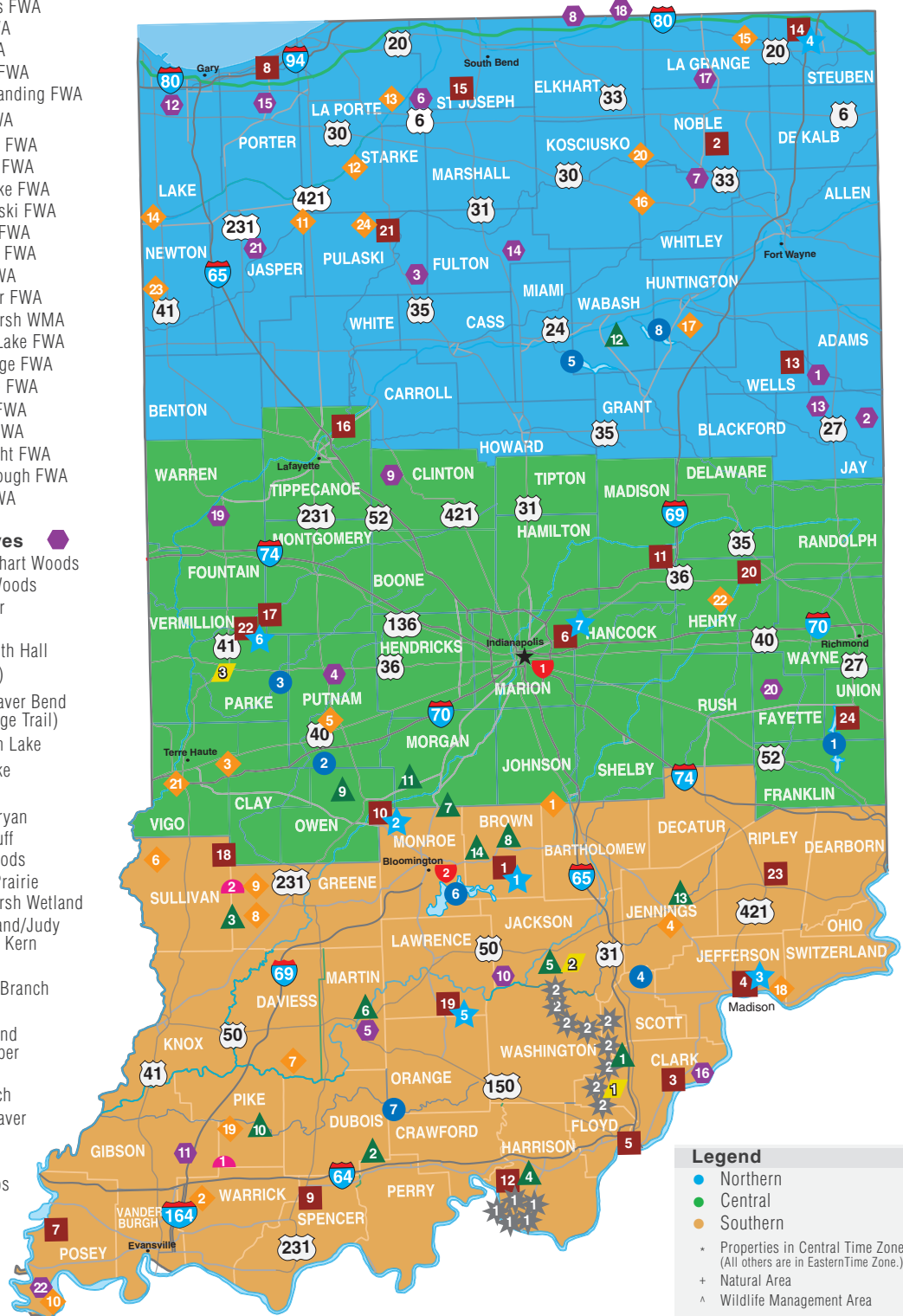

# Interpretive Naturalists Have Guided Hoosiers for 100 years

**A**lmost as long as there have been Indiana state parks, there have been interpretive naturalists to guide visitors around them.

