


PISGAH MARSH FISH & WILDLIFE AREA and DURHAM LAKE WILDLIFE CONSERVATION AREA

The Pisgah Marsh Area and Boardwalk is located approximately 9 miles north of Larwill, west of State Road 5. This area was set aside to preserve habitat resources for a variety of plant and animal species. The 445 combined acres of Pisgah Areas 1, 2 and 3 consist of grassland, wetland, upland forest and lake habitat. Pisgah Area 1 has approximately 128 acres, excluding 6.67-acre Pisgah Lake. The Durham Lake Area consists of 502 acres with a 13-acre lake. The Pisgah Marsh and Durham Lake areas are managed by Tri-County Fish & Wildlife Area. The Pisgah Marsh area is a hidden treasure in northeast Indiana. This unique area provides the opportunity to see grassland, marsh, lake and upland habitats. In an attempt to help preserve the sensitive area, the Pisgah Marsh Boardwalk and Golden Eagle Deck was constructed in Area 1 to provide access to the property.

Area 1: Pisgah Marsh Wildlife Diversity Area
Access to Area 1 is limited to the boardwalk ONLY. ADA-approved parking and restrooms are available. Bus parking is available in Lot 1. Please park in designated parking areas and stay on the boardwalk (see map).

Please do not disturb or feed the wildlife. Pets, alcohol, bicycles, rollerblades and skateboards

PISGAH MARSH AREAS 1, 2 AND 3

The Pisgah Marsh Area is home to more than 290 bird species and provides excellent wildlife viewing throughout the year.

Please be courteous to neighboring landowners. Look for property boundary and safety zone signs. Do not trespass on private property.

WILDLIFE WATCHING

Traffic on public roads through Pisgah Marsh/Durham Lake WCA FWA is governed by state and county laws. All other roads are limited to foot traffic only.

NO camping and NO swimming allowed. PLEASE READ AND OBEY ALL SIGNS.

- Hunting opportunities for woodland game, upland game, waterfowl and furbearers are available.
- Check-in is required. All hunting seasons and bag limits apply. See a copy of the current hunting regulations for details.

HUNTING

- There is a special size and bag limit for largemouth bass. All other species' size and bag limits apply. See a copy of the current fishing regulations for details.
- Small boat access available. No gas motors permitted.
- Primary species include largemouth bass and bluegill.
- No check-in is required for fishing.

Fishing

The Durham Lake area is open to fishing and hunting. Special rules and regulations may exist. Contact Tri-County FWA for details.

DURHAM LAKE AREA



Limited access is allowed on Area 2 and Area 3. Please ask for details at Tri-County FWA headquarters.

Area 2 and Area 3

are prohibited on the boardwalk. Hunting, fishing and collection of any species is strictly prohibited. Property is closed sunset to sunrise except by permit.

FUNDING FOR FISH AND WILDLIFE

The DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife sells hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses. All revenue is used for managing fish and wildlife resources in Indiana. No license money goes into the state general fund.

The DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife sections also receive money through the Sport Fish and Wildlife Restoration Program administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Indiana receives approximately \$11 for every person that purchases a fishing license and \$22 for every person that purchases a hunting license. Currently, Indiana receives approximately \$8 million in federal reimbursement. This money is used to manage fish and wildlife resources in Indiana. So, even if you don't hunt or fish, you can buy a combination license at \$25/year and Indiana will receive an additional \$33 in federal funds to be used for fish and wildlife conservation.
