AM Session

CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

Meeting called to order at 10:00am by Chairman Lee Turpen. Mrs. Candice Pope called roll and announced quorum. Everyone stood for the Pledge of Allegiance. Commissioner Valentine joined the meeting at 10:25am.

ADOPTION OF MINUTES

a. Adoption of minutes from the November 15, 2018 session.

A motion was made by Commissioner Mackey to approve the minutes as written. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Zartman. The motion passed.

INDIANA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

Mr. Murray Lowery reported that the date has been set for the 2019 Medical Directors Conference for April 16, 2019. The Stroke Center listings are now on the Health Departments website.

EMS FOR CHILDREN

Ms. Margo Knefelkamp reported that IEMSC has officially launched their Indiana Pediatric Emergency Recognition program in November. Year one 5 Emergency Departments will be recognized as pediatric ready or advanced pediatric. The PECC learning collaborative has been launched. More information will be shared as it is available. The Pediatric award nominations are being accepted.

INDIANA EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES ASSOCIATION (IEMSA)

Mr. Nathanial Metz reported out regarding the December conference. 132 certifications were given after the conference. The association has garnered the help of a legislation lobbyist. Meetings will be held on the 4th Friday of every even month.

PERSONNEL WAIVER REQUESTS

The following is requesting a waiver of 836 IAC 4-5-2 Certification and recertification; general Sec. 2. (a) Application for certification will be made on forms and according to procedures prescribed by the agency. In order to be certified as an emergency medical services primary instructor, the applicant shall meet one (1) of the following requirements: (1) Successfully complete a commission-approved Indiana emergency medical services primary instructor training course and complete all of the following: (A) Successfully complete the primary instructor written examination. (B) Successfully complete the primary instructor training program. (C) Be currently certified as an Indiana emergency medical technician. (D) Successfully pass the Indiana basic emergency medical services written and practical skills examinations within one (1) year prior to applying for certification as a primary instructor. (2) Successfully complete a training course equivalent to the material contained in the Indiana emergency medical service primary instructor course and complete all of the following: (A) successfully complete the primary instructor written examination. (B) Successfully complete the primary instructor training program. (C) Be currently certified as an Indiana emergency medical technician. (D) Successfully pass the Indiana basic emergency medical services written and practical skills examinations within one (1) year prior to applying for certification as a primary instructor. A motion was made by Commissioner Zartman to approve staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hamilton. The motion passed.

The following requested a waiver of 836 IAC 4-5-2 Certification and recertification; general Sec. 2. (a) Application for certification will be made on forms and according to procedures prescribed by the agency. In order to be certified as an emergency medical services primary instructor, the applicant shall meet one (1) of the following requirements: (1) Successfully complete a commission-approved Indiana emergency medical services primary instructor training course and complete all of the following: (A) Successfully complete the primary instructor written examination. (B) Successfully complete the primary instructor training program. (C) Be currently certified as an Indiana emergency medical technician. (D) Successfully pass the Indiana basic emergency medical services written and practical skills examinations within one (1) year prior to applying for certification as a primary instructor. Standard policy for testing for EMT and EMR has been 3 testing attempts total. The same is true for Primary Instructor candidates. The student would take the first two attempts than complete remediation and take third and final attempt. If not successful after the third attempt the student is required to retake an entire course before he/she could test again. The primary instructor test bank is a limited one. Mr. Cooper has had 3 attempts on the written examination without success. The normal and recommended procedure would be to repeat a Primary Instructor course before being able to attempt the examination again. Brandon Cooper has taken the exam three times: 8/22/2018 – 65%; 10/05/2018 – 73%; and 10/12/2018 – 77% He is requesting a 4th attempt at the exam. Staff recommends: Denial.

Brandon L. Cooper

A motion was made by Commissioner Zartman to deny the waiver. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Champion. The motion was approved; the waiver was denied.

PROVIDER WAIVER REQUESTS

The following is requesting a waiver of Rule 2: General Requirements for paramedic provider organizations 836 IAC 2-2-1 (g) (1) (g) Each paramedic provider organization shall do the following: (1) Maintain an adequate number of trained personnel and emergency response vehicles to provide continuous, twenty-four (24) hour advanced life support services. (2) Notify the commission in writing within thirty (30) days of assigning any individual to perform the duties and responsibilities required of a paramedic. Eaton EMTS are requesting a renewal for their waiver of the 24/7 rule. They have one paramedic and a few more interested. They run BLS when there is no paramedic available and call Delaware County EMS for ALS. Staff recommends: This waiver was originally granted at the March 2018 meeting for 6 months. Granted again on July 19, 2018 for 6 months

Eaton EMTs

A motion was made by Commissioner Mackey to approve the waiver for 6 months. The motion was seconded by Commissioner S. Brown. The motion was approved.

The following is requesting a waiver of 836 IAC 2-2-1 General requirements for paramedic provider organizations (g) Each paramedic provider organization shall do the following: (1) Maintain an adequate number of trained personnel and emergency response vehicles to provide continuous, twenty-four (24) hour advanced life support services. Batesville Fire and EMS are requesting a waiver of the 24/7 rule to maintain an adequate number of trained personnel at the paramedic level. The department currently has 12 paramedics, 2 AEMTs. They have implemented raises and schedule changes to aid in the coverage of ALS. Staff recommends: Approval due to being a renewal and showing effort to fix the issue.