McCormick's Creek State Park was dedicated as Indiana's first state park in 1916. Seven years later, Lucy Pitschler, calling herself a nature guide, started leading hikes through its cliffs, caves, and creeks, pointing out the names of flowers and trees, and dispensing facts about their life cycles. She fell in the love with the area after taking three weeks of vacation from her job as an artist and photographer and discovered she wanted to share her excitement and knowledge with others.

Pitschler's tours, which she gave as a volunteer, caught on. Three years later, McCormick's Creek covered her expenses and lodging so she could work on site from June 1 to Sept. 1. With that compensation, Pitschler brought professional nature guiding, a service already

offered in some other states' parks and in national parks, to Indiana. She became known as the "little lady in tennis shoes" because of her footwear, which was distinctive back then, and which she wore to improve traction while navigating McCormick's Creek's rocky terrain.

Col. Richard Lieber, director of the Indiana Department of Conservation, precursor to today's DNR, took notice in 1927, asking Pitschler to launch similar efforts at Turkey Run and Clifty Falls state parks.

A century later, the interpretive naturalist program has grown to 22 full-time interpretive staff at 36 state park properties, along with five regular part-time and 60 seasonal employees. The ways they share information with guests have grown with the times. Today's naturalists embrace those changes and seek new ways to tell stories about Indiana's state parks. Hikes and campfire programs are still given, but they have been joined by how-to

programs, nature centers and exhibits, art, and social media, to name a few.

The National Association for Interpretation defines interpretation as a mission-based communication process that forges emotional and intellectual connections between the interests of the audience and the meanings inherent in the resource. Nature is at the heart of the connections that interpreters work to make, but their role also includes sharing history, current issues, park rules, and more to a wide audience of parkgoers that includes adults and children. It's a challenge that today's naturalists are as eager to take on as Pitschler was.

### REACHING VISITORS WHERE THEY ARE

To connect with visitors, interpretive naturalists first need to find them. That usually means announcing a hike or event that people can then attend, but the COVID-19 pandemic upended that approach.

For a time, connection during the pandemic required reaching out to families in their homes. Many naturalists learned virtual tactics quickly—they made videos to post on state park webpages and social media about park nature and history. They also used those tools to guide workshops. With those new programs, naturalists wanted to keep parks in the minds of families, offer visitors a virtual escape, and give them information to use when they felt safe to venture out again. The programs also supplemented activities many children were learning in school.

Patoka Lake interpretive naturalist Dana Reckelhoff made videos introducing viewers to kayaking, among other topics. When

guests began returning to the lake in person, she found a few people who traveled to Patoka from as far away as Texas to do a tour with her because they saw her work on Facebook.

“It was amazing to see it have that kind of reach,” Reckelhoff said. “I never would have guessed that.”

Interpretive manager Angie Manuel said when visitors returned, they came back in greater numbers than before the pandemic, with a large part of the new audience still uncomfortable gathering in big groups. Many were seeing a state park or going camping for the first time, so they needed basic information. Instead of having campers, hikers, and visitors come to the naturalists as they had before, naturalists decided to go to the visitors.

Interpretive naturalists went out to trailheads, picnic shelters, and campgrounds and conducted short programs about wildlife, plants, or historical features. Some had informal conversations. Such activities are called roving programs, and talks generated by these smaller and more intimate settings became more interactive and personal than some prior offerings.

“Our guests guided the conversation a lot of times, and they really enjoyed that,” Manuel said. “We gained a lot of positive feedback—people don’t feel as intimidated when you come to them at their campsite as they do walking into a nature center or in an office environment.”

Roving programs can still be found at state parks. Reckelhoff used this technique in 2021 when she found many visitors were asking about the 17-year cicada brood. Instead of waiting for visitors to come to the nature center and ask similar questions, she trained her seasonal naturalists on cicada information, and they went to campsites and other popular park locations, gave programs, and answered questions. Visitors got the information they sought, and park staff interacted with more people than if they had waited for curious minds to come to them.

Interpretive naturalists also work to make programs relatable to whatever age group attends them.

“Sometimes when you have a program where you think you’ll have mostly adults, but then have a lot of children under 10 years old or a lot of teenagers, so it’s a constant adaptation and making things relatable to everyone,” said Indiana Dunes State Park interpretive naturalist Marie Laudeman.

