Managing logjams in waterways

The Division of Water regularly addresses inquiries from property owners regarding the management of logjams, particularly in the aftermath of flooding and significant precipitation events.

A logjam is defined in Indiana Code as an accumulation of lodged trees, root wads, or other debris that impedes the ordinary flow of water through a waterway. Per IC 14-28-1-3.7, a logjam is characterized by a blockage that traverses the waterway, causes upstream ponding, or results in significant bank erosion.


In a similar vein, a "mass of wood debris" is classified as an accumulation of lodged trees or other woody material that causes or threatens to cause flooding on a road or private property, impedes navigation by boat, or reduces the capacity of a waterway to transport water.

Property owners are generally accountable for the removal of logiams on or bordering their property. In cases in which the stream is classified as a regulated drain, the County Drainage Board assumes this responsibility. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) does not provide debris removal services.

Logjam removal may fall under the purview of activities regulated by the Indiana Flood Control Act. Consequently, property owners may be required to obtain a permit before undertaking such work.

Administrative rules, including permit exemptions, have been established for logjam removal activities.

Recently, the DOW updated its Regulatory Guide for Removal of a Logjam or a Mass of Wood Debris from a Floodway. This document outlines key considerations that determine whether a permit is necessary for logjam removal. We encourage all interested parties to consult this guide for detailed information on navigating the regulatory landscape surrounding logjam removal.