Batesville Fire/EMS

A motion was made by Commissioner Mackey to approve the waiver for 2 years. The motion died with no second. After some discussion. A motion was made by Commissioner Champion to approve for 1 year. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hoggatt. The motion was approved.

The following is requesting a waiver of 836 IAC 2-14-3 Advanced life support non-transport vehicle specifications (3) Each advanced life support non-transport vehicle shall have an audible backup warning device that is activated when the advanced life support non-transport vehicle is shifted into reverse. (1) Warning lights of red or red and white, at the discretion of the owner, and shall conform with Indiana law. All lights on vehicle shall be in working condition. Jasper County SWAT is requesting a waiver of their ALS non-transport vehicle to not require the back-up alarm. This vehicle is used during SWAT calls and needs to be discrete while on scene. They are also requesting a waiver to allow blue lights on the vehicle as it is a police vehicle. Staff recommends: Approval based on previous Commission action.

Jasper County SWAT

A motion was made by Commissioner Zartman to approve staff recommendation. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hoggatt. The motion was approved.

The following is requesting a waiver of 836 IAC 2-7.2-1 General requirements for emergency medical technician-intermediate provider organizations 836 IAC 2-7.2-1 (f) (2) (f) The emergency medical technician-intermediate provider organization shall do the following: (1) Maintain a communications system that shall be available twenty-four (24) hours a day between the emergency medical technician-intermediate provider organization and the emergency department, or equivalent, of the supervising hospital using UHF (ultrahigh frequency) and cellular voice communications. The communications system shall be licensed by the Federal Communications Commission. (2) Maintain an adequate number of trained personnel and emergency response vehicles to provide continuous, twenty-four (24) hour advanced life support services. Southern Ripley County is requesting a renewal of waiver for 24/7 coverage at the ADV EMT level. Granted March 2018 for 2 years.

Southern Ripley County Emergency (Rescue 69) cert #0823

A motion was made by Commissioner Zartman to approve the waiver for one (1) year. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lardaro. The motion was approved.

2018 NATIONAL SCOPE OF PRACTICE MODEL

Dr. Michael Kaufmann presented the 2018 National EMS Scope of Practice Model to the Commission. After lengthy discussion regarding what is included in some levels of the Scope of Practice and what is excluded followed Dr. Kaufmann's presentation.

A motion was made by Commissioner Mackey to approve the 2018 Scope of practice with the staff recommended additions/extensions. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Valentine. The vote was taken 9 in favor 4 against the motion was approved. Chairman Turpen requested that the Scope of Practice be added to the March meeting agenda for further discussion. More discussion followed. [Note: This vote was reconsidered at a later point during this meeting and the decision to adopt the Scope of Practice was tabled until the March meeting.]

LEGISLATION UPDATE

Mr. Kraig Kinney gave an update on current legislation:

HB1063. School Safety http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/house/1063#digest-heading

Adds definition of a "bleeding control kit". Provides that, subject to an appropriation by the general assembly, each school corporation and charter school shall develop and implement a Stop the Bleed program (program). Provides that the department of education in collaboration with the department of homeland security shall develop and provide training for the use of bleeding control kits. Provides that, in all matters relating to the program, school corporation or charter school personnel are immune from civil liability for any act done or omitted in the use of a bleeding control kit unless the action constitutes gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct. Requires a school's safety plan to include the location of bleeding control kits.

Status: Passed Committee.

HB 1069 Yellow dot emergency medical information program

http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/house/1069

Establishes the yellow dot emergency medical information program (program). Specifies that the purpose of the program is to provide certain medical information to emergency medical services providers (providers). Provides that participation in the program is voluntary, and allows program participants to end participation in the program at any time. Requires motorists participating in the program to affix a yellow dot decal to the lower right interior corner of a participating automobile's driver side window. Requires a: (1) yellow dot program envelope (envelope); and (2) yellow dot information card (card); to be stored in the glove compartment of a participating automobile. Requires a provider to search the glove compartment of an automobile displaying a yellow dot decal. Provides that a provider may not: (1) search for contraband; or (2) search any location other than the glove compartment of a participating automobile; when searching for an envelope or card. Provides that contraband found during a provider's authorized search of a participating automobile's glove compartment may be: (1) reported to a law enforcement officer; or (2) confiscated by a law enforcement officer; if the provider was not acting under the direction of the law enforcement officer at the time of the search, or a law enforcement officer was not conducting a criminal investigation at the time of the search. Specifies that information contained on a card may be used to do any of the following: (1) Positively identify program participants. (2) Evaluate program participants for medical conditions that may impede or prevent communication with a provider. (3) Attempt contact with a program participant's emergency contact persons. (4) Evaluate a program participant's current medication, preexisting medical conditions, and recent surgeries when administering emergency medical treatment. (5) Share the information displayed on a card with another provider for the purpose of ensuring proper medical treatment. Provides that: (1) the bureau of motor vehicles; and (2) providers; are not liable for damages, including punitive damages, caused by any act, error, or omission related to the information displayed on a card or related to the storage of a card. Provides that a provider is not liable for any damages, including punitive damages, related to a provider's inability to establish contact with a program participant's emergency contact persons.

