - 5. Were there some other examples of concerns that had been found for reports? I know you mentioned some such as missing safety checklist, evidence-based practices etc.
  - a. We are seeing treatment plans that aren't very explanatory or have much detail.
  - b. If you request a CFTM document this, it will be helpful for us to see this.
- 6. Do you have samples of ideal content?
  - a. On the website <a href="https://www.in.gov/dcs/family-first-act/family-preservation-services/family-preservation-services-provider-meeting-notes/">https://www.in.gov/dcs/family-first-act/family-preservation-services-provider-meeting-notes/</a> there are some examples that were highlighted. We want to see what's outlined in the service standard, but we don't dictate the format.
- 7. Home safety checks, FCM and client are asking for decrease in weekly safety checks. Is there a way to meet the specifications but honor the request?
  - a. Knowing the family and keeping the case concerns in mind, you can be directive in your safety checks to those concerns.
  - b. If the CFTM decides it does not make sense to continue weekly safety checks be sure to document this in your reports.







Black: 7.08% Multiracial: 10.89% Hispanic/Latino: 9.05% White: 11.75%



# Is there evidence of progress with overall removals?

2022 Removal by Race report (removals per 1,000):

"Black Disparity" and "Multi Disparity" reflects how many <u>more</u> children of that race per 1000 were removed as compared to white removals.

- They are less likely to exit care with family-based permanency (i.e., be reunified or adopted, and instead "age out" more often)
- They are more likely to go to residential treatment or other congregate care settings
- If they do get adopted, it is more likely to disrupt, and...
- They spend longer in care than their white peers.