She remembered giving a program on prickly pear cactus to a group of teenagers, many of whom were listening to music on headphones as she spoke. To help keep their attention, she told them to dance like they thought a cactus would dance, and many did.

“Even if they don’t remember the program, maybe they’ll walk away with that memory of dancing like a cactus with their friends,” Laudeman said. “We try to create great memories at our parks, no matter how people are engaging.”

When working with children, she’ll ask them to identify plants or other objects on the trail and take them close to a plant so they can get a good look at it. With adults, she tries to give the most accurate information she has and tell them facts they may not know.

Pokagon State Park interpretive naturalist Nicky Ball likes to chat with people before a program starts so she can learn something about them, then include that in her programs. For example, when she is giving a nature program and finds out someone in the group likes butterflies, she’ll make sure to talk more about butterflies during her presentation than she normally might.

Ball also tries to connect common life experiences. Pokagon has a rich Civilian Conservation Corps history, and in addition to mentioning the structures on property that the CCC men built, she’ll tell guests why Corps workers were there. Many were trying to support their family. They sent as much money as they could back home, and Ball said many parents can relate that to how they support their family today.

## CENTER OF ATTENTION

Although naturalists continue to reach visitors at campsites and throughout their parks, they still use nature centers to teach.

Laudeman said the Indiana Dunes State Park Nature Center is a great place to watch birds from its large window, so she developed a bird-window bingo game. Each time guests identify a different bird, they can mark it on their card, and the first player to get three in a row wins. She's also developed a scavenger hunt in which visitors can search for different information on the center's displays. The first to find all the information wins.

Reckelhoff designed Patoka's nature center with a mix of tactile and reading activities because she noticed visitors absorb information differently.

"Some people won't touch an exhibit at all, and they will be there and read all of the signs we have," Reckelhoff said. "Others are like me—they want to touch and feel, so many of our exhibits are interactive and give people an opportunity for that."

One example is a life-size man-made eagle's nest outside the building. Guests can climb into the nest and compare their arm reach to an eagle's wingspan while also learning what nests are made of and why eagles need them.

Pokagon remodeled its nature center last year and now has a combination of interactive and static displays. One of the park's goals was to tell the story of the Potawatomi and Miami peoples that used to live there. A black ash basket made by the great granddaughter of Leopold Pokagon, a Potawatomi leader and the park's namesake, is on display to help relate the tale.

"It's a great gateway into that conversation, and it's a beautiful piece of art," Ball said.

Nature centers can also be the setting for a variety of other events. Manuel said many naturalists tailor their programs to their own strengths and skillsets, which results in a diverse selection of topics offered throughout the state parks system.

"We have kite programs, geocaching programs, campfire programs—we love when naturalists take a part of themselves and bring it into their programming," she said.

Reckelhoff does so with a few of Patoka's events. A certified archery instructor and a skilled paddler, she conducts workshops on both activities. Charlestown State Park's Jeremy Beavin, who likes to paint, gives art workshops. Manuel goes to different parks to teach guests how to carve walking sticks.

## HAVE A QUESTION? PLEASE ASK

Interpretive naturalists do a lot of work to learn about their park through archives research, walking the park grounds and noticing changes, and cataloging plants and animals that live there. They tell the story of their park through their eyes, but sometimes a park visitor will find another topic fascinating. Naturalists love to hear what parkgoers have found, or what they would like to learn about on their next trip.

"I have a nature journal that I keep visitors' questions in, and I'm constantly learning," Laudeman said. "Sometimes those questions can lead to a future program.

"This job involves a lot of listening as well as talking, so learning what questions people have is very important."

Many times, guests share photos of animals and plants Laudeman sees frequently at Indiana Dunes, but she still loves to looking at what they show her because she wants to share the feelings of excitement and discovery people have when exploring the park for the first time.

Questions can also lead to guests becoming better stewards of a park. Reckelhoff has been asked a few times why some fields at Patoka look burnt, and now, on a few of the hikes she guides, she stops by such a field to explain what prescribed burns are and how they are necessary for both plants and animals to thrive. Laudeman does the same when she encounters rogue trails that have been created off a main trail, which parks don't allow, and hikers ask why they should not walk use them.