Status: Third Reading Passed.

HB 1269 Boards. http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/house/1269#digest-heading

Many provisions but EMS affected would be that the bill substitutes the Indiana Department of Homeland Security in place of the EMS Commission as the unit that grants waivers to the EMS rules. Adds a provision that "the Commission is the ultimate authority for orders issued under this section" so there would be an appeal right to waiver reviews by the department.

Status: Referred to House Select Committee on Government Oversight

SB 24 OWI and Public Safety Officials. http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/senate/24

Makes operating while intoxicated a Level 6 felony if the operator causes bodily injury to a public safety official or property damage to an authorized emergency vehicle.

Status: Referred to Corrections and Criminal Law Committee

SB 202 POST. http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/senate/202

Requires that a health provider assess an individual's mental health before the individual may execute a physician order for scope of treatment (POST) form. Removes artificially administered nutrition from inclusion in the POST form. Requires that there is space at the top of the POST form to indicate whether an individual has designated a health care representative.

Status: Referred to Committee on Health and Provider Services

SB 498 Mobile Integrated Healthcare http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/senate/498

Requires the office of the secretary of family and social services to reimburse certain emergency medical services provider agencies for covered services provided to a Medicaid recipient as part of a mobile integration healthcare program. Amends the definition of "emergency medical services" to include transportation services, acute care, chronic condition services, or disease management services as part of a mobile integration healthcare program. Requires the emergency medical services commission (commission), in consultation with the state department of health, to develop a mobile integration healthcare program and approve mobile integration healthcare program applications. Sets forth requirements of the commission concerning the mobile integration healthcare program. Requires the commission to establish and administer a mobile integration healthcare grant and establishes the mobile integration healthcare grant fund. Continuously appropriates money in the fund.

Status: Referred to Committee on Appropriations

SB510 EMS Personnel Licensure Interstate Compact

http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/senate/510

Implements the emergency medical services personnel licensure interstate compact.

Status: Referred to Committee on Health and Provider Services

SB 531 EMT seizure of drugs and paraphernalia http://iga.in.gov/legislative/2019/bills/senate/531

Requires the Indiana emergency medical services commission, after consultation with the state police department, to adopt a protocol concerning the seizure, transportation, and temporary storage of illegal controlled substances and drug paraphernalia. Authorizes an emergency medical services provider who has administered an overdose intervention drug to a patient to seize illegal controlled substances and drug paraphernalia that the provider observes in plain view. Provides immunity to the provider for acts or omissions occurring in connection with the seizure, transportation, and storage of illegal controlled substances and drug paraphernalia.

Status: Referred to Committee on Health and Provider Services

The Commission asked Mr. Kinney to provide them the legislation update in writing for them to review later.

Mr. Kinney reported to the Commission that there was no public comment during the public hearing. A brief discussion regarding the update followed.

A motion was made by Commissioner Valentine to approve the NEMSIS update as written. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Mackey. The motion was approved.

(a) Application for certification as a paramedic shall be made on forms provided by the agency. An applicant shall: (1) complete the required forms; and (2) submit the forms to the agency. (b) All applicants for original certification shall provide evidence of compliance with the requirements for certification. (c) Certification as a paramedic shall be valid for two (2) years. (d) Individuals who have failed to comply with the continuing education requirements shall not exercise any of the rights and privileges nor administer advanced life support services to emergency patients. Mr Leonard only has about 6 hours of audit and review and 8-10 hours of general continuing education. He is going to be completing PALS, ACLS, PALS, and PHTLS while he is still off work.

A motion was made by Commissioner Mackey to look at delaying the implementation of the scope of practice until the next meeting. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lardaro. After further discussion Commissioner Mackey withdrew his motion and Commissioner Lardaro withdrew his second.

A motion was made by Commissioner Mackey to reconsider the earlier vote on accepting the National Scope of Practice. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lardaro. The motion was approved.

More discussion followed.

A motion was made by Commissioner Mackey to table the Scope of practice consideration and approval until the March EMS Commission meeting. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Zartman. The motion passed to table the scope of practice until the March meeting.

APPROVAL OF DRAFT RULE LANGUAGE

Mr. Kraig Kinney clarified the process of the rule update for the Commission members. Mr. Kinney began the presentation of the proposed rule rewrite.

Mr. Kinney started going through 836 article one: Discussion was held throughout the presentation.

Rule One Definitions: the following was passed:

(18) (B) was discussed regarding the use of operator's license.

A motion was made by Commissioner Hoggatt to strike out the word "operator's" and just read "motor vehicle license". The motion was seconded by Commissioner S. Brown. The motion was approved.

Commissioner Craigin left the meeting at 2:23pm. Majority still present. Still maintained quorum.

A motion was made by Commissioner Lardaro to remove and consider 1-1-8 (m) (1) and (2) at this time and consider at a later date. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Hoggatt. The motion was approved.