Ball has been asked questions about plant identification at Pokagon, and that interaction can turn into talks about invasive species and why gardeners should plant native plants when they can and keep invasives out of their yard. She also learned through conversations with guests that a few women wanted to do some long hikes on the property but lacked the necessary confidence. As a result, she set up a women's hiking group that meets once a month at the park to hike at different locations.

Interpretive naturalists have been at Indiana state parks to explain and serve park visitors ever since Lucy Pitschler started. Their passion is the park and the people who visit, and they'd love to talk with you.

"Connecting to visitors is something Indiana state parks has always taken very seriously," Manuel said. "We're grateful so many have found value in what we do, and we hope we can continue to find ways to connect for the next 100 years."



# HOW DNR PROPERTIES DIFFER

## MANAGED BY INDIANA STATE PARKS

Learn more at [stateparks.IN.gov](https://stateparks.IN.gov).

**State Parks (SP):** A total of twenty-four sites were established by the Natural Resources Commission as state parks, generally for their unique natural and/or cultural features. These unique sites conserve portions of Indiana's natural landscape, often through active resource management and restoration, and provide opportunities to enjoy those resources through developed recreational facilities and services. Each has at least one state-dedicated nature preserve (NP), and some have more. See Nature Preserves section for details.

**Reservoirs (Lakes):** Eight sites created for flood control, recreation (both water- and land-based, including hunting), generally by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE),

and leased to DNR. The exception is Hardy Lake, which is State-owned. Some also serve as water supply for local communities. These big lakes have SRAs (described later) and wildlife management units where active wildlife habitat management takes place to support a diversity of species for hunting and birding. USACE manages the areas immediately around the dams and regulates water levels throughout the year. J.E. Roush Lake, which was also created by USACE for the purposes listed above, is managed as a Fish & Wildlife area, as described under the Division of Fish & Wildlife section.

**Inns and Lodges:** Seven facilities within seven respective state parks that provide indoor overnight lodging, restaurants, gift shops, conference/meeting services, and management of the Indiana State Parks online store. These facilities are operated through Indiana State Park Inns, a business embedded within Indiana State Parks.

**State Recreation Areas (SRA):** Areas within reservoirs, state forests, or other DNR destinations with focused recreational facilities and services such as camping, beaches, boat ramps, picnic areas, trails, etc. Several are

managed as a part of the eight reservoirs listed earlier. Two SRAs at state forest destinations (Deam Lake and Starve Hollow) are managed as state park units in communication with the Division of Forestry. More on state forests is below.

**Off-road State Recreation Areas (OSRA):** Two sites (Interlake and Redbird) provide motorized and non-motorized off-road riding opportunities. Both also offer picnicking and hiking and Interlake SRA also offers hunting.

**Natural/Historic Areas & Satellite Sites:** These are too small to be stand-alone destinations with the diverse recreational facilities most properties offer, and they are not contiguous with the larger property that manages them. They are preserved and protected for their significant natural (two destinations) or cultural (three destinations) resources.

## MANAGED BY THE DIVISION OF FISH & WILDLIFE

**Fish & Wildlife Areas (FWA):** Indiana boasts 23 Fish & Wildlife areas. Sixteen have offices, are staffed, and are considered the primary FWAs. Their habitats are generally more intensively

managed, their hunting opportunities are generally more controlled, and sign-in at each is required. All FWAs are open for a wide array of wildlife-based recreation, including hunting, fishing, trapping, wildlife watching, walking, mushroom hunting, and berry picking. FWAs range in size from 3,000 acres to more than 10,000.

**Wildlife Management Areas:** WMAs usually comprise several hundred to 2,000 acres. Their habitats and use are generally not as intensively managed as FWAs. They are also open to a wide array of wildlife-based recreation activities.

**Wetland Conservation Areas:** WCAs are primarily associated with wetland habitats and are often purchased with revenue from waterfowl stamps. They are usually smaller in size, with the largest covering several hundred acres. Their habitats and use are often managed to control water levels, and sometimes use by people is also controlled.

The Division of Fish & Wildlife also manages three Healthy Rivers Initiative (HRI) conservation areas, 440 public access sites, 30 public fishing areas, and a number of small Game Bird Habitat Areas. For space reasons, none are listed in this guidebook.

## STATE FORESTS (SF)

These destinations are managed by the Division of Forestry. For more about each, see [on.IN.gov/forestry](https://on.IN.gov/forestry).

**State Forests (SF):** State forests offer diverse forest habitat, including dedicated nature preserves. Primitive camping is offered at most, including opportunities for dispersed camping at four of them for guests using designated trails. Other recreation opportunities include birding, fishing, hunting, and picnicking. Picnic shelters, horse trails, hiking trails, biking trails, and more are also offered. State forests are working forests. Check with the respective property office or [on.IN.gov/forestry](https://on.IN.gov/forestry) for advisories or to learn more.

**State Nurseries:** For purchasing native tree and shrub seedlings for conservation planting in Indiana. See page 8 for more.

## NATURE PRESERVES (NP)

More information is at [on.IN.gov/naturepreserves](https://on.IN.gov/naturepreserves).

State-dedicated nature preserves are areas identified as having unusual natural significance, and they hold substantial

protection under Indiana law. There are 297 State nature preserves representing 54,701 acres. Their primary purpose is to protect natural areas and the last remaining habitat for Indiana's rarest plants and animals. Recreation is often limited. Sensitive nature preserves may be closed or restricted to public access, but many others listed on page 4 have trails for hiking.

NPs may also be found within State Park and State Forest destinations and Fish & Wildlife areas, which may allow hunting, foraging, and other outdoor activities. Many more nature preserves outside of these larger DNR properties are owned and managed by the Division of Nature Preserves (DNP). At these destinations, foraging and collecting is not permitted. Still more NPs are owned by partner groups and are managed cooperatively with the DNP. For most NPs, expect small parking lots, natural tread trails, and no restrooms, shelters, or other facilities. Always check individual property regulations before you visit.

**Conservation Areas:** Areas owned and managed by the DNP but not formally dedicated as nature preserves. These areas may not be high-quality natural areas but may buffer and connect them.





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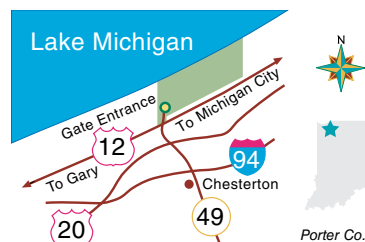
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This is a small boater's paradise and hiker's haven in lake country. Paddle or fish (electric boat motors only) the nine quiet connecting kettle lakes, hike the 29 miles of forested trails, stay overnight in a hillside family cabin, or visit the park's original one-room schoolhouse. ## Annual Permits<sup>+</sup>

### Important Information for Annual Entrance (Resident and Non-resident) and Golden Hoosier Permits:

- Permits admit cardholder and all persons accompanying cardholder in a single private, family-type, non-commercial vehicle or two motorcycles to all properties administered by the DNR, State of Indiana, where entrances are designated and fees are charged.
- Permits are valid from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31 of year issued.
- Permits can be used for parking fees at Falls of the Ohio State Park, but cannot be used for entrance into its Interpretive Center.
- Permits are valid at Indiana Dunes State Park, but not Indiana Dunes National Park.
- Permits may not be used at Indiana State Historic Sites or the Indiana State Museum.

### Golden Hoosier Passport\* Types • \$25

To be purchased by Indiana residents who meet one of the following criteria:

- Purchase a Golden Hoosier Passport if you are at least 65 years or older.
- Purchase a DHV if you are a Disabled Hoosier Veteran (DHV) who possesses or is eligible to purchase a DHV license plate.
- Purchase a SSDI if you are receiving or eligible to receive Social Security Disability Income (SSDI) under 42 U.S. Code 423 as described by the Social Security Administration.

The Golden Hoosier Passport (GHP) is not transferable to family members or any other individual. The eligible cardholder must be present in the vehicle at the time of use.

\*Anyone who has been issued a Prisoner of War license plate may receive a GHP free of charge. Call 317-232-4140 for more information.

### Off-Road Cycle (ORC) Permit

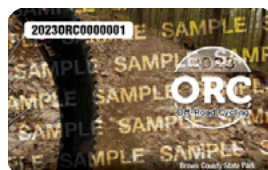

### Annual Off-Road Vehicle (ORV)

#### Trail-use Permit • \$95

Allows resident and non-resident cardholder to ride an ORV on the trails at Redbird OSRA or Interlake OSRA. Not valid for entrance to Indiana DNR State Parks, the Indiana State Museum or State Historic Sites. Does not cover other special-user charges for services and facilities within the property. Permit is issued to purchaser only and valid for one Off-Road Vehicle per visit. The DNR reserves the right to revoke permit at any time if improperly used.

### Annual Motorized Non-Resident DNR ORV Permit • \$20

Allows non-resident permit holders use of ORV trails at Interlake and Redbird OSRAs. Valid for one calendar year. Does not meet Indiana requirements for ORV use on county roads open to ORVs. Does not cover entrance fee.

*It is illegal to copy or reproduce any permit, and doing so will be considered fraud. Individuals presenting a copied or reproduced permit for sale or personal use will be prosecuted. There will be no refund or replacement of lost permits.*

Recreation buildings may be reserved up to one year (to the date) in advance of arrival. Prices range from **\$80** to **\$300** plus state sales tax and vary by property. \*At Fort Harrison SP, and Interlake and Redbird OSRAs, recreation buildings close at dusk.

\*\*At Pokagon SP, Swenson Lodge is only available from 8:30 a.m.–8:30 p.m. (Reservations made through the property only). The Warming Center is only available from 8:30 a.m.–10 p.m.

**Reservation Transfer:** A transfer from one campsite or date to another on a reservation will be allowed until close of business the day before arrival. **Transfers to another person are not allowed.** A fee for each site transfer will be assessed for this service.

**Walk-up Rentals:** Campsites that are not reserved become available for first-come, first-served camping on the day of arrival ONLY. Remember that camping reservations can be made until 2 p.m. ET on your day of arrival, so we recommend that you reserve ahead of time to guarantee your spot.

**Length of Stay:** Campers are limited to a maximum 14-night stay. After 14 nights campers must vacate the property for two nights before they can re-register for an additional stay. There is a requirement of two nights on non-holiday weekends, Thursday & Friday, Friday & Saturday or Saturday & Sunday. On holiday weekends, campers are required to reserve three nights unless otherwise designated. (See Holiday Minimum Stays on page 43.)

**Set-up:** May begin after checkout time on the first day, and the site must be clear by 2 p.m. on the last day, except Sundays (or Monday of a holiday weekend) when campers may stay

until 5 p.m. On Sundays and holidays, incoming campers cannot check in until 5 p.m. Campgrounds are closed at 11 p.m., and no set-up of campsites may occur during quiet hours. Generators or other similar equipment that produces noise may only be operated from 7 a.m. until 11 p.m.

### Number of People/Tents/Vehicles per Site:

Six is the maximum number of people allowed at a campsite. Each site may have two tents, or one camper and one small tent. Vehicles are limited to either 1 or 2 per site, depending upon the property. Additional vehicles must be parked in designated overflow parking lots.

**Age of Campers:** At least one person at the campsite must be 18 years old. The responsible party registering for the campsite shall remain at the site for the entire stay.

**Visitors to Your Site:** Day visitors are welcome. They must park in the campground parking lot and may walk to your campsite. Visiting hours are 7 a.m. until 11 p.m. each day.

### Accessibility for Persons with Disabilities:

For specific information about accessibility, please contact the property manager at the facility you wish to visit.

**Firewood:** Collecting firewood or cutting down standing trees is not permitted in state parks and recreation areas. Laws about the only types of firewood you can bring to DNR properties are below. You can purchase firewood at most state parks and reservoirs. Price varies by property.



## FIREWOOD

ONLY the following types of firewood may be used on DNR properties:

- Kiln-dried scrap lumber
- Wood from your home or other location in Indiana with the bark removed. (Ideally ½ inch of sapwood beneath the bark should also be removed.)
- Wood purchased from a department store, grocery store, gas station, etc., bearing a USDA compliance stamp or a compliance stamp from Indiana or from another state.
- Wood purchased from a local firewood vendor outside the property that has a state compliance stamp with it.
- Wood purchased from the property camp store or on-site firewood vendor and has a state compliance stamp.

Failure to comply with this rule may result in a citation and fine of up to \$500. More information is at [firewood.dnr.IN.gov](https://firewood.dnr.IN.gov)
